## Power Team brings strong message

The Power Team took Floyd and surrounding counties by storm this past week and packed out the Unity Center each night of their 5 day crusade.

The Crusade opened Wednesday, August 21, to a respectful crowd of 550 in attendance. The Team, consisting of Craig Lemley, Mark Sherwood, Matt Dopson, and Willie Raines, challenged the crowd to bring more each night.

The group's "evangelist", Craig Lemley, told the audience, "If you do your part, we'll do ours."

By Sunday night the Unity Center was packed with an audience of 1,350 people, and true to his word the Power Team did their part. Each night brought new and more challenging feats of strength and a new message of Christ's love, deliverance, and faithfulness, from each one of the team members.

Lemley, who is 6'2" and weighs 265 lbs., can bench press over 500 pounds. He has been an Oklahoma State Body Building Champion and was recruited to play Professional Arena League Football in 1995. He also holds the record for breaking ice and concrete with his head.

Lemley closed every evening with a powerful message to the audience which brought over 500 to the altar in the five night period. One night, Lemley used his bare hands to drive nails into a board to illustrate his vivid story of the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. Using himself as an example, Lemley said at the point he asked Christ into his life he saw a vision of the face of the soldier who was driving the nails into Christ's hands. "That face was my own," said Lemley.

Each team member's individual personality shown thru their personal testimonies. There was a salvation message for everyone.

Six foot, 290 lb., Willie Raines bends steel bars with his bare hands and bench presses 600 pounds. Although he can smash 6 foot walls of concrete with his bare hands, he was not too tough to share his story of drug use, drug dealing, and prison. It was in prison that Willie said he knelt down on one knee and asked for for-

giveness. He was rewarded with a changed heart and life and is now reaching thousands of youth in school assemblies and crusades with his message of turning from drugs and alcohol.

Sunday night at the close of Lemley's message, Raines was handcuffed and broke through to symbolize breaking away from the bondage of sin.

Raines also brought the crowd to their feet with cheers of encouragement when he dead lifted a log weighing over 300 pounds one night, and pressed it over his head. He returned another night and pressed the log 10 times.

Mark Sherman, a 6', 245 lb., sharpshooter with the Tulsa Police Department amazed the audience by ripping up license plates and breaking through burning concrete blocks with his head. At one point a "do-rag" on his scalp caught on fire causing the audience to shout, "His head is on fire!" A quick reaction from another team member and a fire extinguisher put the fire out.

Sherman, who was also a catcher with the Texas Rangers for many years, shared a testimony of Christ's "sustaining love".

Twenty year old Matt Dopson was the youngest member of the team. Raised in the home of a pastor, Dopson's testimony was one of turning "back to God" when an injury forced him from the football career he had chosen.

Dopson stands 6'3" and weighs 315 lbs. He can leg press 2,200 pounds. Breaking through concrete and boards, Dopson also blew up hot water bottles and curled up 1 inch steel bars.

Dopson also encouraged the youth to follow his example of never having smoked or taken a drink of alcohol. Dopson preached abstinence and was greeted by cheers when he told the Unity Center crowd and school assemblies that he was a virgin.

Dopson's testimony also included beautiful songs, which he sang a cappella.

The Power Team Crusade is rated by ESPN as the number one school

production in the athletic field. They have a weekly TV program that airs in ten countries.

The Power Team was founded by John Jacobs Evangelistic Association and reaches out to young audiences with their message: "Say 'no' to drugs, suicide and teen sex, and say 'yes' to academic excellence and clean living".

There are 20 members on the Power Team. The Team has spoken, and performed, at 15,000 school assemblies. While in Floyd County the team of four spoke at assemblies in Floydada, Lockney, Petersburg, Hale Center, Motley County and Valley School.

The four members of this team were brought to the Unity Center through the efforts, and donations, of individuals and churches in Floyd County.

According to organizer Kyle Brock, the cost to bring the team to an area runs approximately \$10,000. The cost covers the materials for the stage and props, etc.

Churches in Floydada and Lockney joined forces with large amounts of volunteer help and other monetary backing.

The First Baptist Church in Lockney and Floydada, and the First United Methodist Church in Lockney and Floydada, used their resources to help. Trinity Assembly in Floydada was also a part of the team.

