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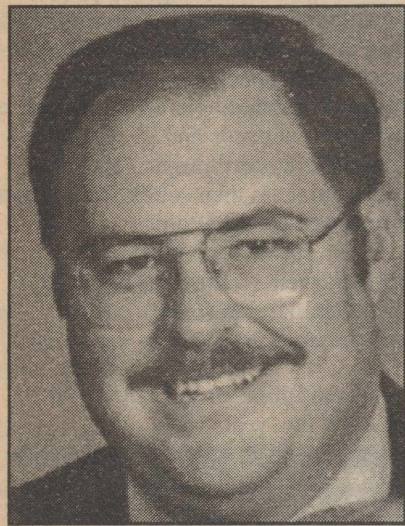

Trustees approve election for Pct. #4 only FISD hires new principal

The FISD board met Tuesday, April 10, and hired Wayne Morren of Hale Center as the new Floydada High School principal starting July 1, 2001.

Morren is presently the Hale Center High School Principal. He has served 5 1/2 years in school administrative work and has 7 1/2 years experience in coaching. He graduated from Floydada High School in 1984. Morren graduated from Texas Tech in 1987, where he did his under-graduate studies. He has a Masters Degree from West Texas A&M in Canyon.

Morren and his wife, Angel, have two children, Landry, age 6, and Kaylee, age 2. They will be moving to Floydada this summer.

The Hesperian-Beacon has been informed that the FISD Trustee Elections will be held May 5, 2001 for Precinct No. 4 position only. Incumbent Amado Morales is running against Charlene Brown, who has relinquished her At Large position on the FISD board.

The board voted unanimously to cancel part of the FISD Trustee Elections on May 5, 2001, Due to Being Unopposed, in Precincts No. 3 (incumbent Rachel Castillo), No. 5 (incumbent Jill Warren), and At Large (Mark McCormick). The motion was

made by Board Member Amado Morales and seconded by Board Member Kerry Pratt.

In other business, the board unanimously approved six nominations as presented by Superintendent Jimmie Collins to serve on the Redistricting Advisory Committee. Each board member had previously nominated a citizen from their individual district to serve. Morales made the motion and it was seconded by Board Member Jill Warren.

The names of the nominated citizens were: Randall Griffin, Pct. No. 1; Irena Simpson, Pct. No. 2; Mary Morales, Pct. No. 3; Albert Hill, Pct. No. 4; James Hinton, Pct. No. 5; and Jeff Johnson, At Large. One more At Large nomination will be considered at next month's board meeting.

In a related matter, the board voted 5 to 1 not to adopt a Resolution on Redistricting in Texas, which affects about 90 single-member school districts. Floydada's district has a 5/2 plan (five single districts, and two at large) and is exempt from the resolution's purpose concerning reelections and budget deadlines. Board Member

Kerry Pratt made the motion "not to adopt" the resolution. Board President Mitch Probasco made the second. Voting for the motion were board members: Pratt, Probasco, Warren, Charlene Brown, and Rachael Castillo. Morales voted against the motion.

Following a recommendation by FISD Technology and Federal Program Director Rex Holcombe, Warren made the motion to approve a media and technology contract with Educational Service Center 17 for 2001-2002. The motion was seconded by Castillo and unanimously passed.

Holcombe told the board, "Some of the main things this ESC 17 contract covers are: the best filtering system for Internet access, a library for video tapes and CD roms, access to encyclopedias and other on-line materials, supplies and equipment available for "Creative Corner" posters, and video tape duplication. The cost is \$30 per student making our total cost at

\$3,060 per year."

Collins recommended the board approve Upgrading Contracts and Letters of Assurance, such as, TASB contracts, board policy manuals, multi-year contracts, probationary contracts with coaches and assistants, and contracts for future uses. Warren made the motion to approve these contracts and letters. It was seconded by Board Secretary Brown and unanimously passed.

In a separate vote and upon the recommendation by Collins, the board passed unanimously to approve Policy Manual Update 65 by TASB, with the exception to exempt Local District Update 1301 passed on June, 2000. The motion was made by Brown and seconded by Morales.

