## Reyes dedicated to training

Training for area track meets is in full force at Floyd County schools, but Floydada senior Rocky Reyes never waits until the season begins. No matter what the weather, Reyes trains everyday, twice a day, all year long.

A dedicated runner, Reyes says he is motivated by his parents, Moises and Mary Ann Reyes, and

his uncle, Rafael Espinoza. He is also encouraged by his 13 year old brother, Christopher, who runs with him.

Frequent travelers on Hwy. 62, through Blanco Canyon, will see Reyes running every morning by 6:00 a.m., and followed in a car by his dad or his uncle.

"Uncle Rafael coaches us and encourages us," said Reyes. "He is a

runner also. He holds the 3200 meter record (9:37.7) at FHS which he got in 1983. He also placed 2nd at State in his Senior year."

A 4 year track competitor, Reyes runs 3.2 miles in cross country meets. "My best time has been 16:55." Reyes has qualified for State and placed 21st his Sophomore year, and 13th his Senior Year. (Another Floyd County stu-

dent, FHS senior Wade Miller, placed 12th at last year's State meet).

Reyes says his training is broken down into "hard days" and "easy days". A hard day is a 5:30 a.m. or 6:00 a.m. report to Blanco Canyon. "During cross country season I run 3 miles worth of 400 meter dashes with 30 second breaks in between.

"The next day would be an easy day," said Reyes. "I start at 6:00 a.m. or 6:15 a.m. and run 4-5 miles distance. I try to keep my time under 5:30 per mile. My little brother runs with me on these days and he keeps it under 7 minutes.

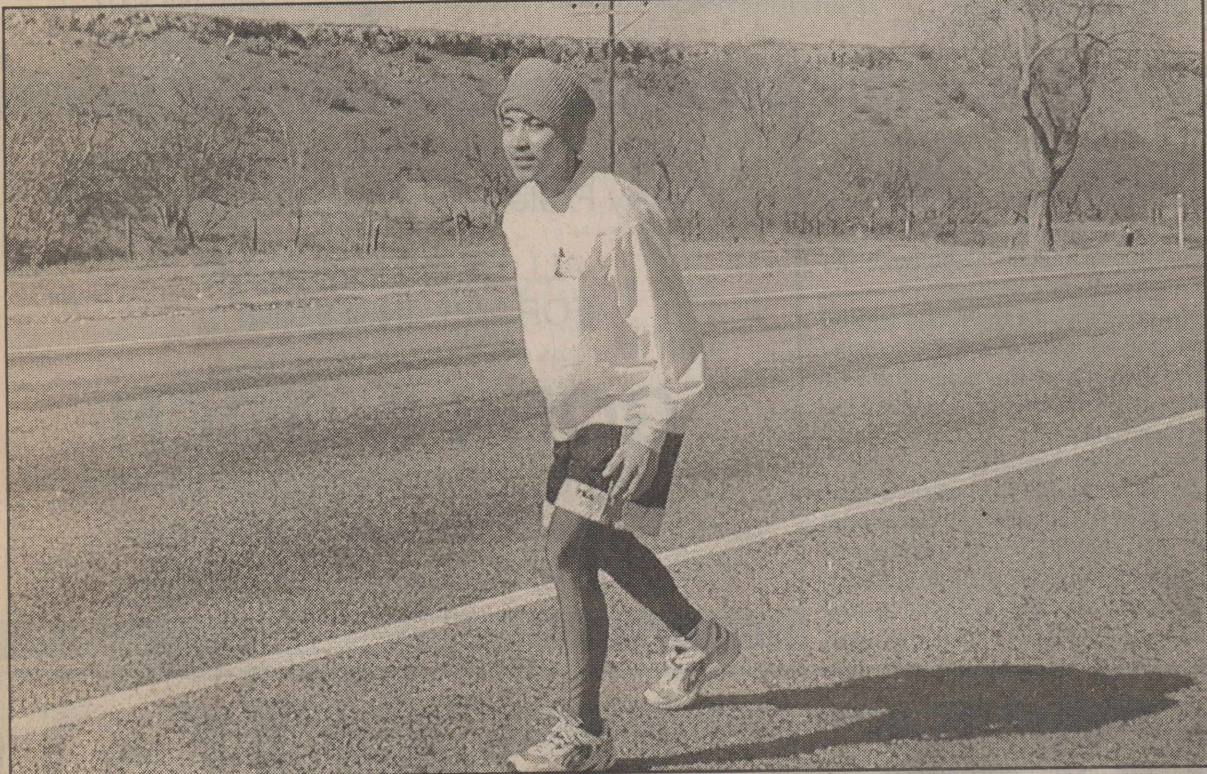
"I admire my brother. He is very dedicated—more than I was at that age."