Months of planning and very hard work brought the Power Team to Floyd County and organizers were not disappointed.

"It just goes to show what can happen when the Body of Christ comes together," said Brock. "I can't thank the people enough who gave of their time, talent, and gifts."

The work behind the scenes involved at least 11 teams of various responsibilities.

There was an usher team, altar workers, materials team and stage crew, hospitality team, technical team, publicity, and products.

"Our materials team also followed the Power Team to their school assemblies and brought in props and cleaned up at each school," said Brock.

Garrett Mathis is in charge of agriculture exhibits, and Gail Dubois heads up the photography competition. Donnell Gowens heads up the flower department.

Textiles Section I is headed up by Elaine LaBaume and Charlene Brown is in charge of Textiles II.

Textiles includes embroidery, knitting, crochet, tatting, quilting, sewing, latch hooking, and cross stitching.

Ladies (or men) can also enter the canned fruits and vegetables division, or the culinary department.

For information on the canned fruits and vegetables contact D'Lee Powell and Shawnda Foster for Culinary information.

Commercial exhibits will also be set up inside the comfort of the Unity Center and food booths will line the outside of the Center. Clean eating areas are available inside the Center.

There is no charge for entry into the Fair, however there is an admission charge of \$2 for adults and \$1 for students to attend the Miss Floyd County Pageants on Saturday, Saturday at 7:00 p.m.

The Tiny, Petite and Junior Miss Pageant will be held at 9:00 a.m. Saturday.

An Old Time Auction will kick off Thursday night, September 5, with a 6:00 p.m. silent auction and a 7:00 p.m. live auction.

Friday night's entertainment will be a concert by "Slo Motion", beginning at 8:00 p.m. There is a \$5.00 charge for the concert.

Saturday is a full day of entertainment for the Floyd County Fair.

A downtown parade in Lockney begins at 10:00 a.m.

A tractor pull will be held in the Unity Center at 11:00 a.m., and a Washer Pitching contest will be held at Pinner's Drive-in at 1:30 p.m.

The Trap Shoot will be set up west of the Unity Center at 2:00 p.m. and the Pet Show will also be held at 2:00 p.m.

The carnival will be brought to the Unity Center by Candy Apple Amusements and will open on Wednesday night.

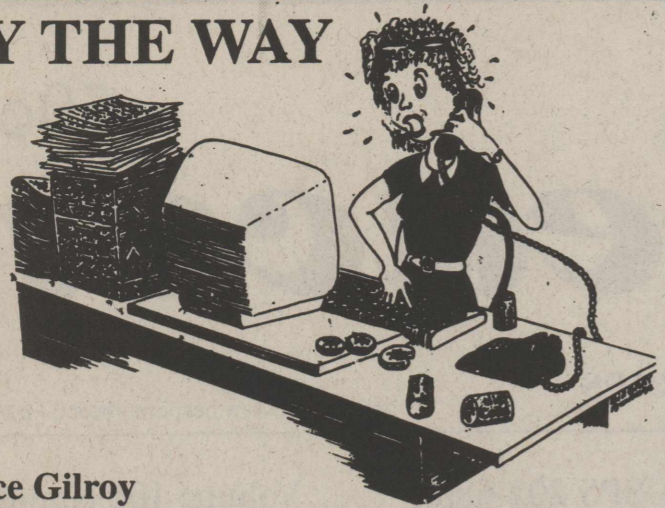

They were also very complimentary of the kids in the area schools they attended. They said the kids here were much more attentive and polite than most of the schools they attend.

For those of you who have been wondering, the attendance at the Crusade was: 550 on Wednesday; 450 on Thursday; 750 on Friday; 650 on Saturday; and 1,350 on Sunday.

Five hundred and thirty-seven people walked to the altar.

Isn't it wonderful what can happen in this county when the communities cross that imaginary boundary and the church bodies join forces.

The whole event was a testimony to cooperation, but most importantly to prayer. Thank you for blessing me.

**County helps spray outlying lakes to control West Nile**

The Floyd County Commissioners Court held an emergency meeting, August 21, to consider spraying area lakes for mosquitos for the prevention of the West Nile Virus.

The City of Floydada requested the emergency meeting and asked for help to pay costs in the spraying of two playa lakes adjoining the City limits.

