Recent Tax Cut Could Mean More Money in Your Pocketbook, Mailbox Soon

As you may have heard, the President recently signed into law the largest tax cut in more than 20 years. I voted for this measure because I believe that tax relief is important to help the economy and to help ease the strain on the pocketbooks of hard working Americans. Federal taxes are near a record high. With higher energy and other costs, taxpayers need relief.

The bill cuts income tax rates, reduces the marriage penalty, doubles the child tax credit, and phases out the death tax - something I have been pushing for since first being elected. In many respects, I would like to have done more. For example, I would like to reduce the federal tax on gasoline and the tax on Social Security benefits, both of which were increased in 1993. But this bill is a good start, and it will put more money in the pockets of every taxpayer.

Next month, the federal government will begin mailing \$38 billion in rebate checks to taxpayers around the country. The amount of rebate will vary; for example single taxpayers could get as much as \$300, \$500 for single parents, and \$600 for married couples. That's extra money to take a vacation, pay down credit cards, add to savings, or do with as you please.

Now, Congress and the President must work together to make sure that all of that tax money you send to Washington is well spent. Priorities such as national defense, strengthening Social Security and Medicare, and paying down the debt are important. And we must continue to work to end wasteful or unnecessary spending.

We must also remember that the money spent by the federal government comes from hard working Americans who work and sacrifice to leave a better Nation for future generations.

Power Association in financing and building an additional electrical generation facility. The motion was seconded by Councilman Sheldon Sue and it unanimously passed.

Brown said, "This will probably never happen, but we need to pass this resolution just as a precautionary measure."
Councilwoman Bettye King made the motion to adopt an affirmative action plan in conjunction with the Floydada Community Development Program in order to comply with a grant proposal. It was seconded by Sue and unanimously passed.

The council unanimously passed a motion made by Nielson to transfer the title of the city's 1993 Ford Crown Victoria vehicle over to the Parent Adolescence Center for liability reasons. It was seconded by King.

Five or six local residents addressed the council during Public Forum. Each resident complained about three or more Rottweiler dogs running loose and threatening the public at 906 E. Ross Street.

One neighbor stated, "I need to walk for my health and these dogs run loose and threaten me. I have to carry a big stick to protect myself."

Brown said, "City employee Cow-

boy has been down there several times and he has not been received very well. I think Police Chief Darrell Gooch has written them three citations for their dogs-running loose. So we must go and explain that their dogs have been shown to be aggressive. Someone must pay for a \$100,000 liability insurance policy and the dogs must have their shots. They must pen them up and keep them on their property."

Another neighbor told the council, "I used to walk every where and every evening and I can't walk now. I am fearful of these same dogs. We ought to be able to walk without fear, if we want to. Something needs to be done."

"With school being out and the children riding bicycles, and you know how dogs are about chasing bicycles, somebody might get hurt. Its no use to say I'm sorry after the children have been mauled by dogs. We need to get these dogs off the streets, so we can walk without fear."

Another citizen complained of a loose dog north of downtown near the gin. Brown assured these residents that something would be done Wednesday morning concerning these loose dogs.

Brown delivered a written report to

the council updating them on some city projects.

"The mosquitoes have been bad and we have been trying to get everything right so we could spray," wrote Brown, "for us to be able to spray, the temperature needs to be close to 70 degrees or more, the wind 12 mph or less, and we must give at least 24 hour public notice."

"We have had some electric problems from time to time. Most of the problems have been associated with weather, although we have had a few

fuses give out due to the load they are to protect or their age. Our daily/hourly load continues to grow.

"We should have the rest rooms at the RV building completed and in working order. This addition of rest rooms and central air and heat is going to be good."

"Our adult softball has had problems. The women who were selected to run the program have done nothing. In fact, they brought the keys in this morning and said they did not want to try and run the program. I wish they had done this a few months back so the program would be going. The man who ran the program last year has agreed to get things going in the next few days."

June brides and social security

June brides already have a huge "to do" list. But may we add something to that list? Contact Social Security to change your name. It can make a difference in your future financial security. It's quick and free, so don't pay someone else to get you a Social Security card with your new name.

For a working woman, reporting a name change helps ensure that you will receive proper credit for your earnings and, one day, the Social Security benefits due to you. And, if Internal Revenue Service and Social Security records show the same name and Social Security number, your tax refund won't be delayed.

Even if you don't work outside the home, you should still report your name change. When you report your new name, it means your Social Security record shows your married name if you apply for benefits on your husband's earnings record. (You should also report any changes to the first or middle names you may use.)

Today, many women continue to use their maiden name after marriage. If so, you don't need to report a name change to Social Security if you continue to use your maiden name consistently throughout your working years. If you decide to change your name at a later time, contact us then to update your record.

To change your name on your record, you'll need to complete form SS-5, Application for a Social Security Card. You'll need to show either your marriage certificate showing your old and new names or two documents—one with your former name and one with your married name. All

documents must be originals or certified copies. The application form lists other documents Social Security accepts.