After his run, Reyes goes to school. After school, Reyes reports for work at Floydada's Pay-N-Save. After work, Reyes runs again. Then he settles down to homework.

"It keeps me busy and out of trouble," laughs Reyes.

As dedicated as Reyes is in his training, one might expect him to pursue a career in sports or coaching, but he has set his sights for a different career. "I plan on majoring in automobile engineering (engine and interior design), and minor in real estate," said Reyes.

Whatever Reyes pursues he has already learned one of the basic principal of success—dedication.

## Lady Winds season ends at Regional

The Floydada Lady Winds' Cinderella season came to an end Friday in the semi-finals of the Class 2A Region 1 Tournament, falling to #7 state ranked Seagraves 55-43.

The Lady Eagles used a suffocating full court press, overall team quickness and a strong performance from 6'ft sophomore post Darrice Griffin to virtually take Floydada out of its game. Seagraves opened the contest by jumping out to a 9-0 lead before the Lady Winds gained composure and Jessica Castaneda scored Floydada's initial points with a field goal at the 3:42 mark. The Eaglettes

then went on to build a 16-4 lead after the first quarter and kept Floydada at arm's length the rest of the way.

The biggest threat the Lady Winds posed was midway in the 2nd quarter when they had whittled the Seagraves lead down to 18-11. Floydada had possession of the ball, but came away empty handed, and the Lady Eagles then went on a 10-0 run to put an end to any Lady Wind momentum.

Griffin scored 14 points in the first half to lead Seagraves to a 30-14 advantage at intermission. The sophomore post ended up as the game's leading scorer with 24 points, plus she

## Lockney's Consumer's Fuel is staying open

Consumer's Fuel, of Lockney, is not closing says manager Lyndall Stapp.

"There is a rumor going around town that we are closing," said Stapp. "This is not true and it is bad for business for that type of talk to go on.

"I've been told by people that they bought their tires somewhere else because they didn't think we were going to be open to service them.

"We still have a wide variety of tires that we are selling and servicing and we are also a full service gas station."

Consumer's is currently owned by stockholders and according to Stapp

the board is looking for an independent buyer. "But they aren't looking to close the business," said Stapp.

"Consumer's has been here for 75 years," said Stapp. "How many other businesses around here have been in business that long. We need the public to be aware of how important it is for them to trade at home and spend their money locally."

Consumer's sells Firestone, BF Goodrich, Michelin, Uniroyal, Hankook, and Lee tires.

"We service everything we sell," said Stapp.

## Thief causes ammonia leak

A smell of ammonia close to the Longhorn track, February 21st, led to an ammonia spill from a Lockney Coop ammonia tank. Police believe the spill was a result of someone trying to steal the ammonia to manufacture methamphetamines.

"Between 4:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. a man watching boys running track noticed a strong smell of ammonia," said Lockney Police Chief Jerry

Edwards.

"He went to investigate and noticed ammonia spilled on the ground under a Lockney Coop tank that was parked in a field close to the track field.

"Approximately one ton of ammonia had leaked out of the tank. There was a hose attached to the tank that did not belong to the Coop. The Coop's hoses have gaskets on them that prevent leakage. It appeared someone tried to drain the tank but

spilled the ammonia instead. I'm sure once the thief saw what was happening he took off before he was over-come by fumes."

According to Edwards ammonia is commonly used to manufacture methamphetamines and theft is common where ammonia is stored. "This is the first time in a long time anyone in Lockney has been a victim of this type of theft," said Edwards.

## Lockney mayor resigns

Lockney's Mayor, Gary Marr formally presented his resignation to the Lockney City Council, February 25. Mayor Pro Tem Roger Stapp was then appointed Mayor in the special City Council meeting.

Araujo presented the Oath of Office to Stapp.

Marr has served as mayor for 7 years and was a councilman for 8 years prior to being elected to mayor.

Marr resigned his position for personal reasons. "I am changing em-

ployment and may have to look outside the county for a job."

Marr was born and raised in Lockney and graduated from Lockney High School in 1969. Marr moved away from Lockney for a brief time and returned in 1980.

During Marr's tenure as mayor the council initiated yearly employee evaluations, split up job functions and created new departments.

Marr says he is perhaps the proudest about the grants the city has received while he has been mayor.

"We worked with the Texas Community Block Grant Program and got a grant for a new water tower and the water pipeline to Aiken," said Marr. "We also applied for a grant for a sewer project. We didn't get it this time but we will reapply. These were great grants. We only had to match them by 15%."

