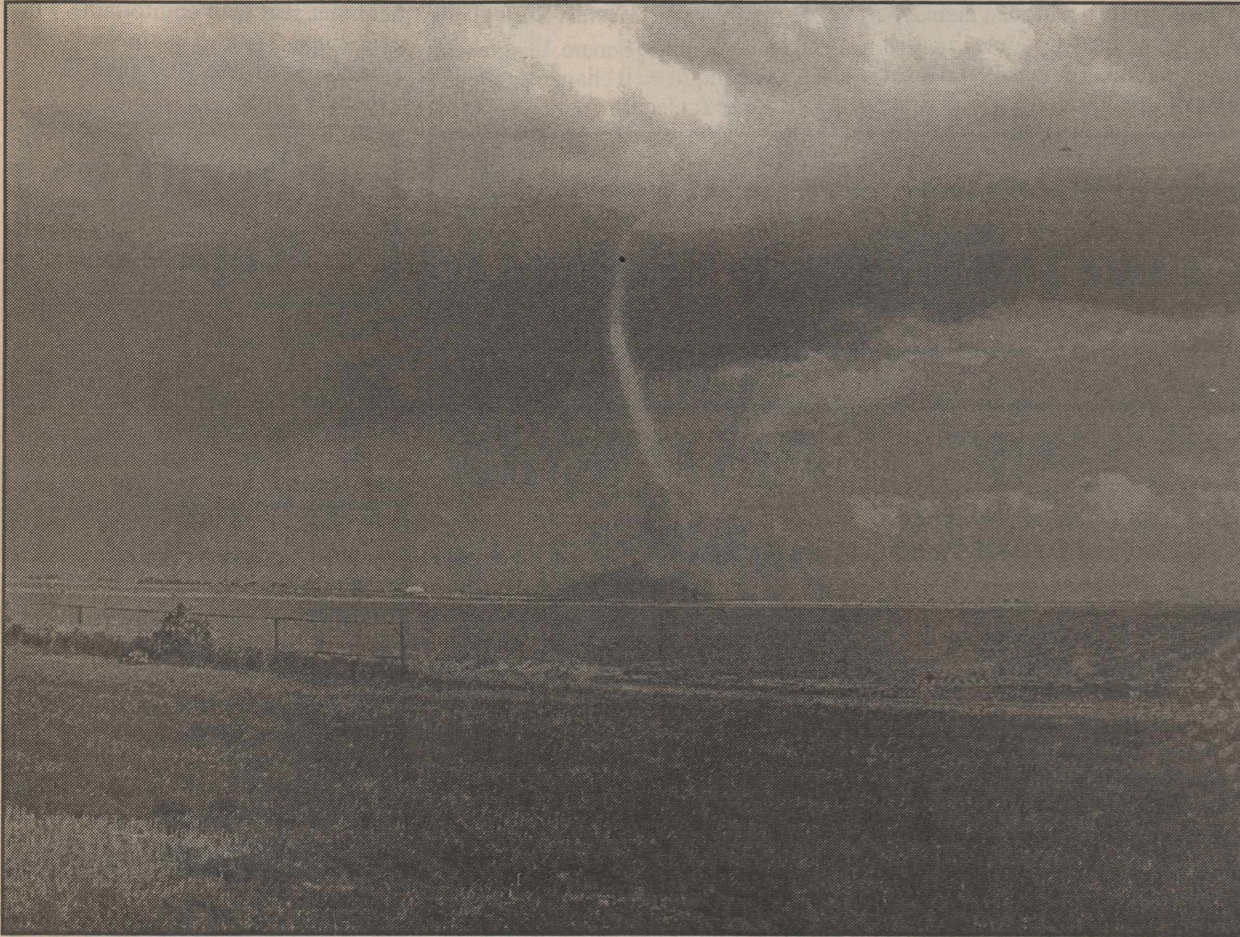

Carl Lemons killed in accident

A former writer for The Hesperian-Beacon, Carl "Snooks" Lemons, 82, was killed Monday, June 4th, after he was struck by a vehicle on Highway 86, 1 1/2 miles east of Quitaque.