Probasco made the motion to increase by 3 percent the salaries of all FISD Auxiliary Personnel, such as, bus drivers, custodians, cafeteria workers, and maintenance workers. It was seconded by Morales and unanimously passed.

FISD Business Manager Sharon Rainwater gave an update on the collection of school taxes for the year. Rainwater said, "\$1,758,371.73 have been collected so far and this is 94.09 percent of the tax roll."

Junior High Principal Clinton Smith introduced Armando Rendon to the board as the FISD "Teacher of the Month." Smith said, "Rendon was overwhelmingly nominated by his peers. We are lucky to have him working with us. He works with our Special Education students and Special Needs students. He counsels with students in every class period."

"I rely on Armando to help me out. He is working on his Administrative Assistance. He does a good job. Those students having problems can turn to him for help in counseling. He is a jack-of-all-trades and does a fantastic job for us," Smith concluded.

The board unanimously accepted the resignation of the Assistant Band Director Jennifer Rogers and unanimously approved the hiring of Sally Lyles, part-time, as a High School Speech Teacher for next school year.

Tourism Society gearing up to help small towns in Llano Estacado

If Sandy Parker's enthusiasm will catch on, tourism should increase on the South Plains.

The executive director of the Llano Estacado Tourism Society, Parker spoke at the Floyd County Museum recently encouraging smaller towns to band together to promote tourism.

"We need to think in terms of a Cooperative," said Parker. "Farmers share in gin coops--this is not a hard concept for people in this area to understand."

Parker says all of the small towns in this region need a cooperative marketing effort. "We need to be selling the whole region--not just one town."

Parker believes the "selling of the region" will encourage tourists to travel from town to town. "It is so silly for someone to come to Lubbock and just see Lubbock. There is so much more to offer in the region."

There may not be enough for a tourist to come to a smaller town to view one attraction--but Parker feels that

"selling" a whole package of the Llano Estacado tours will promote tourism.

"Floydada is so lucky with the ladies you have working at the Museum. Carolyn Jackson and Nancy Marble are great ambassadors for your city."

"The city has a great system already in place to promote tourism. The Coronado expedition is very significant to the whole region."

Membership dues vary in the Llano Estacado Tourism Society. When joining the association your business will sponsor a "site" on a map distributed to tourist. The dues also help pay for a web site, a trade show package, and promotional packets.

"The region includes Canyon to Midland and the Caprock edge (and neighbors) into New Mexico," said Parker.

Sponsors help share the costs of marketing. Floydada members could possibly get a Coronado icon on a map, as a type of treasure hunt for the

region.

Maps will be available at different chambers (including Lubbock), the Visitor's Center, and the Buddy Holly Center. "We will also have ads in national magazines," said Parker.

"When you pull together all the players and add all the icons on the map, it looks like there is a lot going on in the region."

Parker says she is currently very busy preparing for the Vatican exhibit coming to Lubbock next summer.

"We want to be ready for all the tourist that will be here for the Vatican exhibit," said Parker. "We will be going up and down lines handing out tourist packages to everyone. We want to tap into everything we can think of."

Little Dribblers earn 2nd in Nationals

The Lockney Little Dribblers all-star team won second place in the National Tournament held April 12-14 in Plainview. The team competed in the American Senior division which includes teams from towns with populations of 2,500 to 10,000. Lockney elected to play "up" in the bracket instead of competing in the division with towns of 2,500 or less. The tournament was a double-elimination format, and included teams from all over Texas and other states.

Lockney began the tournament on Thursday morning with a win over Teague, Texas. Lockney jumped out to a 19-9 lead at halftime behind bal-

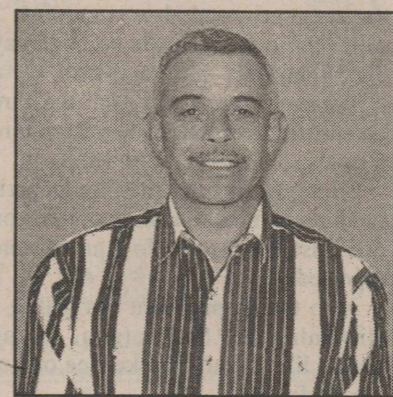
anced scoring. Rance Schumacher scored in the first half, Mark Ford chipped in 4, and Brance Wilson also had four points in the half. Marcos Ascencio had a basket and a free throw and Landon Cotham also added a basket for the team. The second half began with a 6-0 run by Teague to cut the lead to 4 points. Lockney answered with a 16-11 run of their own to finish the quarter leading 35-26. Lockney held off Teague by outscoring them 18-17 in the final quarter and posted the 53-43 victory. Lockney was led by Rance Schumacher who scored 19 points of his game-high 25 points in the second half.

