LISD drops appeal Mandatory drug testing now over

ended the mandatory drug testing battle between LISD and the ACLU. Wednesday, May 23rd.

The Lockney School Board signed a compromise settlement on that date. agreeing to stop mandatory drug testing in LISD, and pay a settlement amount of \$50,000 (in attorney's fees). In return, Larry Tannahill (acting on behalf of his minor son, Brady) would release the school district and the board of trustees from any further law-

"This is a business decision," said LISD Superintendent Raymond Lusk. agreed to settle is because of an economic situation.'

According to Lusk the insurance company (which is an Oklahoma Insurance Company), is pulling out of Texas and cancelling all of their Texas

They had assured us we were covered during the litigation," said Lusk. 'But there is always a fine print clause that addresses settlements. The clause stipulates that the insurance company can't force us to settle. However if the insurance company decides it wants to settle (which it did), then they will tell you a dollar amount on what they feel they can settle with. That dollar

Economic considerations finally amount would be all they will continue to pay you.

"We could not have continued this fight to the Supreme Court with the dollar amount they set."

According to Lusk the school's attorney had advised the board that they had a 50% chance of winning the case in the Supreme Court.

LISD and Lockney parent Larry Tannahill have been in a legal battle since February 2000 when Lockney Jr. High and High School began random drug testing of 6th-12th grade

Tannahill objected to the policy's The number one reason we have criteria that a parent must sign the policy and any refusal to consent to the drug testing would be considered a positive test by the student.

Tannahill refused to sign. Backed by the ACLU, Tannahill filed suit on behalf of his 6th grader son, Brady. Tannahill said the mandatory drug testing violated his constitutional rights against unreasonable search and

The policy was amended in July 2000. In the new policy refusal to sign would not be considered a positive

test. Instead refusal would subject the student to a ban from extracurricular activities. The new policy included only 7th-12 grade students.

March 1, U.S. District Judge Sam Cummnings ruled in favor of Tannahill.

March 29th, the LISD Board voted to appeal the decision.

The policy created controversy and drew a large amount of local and national media attention to the small town of Lockney. On the local level the drug policy was supported by the majority of Lockney citizens.

Lusk said he would appreciate input from the Lockney community on whether they want the school board to revisit this issue with an alternative policy--such as an aggressive voluntary policy. "I would like feedback from parents if they want us to pursue it," said Lusk.

(The school board also released a statement concerning the settlement which can be found on page 2.)

Tannahill said he is glad the lawsuit is settled. "It is a relief and I hope it calms down now. I know it caused hard feelings, but I felt the school board went too far with the policy. It is the parent's prerogative to test their child--not the schools."

Tannahill also said he would not sign his son up for voluntary drug testing unless he saw a need for testing his son. "If other parents think it is necessary then that's fine. It should be their choice."

County to benefit from another Boll Weevil office

Floyd County can now boast of two new businesses after the official news release this week of a Lockney location for a Boll Weevil Eradication District Office.

Floydada had already acquired a district office in March, which is now located in what was formerly Babe's Restaurant.

The new district office in Lockney will be located in the City's Community Center.

The Northern High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Program will lease the Community Center from the city for 3 years with 2 one year options.

The City of Lockney will air condition the building and lay rocks or gravel in the lot around the Community Center. The Floydada School District will also join in the economic development by donating the use of a lot south of the Community Center for Boll Weevil vehicle parking.

The lot was recently donated to the school in memory of George Taylor. After the boll weevil office vacates the community center the lot will be used for baseball park parking.

Lockney Co-op Gin has also leased half of the old Wofford Manufacturing Building to the Eradication Program for use as a shop.

Floyd County is part of Zone 6 of the Northern High Plains Boll Weevil and has been very fortunate to be the recipient of two district offices. Other

counties in Zone 6 are: Hale, Swisher,

Randall, Armstrong, and Briscoe. Zone Manager Wes Jones, said the Lockney office will be open as soon as possible, however phone calls can now be made to the Floydada office at 983-5964.

According to Jones, permanent positions the Lockney office will employ are: 5 Field Unit Supervisors, 1 District Supervisor, 1 Environmental Monitoring Specialist, 1 Field Clerk, and 1 mechanic.