According to Sheriff Jason Miller, Mr. Lemons was walking across the highway when a vehicle coming up the hill hit Mr. Lemons. "It was a horrible accident," said Miller. "There was no way for the driver to have prevented it. Mr. Lemons was walking at the top of a hill and on a blind curve. The driver could not have seen him. Mr. Lemons was killed instantly."

Carl Lemons was well known throughout Floyd County. While living in the Cedar Hill Community, he wrote the Cedar Hill News for this newspaper from 1988-1991.

Although it was meant to be a column about the Cedar Hill Community, Mr. Lemons was an eloquent writer and devoted a great deal of time and newspaper space to weather, crops, the stock market, and neighbors. A popu-

lar column, readers always enjoyed the home spun style of his writings and were very often treated to a humorous story with a moral attached at the end.

Services were at 2:00 p.m. Wednesday, June 6, 2001 at the First Baptist Church of Lockney. Rev. Lance Cypert, pastor of First Baptist Church of Quitaque, officiated. Burial was in the Lockney Cemetery under the direction of Moore-Rose-White Funeral Home of Lockney.

He was born on September 5, 1918 in Floyd County to the late Mr. Carl Vance Lemons and Mrs. Ella Belle Fortenberry Lemons.

Mr. Lemons attended schools in the Cedar Hill Community and graduated from Lockney High School and Wayland Baptist College. He married Grace Marie Anderson on November 27, 1936 in Portales, N.M. She preceded him in death on June 28, 1988. He was a farmer and a lifelong resi-

dent of the Cedar Hill Community.

"Snooks" was a faithful member and long time Deacon of Cedar Hill Baptist Church and was well known within the Cedar Hill Community and with former church members for his faithful devotion and service to Cedar Hill Baptist Church. They would expect that he would hear Jesus' words as such, "Well done thy good and faithful servant; you have kept the faith, you have fought the good fight."

He was preceded in death by a son, James Edward Lemons, on December 22, 1982 and a brother, Harold Dickson Lemons, on June 24, 1924.

He is survived by two sons, Marvin Ross Lemons of Plainview and Phil Lemons of Quitaque; two daughters, Frances Marie Whatley of Mesquite and Carla Grace Gayley of San Antonio; 11 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

The family suggests memorials to First Baptist Church, Quitaque, Texas 79255.

"Walk" honors cancer victims

Relay for Life raises over \$18,000

The Floyd County Unit of the American Cancer Society raised over \$18,000 during the 2nd annual Relay for Life event.

Festivities kicked off at the Floyd County Unity Center, in Muncy, June 1st, at 6:00 p.m. with cancer survivors walking the first lap of the Relay.

Wearing turquoise shirts stating "Survivor", to signify hope, over 35 survivors of various ages carried a banner and balloons while circling the track to the music, "I Will Survive".

During a brief opening ceremony the names of the Gold Star Underwriters and the Silver Star Underwriters were read. A special thank-you went out to D&J Gin, M&L Angus and Nick Long for donating the money for the use of the Unity Center.

Two honorary chairpersons were recognized. The first was Beth Faulkenberry who is currently battling colon cancer and the second was Mrs. Pat Frizzell who passed away from leukemia in March of 2000.

After the opening ceremony one member from each of the 18 teams in attendance began walking relay style for the 14 hour period. Music provided by various Floyd County groups entertained the participants and kept energy levels at their highest throughout the event.

At 10:00, 322 lighted luminaries lined the indoor track in honor of those living with cancer and in recognition

of those who lost their battle to the disease. As the buildings lights were lowered, candles were lit and luminaries forming the word HOPE served as a backdrop to the touching ceremony that followed. The songs, "There are Angels Among Us" and "Go Light Your Candle" were played during the ceremony.

Teams continued to walk throughout the night. A volleyball net was set up in the middle of the track and participants not walking were engaged in volleyball games. Kids were playing ball and hoola hoops while some were shooting basketballs. Some of the teams had raffles going on throughout the night.

The walking stopped around 8:00 and awards were given. The Gammie Walkers from Lockney were presented with the Spirit of Relay award for the decorations in their campsite. Their theme was "There are Angels Among Us" and their camp was decorated with stars bearing the names of the team members loved ones who had passed away with cancer.