Lockney played New Baden, Illinois in the second game of the tournament and lost a close decision, by the score of 33-28. The game featured several lead changes, and neither team could gain a large lead during the game. The game was very physical, and scoring was difficult for both teams. New Baden found their offense in the final quarter, and outscored Lockney 11-3 to win the game by 5. Lockney was led in scoring by Mark Ford who scored 8 points. Rance Schumacher added 6 points. Cagan Cummings scored 4 points, and Jeremy Pyle scored 3. Dahlen McCarter and Marcos Ascencio chipped in 2

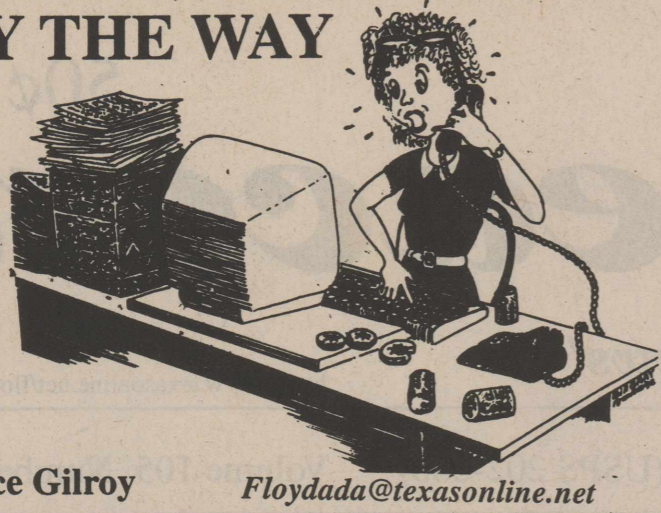
Floydada home damaged in fire

Sometimes it's hard being the only woman in a house of boys.

You learn you are always going to be outnumbered when the fight about the toilet seat comes up--and you'll never understand burping contests.

Sometimes I try to join in and be "one of the guys". More often than not I end up looking and acting like a girl.

This past week-end I finally gave in and joined my son, Brandon; husband, Lennie; and friends, Keith and Jeremy Pyle and Ray Macha in a game of "paintball war". I didn't really know why they have been wanting me to play. I figured they just wanted to see what paintballs look like bouncing off a girl.

After watching them come home from paintball wars and showing off their "wounds", I decided the only way I was ever going to play was if I wore a bulletproof vest. (My husband and I both own bulletproof vests from our police days.)

Every time I went to watch the guys play--I conveniently left my vest at home. Oops--too bad.

This Saturday Ray Macha was prepared for me.

We all traveled to a neat location for the guys to have a "war". It was an abandoned house and several out-buildings sitting on about an acre of land.

It is surrounded by trees and tall grass. Perfect to hide in.

While the guys crept and ran and hid and shot, Judy Macha and I sat in a plowed field (at a safe distance) and watched the action movie unfold before us. It was quite entertaining.

After a bit Ray came up to me and handed me a "flak jacket". "Here he said--now you can play!"

Now I have never worn a flak jacket. I had always called my bulletproof vest a flak jacket--but believe me there is a big difference. This jacket covered you from chin to hips, front and back, shoulder to shoulder. It zipped up the front and weighed at least 20 pounds. It was a real military flak jacket, used to protect you from shrapnel. I put it on and nearly fell over on my face.

"Holy cow," I said, "I can't run in this!"

The guys assured me that I wouldn't have to run. I could just find a spot and stay and shoot at people as they walked by.

