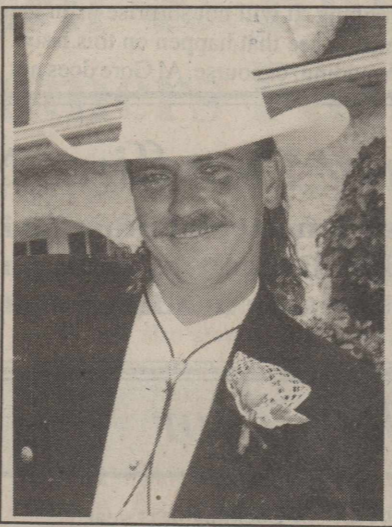
He will be joined by bass guitar player and vocalist, Steve Smith, of Floydada.

Council rewords curfew ordinance and pledges support for airport

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, June 20, and approved an Emergency Management ordinance, an airport resolution, and a city curfew amendment.

Mayor Bobby Gilliland explained to the council, "Ordinance No. 827 gives the Emergency Management Coordinator (Don Daniel) the authority to call in any emergency vehicles or equipment needed during a disaster."

"County Judge Hardin has the higher power to call in outside help in case of a disaster in Floyd County. Lockney Mayor Gary Marr and I need to go through Judge Hardin and Daniel during a disaster," Gilliland added.

Don Daniel was selected as the Emergency Management Coordinator for Floyd County on September 21, 1999 by Judge Hardin, Floydada Mayor Gilliland, and Lockney Mayor Marr. This was in accordance to the Texas Disaster Act and authorized by the governor of Texas.

Schacht made the motion to approve the airport Resolution No. 271 and other paper work needed. It was seconded by Councilwoman Bettye King and unanimously passed.

The airport resolution states: "The City of Floydada intends to make certain improvements to the Floydada Municipal Airport...the total project

cost is estimated to be \$1,957,000...to request financial assistance from the Texas Department of Transportation...the City of Floydada will be responsible for 10 percent of total project costs currently estimated to be \$195,700..."

"...directs the City Manager to execute on behalf of the City of Floydada, at the appropriate time, and with the appropriate authorizations of this governing body, all contracts and agreements with the State of Texas, represented by the Texas Department of Transportation, and such other parties as shall be necessary and appropriate for the implementation of the improvements to the Floydada Municipal Airport."

The council unanimously approved an amendment to the City Curfew Ordinance. Floydada Police Chief Darrell Gooch addressed the council,

"The way our curfew ordinance is worded it gives an 11 P.M. curfew on weekdays and a midnight curfew on weekends."

"The problem is, Friday is a weekday. The kids must be home by 11 P.M. on Friday and on Sunday they can stay out until midnight (the next day, Monday, being a school day)."

"We had rather have the 11 P.M. curfew for Sunday through Thursday and the midnight curfew for Friday and Saturday."

"We advise the kids to go home first, then we began giving tickets after midnight. This does not apply to working students or being with their parents." Gooch said.

Upon the recommendation of City Manager Gary Brown and Mayor Gilliland, the council approved Resolution No. 272, the selection of the engineering firm, Parkhill Smith and Cooper, Inc., to be first on the ranking list for a three year contract with the City of Floydada. They will oversee the engineering of the Texas Community Development grant project.

The motion was made by Schacht and seconded by King. Councilmen Jon Nielson and Sheldon Sue abstained.

The council heard from Virginia Chavez, employee of the Department of Human Services, on a possible Alzheimer's disease care program for Floydada.

"We need volunteers from the city council. We need to know how many Alzheimer people are being cared for at home. We want to know if there is a need in Floydada."

"We work with and provide training for the police departments. In Lubbock, I.D. Bracelets are provided free to Alzheimer patients. Please contact us in Lubbock," Chavez concluded.

Have You Ever Wondered What Happened To The 56 Men Who Signed The Declaration of Independence?



Five signers were captured by the British as traitors, and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons serving in the Revolutionary Army; another had two sons captured.

Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or hardships of the Revolutionary War. They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor.