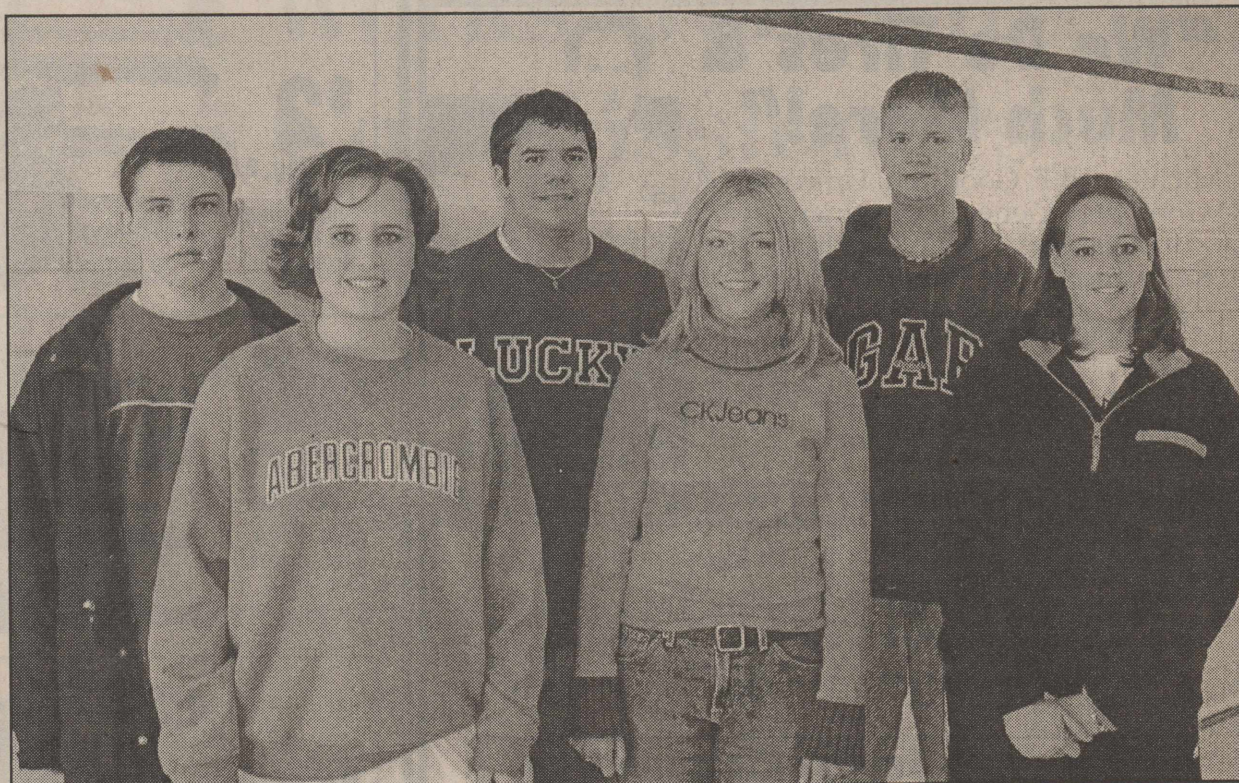
Marr said he enjoyed the time he served on the council. "It has been a real pleasure," said Marr. "There are good people on the council and Mayor Pro Tem Roger Stapp will be able to step right in and do the job well."

The Lockney Council was unanimous in expressing their gratitude and appreciation to Marr for the work he has done on the Council.

Roger Stapp's position as City Councilman in District 5 is now vacant, and people interested in being a Councilmember should contact Lockney City Hall for information. It is not necessary to live in District 5 to be elected to that position.

