made a recommendation to the boar to allow the option by any student to sit out and skip eating breakfast wit

Board Member Board Member Amado Morales mad a motion to leave the present manda tory breakfast program in place as is
It was seconded by Board Member Mark McCormick. Morales, McCormick, and Board Member Bill Dean voted in favor of the motion Board Members Mitch Probasco, Jill Warren, and Kerry Pratt voted against of a majority vote.
In explaining his
menting the new mandatory breakfas program this year, Collins said, "I have lived for this cay where we could pate (problems) nor post elections so I take all the blame for that.
"I will be willing to continue this program with modifications. Now when you pull some of these kids ou of the program, then some of his (or
her) friends will go out with them Yo will pretty much kill the program," Collins added.
Pratt stated, "But if you have 94 percent of the people who like the program, it looks like you will have 94 percent participate (in the program).
Warren said, "I have been told about children on medication who need to eat breakfast at home and the parents want to make sure the medication is administered properly. Other children
are allergic to milk products. are allergic to milk products.
