Bertrand donates locks

Ten year old Hallie Bertrand, of Floydada, wasn't worried about cutting off her pretty blonde braid because she was too excited about where her hair was going to go.

Her 11 inch braid was cut off recently and donated to "Locks of Love", of Lake Worth, Florida.

Locks of Love is a non-profit organization that provides hairpieces to

financially disadvantaged children under the age of 18 with medical hair loss.

Most of the people who benefit from the hairpieces suffer from an

auto-immune condition called alopecia areata (which results in total loss of scalp hair). Other applicants have suffered severe burns, or endured radiation treatment to the brain stem, or have a variety of other dermatological conditions.

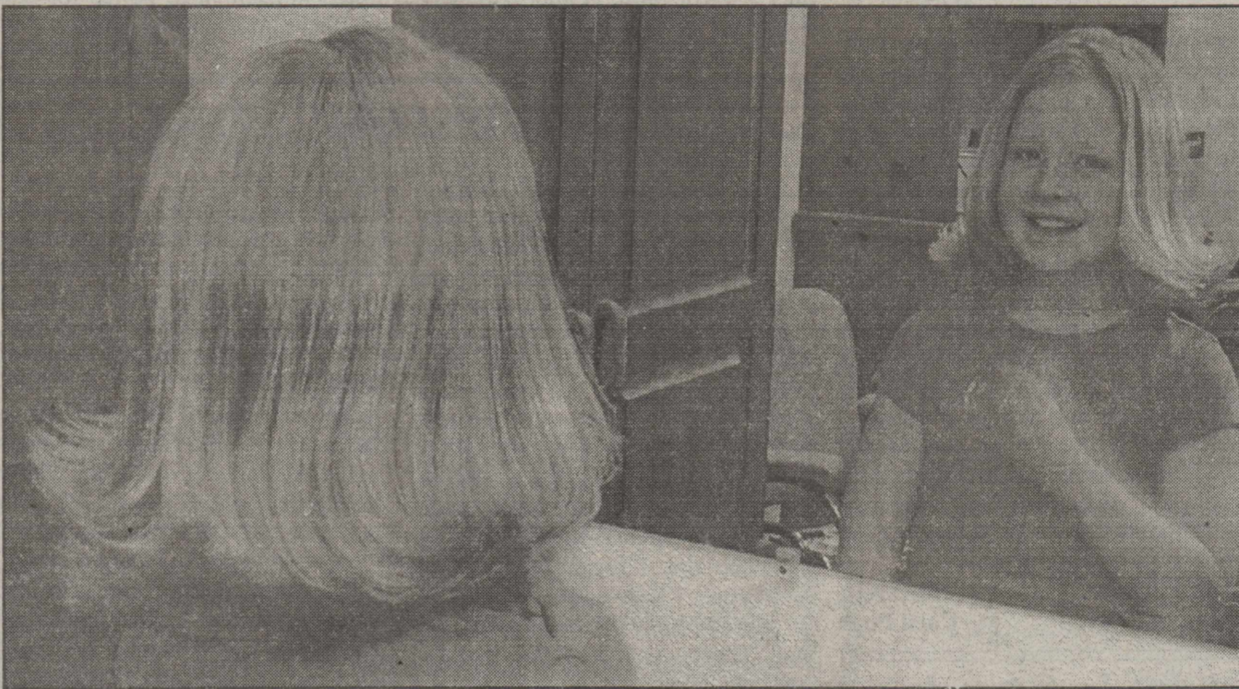
"We first heard about Locks of Love about a year ago from Hallie's hairdresser, Beverly Birdsell, of Lubbock," said Hallie's mom, Cindy Bertrand. "Beverly opened up a drawer to rummage for a brush and we saw a long braid in the drawer," said Cindy. "We asked her why she had that braid and she told us about Locks of Love. She said it was best if the braid was at least 10 inches long and preferably 12 inches long. Hallie decided then that she would try and grow her hair long enough to donate.

Except for trims, Hallie has never cut her hair short. She said she was "glad to get it cut off."

"It takes 10-15 braids to make one wig," said Hallie.