Carter Braxton, of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British Navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.

Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him, and poverty was reward.

Vandals or soldiers looted the properties of Dillery, Hall, Clymer, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Rutledge, and Middleton.

At the battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson Jr., noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. He quietly urged General George Washington to open fire. The home was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt.

Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and she died within a few months.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and gristmill were laid to waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home to find his wife dead and his children vanished. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion and a broken heart.

Norris and Livingston suffered similar fates. Such were the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution.

What Kind Of Men Were They?

Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners; men of means, well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured. They were soft-spoken men of means and education. They had security, but they valued liberty more. They pledged: "For the support of this declaration, with firm reliance on the protection of the divine providence, we mutually pledge to each other, our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor."

First arguments in lawsuit against LISD to be heard by judge

Both sides in the LISD drug testing controversy agreed, on Friday, to ask U.S. District Court Judge Sam Cummings, of Lubbock, for a summary judgement.

Lawyers representing the American Civil Liberties Union and Larry Tannahill, and those representing Lockney School District have agreed to present their facts of the case to the judge and bypass a trial by jury. Both sides have indicated they would appeal the matter all the way to the Supreme Court.

Explaining a summary judgement, local District Attorney Becky McPherson said, "Usually a jury decides the facts of the case and the judge decides the law. If both sides can agree on what the facts are then

they can bypass a jury trial. Both parties are saying they want the judge to tell them if he thinks the law allows the school to drug test."

Lockney resident Larry Tannahill has sued Lockney ISD over the district's drug testing policy for 6th-12th grade. The mandatory drug testing applies to all students, faculty and staff. After an initial testing of all students 10% of the students would be random tested.

Tannahill contends the drug testing policy is unconstitutional and violates his son's right to be free from unreasonable search and seizure.

If both sides can agree on the facts of the case the judge will only need to rule on the law. If the facts are also in dispute the judge will have to issue a

judgement on facts and the law.

"The judge can issue a partial summary judgement," said McPherson. "In this instance he could agree with one side on part of his case and the other side on part of their case. Then both sides would have to decide if they wanted to appeal his partial judgement and get a complete favorable ruling in their favor."

"If you get granted a full summary judgement that means the judge says you are 100% right in your position. The side who is granted a full summary judgement in their favor would obviously not appeal that judgement, but the other side could appeal."

It is not known at this time when the facts of the case will be presented to Judge Cummings.

Mosley wins national art award

Nicole Mosley of Lockney was honored along with 283 young artists and writers this past weekend at the National Scholastic Art and Writing Awards ceremony at the John F. Kennedy Center for the performing arts in Washington, D.C.

The awards ceremony hosted by Saturday Night Live's Molly Shannon included videotaped greetings from Justin Timberlake of 'N Sync and Hillary Rodham Clinton. Special guest speaker was Marian Wright Edelman, writer and founder of the Children's Defense Fund who encouraged the "best of our nation's young creative artists and writers to continue to write and create, but also to serve."

Mosley's textile and fiber design entitled 'My World' was one of 73 American Vision Awards selected from over 15,000 artworks that were judged in the national competition.

"The creation of this piece began when my mother (who's also my teacher) read a poem by Langston Hughes entitled 'I'll Make Me a Word,'" Mosley said. "Our assignment was to use any media to create a piece that

represents what we would want to include if we could make our own world."

Since fabric dyeing and batik is her favorite media, Mosley utilized her expertise in this area to create her award-winning work.

The design incorporates everything that she loves, from the activities that she is involved in, the people in her life and the goals that she has set for herself.

"I hope that people take the time to really look at my design and see the happiness and fun that is going on in my piece," Mosley said. "Perhaps, then, they can see a part of me without even talking to me and learn about the person I am through my art."

The 2000 National Scholastic Art Exhibit which includes 283 American Vision, Gold Key, and Portfolio winners will be at the Corcoran Gallery in Washington D.C. until July 17th and will continue on to the Steuben Gallery in New York.