"This year we will hire 15-20 seasonal employees," said Jones. "Next Eradication Program (NHPBWE), year this will increase to 35-40 trappers, 5 ground observers, 5 mist

All the national pundits are assessing Bush's first 100 days, so why not agree with Mr. Bush, areas that are ing nature of war, the changing nature us. We've always thought the "first terribly important to us but evidently of both offense and defense, it only 100 days" criteria is a silly way to not to him. We believe the current and form opinions about a Presidency, just as we've always thought the modern t.v. debate format is a silly way to choose a President, but the die seems to have been cast in both areas.

Generally speaking, Bush comes out with more "positives" than "negatives" in both pundit chatter and public polls, meaning most people think he is doing a reasonably good job as

We can't quarrel with what most people think, in this instance, but we do have some qualms. We think he should get passing grades on the China thing. The plane crew did come home in one piece. We didn't go to war over the incident. The plane is still there, and the Chinese indicate we can have it back, in time. But, it will be no great loss if it stays.

We've got plenty more planes, although they are terribly expensive. He didn't promise we would not resume our flights off the coast of China, nor should he have done so. So, all in all, and given the fact that the saga hasn't played itself out completely, he still gets passing grades.

Too, he has changed the tone, or helped change the tone, in Washington. The change hasn't been much, and the day is early. Still, the no-holds barred attitude of politics during the Clinton years is distant memory. Given the almost even split among the electorate and in the Congress, that's quite an accomplishment. Both Tom Daschle and Richard Gephardt seem to be doing their best to keep a fight going, but they don't get much help

There are some areas where we dis-til we see the details. Given the changcontinuing invasion of America by illegal aliens from around the world poses a serious threat to the culture, peace, and well being of our society. He evidently does not see it that way. What sort of society can we expect to have if the first order of business for newcomers is that they first become lawbreakers? How is it possible to instill respect for the law among those who choose to ignore the law as a means to achieve a desired goal? The short answer is that it is not possible.

Meanwhile, it's too early to tell what to think about some of his early policy initiatives. The faith-based thing, for instance, sounds good. One is tempted to endorse the general idea, but this is one of those areas where the details make all the difference. We will reserve judgement until we see those details spelled out in proposed legislation. If those details pay proper respect for our Constitution's "establishment" clause, we'll have a lot more faith in "faith-based" initiatives on the part of government.

The Administration's energy policy, addressed in an speech Monday by Vice President Dick Cheney before a gathering of Associated Press moguls. makes more sense to us than the visionary blatherings of Al Gore. The former Vice President's vision would have had us do away with the internal combustion engine as a means of conserving energy. Cheney's would seek to provide the energy to run those en-

The Administration's proposal to restructure the nation's military establishment also makes sense, again un-

makes sense to see that the military adjusts accordingly. We suspect that there is an element of politics, as well, in the proposals to reduce the land warfare elements and increase the airwarfare elements of our military. If we don't have a sizeable land warfare capacity, there should be less temptation to send our soldiers hither and yon on "nation building" exercises around the world. Since our President has voiced his displeasure with such operations, we can be forgiven, perhaps, for thinking there's a method behind his madness, or a reason that does not meet

As we said earlier, it's too early to lock in an impression of what kind of President Mr. Bush will make. Our own concerns, or rather our principal concerns, revolve around the agricultural community and the safety of our nation. Our government has, of course, the primary responsibility of protecting and defending the nation. But government has become such an integral part of the farming community that its policies, along with mother nature, determines agriculture's welfare, and the welfare of all who depend upon agriculture. We can only hope that Mr. Bush will lend his weight to devising some sort of policy that will not only keep agriculture afloat, but will allow it to assume its rightful place in American

Nobody, as President, is going to live up to what each one of us hopes for. Mr. Bush falls far short on certain issues, and exceeds our expectations in others. On many others, the jury is still out. Compared to what might have been, we can all sing hosannas. But also, we can keep our fingers crossed and insist upon the course each of us might wish.

On another, completely different subject, our Editor-Publisher Alice Gilroy had a "By the Way" column last week we are completely and totally proud of. It dealt with the electoral process, and any citizen who thinks that process is not important ought simply to give up and move to Haiti, or China, or some such place where elections are not important, and, in the process, renounce his or her subscription to the Floyd County Hesperian Beacon. For here, at this newspaper, we do think one's vote is important and ought not be tampered with, or diluted by unqualified votes. That has been the practice in too many so-called "democracies" around the

Beyond that, we will say that Pete Laney, from over in Hale Center, is our Representative in the Texas Legislature. True, he is now also Speaker of the House of Representatives, without doubt the most influential position in the Texas Legislature. But he did not acquire that position by virtue of any vote here in this Legislative Dis-

He acquired that position (Speaker of the House) by virtue of support from various House members who were in turn influenced heavily by members of what we call the "lobby." We have seen the operation in practice many times, starting way back in 1956. Unless things have changed mightily in the past half century or so, that's the way it happened when Pete first became Speaker. So...if you have concerns about the sanctity of your ballot, and the importance of your own vote, you may wish to drop Pete a line. He's in position to make things right.