The organization, which began in 1997, has helped over 650 children since its first year of operation. Thou-

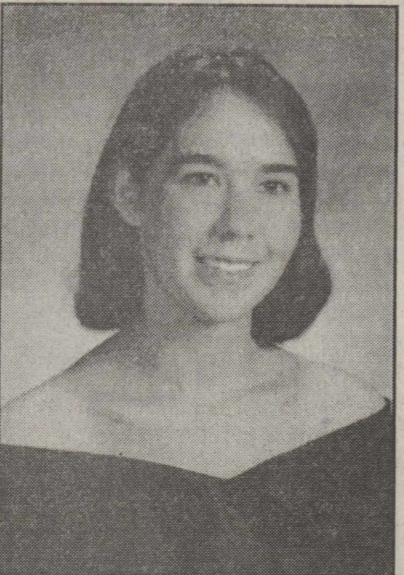
Special honors Liz has earned in-

Abigail came in a close second

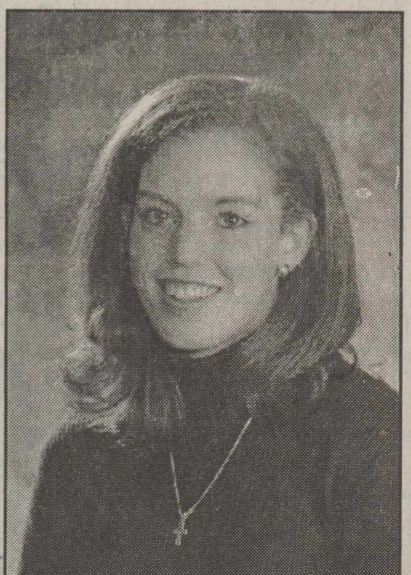

Kimble accorded highest honor for a US scientist

Dr. H. Jeffrey Kimble, a 1967 Floydada graduate, was recently elected to the National Academy of Sciences, in recognition of distinguished and continuing achievements in original research.

Election to membership in the Academy is considered one of the highest honors that be accorded a U.S. scientist or engineer. "This is one step below the Nobel Prize," said Dr. Kimble's proud mother, Joyce Kimble, of Floydada.

The National Academy of Sciences is a private organization and in addition to recognition of scientists of distinction, it addresses important matters in science and assists the nation in addressing problems where scientific insights are of central significance. It was established in 1863 by a congressional act of incorporation, signed by Abraham Lincoln, that calls on the Academy to act as an official advisor to the federal government, upon request, in any matter of science or technology. The Academy member-

ship is comprised of approximately 1,900 members and 300 foreign associates, of whom more than 170 have won Nobel prizes.

Now residing in La Canada, California, Dr. Kimble is the William L. Valentine Professor of Physics at California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, California. A graduate of Floydada High School and Abilene Christian University, Dr. Kimble, played basketball for 4 years. He received his doctorate in physics in 1978 from the University of Rochester.

Before joining the Caltech faculty in 1989, he held the Sid Richardson Regents' Chair in Physics at the University of Texas at Austin.

Dr. Kimble is the winner of the Albert A. Michelson Medical Medal of the Franklin Institute (1990) and co-recipient of the Einstein Prize for Laser Science (1989). In 1996 Dr. Kimble received the Max Born Award of the Optical Society of America.

