

Growing up in the small town of Haskell, I learned early in life that neighbors look out for each other. As a child, you didn't always understand that concept, but you knew if your bicycle wasn't parked where you were expected to be, a neighbor had already informed your parents by the time you made it home.

We are more likely to watch out for our neighbors if we know them. As a nurse, I saw first hand some of the horrifying effects of child abuse. Sometimes, stress or other factors can lead a parent to do the unthinkable. Texas Child Protective Services (CPS) confirmed that nearly 43,000 Texas children became victims of child abuse or neglect last year. Almost 200,000 children were reported to CPS as alleged victims. And those are only the ones who are reported. How many more are put in harm's way each day that no one ever knows about? April is Child Abuse Prevention

Neglect is the most frequent form of child abuse. Yes, children die simply because they're put in situations

In fact, in the majority of the most tragic cases of child abuse those in which a child died - Child Protective Services had no opportunity to impact the safety of the child at risk. Maybe it was a situation that people outside the family couldn't see. Possibly the child's parent didn't re-

alize that their own action, or lack thereof, put their child's life at risk. We all have to recognize neglect and take it personally.

It is a time to focus on ways to not only protect children from abusive environments, but also to prevent abuse from ever occurring. We can help protect the children in our neighborhoods, our communities and our

This might be as simple as offering to baby-sit and allowing a parent to

take a much-needed break or giving a word of encouragement to a frustrated parent. We can also get involved in activities that support healthy children and healthy communities, and learn about the warning signs of child abuse and neglect.

This month, the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services, the state agency responsible for Child Protective Services, is launching a statewide media campaign - It's Up To You - that asks each individual to take personal responsibility in keeping children safe. The ads reference a website - www.itsuptoyou.org - full of resources and ideas to keep kids safe.

Texas law requires any person who believes a child is being abused, neglected, or exploited to report the circumstances to the Texas Child Abuse Hotline. If you believe that a child is in imminent danger, call toll-free 1-800-252-5400 or your local law enforcement agency immediately.

If the child is not in imminent danger but you are suspicious, watch the way the parent acts toward the child. Look for a pattern of shouting, hitting, or making demeaning remarks to the child--not just an isolated incident. Also watch for signs such as obvious malnutrition, medical neglect or extended periods of time that a child is left unattended.

When in doubt, contact your local child protective services office. Unfortunately, child abuse and neglect exists in our state and will not go away by simply ignoring it. It's up to each of us to arm ourselves with the facts, learn the warning signs and watch out for our most innocent Texans.

It's up to all of us to prevent a child from becoming another heartbreaking statistic.

pay more. "There's nothing in the law that prohibits those who believe they aren't paying enough in taxes from writing a check to the state of Arkansas," he said.

So in January, Gov. Huckabee created the "Tax Me More Fund," so people who consider themselves undertaxed can donate more to the state government.

Sounds reasonable. Surely those who derided the governor for his opposition to tax hikes would open their wallets for the sake of the "vital" programs they hold dear.

That's the theory, anyway. But things have worked out differently: At last report, the fund has raised about \$1,900.

The Arkansas story illustrates what we already know: We're not undertaxed. In fact, we're overtaxed. And it costs us: According to the National Taxpayers Union (NTU), Americans shell out an average of 35 to 40 percent of their earnings each year in taxes. A relentless array of federal, state and local taxes chip away at our paychecks, and sales taxes and registration fees siphon off even more. The mortgage, utilities, food, etc., come out of what's left.

Most financial planners say it's smart to create a "rainy day" fund equivalent to six-months' worth of expenses. But most people have little disposable income after the government takes its share, so saving that much money could take years. Meanwhile, the car needs new tires. The washing machine breaks down. The roof starts leaking.

Now, it's clear that Gov. Huckabee didn't expect his "Tax Me More Fund" to do more than highlight the hypocrisy so prevalent among the taxhiking elite. It seems that was the goal in Kansas, too, where state legislators opposed to Gov. Bill Graves' plan to raise taxes-rather than cut unnecessary spending-set up a "Tax Me More Fund," too.