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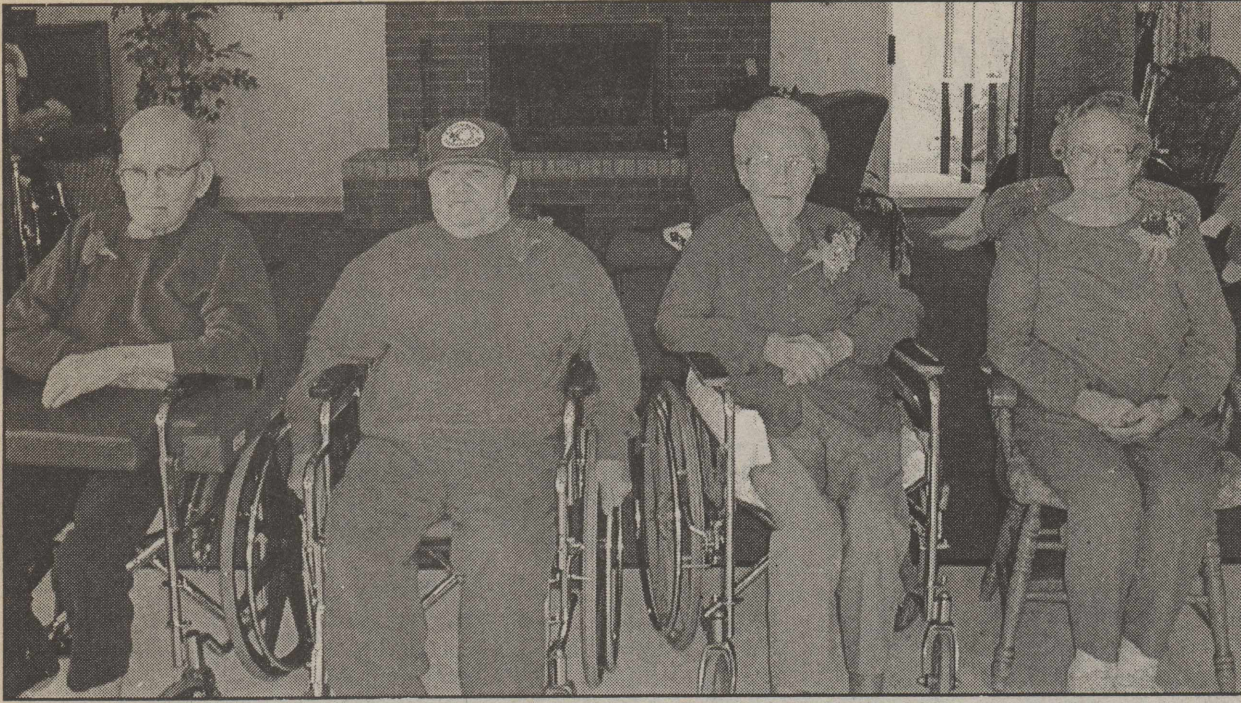