Kimble is an expert on quantum optics and has made groundbreaking

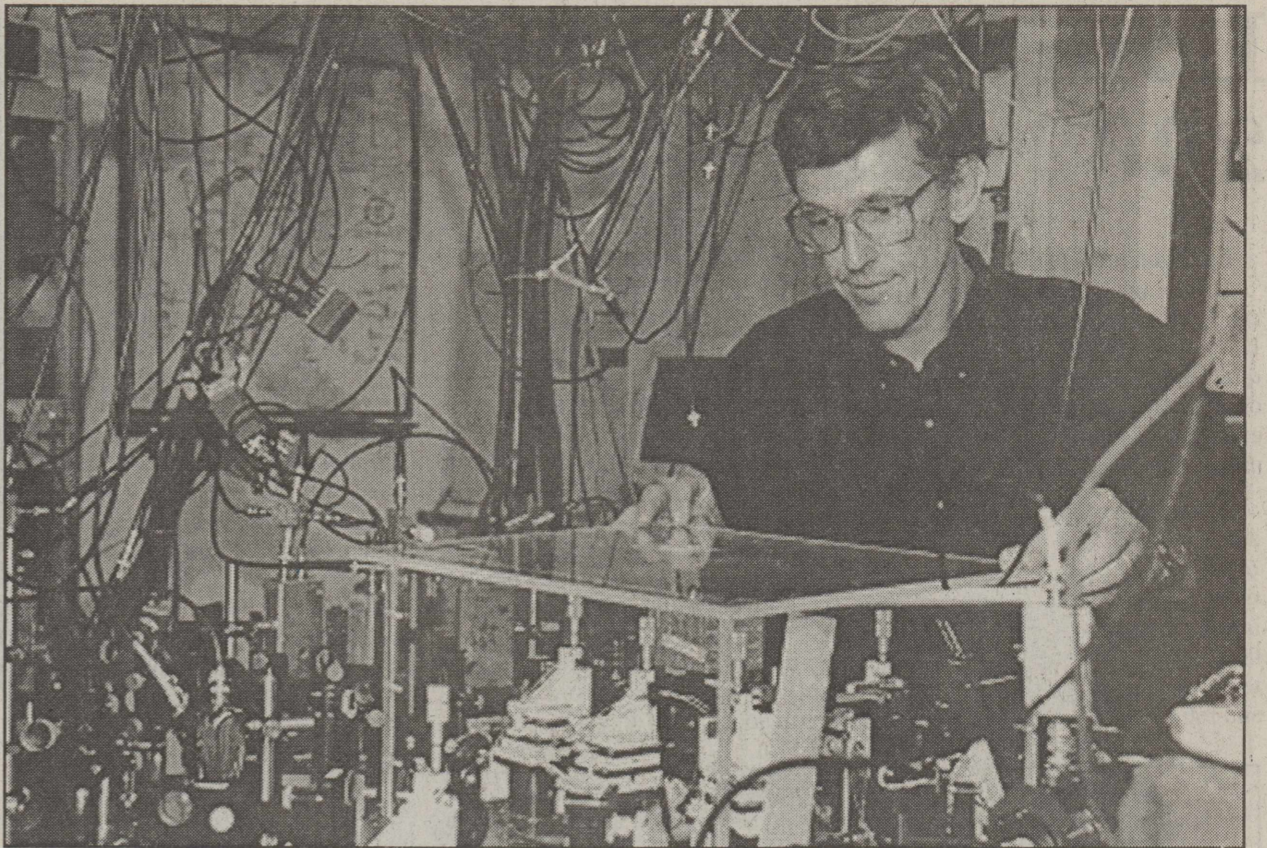
discoveries relating to quantum measurement and to the new science of quantum information. Kimble and his colleagues at CalTech were able to achieve the first demonstration of the original 1935 proposal by Einstein-Podolsky-Rosen (or "EPR") involving the quantum correlations of spatially expanded quantum systems.

This work became the foundation of the attainment of unconditional quantum teleportation by Dr. Kimble's group in 1998.