I had a glorious vision of winning this battle single handedly. I was going to show them all. The girl against the guys. They do it on T.V. all the time--the women always win and show up the weaker sex. In the older movies the women always fell down when they were running away. In the newer movies the guys always fall down and the women save them.

My husband said I would be back soon because they were going to kill me quick.

Since I had never played before, the guys let me have a few practice shots.

First, I'd like to say that I can shoot a pistol. I'm not anything to brag about--but I can pretty well hit what I'm aiming at--or at least close to it.

Anyway, they handed me the paintball gun and told me to try and shoot into a very large window of the house (the glass is all gone). I aimed and shot--never once making it into the window. I tried 4 times.

They said--"Good enough. Now you know how it shoots."

Uh-Oh.

Ray was kind enough to take me as his partner. While we went and hid, Keith Pyle and his 14 year old son, Jeremy, turned their backs and waited.

We walked about 50 yards and Ray showed me a large group of saplings and bushes to hide behind. He said, "Just stay here. It is good concealment and you can shoot them when they go by. They probably won't see you here." Then he left.

I was already breathing hard from the trek to my hiding place. I figured if I just stood still and tried to control my breathing they would never see or hear me. I was invisible. I was invincible. "I WAS WOMAN--HEAR ME ROAR!"

Soon I saw Keith and Jeremy slowly creeping their way to our location. I thought Keith looked pretty funny trying to walk so quietly when I could see everything he was doing. I wondered how long it would take him to get close enough for me to splatter him with paint. I couldn't wait.

He looked my way--but I was invisible. Then I saw him raise his gun. I thought Ray was probably in trouble and about to get shot. Then I saw stuff flying at me and sounds popping around me as paintballs splattered on the bushes around me.

This couldn't be happening. There must be some mistake. How could he possibly see me.

Survival instincts finally snapped in and I took off running. The heck with my partner. I had no idea where he was and I didn't even care! I ran around an old barn and threw myself onto the ground in tall weeds. My heart was pounding so hard I knew I would be heard--but at least I was invisible again.

Pretty soon Keith came creeping by again. He took cover and started shooting in my direction again. Paintballs were splattering around me. I jumped back to try and take better cover, tripped and fell backwards. I landed like a turtle on his back. My legs and arms were sprawled in all directions. I was exhausted. The flak jacket felt like a wall of bricks was laying on my stomach. I thought of the commercial--"Help, I've fallen and I can't get up."

Then I did the girly thing.

I started to giggle. I couldn't stop. There was a war going on--and I was giggling. Then I started to laugh really hard.

Within moments I saw Jeremy coming up fast from another direction with his gun out. I didn't have a prayer. I was a goner. I laughed even harder.

Jeremy was about to shoot and then he started to laugh. He had seen me fall and it was more than he could take. He stood there and laughed.

I figured I would go out in a blaze of glory--a hero laughing in the face of defeat!

I started shooting in Jeremy's direction. I wasn't aiming. I was still flat on my back and my gun was only inches off the dirt--but the paintballs hitting the ground around him was enough to send Jeremy scrambling back to cover. (Actually he probably could have gotten me. I think he felt sorry for me and didn't want to shoot the woman who gives him cookies.)

Now all I had to do was get up. I was so tired. I was weak from laughter. Weak from the stupid flak jacket--and weak because I am totally and completely out of shape.

I knew I had to get out of my invisible spot and find another one. Keith and Jeremy were surrounding me.

I peeked around the corner. I didn't see anyone so I took off running in the open--trying to get to a clump of trees. Then, out of nowhere Keith Pyle raised up from the tall grass. He had been waiting for just this moment. He started shooting at me. All I could do was scream and laugh as I ran. Keith said I shot back but I don't even remember.

Then --pow pow pow--right in a row. I was hit three times in the legs. (There was no flak jacket on my legs!)

I hollered--"I'm hit. I'm hit." Then I fell down--totally spent. I started to giggle again. (I still giggle--just thinking about it.)

Keith was a gentleman soldier. He walked over to me and offered me a hand up. I was almost too exhausted to sit up.

Now I had a war wound (a teensy bruise) on my leg that I could compare with the guys when we got home.

That is as far as it will probably go. I'll still be mad about toilet seats and disgusted by burping contests.