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy made a motion to approve the request and Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden made the second. All were in favor.

The County will pay \$480 to spray 125 acres.

David McDonald, 36, of Lockney, pled guilty to a charge of Assault/family violence. He was sentenced to 32 days in jail plus court costs.

The July 16, 2002 DWI-2nd charge against David Martinez, 20, of Lockney, was dismissed in exchange for his guilty plea to a Possession of Marijuana under 2 ozs. He was sentenced to 60 days in jail plus court costs on the possession charge.

In County Court, August 15, 2002, Daniel Jacob Herrera, 22, of Floydada, pled guilty to Interference with Public Duties. He was fined \$300 and court costs and sentenced to 60 days in jail.

August 16, 2002, Louis Marquez, 22, of Floydada, pled guilty to Assault/Family Violence. He was sentenced to 4 days in jail plus court costs.

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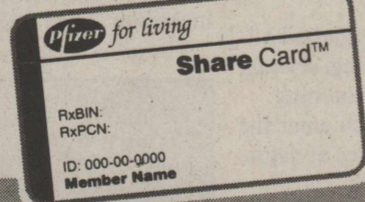

## Lockney Police Report

June 2, police stopped a vehicle for speeding on US 70 at about 12:20 a.m. and found that the driver of the vehicle, Antonio Martinez III, 30, of Plainview had outstanding warrants from the Justice of the Peace office in Matador.

Also on June 2, Floydada Police notified the on-duty Lockney officer about a theft of gasoline from a convenience store in Floydada and asked that the officer watch for the vehicle as it was to have left the store traveling toward Lockney. The vehicle was located by the Lockney officer after the vehicle was found to have been traveling well above the posted speed limit. The vehicle was found to have been stolen from a residence in Plainview but had not been reported to the Plainview Police at the time the vehicle was stopped.

The 14 year old driver along with all of the juvenile passengers were taken into custody and transported to the Parent Adolescent Center in Floydada. The 14 year old driver was charged with Unauthorized Use of a Vehicle, and theft of the gasoline. The others were all released later.

June 5, just before 1:00 a.m., police located, Elisandro Pedro Naranjo, 17, of Floyd County, in the 200 block of NE 3rd Street. Naranjo was known to have outstanding warrants from the municipal court. Naranjo was taken to the Floyd County Jail.

June 20, police went to a residence in the 500 block of W. Locust and arrested Steven Anthony Carrillo, 19, of Lockney, on a municipal court warrant. Carrillo was located and taken to the Floyd County Jail.

Carrillo was also found to have a burglary of vehicle warrant issued for his arrest. That warrant was also served on Carrillo.

June 23, a Lockney Officer saw a blue and purple Suzuki SUV traveling from side to side on Main Street

in a rapid manner and stopped the vehicle in the parking lot of Allsup's on Main Street. The driver Gloria Ann Moya, 40, of Amarillo was arrested for Driving While Intoxicated and taken to the Floyd County Jail.

In order to meet these goals Metcalf says the local Dairy Queen will remain open until 12:00 a.m. for all home football games.

"Roundtable Corporation, of Lubbock, has invested close to \$1 million towards improving facilities both internally and externally and employee training at all 31 stores," said Metcalf.

"Currently there are 580 DQ's in Texas, but just 5-10 years ago there were over 700. The primary reason for all the closings is the lack of reinvestment in the stores. The buildings and equipment were very outdated and

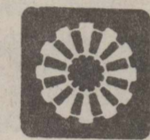
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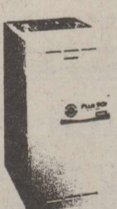

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**Floydada Rehab addresses "Medicare Cliff" concerns**

Floydada Rehabilitation and Care Center announced today that it will hold a Family Night Town Meeting on September 10 at 7:00 p.m. for elected officials, family members, residents and members of the community to address critical Medicaid funding shortages in long-term care and impending Medicare cuts. The meeting will address the fact that starting October 1, 2002, America's nursing homes will lose over \$1.3 billion a year in Medicare skilled nursing funding unless Congress and the President act to stop it. This cut in existing Medicare reimbursement known as "the Medicare cliff" will automatically trigger funding reductions of up to 10% or approximately \$35 per patient, per day for Medicare residents. This change if implemented, will have disastrous consequences for seniors and nursing home providers.