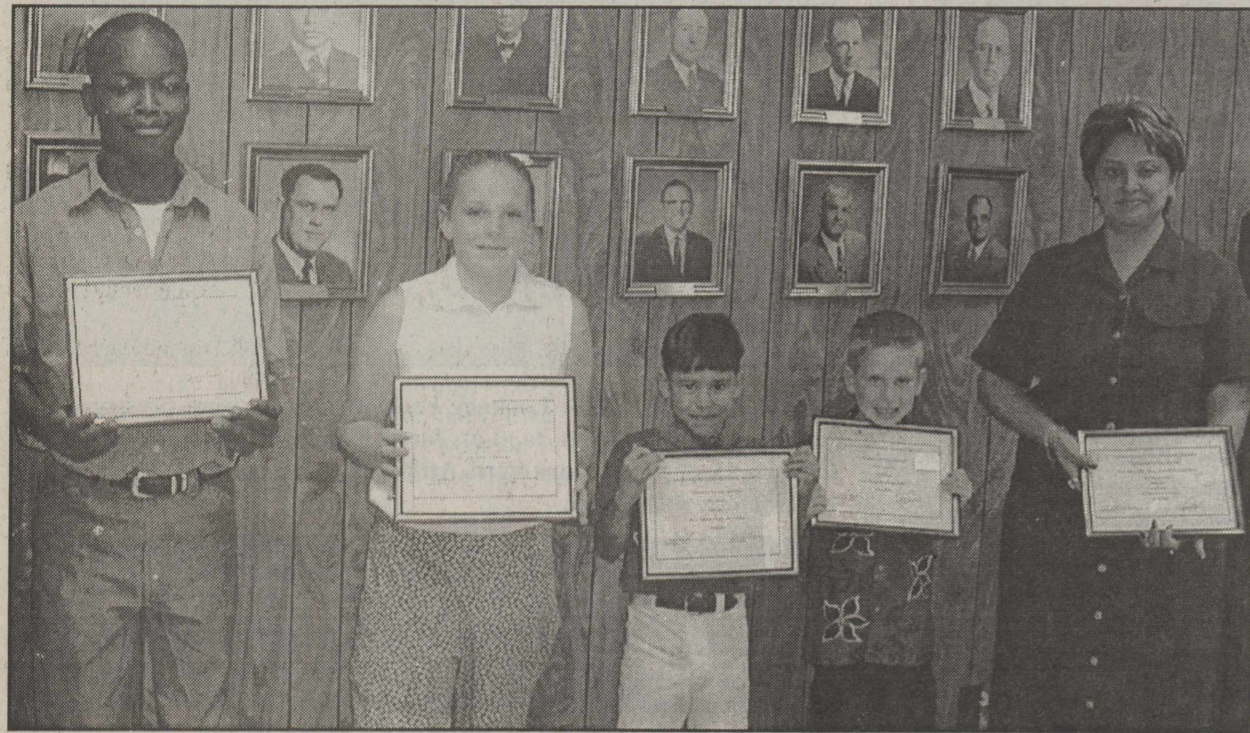
Kimble has pioneered the field of cavity quantum electrodynamics, establishing the experimental foundations of quantum information science.

"He was born smart," says Joyce Kimble about her son. "He was very driven and works very hard. However he could not have achieved what he did without his wife, Margaret Ann (Midge).

The Kimbles have two daughters, Katherine, 17, and Megan, 15.