The Dough Girls from FNB Floydada were presented with the most original campsite with the theme "Clothes Out Cancer", their camp decorated with an old fashioned washing machine and a clothes line.

The Harley Hooters were presented with the most unique campsite with their chuck wagon. The Hooters also

cooked cobbler Friday evening and then cooked breakfast Saturday morning.

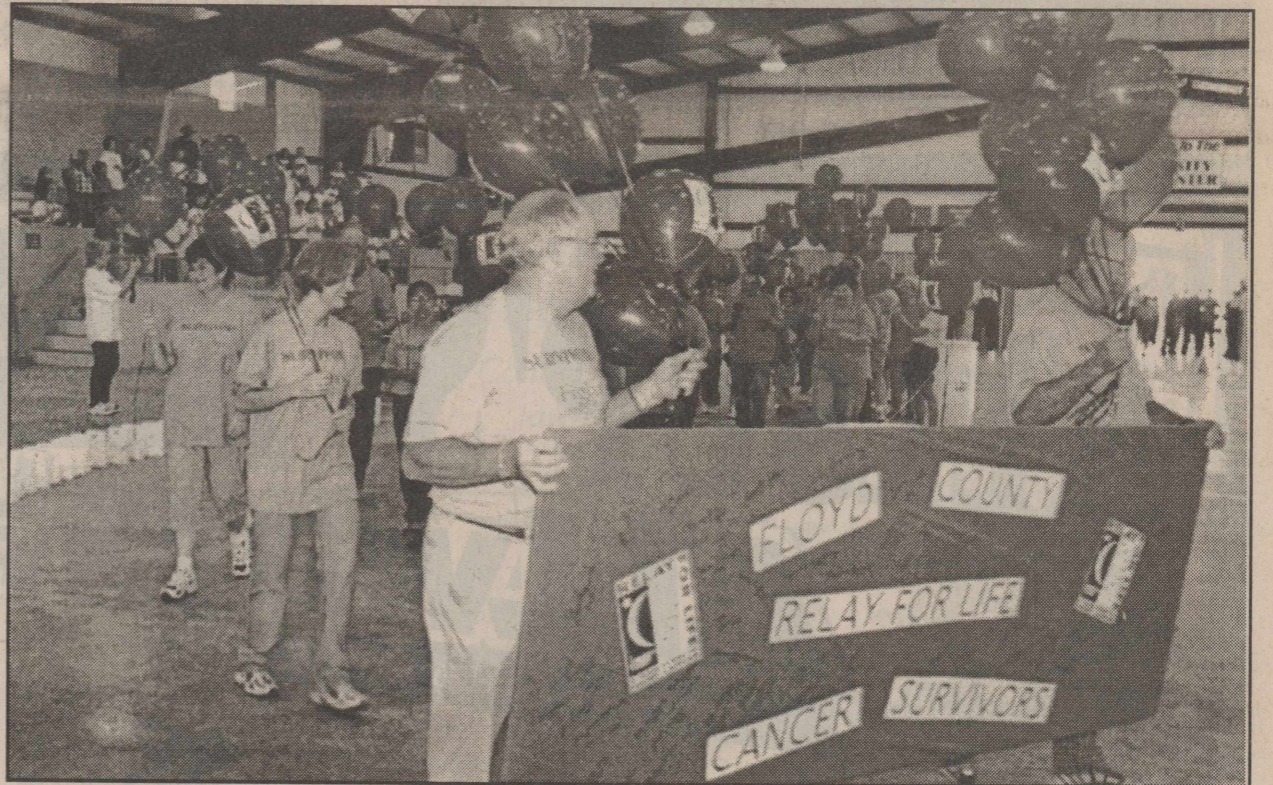
Receiving the award for the most spirited team was the Bunko for Life team. They were up at 4:00 a.m. doing the Chicken Dance (without chicken music) and doing the twist like they just got out of bed.

The award for the most money raised per person went to Bosom Buddies who raised over \$142 per team member.

Funds raised from the Relay for Life event will support the American Cancer Society's programs of cancer research, education and services to local cancer patients in Floyd County.