"The purpose of this Family Night Meeting is to inform our residents, families and community leaders of the crisis we are faced with and solicit their support in this very important fight to preserve Medicare funding. It is our mission to provide high quality care to the residents we serve and by drawing attention to these difficulties we can make others aware of the consequences that may result if current funding levels are reduced," said Sandra Seago, Administrator. Seniors who depend on Medicare and require around-the-clock skilled nursing care are clearly being put in jeopardy by these cuts. A presentation will be given outlining the Medicare cliff and its implications on Floydada Rehabilitation and Care Center and petitions will be circulated and signed urging Congress to ensure that the cliff is avoided.

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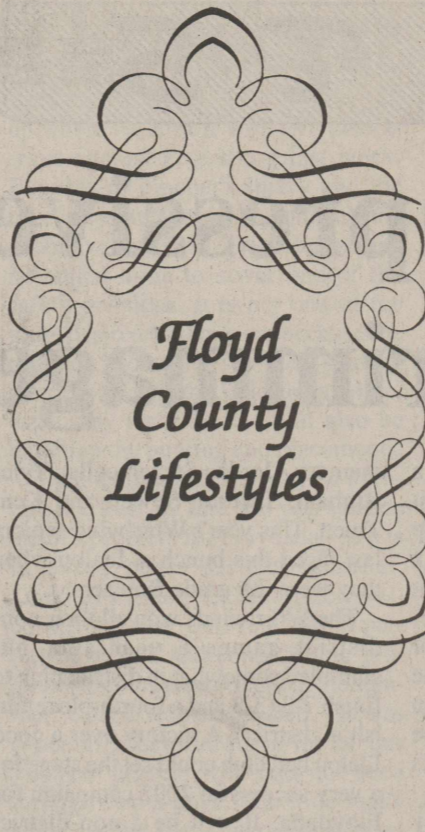

# Winds look impressive at pre-season scrimmage

The Floydada Whirlwinds concluded their pre-season workouts with an impressive showing in a controlled scrimmage at Petersburg on August 22. Ranked as high as number 12 in Class 2A in Texas in at least one poll, Floydada displayed a balanced attack, along with a ball-control defense that should send the message across the South Plains that the Whirlwinds are back - and then some.

Floydada's first two offensive units combined for over 450 yards total offense, producing 17 first downs and five touchdowns. Game officials were present for the scrimmage and, interestingly enough, flagged the "Winds" only four times for minor infractions. That, in itself, was impressive in these early stages of the season. The Whirlwind stopper units held the host Buffaloes to 216 total yards, 12 first downs, and a single score.

Leading the Whirlwind ground troops, which accumulated 363 yards, was senior runningback Dustin Covington who carried seven times for 124 yards (which included a 68-yard TD romp). Junior fullback Chris Wickware followed with 85 yards in 8 carries (including a 70-yard scoring run). Junior Gerald Henderson produced 63 yards in 11 carries and one touchdown. Angelo Williams paced the second unit offense with five carries for 50 yards and one score.

Both Floydada quarterbacks put up some good numbers. Plus neither suffered a single interception the entire evening. Senior Tyler Helms completed five passes in eight attempts for 70 yards while throwing to five different receivers. Junior Luke Miller was perfect in the passing department, completing three of three for 21 yards during the second unit offense's second set of plays.

The Whirlwind defense was close to mid-season form, as the first unit turned away Petersburg's first team

offense's lone scoring threat with a great goal-line stand during the first set. Senior Brady Rainwater took up where he left off from last season's six interceptions with a pair of "pics" at the expense of the Buffaloes. If defensive laurels were handed out for the effort against Petersburg, the line would form behind Gerald Henderson and lineman Morgan Tijerina. Time and again, the Buffalo runningbacks were pounded hard by these two. Bryce Bowley, Dustin Covington and Ty Heflin were also outstanding on a defense that did not permit any long runs (a common occurrence in pre-season scrimmages) and kept Petersburg's first unit offense out of the end zone.