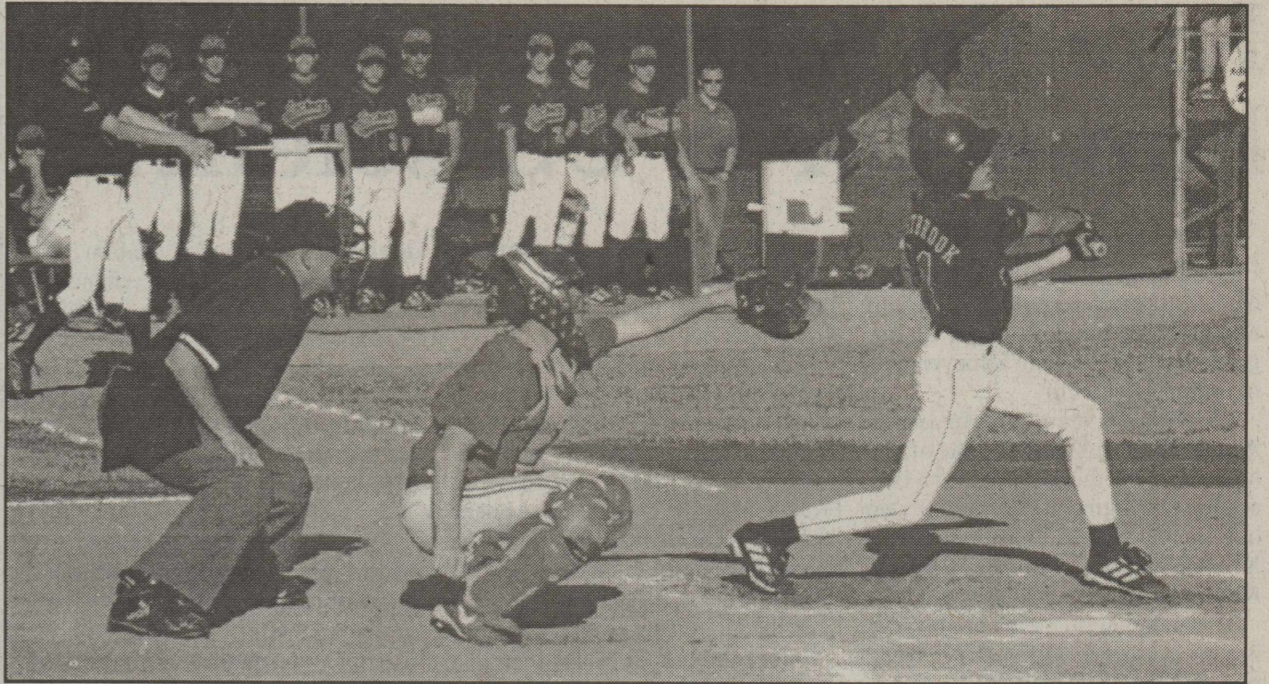

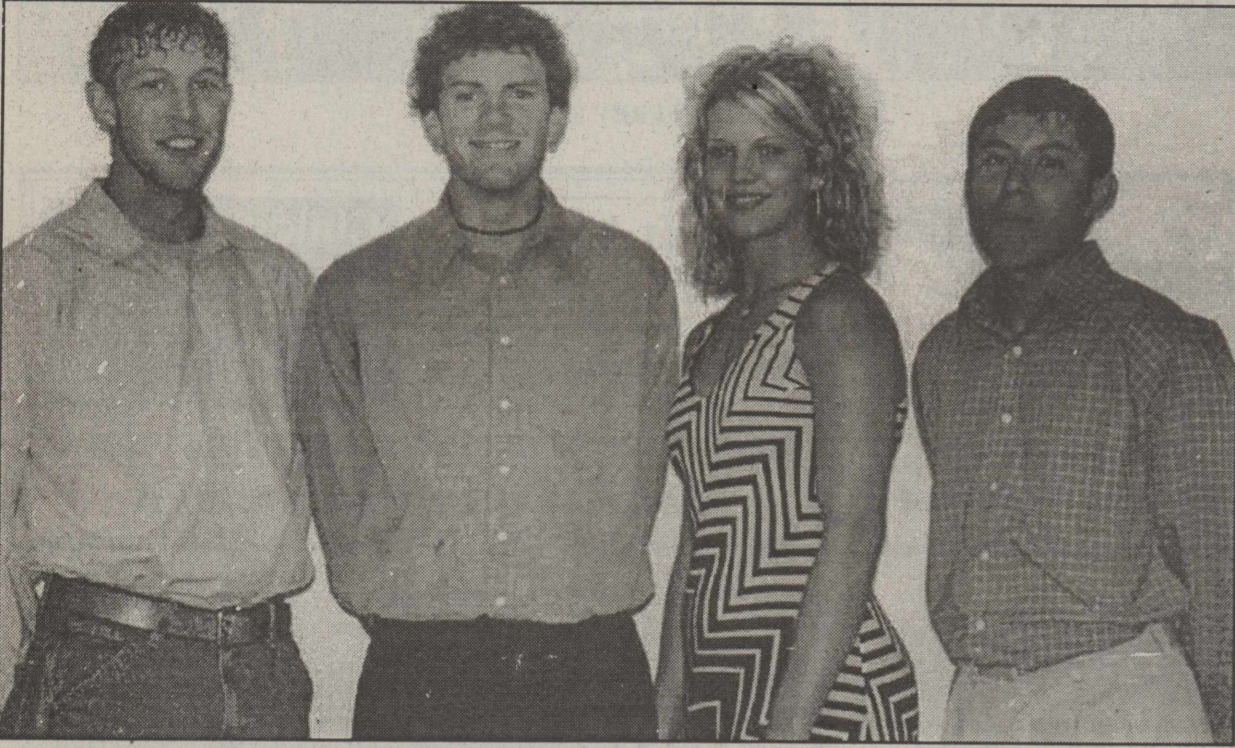
The Longhorns also placed high on the list when it came to All-District nominations.

