

Do any of us really enjoy living up here on the Southern High Plains of Texas? Of course we do.....but what could make life a little more pleasant, particularly during certain times of the year? How about a windbreak to block and divert the wind and dust?

Wouldn't several nice rows of trees, all planted in a custom-designed configuration, make those winter and spring months a little more tolerable?

Sounds simple enough, doesn't it? To stop the wind and/or the blowing soil, just plant a few trees and the problem is solved, right? Well, there's a little more to it than that, but with the right materials, proper site preparation, planting technique, supplemental water and weed control, and the MIND-SET of LONG-TERM COM-MITMENT, an initial planting can mature into a beautiful, functional, protective wind and soil barrier within a reasonable amount of time.


