The Floydada Lady Winds' Cinderella season came to an end Friday in the semi-finals of the Class 2A Region I Tournament, falling to #7 state ranked Seagraves 55-43.

The Lady Eagles used a suffocating full court press, overall team quickness and a strong performance from 6'ft sophomore post Darrice Griffin to virtually take Floydada out of its game. Seagraves opened the contest by jumping out to a 9-0 lead before the Lady Winds gained composure and Jessica Castaneda scored Floydada's initial points with a field goal at the 3:42 mark. The Eaglettes

then went on to build a 16-4 lead after the first quarter and kept Floydada at arm's length the rest of the way.

The biggest threat the Lady Winds posed was midway in the 2nd quarter when they had whittled the Seagraves lead down to 18-11. Floydada had possession of the ball, but came away empty handed, and the Lady Eagles then went on a 10-0 run to put an end to any Lady Wind momentum.

Griffin scored 14 points in the first half to lead Seagraves to a 30-14 advantage at intermission. The sophomore post ended up as the game's leading scorer with 24 points, plus she Continued On Page 6













Although horses do not transmit the disease to humans, equids are "sentinel animals," or indicators that infected mosquitoes are in a specific area.

"Veterinarians can administer an effective 'two-way' vaccine to protect equids against EEE and WEE," said Dr. Irby, TAHC equine specialist. "Texas is particularly vulnerable to the introduction of WNV, because major migratory routes for birds pass summer, we may find that the disease is brought into the state by infected birds," commented Dr. Irby. He pointed out that at least 17 species of mosquitoes can be involved in the disease cycle.

"Many horses infected with WNV won't appear to be ill, while, others · such as: become debilitated and too weak to rise," he said. "About 20 percent of they were so ill."

"Late last summer, a WNV vaccine was approved for equids, and like many other encephalitic vaccines, two injections are needed. For WNV vaccine, the injections must be three to six weeks apart. The timing of vaccination is crucial, as demonstrated in Florida last year, where 267,000 doses of vaccine were made available. Dr. Irby reminded owners to reduce mosquito populations by draining stagnant water from birdbaths, flowerpots, troughs and other containers, and by keeping pools properly chlorinated. Insect repellents and insecticides should be used only according to directions, he said, and owners may want to stable their animals at night, to provide added protection.

"WNV is a 'zoonotic disease,' one that also can affect human health,' commented Dr. Conger. "Species other than horses, humans and birds are susceptible to the disease, and it has been demonstrated in other states that canines can contract the infection. No vaccine has been approved for dogs, but this information may be useful in an epidemiological investigation of a potential WNV introduction."

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) also is conducting disease surveillance, for testing mosquitoes, dead crows, blue jays and hawks. To submit a dead crow, blue jay or hawk for laboratory examination, call your regional Texas Department of Health of fice or the Texas Department of Health in Austin at 1-512-458-7255. TAHC field personnel are collecting blood samples from equids involved in regulatory disease programs, and the agency operates a 24-hour hotline at 1-800-550-8242 for taking reports of unusual signs of disease in livestock,

SUSAN COMBS As a child I never imagined I would ome day be the Texas agriculture commissioner. But I should have known I would find myself working in some sector of the industry. My family has firm roots in agriculture, having come to Texas in search of land and opportunity in 1859; ve are products of our families who help hape our past and future.

More than 20 years ago, I took the eins of my famlily's cow-calf operation n Brewster County, but many agricultural careers are found off the traditional farm or ranch. The United States has about 22 million people working in ag-related fields, employing over 20 percent of America's workforce. But only about 10 percent of workers fill traditional roles on arms and ranches.

With more than 8,000 career possibilties to choose from, there is bound to be a little something for everyone, no matter what their skills or interests are. Ag careers are every bit as diverse and varied as the people who fill them, including everything from veterinary medicine to orestry to communications

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the farm sector needs to fill nearly 48,000 jobs each year but can only find 46,000 qualified graduates. With more jobs than educated people to fill them, a prepared agriculture grad will have a variety of opportunities.

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Stage set for Farm Bill conference committee

With the delivery of the final text of the Senate Farm Bill to the House of Representatives the stage is set for the formal initiation of the House/Senate Conference Committee.

That committee will have the challenging task of working out differences between the two Bills and, hopefully, deliver a final product that can be implemented for 2002 crops.

Significant differences in several key areas, however, are expected to cause problems for conferees. Some of the most troublesome provisions include dairy, water rights, packer ownership and payment limitations.

For cotton the primary focus is squarely on the payment limitation provisions included in the Senate Bill. An all out effort is already underway to try to strip out the Senate provi-





In accordance with Article IV, Section 4.06 of the Bylaws of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc., the Board of Directors has appointed a Committee on Nominations to prepare a list of nominations for Directors to be elected at the annual membership meeting of the Cooperative on April 26, 2001. Three (3) Directors, one each from District 6, District 7 and District 9, will be elected in 2001. Although Directors are nominated from the District which they represent, all members in attendance at the annual meeting vote on all candidates who may be properly nominated.

SECTION 4.02 QUALIFICATIONS:

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of the Cooperative who is a close relative of an incumbent director or an employee of the Cooperative, or is not a member in good standing of the Cooperative and receiving service within the District he represents; PROVIDED, that the operating or chief executive of any member which is not a natural person, such as a corporation, church, etc., or his designee, shall be eligible to become a director, from the Directorate District in which such member is located, if he or such designee (1) is in substantial permanent occupancy, direction or use of the premises served by the Cooperative, and (2) is a permanent and year-round resident within or in close proximity to an area served by the Cooperative; BUT PROVIDED FURTHER. that no more than one (1) such person may serve on the Board of Directors at the same time. No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of, or to hold any other position of trust in, the Cooperative who does not have the legal capacity to enter into a binding contract or is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise, or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing applicances, fixtures or supplies to, among other, the members of the Cooperative. No personal shall take or hold office as a Director who is the incumbent of or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary is paid.

SECTION 4.05 DIRECTORATE DISTRICTS

The territory served by the Cooperative shall be divided into nine (9) Directorate Districts. Each District shall be represented by one director and the Districts are described upon the map on the territory served by the District attached to the Bylaws and made a part hereof.

SECTION 4.06 NOMINATIONS

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than thirty (30) days nore more than one hundred (180) days prior to the date of the meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a Committee on Nominations, consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members. The Committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least twenty (20) days prior ro the meeting a list of nominations for directors to be elected, listing separately the nominee (s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which director must, pursuant to this Article, be elected at the meeting. The Committee may include as many nominees for any director to be elected from or with respect to a Directorate District as it deems desirable. Any fifteen (15) or more members of the Cooperative, acting together, may make additional nominations in writing over their signatures, listing their nominee (s) in like manner, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting, and the Secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the Committee is posted. The Secretary shall mail to the members with the notice of the meeting, or separately, but at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the meeting, a statement of the names and addresses of all nominee (s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which a director must be elected, showing clearly those nominated by the Committee and those nominated by petition, if any. The chairman at such meeting, after all nominations so made have been duly announced, shall call for additional nominations from the floor and shall ascertain and announce, after any nominations made from the floor, the particular Directorate District from or with respect to which any additional candidates have been nominated.



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