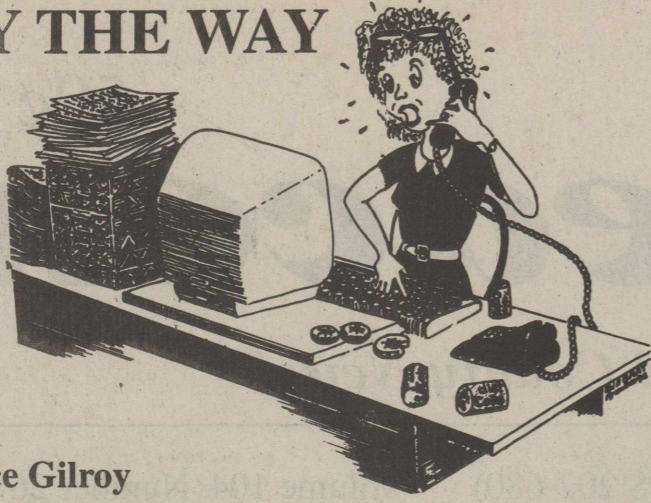
Students attending the awards weekend also participated in a book-making event entitled "Make Your

A majority on the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that student-led prayer at a school sporting event near Houston is a violation of the United States Constitution.

Three sane members of the Court said it is not. We agree with the three court members, Rehnquist, Scalia, and Thomas, who disagreed with the majority. No matter what our thoughts are, the Court's ruling will stand until another President appoints at least two more members who agree with those who disagreed.

In the meantime, the ACLU and their fellow travelers can, and will, revel in the sweet taste of victory. They have won this one, and, to them, it was a big one. No sooner than the court's ruling was announced, there appeared on our computer screen a message from a reader in Houston, chortling that we had lost another argument. The message came from a Dennis Oakes in Houston. He also suggested we change the name of our web site, although we fail to see the connection.

Well, Mr. Oakes, we are not strangers to losing arguments. We lost one to the Japs more than 50 years ago on Corregidor, and suffered mightily for

a number of years. That did not make the cause for which we fought any less worthwhile. Nor did it make us feel we should not have made the fight.

As an after thought, we refer Mr. Oakes, and others who think as he seems to think, to the Supreme Court's Dred Scott case of many years ago. He will probably understand what we mean.

Quite frankly, we do not believe the ruling will change the outcome of one football game anywhere in the land. Indeed, we doubt that many prayers are offered up beseeching the Almighty for victory to those doing the praying. I rather imagine the prayers are offered up asking for safety and guidance in the difficult task ahead. It has been many, many, years since we put on a football uniform, but I do not remember anyone asking God to help us clobber those other guys.

This is not the first time we have disagreed with the Supreme Court's majority opinion. It probably won't be the last time, either. The court has been known to reverse itself, or modify its thinking. It will not surprise us in the least to see that happen on this issue. Providing, or course, Al Gore does not

become the next President.

Speaking of Al Gore, we see by the papers that those thousands of missing White House e-mails will evidently stay missing. When they first turned up missing, we were told to never mind, that the backup tapes would provide all the information. It would just be a matter of time, while technicians went through the process of retrieval. Now it turns out they are, fortunately for Mr. Gore, missing for good. The Clinton White House, including Al Gore and Janet Reno, can now get a good night's sleep. At least a portion of the record dealing with illegal fund raising is now safe from prying Congressional eyes.

Those prying Congressional eyes have now turned to another set of (temporarily) missing (super secret) tapes at the Los Alamos laboratory in New Mexico. Dear Editor

This letter is in response to Theresa Payne's Letter to the Editor in last week's Hesperian-Beacon.

I would like to start off by saying Floyd County has one of the lowest tax rates in the state. The following is the 1998 tax rate for some surrounding counties and are based on \$100.00 valuation of real property, homes and land:

Hale County, 46.37¢; Brisco County, 59.26¢; Swisher County, 64.00¢; Crosby County, 72.45¢; Motley County, 79.00¢; and Floyd County at 36.22¢.

One of the reasons our tax rate is so low is because of the tax on personal property.