So our "detainees" are home. The political pundits are now assessing the situation. Did Bush do a good job, or did he cave? What does the future hold?

For what it is worth, we think he did about as good as he could have, under the situation. And the future is very uncertain.

He did not cave, as we understand the pussy footing of "diplomacy". Nor should he have. If anybody was due an "apology" in this matter, it was the United States. Our electronics eavesdropper was operating over international water and in international air space when it was buzzed by Chinese fighter pilots. At least one of those pilots came entirely too close. An accident occurred. Our plane headed for safe haven, which just happened to be Chinese territory. The captain of the airplane could have chosen to ditch the plane, with the possible loss of the entire crew. He chose, wisely in our view, to head for the nearest landing site.

So we did, in the norms of international diplomacy, violate the Chinese air space by intruding upon that air-space and landing without permission.

For that, we could apologize. We could also express regrets that a Chinese pilot had lost his life. But we could not, and we did not, as we understand such matters, offer an apology for the fact that our plane was operating in a place it had every right to operate. Nor did we promise the Chinese that future flights would be ended.

During all this episode we could not help being struck with the difference. There was, a few short years ago, the President of these United States of America flitting around Africa and various other places, apologizing for any beef anyone might have held against America, no matter who was responsible. He apologized to various people of Africa for our having been solely responsible for the reprehensible slave trade, despite the fact that various and sundry African tribal chieftains were also part of that trade, and every bit as guilty of profiting from it as American slave traders. Mr. Clinton was good at very sincere apologies, of course, having had so much practice with it here at home.

As far as the China thing is concerned, we believe something good

may actually come from it. Talks are supposed to begin today (Wednesday) on a range of issues involving relations between the two countries. Out of those talks should come some understanding and agreements, agreements that could preclude repetition of the recent unpleasantness. During the "Cold War" we entered into certain agreements with the old Soviet Union that kept our differences from erupting into a full blown war, and we should be able to do the same with the present government of China. After all, we face far less threat from the Chinese, at the moment, than we did with the old Soviet Union. They may now have our most secret secrets, but they do not yet have the nuclear arsenal held by the Soviets.

When dealing with the Chinese, one must keep in mind the fact that things move exceedingly slow in that country. They, like the Israelis, have a different concept of time than that held by most Americans. Like the Israelis, they keep in mind the end game, with the early maneuvers being only that: maneuvers designed to set the stage for the end game.

The Chinese end game envisions the future of Taiwan. How the Taiwan matter is resolved is the crux of the matter.

There will be many more opportunities for the new President to demonstrate his skills, or his lack of skills, in the conduct of foreign policy. There will be many more opportunities for critics of George Bush, from both the right and the left, to make themselves heard.

(Bill Kristol, who edits Mr. Murdoch's Weekly Standard in Washington, has been all over t.v., complaining that Bush has failed, that he has appeared weak in the face of danger, that he has set the stage for giving away the store. In the first place we don't know why, or how, Mr. Kristol considers himself a spokesman for conservatives in America. He is part and parcel of that group of Jewish intellectuals calling themselves "neo conservatives", from whom we never heard a peep during those long years when others were fighting the conservative cause and giving voice to conservative thought. We didn't hear from them then, and it would be well if we heard less now.)

From our own point of view, Mr. Bush did well. Now that he has passed his first real test in foreign policy, we feel better, a little more sanguine,

about the future of our country than we did a few years ago.