City Garage Sale is Saturday

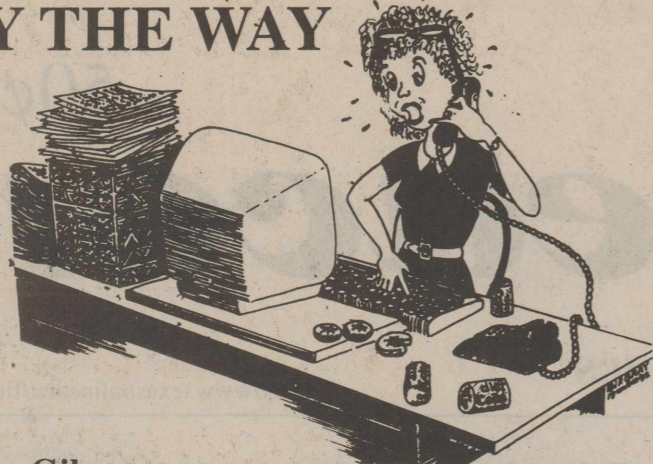
The Floydada Chamber of Commerce's City Wide Garage Sale will be this Saturday, June 9th.

In the world of politics our personal tendency is to look for the silver lining in threatening clouds. Indeed, in this part of the world, clouds are usually harbingers of good news, not bad.

The change of the Vermont Senator Jeffords from Republican to Independent may turn out to be just that for Mr. Bush and the GOP. True, it will change the agenda in the Senate. The Democratic leadership in the Senate, led by Tom Daschle of South Dakota, has opposed the President on practically every issue. Now it will be put up or shut up time, with Daschle and his fellows having to take the heat for what doesn't get done.

Jeffords' defection turns the Senate

over to the Democrats. If Bush plays his cards right, that will be no great loss, and could turn out to be a blessing for Senate Republicans in the long run. Jeffords himself seldom supported Bush or his policies, so his own vote will not be missed. But by taking control of the Senate, the Democrats are entitled to chortle a bit, but they could also find themselves weighed down by Daschle's history of obstructionist tactics during the past few years.

He, and the Democratic leadership, have generally positioned themselves as being against tax cuts, against a strong national defense, and for excessive spending on social issues.

That's not the best position to be in when the next election rolls around.

Quite obviously, the defection of Jeffords, and the resulting upheaval in Washington, was well thought out and well timed by both Jeffords and Daschle. Bush had just scored a major legislative win with passage of the income tax cut, and by passage of Bush's education reform measure, but most of the political comment centered on the Jeffords, move, not the Bush legislative wins. A stage that should have been Bush's quickly became a stage for Daschle. Still, given the makeup of the Senate, the present situation might well change again before the next election.

Jeffords of course is free to do what he wishes, but the more we see of people like him, the more we appreciate Senator Phil Gramm, the Senior Senator from Texas. When Gramm,

then a Democrat, found himself at odds with the leadership of his party, he resigned his seat in the House of Representatives, came back home and ran for the same seat as a Republican. He won hands down. Then he won the Senate seat formerly held by Republican Senator John Tower, and has held that seat with comfortable wins ever since. That, to us, is the honorable course to take. And most Texans evidently agree.