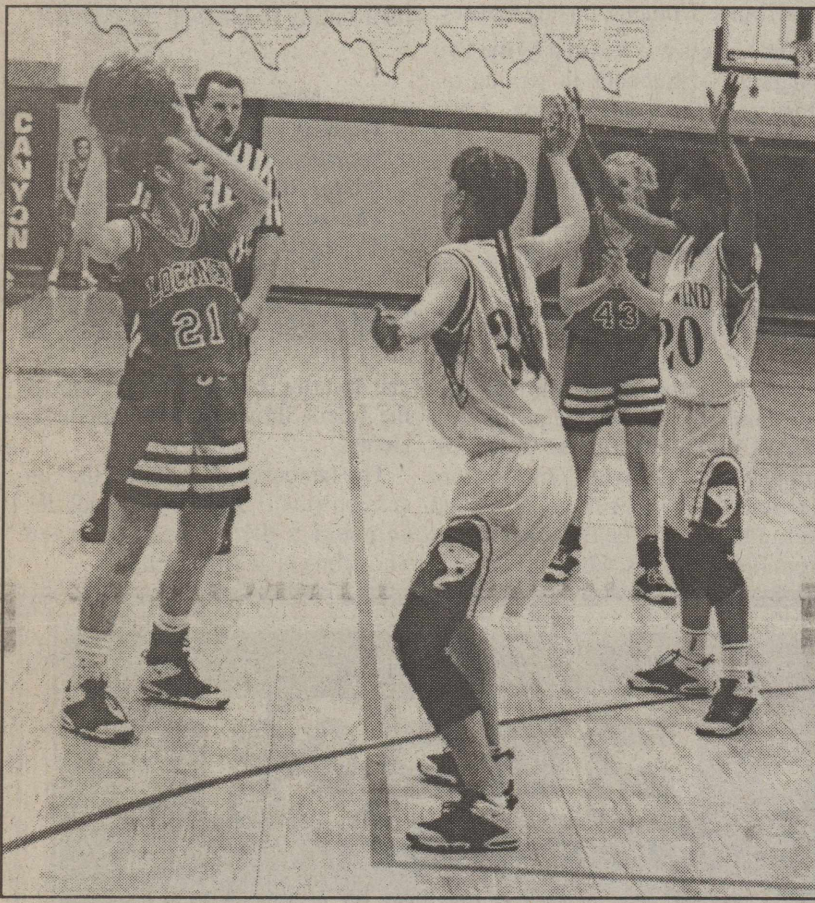

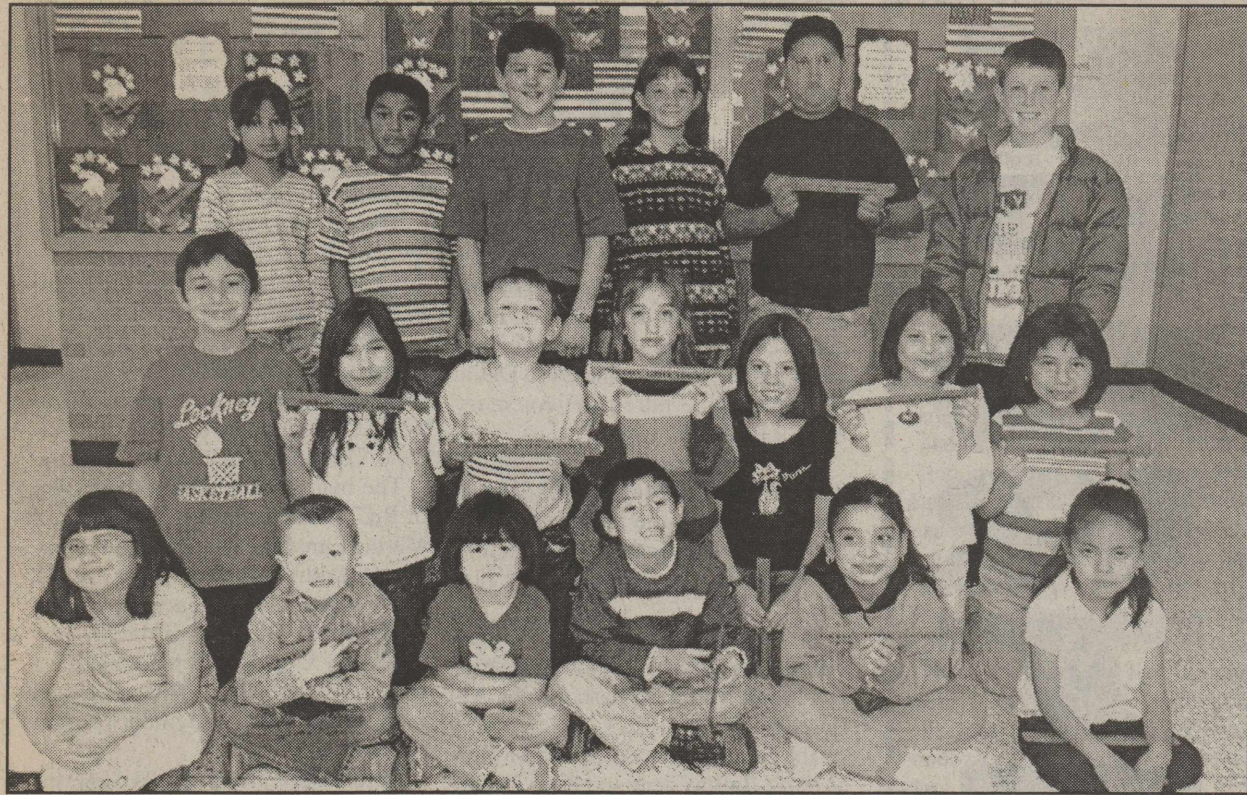

Jaynette Harrison as Alternate Judge.

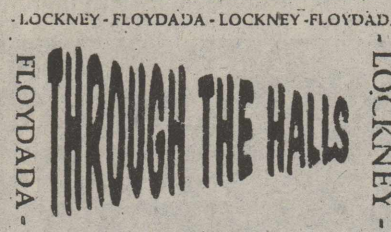
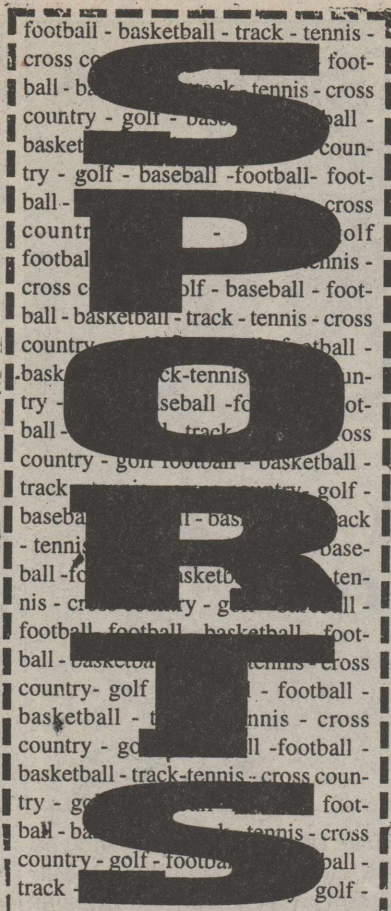
The attorney firm of Underwood, Wilson, Berry, Stein, and Johnson of Amarillo was approved by the board to be FISD's attorney representative.

