

(Sharon was quickly put in his place when Bush termed Sharon's comments "unacceptable." Good that he did. It was long overdue. Sharon has lied to the United States on more than one occasion, and his mouthings should be given the same weight as Jesse Jackson's. Despite frequent, and repeated, assurances from the Israeli lobby in the United states, Israel is no real "friend" or ally of the United States. Israel is a "client state" of the United States, armed, paid for, and subsidized by the United States. Normally, in that kind of situation, the "client state" responds positively, not negatively, to the benefactor state. Mr. Sharon said, again publicly, that from now on Israel would depend on no one but Israel for its own security. That, for a moment, was good news, great news. But then, perhaps realizing the implications of his remarks, Sharon quickly recounted and got on board.)

Mr. Sharon has good reason to be concerned. If there is ever going to be any semblance of peace in that part of the world, there will have to be a reevaluation of America's role in the Palestine-Israeli conflict.

We simply cannot continue to give Israel carte blanc authority to work its will without also reaping the consequences of Israeli action. That is just a fact of life that should be obvious to even the most stupid of our policy

As long as Clinton was our President, the Israelis had no cause to

worry. With Bush, they are not so sure, and it is that possible reevaluation that so worries Sharon and Israel. The way the Israelis look at it, the fewer friends we have throughout the Muslim world, the more valuable the Israelis become as a client state. The more friends we have throughout the Muslim world, the less valuable Israel becomes as a client-state.

> Accordingly, it is in the Israeli interest for Bush not to owe any favors to any Muslim state, for that may cause a decision to be made, somewhere down the line, that Israel might believe not to be in their best interest.

praisal District Board of Directors. Bearden made a motion to support the Resolution of Proposition 7, as listed on the November 6, 2001, Constitutional Amendment Election Ballot to provide for more veterans cemeteries. The motion was seconded by

Jones and unanimously passed. Gilroy made a motion to adopt the order by the State of Texas that prohibits the keeping of dangerous wild animals in Flovd County. The motion was seconded by Bearden and unanimously passed. Judge Hardin said the law states, "A person who harbors or keeps in Floyd County an animal prohibited by this Order commits an offense: An offense is a Class C misde-

The Order states: "The keeping of the following wild animals is prohibited in Floyd County: lions, tigers, ocelots, cougars, leopards, cheetah, jaguars, bobcats, lynx, servals, caracals, hyenas, bears, coyotes, jackals, baboons, chimpanzees, orangutans, gorillas, and hybrids of these animals.

Bearden also made the motion to adopt the Resolution Proclaiming October as Czech Heritage Month. Gilroy made the second and it unanimously was approved.

The court accepted a deed from Chad and Shelley Moore. It was the last deed needed concerning the FM 689 road project to begin soon in the Northeast part of the county.

The court voted unanimously to keep the daily reimbursement for jurors at \$12. They also voted to renew the county's contract with the City landfill at \$27.50 per ton and \$30 per load delivered there.

The commissioners unanimously passed a motion to transfer \$15,000 to each precinct from the Road and Bridge Fund.

County Agents J.D. Ragland and Melissa Long both gave reports to the court on their activities for the last

Ragland said, "The last of August we had a grazing seminar for cattle in Floyd and Crosby counties. We had about 25 producers that attended. We covered wheat varieties and hay grazer tests. Many producers requested sorghum sample testing to be

"Also, Floyd and Crosby counties held a joint effort beef cattle management seminar in Ralls. There were about 15 producers there. We went over nutrition for beef cows.

"On September 19, we had a successful Floyd County Ag Tour with 41 producers participating. We had three tour stops. One was on the Steve Lloyd farm where we focused on guar production. Another stop was about a

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half a mile west of town to a range pasture demonstration for removing and controlling mesquite (bushes and trees). The other stop was at the Brian Teeple farm where we looked at cotton varieties and harvest aids," Ragland added.

Ragland continued, "Our 4-H and youth programs have kept us busy with all the fairs lately. Floyd County was represented extremely well at the West Texas Fair in Abilene, the South Plains Fair in Lubbock, and the State Fair in Dallas."

"Agriculture wise, there is a lot of cotton being harvested in Floyd' County. We have everything from no cotton production to really good cotton with some really good yields. But the downside to that is the price is not very stable right now. But we are in a lot better shape in cotton production than a lot of our neighboring counties. However, our wheat that has been planted needs a good rain," Ragland

Since the program began, it has honored 3,580 farms and ranches in 219 counties. For the first time last year, TDA recognized farms and ranches in the 150and 200-year categories.

The wealth of Texas history that lies within the fences of these farms and ranches is truly amazing. The spirit of the early Texas settlers still lives on today in the men and women who continue farming and ranching through the generations.