The City of Floydada and Caprock Hospital District are the only two taxing entities in Floyd County that do not collect taxes on personal property. FISH, the City of Lockney, and the Lockney Hospital District, all collect taxes on personal property.

It takes a certain amount of resources to operate each of these entities. If we were to cut out taxing personal property we would have to raise taxes on real property approximately 30% to raise the same revenue. As a County Commissioner this is not an option for me.

I feel that when this tax was put into place the reason was to help spread out the tax burden. Not everyone owns a home or farm land, so this would be a way for others to help contribute.

Theresa Payne, the lady who wrote the letter to the editor, is a good example of what I am talking about.

The only county taxes Mrs. Payne pays is on her two vehicles. If Mrs. Payne was not taxed on her vehicles she would not contribute anything to our county, city, school, or hospital.

Given the fact that Mrs. Payne's

husband is a police officer for the City of Lockney, whose salary comes from taxes, including personal property taxes, makes me feel that she just wants a free ride.

Many other people in our county do not own land or a home. But they do help spread the tax burden, when they own a newer vehicle, or R.V.

The ones who take it on the chin are the ones who own a home, farm land, newer vehicles, and some type of R.V.

If Mrs. Payne had her way, people like her would pay nothing and the people who own their homes and land would pay even more. Again, without revenue from personal property taxes we would have to look at raising taxes approximately 30% on homes and farm land.

A breakdown on the distribution of revenue from taxes currently looks like this: On a \$21,625 vehicle in Lockney: Lockney ISD would get 1.21884, or \$263.00; Floyd County would get 0.3622 or \$78.32; Lockney Hospital District would get 0.35701 or \$77.85; and the City of Lockney would get 0.37906, or \$82.17.

I want to make it clear, I am not saying I like this tax at all. But we cannot asses a tax that is 100% agreeable to everyone. Some will always pay too much and some too little.

As for Mrs. Payne's suggestion of a petition, with 600 signatures, to repeal the tax--she is mistaken. There is no law that would allow a petition, with any number of signatures, to repeal this tax.

However, your elected officials will listen to you.

Keep in mind, they are also forced to pay these taxes, and I assure you we don't like to pay taxes either. However, if you want to continue to have the quality services we enjoy today--

good schools, hospital, city and county services, fire, and law enforcement--this is what these taxes provide.

I will close by saying, I know it is a burden to have to pay this tax because it is also a burden to me. However our taxes are still lower than most counties in the state and I personally feel we get a good return on our tax dollar.

In reference to a petition being passed around town about the vehicle taxes, and in response to a letter to the editor last week about taxation of personnel vehicles. I would like to address this subject as someone actively involved in trying to run a city with a limited budget.

The City of Lockney is operated with a total of 7 employees. We are not doing anything, but necessary services for the citizens of Lockney. We supply ample clean water; we provide a place for your household sewage; we provide garbage pickup at your house; we provide police services; we maintain a few parks for public use; we keep your paved streets sealed-coated, and the dirt streets as smooth as possible. The services are all paid for from either taxes or charges for those services which amount to the same thing. I would like to inform the people renting housing in the city that property owners are the ones paying the most in taxes, and they also have to pay tax on their vehicles also. The personal property (vehicle tax) was put in place to help spread the tax burden to more people. Yes the city and other taxing entities could take this tax away, but let me assure you that it takes the same amount of money to run these entities and if that tax were dropped, I'm certain either usage fees or property taxes will be raised to offset the drop.

The other subject discussed at the last council meeting was on taxing motorcycles every year, with no consideration to the age of the cycle. It is my personal opinion that this should have been set up like cars, where after seven years old they are dropped off the tax roll. I'm sure the council will be discussing the impact of this policy also in the coming months, and I expect it to be changed at least from

the city of Lockney next year.

Keep in mind that there are no free rides. If you aren't paying some taxes then the rest of the world around you is paying your part.