Last February's realignment not only altered Floydada's district slate for 2002, but also produced a new lineup of non-conference opponents. The opening game this Friday brings back to Floydada one of the Whirlwinds' old rivals from earlier year district wars - the Idalou Wildcats. Hopefully, the defensive gem turned in by the "Winds at Petersburg will continue into tomorrow night's season opener.

Idalou shared the 4-2A title last year, and opens 2002 with a lot of high expectations. The Wildcats lost 28-0 to Coahoma in the bi-district round a year ago, but returns nine starters off a team that sported a nifty 9-2 record in 2001. Idalou quarterback Shae Reagan (6-3, 220), who suffered a season-ending collarbone injury in the fifth game a year ago, returns at full strength and offers a serious threat in Coach Jimmy Taylor's multiple offense.

Others who will give Floydada's defensive troops all they can handle will be Chris Olmos (who filled in at quarterback last year when Reagan went down and now moves to runningback) and a receiver corps many are calling the best set of pass-catchers in recent

memory - Jordan Stegemoeller, Tyler Bigham, Trynton Sewell and Kent Truett. This year's Whirlwind seniors last faced this bunch at Idalou when they were 7th grade Breezers.

The Whirlwinds won all their non-district games a year ago, but stumbled somewhat in district play to finish 7-3 (3-3 and a fourth-place finish in district). A victory over a good Idalou ball club could set the stage for a very successful 2002 campaign for Floydada. It will be a non-district game, (supposedly) with little at stake. Try telling that to the Whirlwinds and Wildcats at Wester Field on Friday night! Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m.

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# Bill Gray's 2002 County Football Forecast

There are plenty of reasons for optimism for the 2002 football campaigns of Floyd County's two Class 2A high schools. For one thing, the University Interscholastic League's biennial realignment last February saw Morton moved from District 5-2A, thus bringing Floydada and Lockney back into a six-team district. The new setup allows 5-2A teams to schedule another non-conference game prior to district action.

In 2002, District 5-2A will consist of the Whirlwinds, Longhorns, Abernathy, Hale Center, Olton and Friona. Abernathy won the district championship a year ago, with Friona and Hale Center grabbing the other two playoff berths. According to one pre-season observer, Abernathy will be "down in 2002, having lost so many players from its title team to graduation." Those who follow high school football in the smaller West Texas schools would probably disagree with that assertion. Abernathy just seems to be one of those teams that "re-loads" yearly instead of "re-builds."

True, all-everything Matt Pierce is gone via graduation at Abernathy. But, Coach Dwayne Sexton once again has a good group of athletes from which to build a league contender. Same holds true at Friona, where Coach Bob Furgeson takes over the Chieftains. Nathan Haile, a 1200-yard runner in 2001, enters his senior season as the core of an experienced backfield. Haile and the supporting cast of quarterback Brock Field, runningback Adam Bandy and defender/receiver Andy Carthel all bring a lot of talent to the field for Friona, where an upper-division finish is expected almost yearly.

There are a lot of question marks at Hale Center, where several players who would have been probable starters this year will not be playing due to medical or personal reasons. To make matters worse, returning quarterback Jacob Reiff injured his leg during the summer and may not be playing able to play at full strength until mid-season. Willie Joe Johnson, an all-district selection a year ago, will be joined in the backfield by his cousin, junior Terrence Johnson. The two are expected to carry most of the load until, at least, Reiff returns to 100 percent. The Owls have made the playoffs each of the six years under Paul Chandler. They should be considered a dark horse this year. It all depends upon how well some of the younger players mature and how much they are able to help.

The Olton Mustangs are another 5-2A team with a lot of question marks entering 2002. Bryan Allcorn enters his second year at Olton with a team that won but twice in 2001. One of Olton's top returnees, Sawyer Perry, received an off-season knee injury that could keep him out of the lineup until deep into the district race. With Perry out, Coach Allcorn is having to look to some of the younger players to come forward in leadership positions. Sophomore Dustin Synatschik and junior Blake Neinast will be battling it out for the quarterback position. Eric Johnson will fill in at tailback until Perry is healthy. Defensively, the Mustangs must fill a lot of slots with underclassmen, so there are a lot of questions in that department. One thing for certain...Olton will not go 2-8 this year. The Mustangs only play a nine-game schedule.