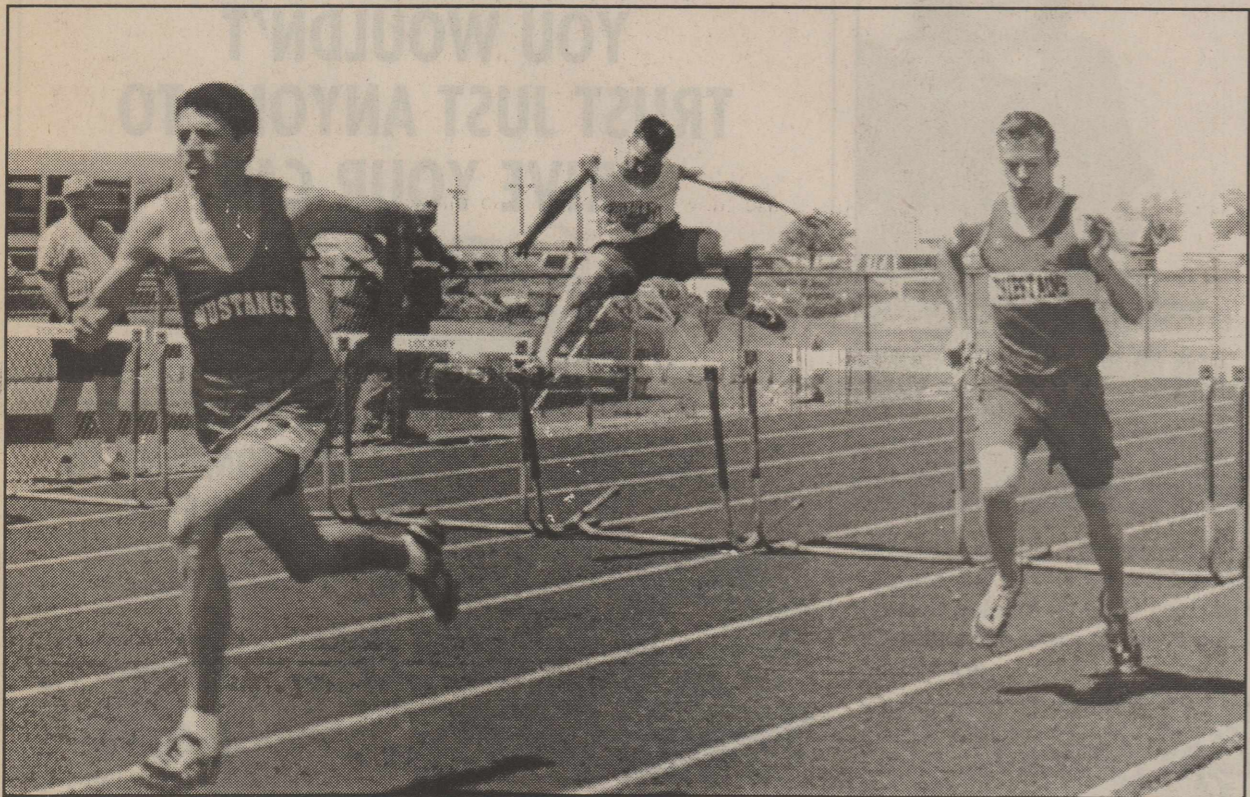

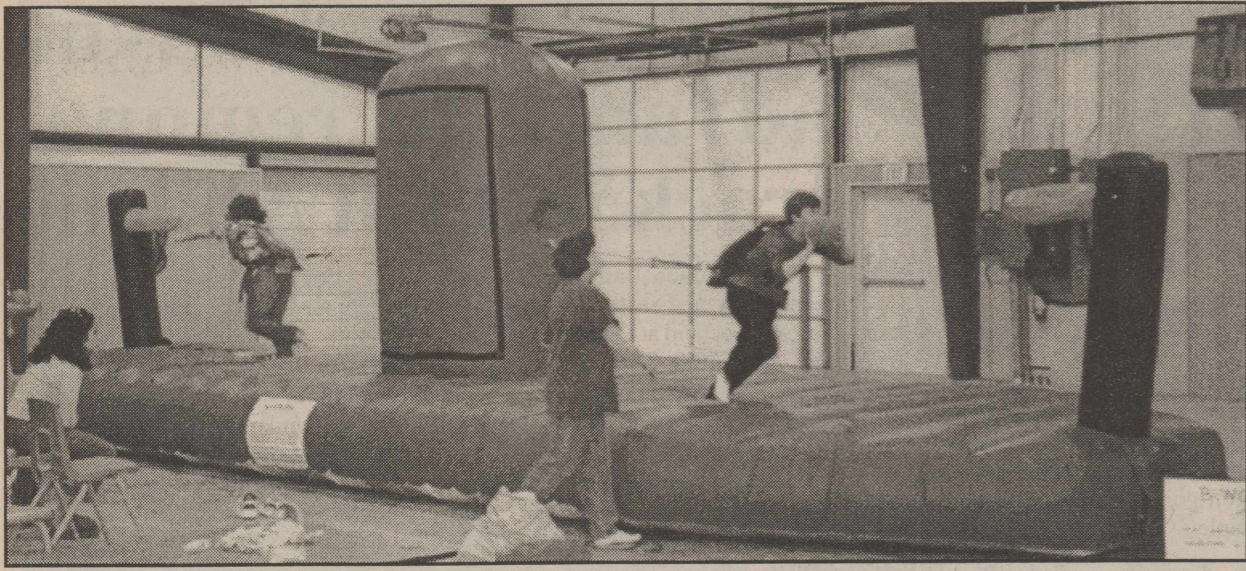

May spells way to 2nd Regional Bee title

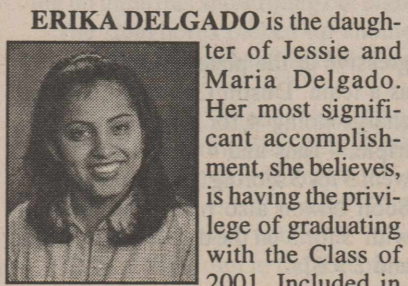

Foot-and-mouth discussed

Continued from last week

Q.—Is foot-and mouth disease present in U.S. cattle herds?

A.—No. The U.S. has not had a case of foot-and-mouth disease since 1929, which was contained and eradicated quickly. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) regularly monitors for any disease among U.S. cattle herds and takes aggressive steps to prevent FMD from spreading to the U.S. whenever there is an outbreak in other countries:

- As part of its ongoing surveillance program, the USDA conducts hundreds of field inquiries each year in an effort to detect animal diseases that might affect livestock.

- When there is an outbreak of FMD in another country, the U.S. temporarily prohibits the importation of animals and animal products from the European Union into the United States. These restrictions augment those already in place on ruminants and ruminant products to prevent the introduction of BSE into the U.S.

- The government also prohibits travelers from carrying into the United States any agricultural products, particularly animal products that could spread FMD. Passengers are required to identify any farm contact to Cus-

toms and USDA officials. All baggage is subject to inspection. Violations could result in penalties of up to \$1,000.

- A team of experts (40 federal, state and University officials) is sent to the European Union—or other country with an outbreak—to monitor, evaluate and assist in containment efforts.

- There is heightened alert at ports of entry and airports to ensure passengers, luggage and cargo are checked as appropriate. This includes placing additional inspectors and dog teams at airports to check incoming flights and passengers.

- USDA officials also are stationed around the globe to monitor and coordinate with the state agriculture officials.