Lockney Police Report

June 10, 2000, Lockney Police stopped a red Ford for speeding on F.R. 378 (N) just after midnight. The driver of the vehicle, Tiofilo Juarez, 39, of Lockney subsequently arrested for Driving While Intoxicated and taken to the Floyd County Jail. A passenger in the vehicle Daniel Salas, 41, of Big Spring had a warrant for his arrest from the Floyd County Court. He was also placed under arrest and taken to the Floyd County Jail. According to Lockney Police Chief Jerry Edwards, "Salas attempted to conceal his true identity by giving a false name and birth date. Salas was also charged with Failure to Identify."

June 12, police were called to a domestic disturbance just outside of the city limits on F.R. 97. While responding to the call the suspect in the disturbance drove past the patrol unit. The suspect was stopped in the 200 block of S. Main Street. The driver of the vehicle Andres Hernandez Jr., 24, of Plainview, arrested for Driving While Intoxicated.

"The passenger, Michael Salazar, 25, of Lockney, was the person involved in the disturbance," said Edwards. "Salazar was also intoxicated and was arrested for Public Intoxication."

June 13, just before 3:00 a.m. police stopped a white Chevy P/U for speeding on U.S. 70. The driver of the vehicle, Coy DeWayne Holmes, 20, of Floydada, was arrested for Driving While Intoxicated and taken to the Floyd County Jail.

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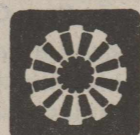
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Sanders and Waldrop wed in evening wedding ceremony

New technique for incomplete spinal cord injuries

A new assisted walking program could help some individuals with incomplete spinal cord injuries reach a greater level of independence.

With the use of supported treadmill ambulation training, or STAT, Dr. S. Ann Holmes hopes to "retrain" nerve cells to work with minimum connection to the brain. Holmes is an assistant professor of physical medicine and rehabilitation at Baylor College of Medicine.

Dr. Holmes' goal is to restore a degree of mobility that would allow some individuals to walk short distances, making it easier for them to function at home and at work.

Researchers at Baylor and the

Houston Veterans Affairs Medical Center (VAMC) are studying the effectiveness of STAT on patients with some motor function below the injury site. Results of a pilot study are promising and a larger-scale, two-year study is now underway.

"Past studies have shown this type of treatment to be helpful in regaining some mobility, but is has yet to become standard practice," said Holmes, also VAMC medical director of the spinal cord injury service.

"We hope to improve strength, and, in turn, make them more function walker."

STAT patients walk on a treadmill while supported by a harness and sus-

pension device. Initially, 40 percent of the body weight is supported. As the program progresses, the degree of support decrease while time and treadmill speed increase. During training, two physical therapists provide assistance by positioning the patient's feet in a proper stepping pattern.

The pilot study enrolled three participants who had been injured more than two years ago. Following the three month training period, all showed improved gait speed and gait distance while reducing the amount of

energy required to walk.

The new study, funded by the VA Central Office, will include patients who are six months to two years post-injury. Participation is not limited to veterans.

The researchers will also test methods which can be used to identify different patterns of injury. This should help physicians determine, beforehand, good candidates.

Each year, nearly 8,000 spinal cord injuries occur in the United States.

Tips on how to stay healthy in hot weather

The oven that is fired by summer heats up quickly. With several days of record-setting temperatures already recorded in Texas this spring, the long weeks ahead can pose serious health problems.

Heat danger spans many months in the state, according to the Texas Department of Health (TDH). The department's Bureau of Vital Statistics recorded 98 deaths from heat-related causes in 1998, the last year for which complete figures are available. Most often, the elderly, the very young, people with other illnesses or those without access to air conditioning are the victims of intense, prolonged heat.

The body normally cools itself by sweating, but the combination of high temperatures and high humidity can cause this natural cooling system to work overtime. Dehydration and heat illness can result if a person does not replace fluids and salts lost during perspiration. Also, when humidity is high, sweat does not evaporate efficiently, preventing the body from releasing heat quickly. This heating of the body to dangerous levels may result in a heat illness.

Symptoms of a heat illness include heavy sweating, muscle cramps, weakness, dizziness, nausea, weak but rapid pulse and headaches. People with these symptoms should find shade and ventilation and drink water.