It's an attractive idea. Lawmakers in Arizona, California, Massachusetts and Virginia also have considered creating "Tax Me More" funds. We encourage more.

The lesson these funds teach is simple: Americans don't want to pay more taxes. An NTU poll found that, by a margin of 63 percent to 26 percent, Americans prefer to accelerate the tax-rate reductions President Bush signed last year-or enact additional cuts.

But tax-hikers don't see it that way. While most families and individuals peg their spending to their income, tax-hikers do the opposite. They figure out how much they want to spend and then find creative new ways to gouge it out of us. It stems from a flawed belief that taxpayers exist to serve government.

Deep down, though, most Americans understand that it's really the other way around. Otherwise, Little Rock's "Tax Me More Fund" would be overflowing.


## **Senior Citizen computer** classes to begin soon





# Walk your way to better health in Walk Across Texas program

bullet to help them live longer or better. Many search for clues on the Internet, magazines, and television news. Some think the key to a longer, better life lies in a particular dietary supplement or eating only organic foods. None of these other strategies is supported by the amount of research showing regular, moderate physical activity like walking is what they really need.

A substantial amount of research shows regular moderate physical activity like walking produces a significant impact on health. Everyone knows physical activity is good for their health, yet, starting, and most of all continuing, physical activity, are very difficult. Walk Across Texas (WAT) was created in 1997 by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to provide people with the necessary support to not only start walking, but also find a group that can keep them walking even when they feel like quitting.

Everyone is looking for the magic WAT? A recent study found that the gall bladder surgery, breast cancer, women participating in a walking group similar to WAT were still much more likely to be walking ten years later even though no follow-up was provided. Women in the walking group had less heart disease, hospitalizations, surgeries, and falls ten years later than women who did not walk

Another study with 70,000 women, determined that those walking 1 hour a day or performing moderate activity such as housework reduced their risk of developing type 2 diabetes by half.

Another study found that people at risk for developing heart disease due to atherosclerosis experienced a significantly reduced risk by walking for six months.

Moderately to vigorously active women reduced their risk for hip and vertebral fractures due to osteoporosis by as much as 42%.

Other studies found that moderate physical activity lead to lowered risk What are the benefits of joining for other health problems including Across Texas.

depression, and stroke. Additional benefits include lower blood pressure, lower "bad" cholesterol (LDL), higher "good" cholesterol (HDL), lower stress levels, and improved immunity. Finally, people with diabetes find they can control their blood sugar much better when they walk regularly.

Besides reporting feeling better, last year many participants reported an added benefit of spending more time with their family and friends when they walked together. Other teams reported bird watching as they walked. But perhaps the most unique benefit noted by a team in East Texas was treatment of over 10 acres for fire ants!

Whether you want to walk to improve your health or to kill fire ants, here is your opportunity to get started by participating in Walk Across Texas beginning April 21. Call your county Extension office at 983-4912 and let them know you are ready to Walk



### "Productivity appraisal" may lower rhe property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock, or timber - not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean a substantial property tax savings.

# When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new land owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2002 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

# Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

#### *!"La valoracion productiva" puede reducir los impuestos de su terrano agricola, ganadero o maderero!*

La ley de Texas permite a los granjeros, rancheros, y madereros pagar sus impuestos de propiedad basandose en "la valoracion productiva" del terreno calificado - o sea en su abilidad de producir cosecha, ganado, o madera - y no de su valor en el mercado actual. Y esto le puede ahorrar en sus impuestos de propiedad.

## ¿Cual es la hora del cierre?

Si su terreno nunca ha tenido una valoracion productiva, o si Ud. es nuevo dueno, debe solicitarla a su distrito de valoraciones para el dia 30 de abril, para recibir el beneficio en sus impuestos de propiedad de 2002. Puede recibir hasta 60 dias mas si tiene una buena razon y si solicita el tiempo adicional antes del 30 de abril. Si pasa de esta fecha, es posible que todavia la podra obtenar, pero pagara una multa. Pregunte en la oficina de su distrito de valoraciones.