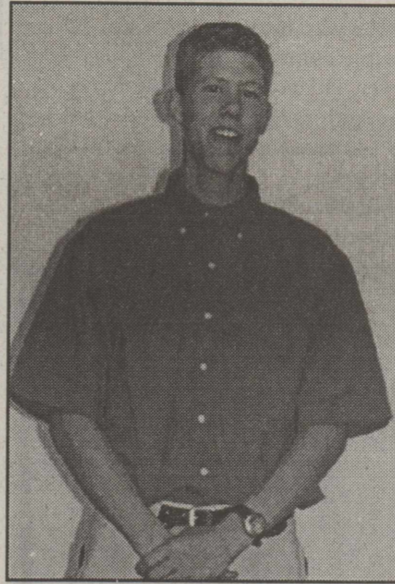
In closing, I would like to thank this season for a wonderful year as well as thank all the people involved in decorating and helping throughout the season.



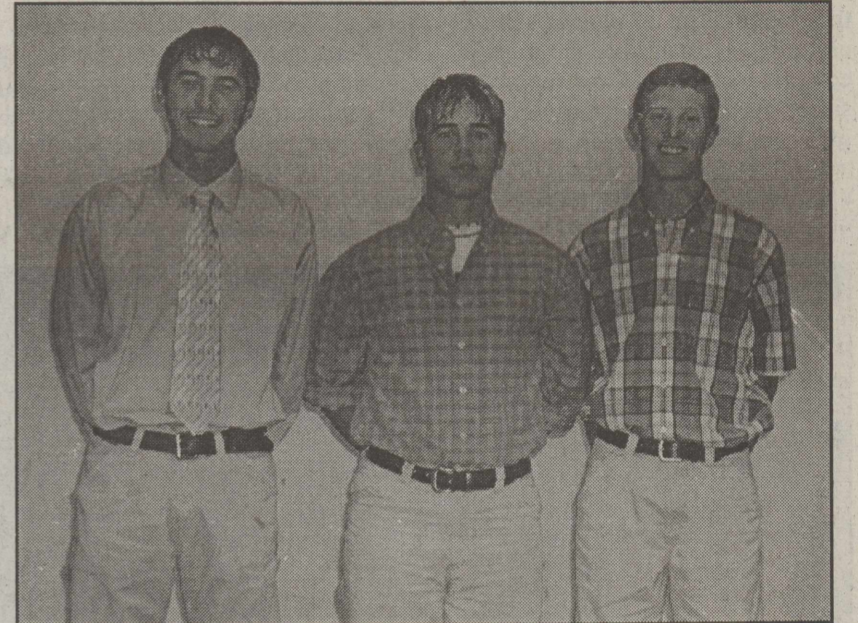

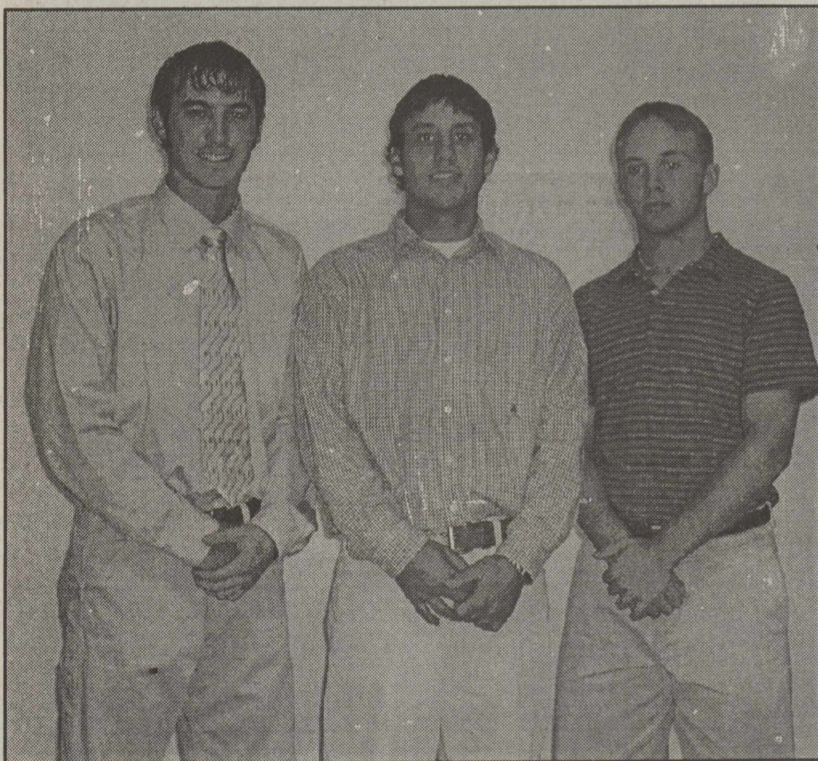

Conservation title holds potential benefits

With the signing of the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 by President George W. Bush this past Monday, the next phase of the effort to restructure federal Farm Programs begins in earnest.

Although the national press and many observers of Washington legislative activity have been quite vocal in their opposition to the Bill, a dawning reality among many growers is that the Bill has some truly unique and beneficial components.

The spotlight and pressure now turn to USDA as that agency moves full-speed into the process of implementing the new law. Considerable work remains to be done to provide growers with all the necessary information they will need to make decisions on updating bases, yield or both.

One near-term deadline that many producers looking to split or consoli-

date farms should remember is June 3. This is the date by which requests for farm reconstitutions must be filed with the Farm Service Agency.

Much has been made of the support provided through the Commodity Title of the Bill with good reason. Somewhat overlooked so far, however, are the potential benefits that lurk in the Conservation Title as well.

A good deal of additional funding and some long sought changes to the administration procedures of several current programs and the addition of a couple of all new programs hold tremendous potential benefits for producers.

Enhanced funding for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and possible modification of rules that targeted a lions-share of EQIP dollars to projects originating in certain areas promises additional opportunities for growers.

The overall objective of the EQIP changes was to make it easier for growers previously left-out of the program due to location or lack of available funds to participate.

Another interesting new program is the Conservation Security Program (CSP). Introduced by Senator Tom Harkin (D-IA), the CSP has the potential to provide significant financial incentive for farmers and ranchers to implement conservation practices on their own operations.

PCG officials have noted that it will be increasingly important to participate in the development process for the CSP.

Insuring that the Texas High Plains, and other semi-arid growing regions in Texas and elsewhere, have the same ability to meet and exceed the requirements necessary to fully participate in the CSP at the higher participation levels is key.