After all, he is your Representative in the Texas Legislature, and the subject addressed by your Editor-Publisher last week is within his own Legislative District, and, one would think,

Letter From the Lockney ISD Board of Trustees and Administration

As we have concluded our fight to retain mandatory drug testing in the Lockney School system, the administration and Board wish to express our sincere gratitude to the entire community of Lockney for the tremendous support you have given throughout this process.

We are naturally disappointed by Judge Cummings' ruling which declared our policy unconstitutional. Our disappointment is not necessarily in losing a lawsuit, but in the fact that we have lost the ability to provide this program to students in their continuous battle to resist negative peer pressure. Parents are disappointed because they know that they have been deprived of an effective deterrent to drug use.

We do believe that we have made a positive impact on our schools and our students through the policy that was in place. Beyond that, we believe that we have made a very bold statement to the entire nation--a statement which clearly recognizes the horrible effects of drugs and condemns the use of illegal drugs in our society.

The decision to drop the appeal and enter into a settlement agreement is simply a matter of economics. The school's insurance policy has paid all bills to this point. However, that had become questionable for future litigation. The Board of Trustees could not place the school in a position of being liable for those costs.

Again, we do believe in what we have done and appreciate the support from this community and from many communities and individuals around the state.

Yes, Lubbock Has Running **Water--and Knight Too**

"To hear the national masses tell it, Robert Montgomery Knight has landed at an outpost so remote, it's next in line for the setting of Survi-

You'd think Lubbock was in Mongolia, not West Texas. Writers journeying to Lubbock to get a rise out of Knight act as if they're headed for a stagecoach ride after flight to Dallas. They talk about Texas Tech the way Kelvin Sampson talks about Montana Tech. To which I say,

You want remote, try the Chicago suburbs. You can't get anywhere from there. Driving from downtown Chi Town to the suburban border, I once went 58 miles in five hours. And people bad-mouth Lubbock because it's four hours west of Dallas?

I like Lubbock. Lubbock is cool. American rock 'n roll was born in Lubbock, in Buddy Holly's garage. Lubbock has the Big 12's best steakhouse, the 50 Yard Line. Southwest flies to Lubbock, and anywhere Southwest goes is good by me. Lubbock has streets as wide as freeways and some of the nicest people you'll ever meet and weather like you've never seen before.

I once spent five days in Lubbock, during which we had a flood, a heat wave and a dust storm. Boring it ain't. Lubbock feels good. Feels like the frontier. Feels like an America that's hard to find. Lubbock is Texas the way it used to be. The way it claims to be.

Lubbock is the perfect place for Bob Knight. Tech is far removed from the media glare. Knight once toiled at Indiana, where writers trip over themselves chronicling the Hoosiers. Only one newspaper covers Tech full time. Knight has committed many transgressions. But one of his chief hobbies was pot shots at the media. We are too easy a target for Knight. He sees us like birds on a high line and can't keep himself from firing a .22, just to see us scatter.

After the dust has settled in Lubbock, if Knight throws a chair or shames a young writer or cusses out a ref, it won't automatically lead off that night's SportsCenter. In Lubbock, Knight won't coach a bunch of young lads raised to believe he's the state's high priest. Ballou said the intent of VIP is to teach job related skills to PAC residents so they can be successful in young adult hood."

The automotive services being offered to the community include large and small engine repair, including: car washes, oil changes, brake work, tire

repair and replacement, wheel balancing, engine overhauls and replacements, and irrigation overhauls. Repair will also be offered on lawn and garden equipment as well as tractors.

"We also plan on offering classes to other kids," said Ballou. "We would like to develop an elective automobile mechanics class for the local school

'We have also discussed developing classes to teach women preventive maintenance on vehicles, changing tires, checking oil, etc."

The automotive center is just one component of VIP. The Center is also working on an Industrial Arts Component (woodworking). "We hope to have a facility soon for this," said Ballou.