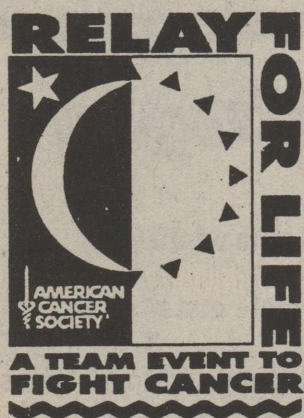

## Floyd County Extension News

Shoot'n The Breeze By J.D. Ragland, Agent-Ag

Despite blustery days now and again, spring is just around the corner, and animal health officials are urging owners to protect their equids, including horses, mules and donkeys against several mosquito-borne diseases before "bug" season starts.

"Vaccines are available to protect equids against both equine encephalitis, better known as "sleeping sickness" and West Nile Virus (WNV). However, the shots are no value if they aren't given prior to disease exposure," said veterinarian Terry Conger, state epidemiologist for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency. "These vaccines require two doses, administered several weeks apart, and full protection doesn't develop until four to six weeks after the second dose. Realistically, then, it can take up to 10 weeks for the horse to be disease-resistant. That's why it's so important to start the round of vaccinations now."

Dr. Conger noted that cases of "sleeping sickness," or equine encephalitis, occur sporadically in Texas equids, and on rare occasions, humans contract the mosquito-borne infection. Transmitted by mosquitoes that have fed on diseased birds, Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) and Western Equine Encephalitis (WEE) causes swelling of the brain, resulting in staggering, convulsions, and fever. Although horses do not transmit the disease to humans, equids are "sentinel animals," or indicators that infected mosquitoes are in a specific area.

"Veterinarians can administer an effective 'two-way' vaccine to protect equids against EEE and WEE," said Dr. Irby, TAHC equine specialist. "Two injections, 30 days apart, are required, and the animal will need a 'booster shot' annually or biannually."

"Another form of sleeping sickness, Venezuelan Equine Encephalitis (VEE), is a foreign animal disease that originated in South America. In 1971, a VEE outbreak swept northward through Mexico, threatening horses in the southern U.S. In two years, due to an all-out effort, more than 2.8 million animals in 19 states were vaccinated against VEE," Dr. Irby said. "On rare occasions, VEE cases still creep into southern Mexico, and if it should move north, it would threaten American animals. Therefore, as an added precaution, equids in South Texas

should receive a three-way vaccine that protects not only against EEE and WEE, but also VEE."

Although it has yet to be diagnosed in Texas, another mosquito-borne, encephalitic disease causing concern is West Nile Virus (WNV). Dr. Irby said WNV was unheard of in the US until 1999 in New York, where seven persons died from the infection and at least 25 equids were infected. In 2000, the virus had spread to 12 states, and by year's end 2001, the disease impacted 27 states, including Louisiana and Arkansas. At least 564 equids, tested positive for the disease in 2001, reported Dr. Irby.

Epidemiologists are still uncertain how or when an infected person, bird or mosquito entered the country, initiating the bird-mosquito WNV disease cycle in the US. First isolated in 1937 in the West Nile District of Uganda, the disease now has wide-spread distribution, including Africa, Europe, the Middle East, and West and Central Asia. As the virus has moved across the U.S., the U.S. Department of Agriculture changed WNV's designation from a "foreign animal disease," to an "emerging disease."

"Texas is particularly vulnerable to the introduction of WNV, because major migratory routes for birds pass over a large portion of east Texas. This summer, we may find that the disease is brought into the state by infected birds," commented Dr. Irby. He pointed out that at least 17 species of mosquitoes can be involved in the disease cycle.

"Many horses infected with WNV won't appear to be ill, while, others become debilitated and too weak to rise," he said. "About 20 percent of the horses infected with WNV in 2001 either died or were euthanized because they were so ill."

"Late last summer, a WNV vaccine was approved for equids, and like many other encephalitic vaccines, two injections are needed. For WNV vaccine, the injections must be three to six weeks apart. The timing of vaccination is crucial, as demonstrated in Florida last year, where 267,000 doses of vaccine were made available. Eighty-six equine that became infected had received only one dose of vaccine. Seventeen other stricken animals received their second dose of vaccine less than three weeks prior to becoming infected," he explained. "Since

immunity may not develop for four to six weeks after the second dose, owners should have their animals vaccinated now, so they'll be protected by the time mosquito season begins this spring."

