rettes, or have a shotgun in your car. We could not justify searching a car because Elza alerted to something and it just turned out to be a cigarette.

When she is taken to the school for a search, Elza does not search students. She only searches propertysuch as cars, lockers, desks, books,
backpacks, etc. Before Elza is taken into a room, all students are taken out and stand in the hallway while Elza searches everything in the room.
Most searches are done within Most searches are done within one hour. "We don't want to bore her with
a long search," said Ramon. "If she a long search, said Ramon. 'If she
searches for too long and doesn't find anything she wouldn't want to try again." Sgt. Ramon has worked for the City of Floydada since November 1997. He served as a popular school resource
officer until recently. "I had to give up that position when I was promoted to Sergeant and took this shift," said Ramon.
Ramon's new partner is only 3 years old and still very playful. "She lives
with me and is a regular house pet," said Ramon. "She has been received well by the community and loves all "Kong".