Ongoing communication between growers and their representatives USDA officials developing the rules for the program will be the number one vehicle for having currently recognized conservation and tillage practices used on the Texas High Plains included in acceptable or recommended practices.

Potentially the CSP could provide payments to growers/landowners on individual farms at one of three levels. The three program tiers and the maximum yearly payment amounts available under each are: Tier One - \$25,000; Tier Two - \$35,000; and Tier Three - \$45,000.

It is assumed that final payment rates would be dependent on the actual combination of practices employed on the farm and the length of contract agreed to when enrolling in the program.

Contact officials before moving boll weevil traps

Boll weevil eradication is beginning its second year on the High Plains, and one obvious difference this year will be the number of traps placed around cotton fields.

The increased number of traps is necessary for making treatment decisions, and foundation officials seek growers' cooperation in protecting them.

Foundation personnel follow specific guidelines in placing traps around cotton fields so they will be effective in attracting weevils and provide good information on weevil activity. Traps are placed to optimize their usefulness while providing the least disruption to farm operations.

Where possible, traps are set next to existing structure such as fence or telephone posts. When this is not possible, employees try to place the traps so they will not be in the way when growers are working in the fields.

Growers may believe, however, that some traps are in the way and decide to move the traps. Doing so can hamper the progress of the eradication program, officials say.

Producers are asked to contact their field unit supervisors before moving or removing any trap. The supervisors will find a placement for the traps that meet program goals and reduce interference to farmers' operations.

Occasionally a piece of equipment will clip a trap and knock it down or break it. Also, inclement weather can damage traps or blow them down.

Traps are checked weekly, and growers will quickly grow accustomed to the schedule for their fields. Should they notice damaged or downed traps between regular inspections, growers should contact their field unit supervisor with the information so the traps can be repaired or replaced.

Well-maintained traps allow foundation personnel to monitor weevil activity and make proper treatment decisions. Damaged or missing traps may result in extra treatments to ensure that weevils don't have the opportunity to infest field unnoticed.