## ¿Debo solicitarla cado ano?

Por lo general, si su propiedad ya recibe una valoracion productiva agricola o maderero, no hay necesidad de pedir una nueva cado ano - al menos que se lo pida su jefe de valoraciones. Si una solicitud nueva se requiere, el distrito de valoraciones le mandara un aviso por correo.

## exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

#### Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as theier primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year . . . and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium, or mobile home. (Counties, cities, and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

#### Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled - or if you're 65 years old or older - you are entitled to an *additional \$10,000 school tax exemption* on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, lockned-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowners exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners may also transfer the percentage of school tax ceiling, to a new home.

## Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2001, you won't need to reapply for 2002 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home - or *if uou've moved* to a new home - you'll need to file for an exemption for 2002. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you *became disabled* during 2001, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

#### When and where should I file?

File applications by April 30 at your appraisal district office. If you need more time, contact us at: 806-983-5256.

## ¿Quien califica para una exencion?

Cualquier dueno de una residencia principal el dia 1 de enero tiene derecho a una exencion de residencia de \$15,000 este ano para rebajar sus impuestos escolares ... y no importa se la residencia es casa, condominio, o casa movil. (Los condados, municipios, y distritos especiales de impuestos tambien pueden ofrecer exenciones de residencia.)

### ¿Hay otras exenciones?

Si Ud. es incapacitado - o si tiene 65 anos o mas - tiene derecho a una excencion adicional de \$10,000 en sus impuestos escolares de propiedad. Y si Ud. califica para la exencion para los que ya cumplieron 65 anos, tambien tiene derecho a un "cielo maximo" permanente en sus impuestos escolares de residencia. (El cielo maximo no tiene que ver con impuestos de propiedad de los condados o municipios, y esas entidades pueden ofrecer otras exenciones.) La exencion para los que ya cumplieron 65 anos y el cielo maximo se pueden transferir al esposo/ esposa sobreviviente si el o ella tiene 55 o mas anos de edad y es dueno/duena de la casa en donde vive. Tambien el dueno de una casa nueve que tiene mas de 65 anos puede transladar un porventaje de cielo maximo del los impuestos escolares que le tocaron en su domicilio vieja.

#### ¿Debo solicitarla cado ano?

No. Si Ud. recibio una exencion de residencia en 2001, no hay necesidad de solicitarla de nuevo en 2002 - al menos que se lo pida su jefe de valoraciones. Sin embargo, si no ha recibido una exencion en su residencia actual - o si ha cambiado de domicilio tendra que solicitar una exencion para 2002. Si Ud. cumplira los 65 anos durante este ano, tiene hasta un ano de esa fecha para solicitar una nueva exencion. Y si cumplios los 65 anos o resulto incapacitado en 2001, tendra que solicitar las exenciones adicionales.

# "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office ... or you may draft a similar form.

### Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income - such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

#### Are there any advantages to you? The advantages of filing a rendition are:

You give your opinion of your propertys value. if the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant de preciation of the value of your property in 2001. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2002.

#### What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2002 renditions is April 15. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 15 deadline.

- Registra su direccion correcta para que le pueden mandar sus tarifas de impuestos. Segun la ley, Ud. es responsable por pagar sus impuestos sin demora o de pagar cualquier multa que resulte por haberlos pagado tarde - aunque la tarifa se haya mandado a una direccion equivocada.
- Tambien puede someter un "reporte de valoracion disminuida" para avisar al distrito de cualquier reduccion significativa en la valoracion de su propiedad en 2001. El distrito examinara su propiedad antes de designarle un valor en 2002.

## ¿Cual es la hora del cierre?

15 de abril es la ultima fecha para mandar sus rendiciones para 2002. Favor de llamar a su distrito de valoraciones para obtener la ultima fecha en que puede mandar su redicion por correo. Puede obtener 15 dias adicionales si los pide por escrito antes de la hora de cierre.