To get a copy of an Application for a Social Security Card, visit www.ssa.gov, our Internet website; call our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213; or visit your local Social Security office. Remember: the process is simple and free.

Holland is a former sportswriter for The Dallas Morning News and the Waco Tribune-Herald. His golf writ-

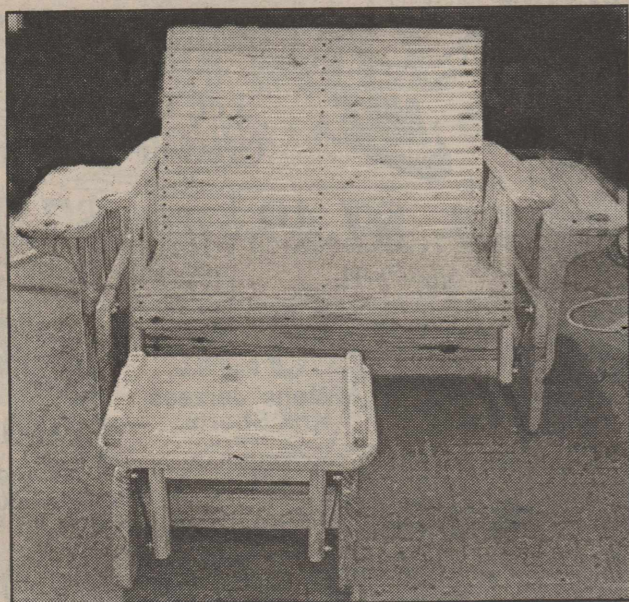

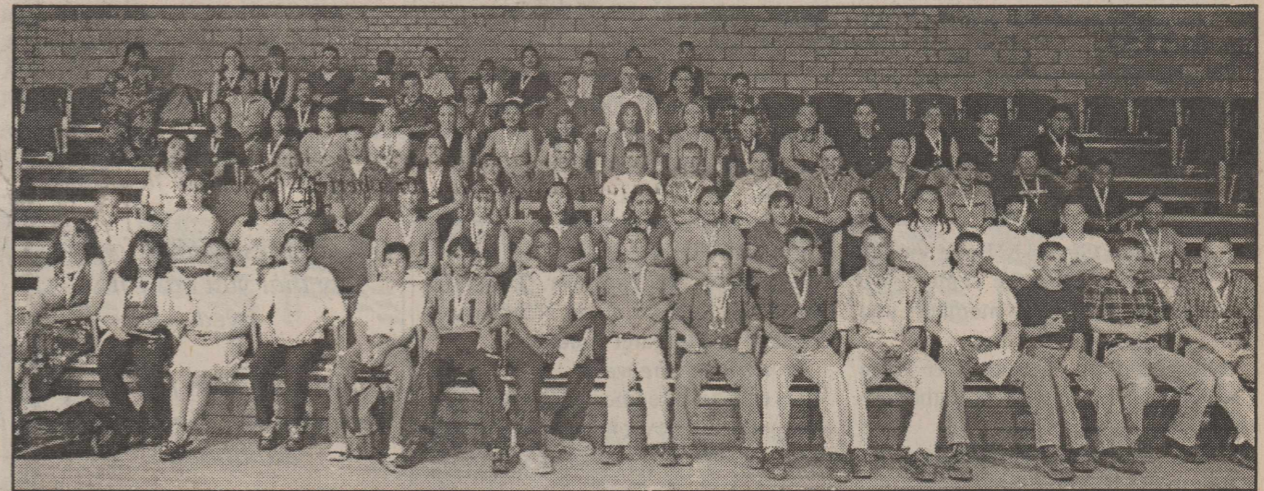

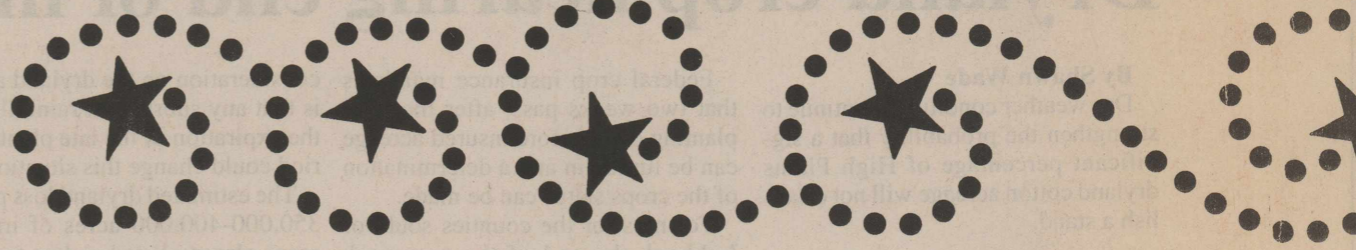