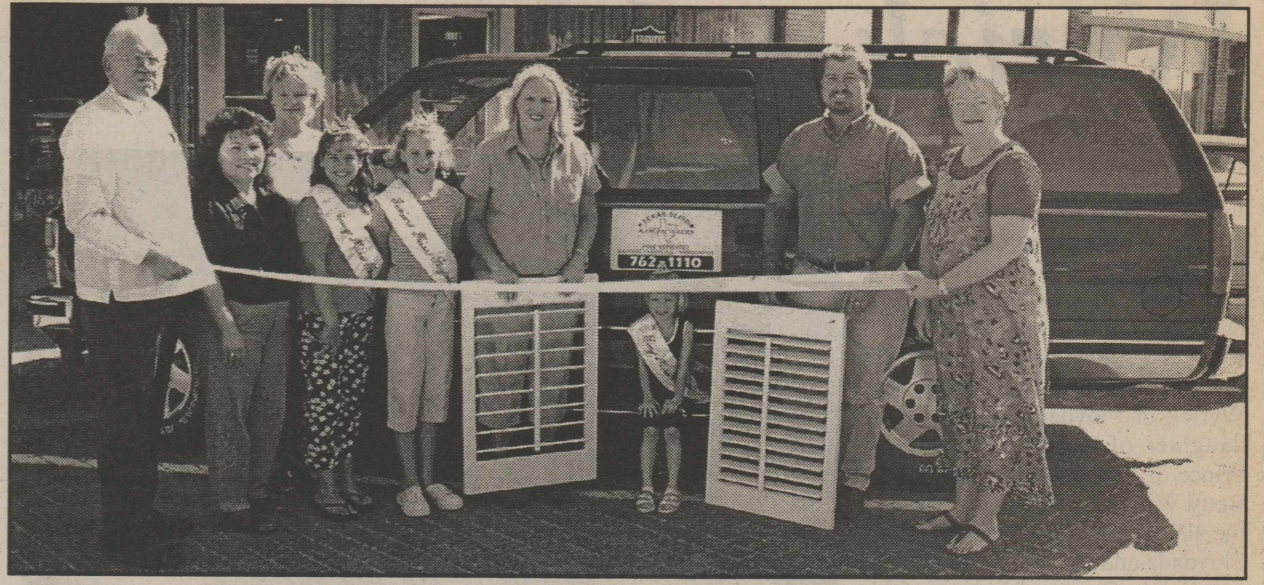

High winds and hail pound cotton

Getting a handle on the effects of the May 30 hailstorm that dissected the Texas High Plains will be no easy task according to published and unpublished reports attempting to detail the aftermath.

Cotton fields from the New Mexico state line south of Muleshoe all the way to Snyder were affected by the storm that pummeled the area with heavy rain, hail and wind gusts that reached 105 miles per hour at one location west of Lubbock.

One thing that is known is that for many growers the 2000 crop year has come to an abrupt and early end. With prospects for the crop being less than ideal from a price and input cost standpoint many growers are having mixed feelings about their situation.

"Nobody wants to lose a crop to feel like they have a chance to stay in business," notes PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett, "but many growers realize that the projected final outcome for a crop taken to harvest this year is another financial loss that they might not survive."

It is hard to argue with the reality that some growers have been relieved of the difficult task of producing a crop in the face of rocketing input costs and plummeting prices.

Two key questions remain to be answered: How much of the High Plains crop was lost permanently? How much is likely to be replanted due to requirements of the federal crop insurance program?

Early estimates are that as much as 250,000 acres were directly affected by the storm. Approximately one-half

of the acres affected have final planting dates of May 31 or June 5. Any crops lost in Bailey and Lamb counties have a May 31 planting date and are unlikely to go back to cotton.

Acreage lost in Hockley and Lubbock counties have a June 5 final planting date and may or may not be able to be replanted before that date. A large percentage of this acreage is likely to be abandoned as it will take several days to assess the damage and for the ground to dry enough to allow growers to return to the field.

Acreage damaged in Lynn, Garza and counties further south and east of Lubbock have planting dates of June 10 or later. Most of these acres will probably be required to be replanted unless subsequent weather events occur that inflict further damage or keep growers out of the field.

USDA protects against foot and mouth disease

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs applauded Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Office of Management and Budget, for implementing a policy to pay U.S. livestock producers for any animals that must be slaughtered to control an outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease. Farmers and ranchers would be paid 100 percent of the fair market value of their animals.

"Indemnification is an important step in our aggressive efforts to keep foot-and mouth disease out of the United States," Combs said. "The thought of losing everything that sometimes has taken generations to

build had many of our farmers and ranchers worried.

"If an outbreak does occur in Texas or the United States, producers can rest assured that they will be compensated for any livestock they lose to this devastating disease," Combs said. "This is an additional incentive to report signs of the disease they might find in their herds."

The White House is also looking into compensation for additional expenses, such as the cost of disinfecting or the cost of feed for livestock awaiting slaughter or vaccinations.

Indemnification funds will come from the USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation. USDA has the broad authority to spend whatever is needed to control any outbreak of plant or

animal disease in the country with the cooperation of OMB.

