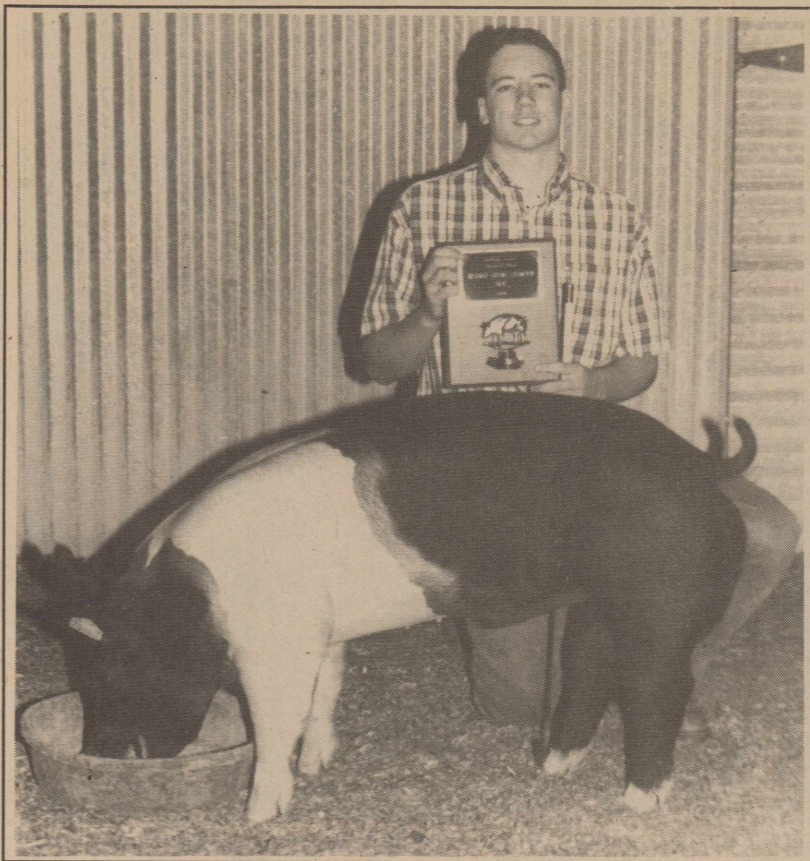

## Extension agents report to County Commissioners

tance is pending. This followed a unanimous vote of approval by the commissioners to select only public members for this committee.

Floyd County Agents J.D. Ragland and Melissa Long gave brief reports to the commissioners.

Ragland said, "We are finalizing our plans for the Caprock Cotton Conference which is scheduled on January 23rd.

"Our Floydada local stock show is scheduled for Saturday, January 20. While our Floyd County Stock Show will be the following week on January 25-27.

"Our schedule is a little different from years past. We will have our lamb show on Thursday, Friday we will have our steers and heifers show. On Saturday, we will conduct our swine show, and on the same day we will have our Auction Sale."

"Both Lockney and Floydada schools will be turned out all day on Friday, January 26th. Then we will go to other stock shows in Fort Worth, San Antonio, and Houston," Ragland concluded.

Long told the commissioners, "We are getting back in full swing with our extension and education clubs that were postponed during December.

"Our Head Start program is scheduled this week at Duncan Elementary where they teach food nutrition and safety.

"The 4-H fund raiser this year will again be the concession stand at the Floyd County Stock Show. On Saturday we will have a plate lunch ready for everyone.

"The 4-H concession stand and the auction sale are our two major fund raisers for 4-H during the year. The money goes to all the kids in 4-H and not just to the ones participating in the stock shows," Long said.

County Treasurer Mary Shurbet gave the monthly and quarterly financial reports to the commissioners.

The monthly December 1, 2000 beginning balance was \$361,551.70 and receipts were \$155,687.35. Transfers in and out were \$148,245.21, while \$162,097.15 was disbursed. The December 31, 2000 ending balance was \$355,141.90.

### PCG focused on 2001 producer needs

Members of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Board of Directors will meet Wednesday, January 17 in Lubbock to discuss the organization's legislative priorities for 2001.

The PCG Board has been working for several months to fashion a preliminary set of goals to bring both short- and long-term relief to growers in 2001. The ill effects of the 2000 growing season piled on top of poor economic outcomes in previous years have virtually every link in the industry chain worried about the coming year.

At the top of the list are producers and bankers trying to figure how to finance operations that face the worst of all situations- low prices and increased costs.

Adding to the misery is the hit price projections took this week with an upward revision in Chinese production numbers. The change will no doubt alter forecasted world supply and carryover projections and change the timeline for a price recovery.

In light of these and other issues PCG has focused on two immediate changes to benefit producers.

Chief among the policy changes PCG will be pushing for, and one that could make the most direct impact on producer cash-flows, is the immediate increase of the base cotton loan rate by 20 percent.