Dr. Irby reminded owners to reduce mosquito populations by draining stagnant water from birdbaths, flowerpots, troughs and other containers, and by keeping pools properly chlorinated. Insect repellents and insecticides should be used only according to directions, he said, and owners may want to stable their animals at night, to provide added protection.

"WNV is a 'zoonotic disease,' one that also can affect human health," commented Dr. Conger. "Species other than horses, humans and birds are susceptible to the disease, and it has been demonstrated in other states that canines can contract the infection. No vaccine has been approved for dogs, but this information may be useful in an epidemiological investigation of a potential WNV introduction."

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) also is conducting disease surveillance, for testing mosquitoes, dead crows, blue jays and hawks. To submit a dead crow, blue jay or hawk for laboratory examination, call your regional Texas Department of Health office or the Texas Department of Health in Austin at 1-512-458-7255. TAHC field personnel are collecting blood samples from equids involved in regulatory disease programs, and the agency operates a 24-hour hotline at 1-800-550-8242 for taking reports of unusual signs of disease in livestock, such as:

1. Staggering, falling, or inability to rise
2. Illness affecting a large percentage of animals
3. Sudden death
4. Blistering around an animal's lips, teats or hooves
5. Unusual ticks or maggots

"Only the first three of the disease signs apply to encephalitic diseases, but the other two—blistering and ticks—should be kept in mind, as they could be signs of other very serious disease situations," said Dr. Irby. "TAHC and USDA veterinarians will work with private veterinary practitioners and producers at no charge to help diagnose foreign or emerging diseases. The earlier we can make a diagnosis, the sooner we can take appropriate measures to control or stop the spread of a disease."

### Think Texas

As a child I never imagined I would some day be the Texas agriculture commissioner. But I should have known I would find myself working in some sector of the industry. My family has firm roots in agriculture, having come to Texas in search of land and opportunity in 1859; we are products of our families who help shape our past and future.

More than 20 years ago, I took the reins of my family's cow-calf operation in Brewster County, but many agricultural careers are found off the traditional farm or ranch. The United States has about 22 million people working in ag-related fields, employing over 20 percent of America's workforce. But only about 10 percent of workers fill traditional roles on farms and ranches.

With more than 8,000 career possibilities to choose from, there is bound to be a little something for everyone, no matter what their skills or interests are. Ag careers are every bit as diverse and varied as the people who fill them, including everything from veterinary medicine to forestry to communications.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the farm sector needs to fill nearly 48,000 jobs each year but can only find 46,000 qualified graduates. With more jobs than educated people to fill them, a prepared agriculture grad will have a variety of opportunities.

## Stage set for Farm Bill conference committee

With the delivery of the final text of the Senate Farm Bill to the House of Representatives the stage is set for the formal initiation of the House/Senate Conference Committee.

That committee will have the challenging task of working out differences between the two Bills and, hopefully, deliver a final product that can be implemented for 2002 crops.

Significant differences in several key areas, however, are expected to cause problems for conferees. Some of the most troublesome provisions include dairy, water rights, packer ownership and payment limitations.

For cotton the primary focus is squarely on the payment limitation provisions included in the Senate Bill. An all out effort is already underway to try to strip out the Senate provisions.

Senate provisions that would eliminate the three-entity rule, reduce spouses to less than full partners in operations run by a husband and wife, eliminate the ability to redeem commodities penalty free with generic commodity certificates and apply forfeiture gains against a growers \$150,000 loan benefits limit create a very real problem for cotton producers.

Bush Administration officials have made some of their most direct statements yet in support of the House version of the legislation while taking special care to avoid coming down on one side or the other regarding the above mentioned contentious issues.

How the Administration reacts to the more contentious issues could play a significant role on determining the final outcome.

Official announcement of Conferees from each body haven't yet been made, although a probable lineup from each side can be speculated. This is what the lineup looks like at this time:

**Senate:** Democrats Tom Daschle (D-SD), Kent Conrad (D-ND), Patrick Leahy (D-VT), and Tom Harkin (D-IA); Republicans Richard Lugar (R-IN), Jesse Helms (R-NC), and Thad Cochran (R-MS).

**House:** Republicans Larry Combest (TX), Saxby Chambliss (GA), Frank Lucas (OK), Bob Goodlatte (VA), Richard Pombo (CA) and Terry Everett (AL) plus an addi-

tional 2 at-large Republican members; Democrats Charles Stenholm (TX), Cal Dooley (CA), Eva Clayton (NC), Collin Peterson (MN), Gary Condit (CA), and Tim Holden (PA).