If fluids are not replaced quickly, heat stroke can follow causing extremely high body temperature, red and dry skin, rapid pulse, confusion, brain damage, loss of consciousness and, eventually, death. For severe symptoms, get the victim into shade, call for emergency medical services and start cooling the person immediately with cool water or by fanning.

Staying in an air-conditioned area, either at home or in a public place such as a mall, library or recreation center, is the most efficient way to combat heat. If air conditioning is not available, pull the shades over the windows and use cross-ventilation and fans to cool rooms. In areas of high temperatures and high humidity, however, turn off the fans or aim them through a window to blow the hot air out. A cool shower or bath also is an effective way to cool off. Limit the use of a stove and oven to keep temperatures lower in the home.

Children especially can quickly become dehydrated. They need to drink fluids frequently, especially water, and wear light, loose clothes. Avoid drinks that are heavily sweetened or contain caffeine. Check on children often, especially if they are playing outside in high temperatures.

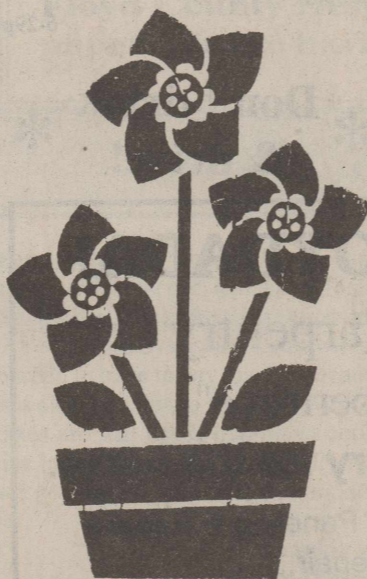
Other heat precautions:
• Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle during hot weather.
• Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle during hot weather.

• Drink plenty of fluids, but avoid drinks with alcohol, caffeine or a lot of sugar. Start drinking fluids before going out into the heat.

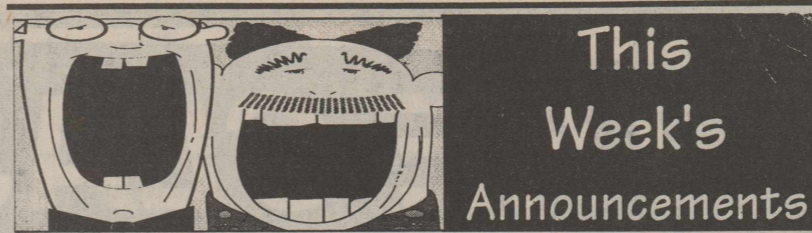
• Plan strenuous outdoor activity for early morning or in the evening when the temperature goes down.

• Take frequent breaks when working outside and wear sun block, hats and light, loose-fitting clothes.

- Eat more frequently but be sure meals are well balanced and light.
 - Avoid dressing infants in heavy clothing or wrapping them in warm blankets.
 - Check frequently on people who are elderly, ill, or may need help.
 - Check with a doctor about the effects of the sun and heat exposure when taking prescription drugs, especially diuretics or antihistamines.
 - At first signs of heat illness (dizziness, nausea, headaches, muscle cramps) move to a cooler place, rest a few minutes, then slowly drink a cool beverage. Seek medical attention immediately if conditions do not improve.
 - Pay attention to pets. Be sure they have plenty of water and do not leave them closed up in parked cars or hot buildings.
- The best defense against heat-related illnesses is prevention. Staying cool, drinking plenty of fluids, wearing cool clothing and monitoring outdoor activities all are key to staying healthy in hot weather.

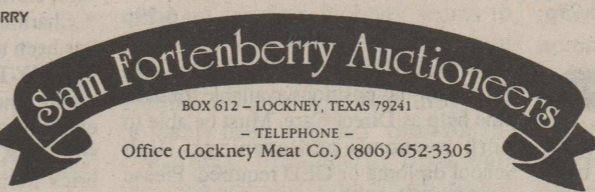