As Coach Joe Robertson enters his second year at the helm in Lockney, not only will the team be quicker and stronger, but everyone will be more comfortable. After many successful years at Petersburg, Coach Robertson took over the Longhorns a year ago. Neither the coach nor the team was used to 3-7 seasons, and there are all kinds of positives around the Longhorn camp this year to insure that doesn't happen again.

"I believe in the kids having fun playing football," said Robertson. "If we can instill in them the right attitude, it just seems that winning will take care of itself. Oh, I don't mean we don't have to have discipline and plenty of it, but with the right approach to discipline, I think the kids have responded in a very positive way." The coach added, "We came in with a new offensive system last year, and this year we've been able to add our 4-3 defense. Gosh, at least this year I knew all of their names."

One of the players at Lockney to watch this year is not an all-everything quarterback or a speed-burner runningback. No, it is imposing 6-8, 315-pound Landon Schumacher, who could be one of the most sought-after high school linemen in West Texas when the college recruiters come calling later in the year. Schumacher and his "little" cousin, Rance Schumacher (6-2, 220) give the Longhorns a couple of stout bookends for an offensive line that, according to Coach Robertson, "is the biggest line I have

ever had in my coaching career." Todd Cotham and Tod Duncan (6-1, 235) will help anchor the line, paving the way for sophomore fullback Mark Ford's explosive ground game. Ben Sherman (6-1, 180) returns for his senior campaign at quarterback, with sophomore Cagan Cummings as his back-up. 195-pound Michael Rodriguez will not only fill the tailback slot, but is expected to return to his favorite spot of middle linebacker in Coach Robertson's new 4-3 scheme.

"You had better be ready to play every Friday night," said Robertson, concerning District 5-2A. "This district is just awesome, and I expect Floydada and Friona to be the ones to beat, with Hale Center and Abernathy right behind them." Coach Robertson and his Lockney Longhorns are going to have a whole lot to say as to who sits in the District Throne Room at the end of the season. If all gels for the Longhorns, they could very well be in the title hunt themselves. The October 25 shoot-out for the County Championship at Lockney's Mitchell-Zimmerman Field between the 'Horns and the Whirlwinds could have more than the County Crown at stake. A post-season playoff berth could well be on the line.

The Floydada Whirlwinds have been picked by many to be the "Top Dog" of District 5-2A for 2002. Dave Campbell's Texas Football has ranked the 'Winds as the number 12 team in Class 2A in Texas in its pre-season publication. According to Floydada Coach Lee Hurt, "It's kind of nice to draw that kind of respect from a well-known football magazine such as that, and it is a real compliment to our young men and to our program. I'm sure it's (the ranking) based upon last year's record (7-3), the number of returnees we have and the number of all-districts among those returnees."

The coach continued, "Those kind of rankings are kind of for the fans anyhow. We can't let the kids take them too seriously, but if they can keep it in prospective and let it be kind of a call to spirit, a high ranking can help generate enthusiasm. One thing we know for certain is that a team's high ranking can certainly motivate its opponents. We're flattered by their acknowledgment of us, and just hope we can live up to their expectations."

It would be difficult not to project the Whirlwinds as one of the top class 2A clubs on the South Plains. With nine returning starters on each side of the line of scrimmage, a multi-talented returning quarterback, a strong stable of experienced runningbacks, and a receiver corps that will rank with the best around, the 'Winds have a lot to offer from an offensive view.

Tyler Helms (5-8, 160) returns for his senior year at quarterback to guide the Whirlwind option offense. A former Floydada coach, Dean Bates, once noted when Tyler was a third or fourth grader, "Get and keep a football in that kid's hands! He's as natural an option quarterback potential that I've ever seen! Coach Bates' vision has come to reality. Bates also suggested at the time that he (Tyler) needs to be kicking the ball all the time-day-in, day out. That prophecy has also come to pass as Helms has garnered post-season honors in kicking and punting the last couple of seasons. Sophomore Luke Miller's showing in two pre-season scrimmages has solidified his position as the backup signal-caller in the Whirlwind wishbone.

Floydada is blessed with a group of strong runningbacks, headed by senior Dustin Covington (5-10, 180). Covington will win four varsity football letters before his career at Floydada is over, and would like nothing more than to lead the ground charges all the way to a district title. Covington will be joined in the backfield by jun-

iors Chris Wickware (fullback) and Gerald Henderson (halfback). All three have displayed their capabilities of breaking the long runs not only last season, but in the scrimmages this year against Slaton and Petersburg.