Currently USDA has banned the import of livestock and certain livestock by-products from the European Union and countries with foot-and-mouth disease. The Texas Department of Agriculture and USDA are warning travelers to the United States to take the necessary precautions to make sure they don't bring the virus back with them on their clothes or personal items.

TDA is a member of Gov. Rick Perry's newly formed Foreign Animal Disease Working Group charged to develop measures to respond to any outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease or any other foreign animal disease.

Windbreak assistance now offered

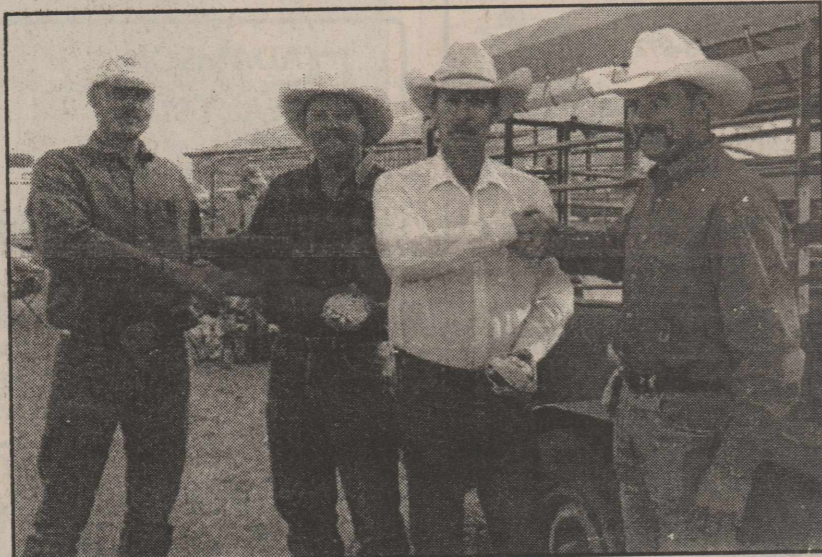
Do any of us really enjoy living up here on the Southern High Plains of Texas? Of course we do.....but what could make life a little more pleasant, particularly during certain times of the year? How about a windbreak to block and divert the wind and dust?

Wouldn't several nice rows of trees, all planted in a custom-designed configuration, make those winter and spring months a little more tolerable?

Sounds simple enough, doesn't it? To stop the wind and/or the blowing soil, just plant a few trees and the problem is solved, right? Well, there's a little more to it than that, but with the right materials, proper site preparation, planting technique, supplemental water and weed control, and the MIND-SET OF LONG-TERM COMMITMENT, an initial planting can mature into a beautiful, functional, protective wind and soil barrier within a reasonable amount of time.

But where do you go for assistance in windbreak design, plant species selection, plant acquisition, and other important technical information about windbreaks? How about the Texas Forest Service, which just happens to have a windbreak tree nursery in Lubbock, staffed with people anxious and willing to provide windbreak assistance?

So, when you decide to protect your homestead, your livestock, or your fields with trees and shrubs, or you decide to establish wildlife habitat, or maybe build a snow barrier, contact the West Texas Nursery of the Texas Forest Service in Lubbock. Summer is the perfect time to design your windbreak so you'll be prepared to order your trees in the fall and take delivery in late winter or early spring, just in time for installation.

Patman praised the leadership of the Governor and that of Lieutenant Governor Bill Ratliff, and Speaker of the House Pete Laney.

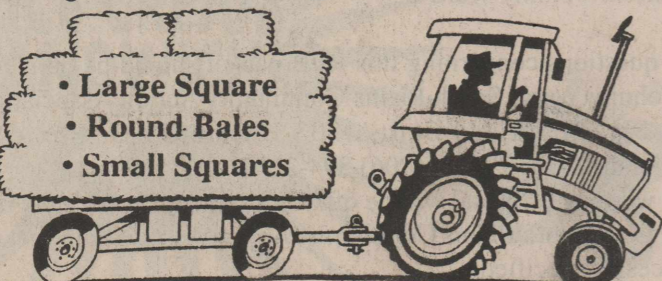
"The leaders of Texas have once again closed ranks to attend to the state's business in a bipartisan way," Patman said.