Such a change would increase the loan rate to about 60 cents per pound and put a new face on the balance sheets of many growers.

Bank representatives are scrambling for ways to prevent the unfair

penalization of growers who, through no fault of their own, have been adversely affected by drought, cost increases, and low prices.

Many growers are simply unable to project a positive cash-flow situation due to the effects of variables over which they have no control.

The second part of PCG's short-term relief initiative would entail changing the 2001 Agricultural Market Transition Act (AMTA) payment rate and authorization of a second AMTA payment for the 2001 crop year.

PCG is suggesting all 2001 AMTA payments be calculated using the 1998 payment rate of 8.17 cents per pound.

Any short-term changes will hopefully get producers back in the game in 2001. They are, however, only the start of the policy work that will be taking place in 2001.

Efforts are also underway to develop a comprehensive set of long-term policy reform suggestions to set the stage for development of the next Farm Bill. The House Ag Committee is gearing up for another round of hearings and the issue is expected to be a top priority in 2001.

PCG is currently looking to initiate changes aimed at several areas key to shoring up the safety net provisions of current farm policy.

The balance that must be struck, however, is to provide an adequate safety net without decreasing the flexibility growers currently have under Freedom to Farm.

Long-term reform ideas that PCG is now looking into include: 1) A permanent increase in Marketing Loan

rates for all program commodities; 2) Initiation of a voluntary set aside program that producers can use to further increase loan rates along the lines of the "Flexible Fallow" program being studied at this time; 3) Initiation of counter-cyclical price protection mechanism to kick in automatically when prices are down, and, 4) Continuation of some form of de-coupled payment mechanism similar to current AMTA payments utilizing updated acreage and yield figures.

In the coming months PCG will be seeking additional input throughout this process. The main conduit for surfacing, evaluating and then pursuing new program ideas is the PCG Board of Directors.

Current PCG member gins in the 25-county High Plains region earn a seat on the PCG Board automatically and are immediately entitled to take part in all PCG deliberations.

One of the key strengths PCG enjoys, and the main reason it receives the consideration it does at the State and National level, is the fact that over 70 percent of the cotton produced in the High Plains region pay dues to support the organization's efforts.

That level of support makes it clear that the messages PCG delivers and the situations it describes are not only accurate but carry the weight of a significant portion of the cotton growers in the region.

Grower input and participation makes the process work and allows PCG to translate grass-roots support and ideas into real benefits for its grower membership.

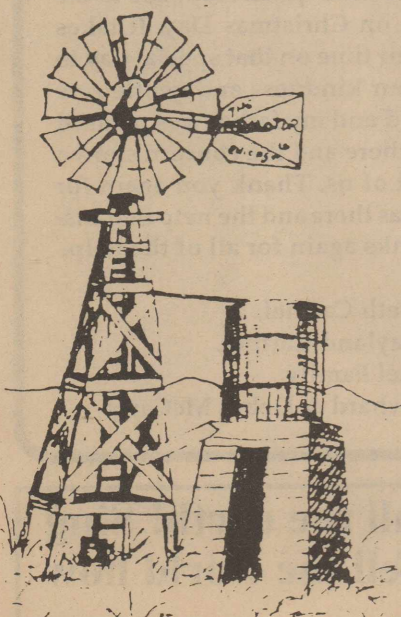

She married Herbert Walker on April 2, 1936, in Plainview. He died September 5, 1984.

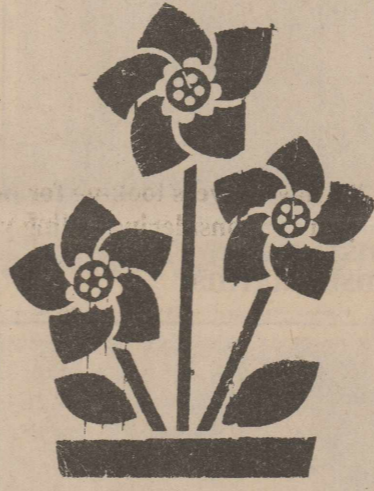

## Annual sign-up period for Medicare January thru March

If you are eligible for Medicare medical insurance (Part B) but haven't signed up, you can do so now during the annual "General Enrollment Period" for Medicare, from January 1 until March 31.

Beneficiaries with Medicare hospital insurance (Part A) who originally decided not to sign up for Medicare insurance when they first became eligible for Medicare but have changed their minds can take advantage of this three-month period. Those who had medical insurance at one time but dropped out may now enroll again.

Medicare medical insurance helps pay for doctor's visits, out-patient hospital treatment and other medical services and supplies not covered by Medicare hospital insurance (Part A). The cost of the medical insurance premium is \$50 a month in 2001. However, beneficiaries who sign up

now instead of when they were originally eligible may have an additional 10 percent added to their premium for each year they could have enrolled in Part B but didn't. If you sign up at any time during the general enrollment period, your coverage will begin July 1, 2001.