- USDA recently initiated an aggressive public education campaign that includes additional signage in airports, public service announcements, website, and other tools to inform the public about this important issue and steps they can take to prevent it from entering the United States. The USDA also recently established an 800 number to respond to questions from the public, industry and media about the foot-and-mouth outbreak in Europe.

PCG intervenes in SPS rate change

Plains Cotton Growers has joined the Texas Cotton Ginners Association and the Texas Cattle Feeders Association as interveners in Southwestern Public Service Company's latest request for an increase in the fuel cost adjustment rate charged to its customers.

SPS's request was presented to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) in February and seeks an increase in the rate charged to offset the cost of fuel used to generate electricity.

The SPS request, which has been amended slightly since its original submission, would also authorize the ad-

dition of a surcharge, added to customer bills, to offset the cost of fuel for the period October 2000 - March 2001.

The increased fuel costs incurred by SPS during the period exceeded the previously approved fuel cost adjustment factor. SPS is prevented by law from adjusting its rates dynamically to account for changes in fuel costs. Accordingly the company must file with the PUC to recapture its fuel costs after they have been incurred.

The process also works in the other direction as SPS is also required to provide refunds, usually through billing credits, to customers for those

times when approved fuel cost adjustment factors exceeded the actual cost of fuel purchased by the company.

Currently SPS customers are in the process of paying two earlier fuel cost adjustment surcharges to offset the higher cost of fuel incurred by the company for the periods January - May 2000 and June - September 2000.