## Crop insurance rule could be trouble

New rules announced for the 2002 crop year could pose a significant problem for producers who do not receive sufficient moisture to establish their primary crop and wish to shift their acreage to a secondary crop.

The rule, which doubles the number of days a producer must wait after the final planting date of the crop to receive an appraisal, will essentially have the effect of preventing a grower from establishing a secondary crop on their acreage.

Previous rulings by RMA had set the waiting period for cotton in Texas at 15 days following the final planting date for the crop with the understanding that any rainfall during that period would necessitate a further evaluation period to determine if it was sufficient to germinate the seed.

If no rain fell during the fifteen (15) day period the producer was able to get an appraisal as early as the sixteenth day. This process would allow producers a short window in which to get back in the field an plant an ap-

propriate second crop in a timely manner.

For 2002, however, RMA has changed that procedure in a significant manner. Under the new rule a producer will be unable to schedule an appraisal until 30 days after the primary crops final planting date. The ultimate effect of the rule would be to deny a grower the opportunity to insure a secondary crop.

The old adage, "If it looks like a duck, quacks like a duck and walks like a duck, then it probably is a duck", seems to hold true in this case.

The new rule appears to be a backdoor attempt to deny secondary coverage on crops planted after the failure of a primary crop because of

drought without going through the process of simply putting in a rule that says - "No secondary coverage allowed on crops planted after the loss of a primary crop due to drought".

Implementation of the rule in this manner poses many potential problems for both producers trying to make sound management decisions for their operations as well as for RMA.

Plains Cotton Growers has been in contact with RMA about this situation and is working with them to find a solution to the problem it presents. Contact has also been made with representatives of the House Agriculture Committee in order to further the effort of finding a workable solution to the issue.

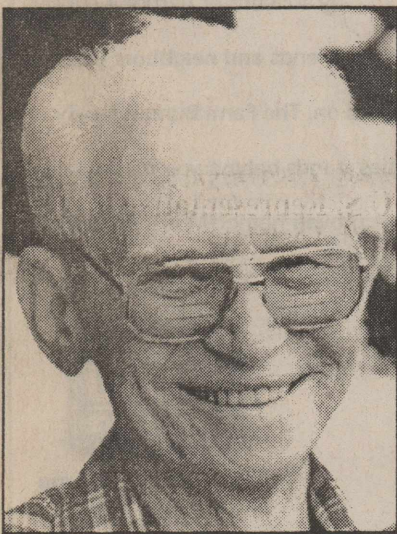

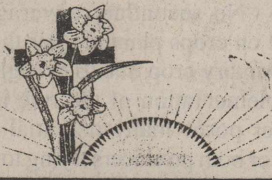

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of the Cooperative who is a close relative of an incumbent director or an employee of the Cooperative, or is not a member in good standing of the Cooperative and receiving service within the District he represents; PROVIDED, that the operating or chief executive of any member which is not a natural person, such as a corporation, church, etc., or his designee, shall be eligible to become a director, from the Directorate District in which such member is located, if he or such designee (1) is in substantial permanent occupancy, direction or use of the premises served by the Cooperative, and (2) is a permanent and year-round resident within or in close proximity to an area served by the Cooperative; BUT PROVIDED FURTHER, that no more than one (1) such person may serve on the Board of Directors at the same time. No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of, or to hold any other position of trust in, the Cooperative who does not have the legal capacity to enter into a binding contract or is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise, or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to, among other, the members of the Cooperative. No person shall take or hold office as a Director who is the incumbent of or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary is paid.

### SECTION 4.05 DIRECTORATE DISTRICTS

The territory served by the Cooperative shall be divided into nine (9) Directorate Districts. Each District shall be represented by one director and the Districts are described upon the map on the territory served by the District attached to the Bylaws and made a part hereof.

### SECTION 4.06 NOMINATIONS

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than thirty (30) days nor more than one hundred (100) days prior to the date of the meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a Committee on Nominations, consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members. The Committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least twenty (20) days prior to the meeting a list of nominations for directors to be elected, listing separately the nominee (s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which director must, pursuant to this Article, be elected at the meeting. The Committee may include as many nominees for any director to be elected from or with respect to a Directorate District as it deems desirable. Any fifteen (15) or more members of the Cooperative, acting together, may make additional nominations in writing over their signatures, listing their nominee (s) in like manner, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting, and the Secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the Committee is posted. The Secretary shall mail to the members with the notice of the meeting, or separately, but at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the meeting, a statement of the names and addresses of all nominee (s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which a director must be elected, showing clearly those nominated by the Committee and those nominated by petition, if any.
