Many donors mail a note and a photo with their bundle of hair. Children comprise over 80 percent of the donors.

Donors provide the hair, volunteers staff the office, and the manufacturer hand-assembles each piece, which requires approximately 4 months.

Locks of Love provides its recipients with a custom, vacuum-fitted hairpiece made entirely from donated human hair. The vacuum fit is designed for children who have experienced a total loss of scalp hair and does not require the use of tape or glue.

Donated hair should be bundled in a pony tail or braid and be free of chemical processing. The hair must be clean and dry, placed in a plastic bag, and mailed in a plastic envelope to: Locks of Love, 295 10th Avenue N., Suite 102, Lake Worth, FL., 33461.



Board Member Kerry Pratt replied, "Then we lose money when our appraisals are not in those limits. The State says we are not trying locally and you are bleeding the State, so we are going to (step in).'

Vaughn and Business Manager Sharon Rainwater explained that the Tier 2 level of State money depends on the amount of money FISD collects locally, not on the tax rate, nor on the property values. Vaughn said, "The two years prior, or every odd year, becomes the benchmark for State money for the coming school year."





BRING THE DIGNITY BACK TO GRADUATION CEREMONIES

Graduation is a time-honored tradition since the 12th century and is an important rite of passage for students and their families. 3. Please do not talk or move about during the ceremony, including during speeches, prayers, and conferring of the diplomas. This distracts from the dignity and honor due the graduates and the speakers. Guest are expected to remain seated until the entire ceremony is over.

4. A professional photographer has taken the pictures of the graduates receiving their diplomas, please do not jump up and get in front of others to get your pictures. Pictures can be staged after the ceremony. If you must take pictures use a zoom lens from your seat.

5. Please leave the cell phone, beeper, etc. at home or turned off. This is not chit chat time. Please help keep the area inside and outside the building alcohol and smoke free. Please respect the elderly who are attending, the steep steps and lack of handrails are dangerous for them. Move cautiously in the tight crowd. Refrain children from running. Please dress appropriately for the ceremony. This is a time to recognize your senior with respect. Dressy casual format is best. Men: collared shirt, casual pants, suit, coat, tie. Women: dress slacks, skirt, dress, suit. Leave the tee shirts, shorts, beachwear, and cutoffs at home.

9. Please do not bring signs, streamers, balloons, toys, Silly String, or other distracting items

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





Have you ever wondered if you might now be eligible for monthly Social Security benefits, or if you qualify for Medicare health insurance? Sometimes it's hard to know where to begin when you are looking for information about large government programs.

But now Social Security has introduced a new online service that can provide some real help for you. It's called the Benefit Eligibility Screening Tool (BEST). If you would like to know what benefits you may be eliavailable in both English and Spanish.

You will need to answer some questions about your age and marital status. And there will be some questions about your personal finances. These questions will help determine if you may be eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits, or if you can qualify for help with your Medicare premium.

BEST takes only five to 10 minutes



Organ Donor Facts

Anyone who is 18 years or older and of sound mind may become a donor when he or she dies. Minors may become donors with a parent's or guardian's consent.

A prospective donor should talk to your family to ensure they know about your wish. Sign the card in their presence, and have two family members sign it as witnesses, and carry the card with you at all times.

More important than signing the card is sharing the decision with your family. In the event of your death, medical professionals will ask your family members for consent, even if you have a donor card.