Growers may contact their district offices for more information.

The Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation is a nonprofit, grower-initiated and funded organization dedicated to eliminating the cotton boll weevil from the state in the most cost effective and environmentally responsible manner possible.

Area wheat field day is planned in Brisco County

The Brisco County Cooperative Extension Service is hosting an area Wheat Field Day on Thursday, May 23, 2002 at 1:30 p.m. at the Walter Bean Farm located 2 1/2 miles east of Silvertown. Some 30 wheat varieties will be viewed. Dr. Brent Bean, Extension Agronomist from Amarillo, will be on hand to discuss varieties, disease problems and grazing.

Also, bine weed mites will be handed out at no charge to any one interested. Many producers have asked me about setting bine weed mites, so this is your opportunity. Please bring a cooler to put them in. Release instruc-

tions will be given upon pick up.

Specific site locations and directions are: From Highway 207 turn right (east) on Highway 145 toward Quitiquae. Go approximately 2 - 2 1/2 miles to a two (2) story house with a tin barn behind the house on the right side of the road. The wheat field site will be directly behind the barns. Turn into the house and go between barns around to wheat field. Two (2) CEU's will be provided.

Majority of irrigated cotton has now been planted

High Plains' cotton producers are moving ahead with 2002 cotton planting at a fairly typical rate according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

According to PCG officials irrigated acreage is being planted at a fairly good clip across the area. It is thought that the majority of the irrigated crop is now in the ground.

A recent series of cool nighttime temperatures, some reaching as low as the mid-thirties, have slowed early development and/or emergence in some cases. The overall net effect this will

have is difficult to predict at this time.

The other side of the coin, however, is the area's non-irrigated acreage. Producers with non-irrigated acreage are mostly still in a wait and watch mode as they look for additional rainfall to help bolster already present underground moisture and assure the crop achieves a strong start.



SSA offers new online service

Have you ever wondered if you might now be eligible for monthly Social Security benefits, or if you qualify for Medicare health insurance? Sometimes it's hard to know where to begin when you are looking for information about large government programs.

But now Social Security has introduced a new online service that can provide some real help for you. It's called the Benefit Eligibility Screening Tool (BEST). If you would like to know what benefits you may be eligible for, just log onto best.ssa.gov. It's available in both English and Spanish.

You will need to answer some questions about your age and marital status. And there will be some questions about your personal finances. These questions will help determine if you may be eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits, or if you can qualify for help with your Medicare premium.

BEST takes only five to 10 minutes to complete. You will not have to give any personal identifying information, such as your name or Social Security number. And once you exit this screening tool, all your answers will be permanently erased.

BEST is not an application for benefits. After you complete the questions and see the results, you then decide if you should apply for benefits.

You can file for retirement, spouse and disability benefits online at <http://www.ssa.gov/applyforbenefits/>. You also can file a retirement, spouse, survivor's, disability or SSI application by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, or visiting your local Social Security office.

A reminder from your friends at Floydada Emergency Medical Services

Motor vehicle collisions are the leading cause of death in children under 15. Texas is doing its part to protect children by changing child restraint laws. Following is a listing of what Texas laws requires.

Children in safety seats - Children under 4 years old or 36 inches tall regardless of age must be restrained in child safety seat in accordance with seat manufacturer's instructions.

Children in seat belts - Children ages 4 through 16 must be restrained in a seat belt regardless of where they're riding in a vehicle.

Pick-up trucks and trailers - Children under 18 cannot ride in the open bed of a pick-up truck or trailer on a public road.

Adults in seat belts - Anyone 17 or older must be restrained in a seat belt if seated in the front seat.

Experts also recommend that everyone in the vehicle always wear a seat belt and that all children under 12 always ride in the back seat of vehicles. The Texas Department of Health and the Texas Department of Transportation co-sponsor Texas Safe Riders, a program that focuses on traffic and pedestrian safety in Texas. The program offers educational materials and training on proper use of child safety seats and bicycle helmets. Safe Riders also coordinates bicycle helmet discount purchase programs for schools, community groups and other nonprofit efforts and car seat loaner programs for hospitals and healthcare organizations.