'We feel like we've been successful with juveniles in our current system but there is a portion of the population of offenders that are in need of vocational skills. After going through the vocational program we feel like the kids that graduate will be better prepared for adult living and less likely to re-offend. With this new addition to the staff I feel this makes us one of the finest small departments in the state."

Tips for solving problems at school

By Ron Trusler

Two problems that occasionally confront parents of school-age children are cheating and fighting. If the problems are left unsolved, a child can develop poor learning skills, a negative self-concept and inappropriate ways of dealing with anger and frus-

Cheating is an anti-social problem that children often exhibit as a result of unusual pressures for achievement. The child may feel the need to cheat to please the high expectations of his parents, teachers and/or society.

The child who cheats often is highly motivated to achieve but may not have the intellectual capacity. Children who are unable to meet expectations often rely on cheating to avoid facing defeat or humiliation. Feelings of inferiority may result and must be dealt with by parents and teachers to prevent a child's low self-esteem.

Cheating alone only meets surface expectations of others while the cheater feels worse because he knows how he achieved the expectation - by cheating. That lowers self-esteem.

Parents need to address the problem with understanding. Here are

1. Don't compare children. Show love and admiration for each child's individual abilities rather than comparing achievements.

2. Make sure your expectations are realistic.

3. Family stress may be a cause. Family problems can create feelings of inferiority or prevent the child from achieving so that he relies on cheat-Breakfast-Rice/Cereal, toast, juice, ing to get ahead. It is very difficult to focus on schoolwork when all your energy is spent on surviving at home.

4. Work closely with teachers. Discuss the pressures the child may be facing. Develop a plan to include a Breakfast-Sausage Biscuit/Cereal, variety of solutions to help the child in the classroom or reduce the oppor-Lunch-Steak Fingers/Chicken tunity for cheating. The teacher can

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



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Public Notice

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Protest

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- · the market or special appraised value placed on your
- property

 the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
 any exemptions that may apply to you
- · the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- · the taxable status of your property · the local governments which should be taxing your
- property
- the ownership of property
 the change of use of land receiving special appraisal any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you

Informal Review

(Insert description of appraisal district's informal review process, if any, then give name and telephone number of person taxpayer should contact.)

Review by the Appraisal Review Board If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your

case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold

their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at (Insert address.)

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Contact the appraisal district office if you disagree with this year's proposed value for your property. In addition, if you notice an error regarding the legal description, address, or spelling on this notice contact the appraisal office to notify them. If any problem cannot be resolved between the appraisal staff and yourself, you have a right to appeal to the appraisal review board (ARB). To appeal, you must file a WRITTEN protest with the ARB before After your protest has been processed, you will be notified of the date, time, and place of your scheduled ARB hearing. You may protest by letter, if it includes your name, your property's description, and the facts surrounding your protest

Deadline for Filing Protest with the ARB

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed (You may insert

deadline for protests concerning omitted property if doing so would avoid taxpayer confusion.)

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday

What happens before emergency help arrives might save someones life

Emergency crews on the run. Comforting sights and sounds to those needing help.

But the time between the call to 9-1-1 and the arrival of an emergency team can seem like an eternity of fear and indecision when someone is ill or

Minutes count in an emergency, and what people do before EMS arrives makes a significant difference to an injured or ill person, according to Kathy Perkins, chief of the Bureau of Emergency Management at the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

When you call 9-1-1, Perkins said, "you access the emergency care system and its personnel, available by telephone everywhere in Texas 24 hours a day. But until a trained team arrives, there are things people can do

to help." Recognizing an emergency is the first step in getting assistance for an ill or injured person. Most people consider auto crashes, severe chest pains, obvious broken bones and serious burns to be emergencies. But not all emergency situations are so apparent. Call 9-1-1 immediately if any of these

- conditions are present: · Serious bleeding;
- · Unconsciousness;
- Neck or spine injuries; • Signs of a heart attack including uncomfortable pressure or fullness in the chest or chest discomfort with lightheadedness, fainting, sweating or
- shortness of breath; Unexplained paralysis;
- Burns;
- No indication of breathing; · Choking;
- · Broken bones; or

• Head, chest or abdominal injuries. Common sense and knowing the victim also are important to assessing an emergency. "Factors such as stressful events, a pre-existing medical condition or abnormal behavior may signal that a person is in an emergency

situation," Perkins said. How you make the 9-1-1 call also is important. Stay calm or have someone else make the call. Give the 9-1-1 dispatcher any information requested. This information usually includes the address or location of the emergency, your name and the telephone number at your location, name of the injured