If you do not have Medicare hospital insurance (Part A) but are 65 or older and a U.S. citizen or a lawfully admitted alien who has lived in the United States for at least five years, you can sign up for medical insurance

only or for hospital and medical insurance at this time. The premium for hospital insurance varies depending on the amount of time you may have worked in jobs where you paid Social Security taxes.

If you are interested in enrolling in Medicare, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, or contact your local Social Security office.

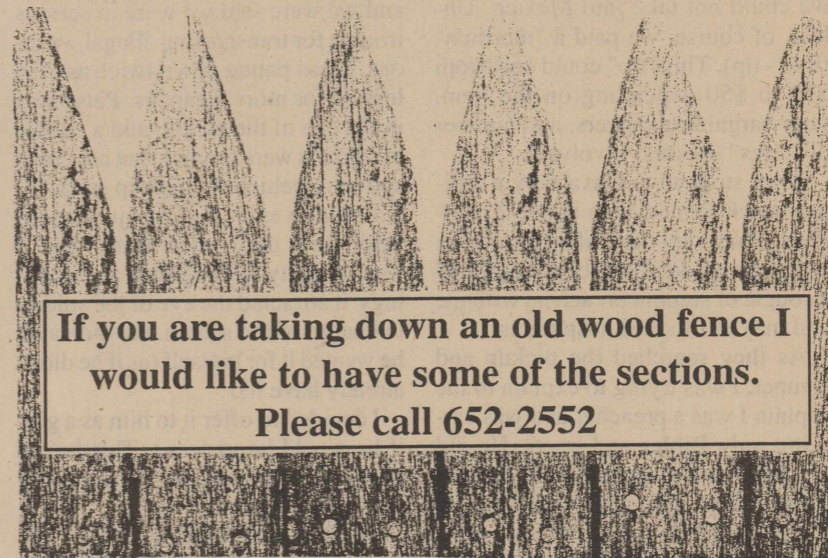

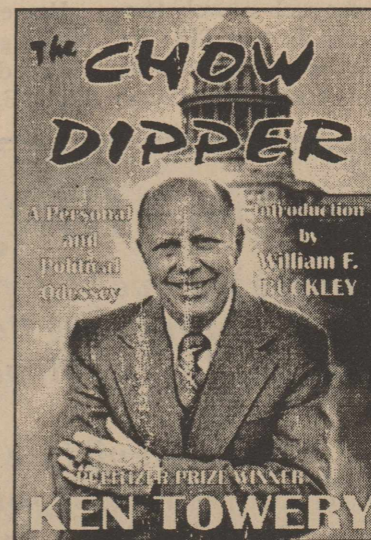

**4. Faith in a Higher Power.** Researchers found that people who believed in a higher power were happier than those who didn't. Most people

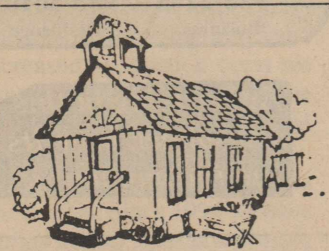
who recover from a serious drug or alcohol addiction report the need of a higher power than themselves. Faith in the unknown can be a life rewarding experience.

We usually had some electrical item, like a small TV, radio, or cassette player that we would be told we could not take into Mexico. Unless, of course, we paid a "mordida" (bribe - tip). This "tip" could cost from \$10 to \$50 depending on the item, your bargaining powers, and number of "jefes" (bosses) involved.

I was stopped in Oaxaca by a military truck loaded with about 20 soldiers. They kept their rifles trained on me and were looking for drugs. I had a couple of student preachers with me and maybe I looked suspicious.

As they searched the pickup and camper, I was trying to explain to the captain I was a preacher and was carrying only Bibles and tracts. He did not believe me and made me stand aside. When they were finished and we were given permission to go, I made sure I handed every soldier a gospel tract, reaching over their rifle

barrels.

On another trip, Patsy and I were returning around midnight in Veracruz from a long journey down south, when we were stopped by a military roadblock looking for guns. In their search of our camper, and as they ate our oranges, they found a souvenir Bowie knife from Tennessee.

This became a "deadly weapon" and we were told we were in serious trouble for transporting illegal weapons. I was patted down twice as they looked for more weapons. Patsy was in the cab of the pickup and a couple of soldiers were trying to pat her down and look behind the pickup seat.

I tried to explain it was just a souvenir from the United States. But it was so pretty with designs and drawings, it attracted the eye of the soldier in charge of the search. He indicated he wanted it for himself (as if he didn't already have it).

I decided to offer it to him as a gift, if he would let us leave. This he did immediately and we drove away thanking the Lord.

**MORAL OF THE STORY:** "Remember the chief captains and the mighty men are under God's control."