The running threats do not end with the starters. Sophomore Ty Heflin and junior Angelo Williams have proven themselves in fall scrimmages and are big boosts to the depth in the backfield. Senior Brady Rainwater (6-1, 160), heads up the Whirlwind receiver corps and, judging from his outings against Slaton and Petersburg, appears ready to take up where he left off last year as one of the district's top receivers.

The depth at receivers, as well as defensive backs, may have been dealt a blow with the news of a knee injury sustained by Dustin Fincher in the Petersburg scrimmage. As of this writing, it is not known how long Fincher, a senior, will be out of the lineup. Junior Ross Bennett is being counted on to contribute in a big way in the receiver corps, as is senior Jeremy Duran. Senior Andrew Arvizu will see plenty of game time as a runningback as well as in the defensive secondary.

Floydada's option offense is primarily a ground-oriented attack, but, as in the past, a lot of Helms' passes will be directed at people coming out of the backfield. Henderson, Wickware, Covington and Arvizu have all shown they are quite capable at snagging passes out of the backfield. Floydada's option offense is also dependent upon one very important ingredient - a strong and quick offensive line.

Senior Bryce Bowley (6-0, 235) brings all-district credentials to the guard position he has held since his freshman year. Bowley will anchor a line that includes seniors Jacob Morales (5-9, 210), Chris Wiley (6-4, 280), and hopefully after the season's third game, Chase Mitchell (6-2, 225). Seniors Corey Hayter (5-10, 195) and Tanner Battey are high on the depth chart on both sides of the trenches. Some outstanding underclassmen, headed by Morgan Tijerina, D.J. Summers, Paul Irlas (5-9, 210), and Taylor Sue will see slots of action in the offensive as well as defensive fronts.

Floydada's defensive strategies will operate out of the familiar 4-3 scheme. In all probability, the front four will consist of D.J. Summers, Morgan Tijerina, Jacob Morales and Gerald Henderson. Projected as backups, but possibly moving into starting positions on the defensive front are Chris Wiley, Corey Hayter and Paul Irlas. The Whirlwind linebacking troops are a solid unit, with Bryce Bowley holding down the middle, with able assistance on the left from sophomore Ty Heflin and on the right by senior Jeremy Duran.

In order to keep fresh people in the mix, several underclassmen are projected at linebacking spots, including Luis Lopez and Taylor Sue. Dustin Covington may be seen at linebacker some, but will probably be used more in the defensive secondary. A lot depends upon the availability of Dustin Fincher as far as the defensive corners are concerned. Currently, Ross Bennett and Andrew Arvizu seem to be the best bets at the cornerback slots, but at this point in the early season, a lot of different people may be given various looks as opportunities dictate.

One thing is pretty certain. Brady Rainwater will be one of the starters in the deep secondary. Rainwater had six interceptions a year ago, and took

up where he left off with two take-aways against Petersburg last week. Because of Fincher's injury and the necessary shuffling of personnel in the defensive backfield, Tyler Helms may be called upon to cover one of the safety positions. It is not one of the more desired occurrences because the coaches had rather see their starting quarterback off the field for a while, especially since Helms will also be handling the punting and placements.

Total team depth is always a problem in Class 2A, and this year is once again a problem for Floydada - as it is in every other district member. Lockney's coach Joe Robertson welcomed the new UIL rule which permitted weight and conditioning programs to continue throughout the summer. Coach Robertson said, "It was especially helpful for a lot of our younger players who had not been through two-a-days. The kids really came in good shape overall once practice started." Those comments were echoed by Floydada's Lee Hurt.

"A lot of our players took advantage of the weight room being opened - and it was good to be able to have the coaches working with them," said Hurt. The new UIL policy this year relaxed the rules prohibiting the coaches from having any contact with the athletes during the off-season.

It is a consensus opinion among the district's coaches that District 5-2A is one of the more balanced Class 2A districts in Region 1. There is a great deal of parity in the district, and as both coaches Hurt and Robertson said, "You better be ready to play every Friday night." There may be a couple of teams that are "head and shoulders" above the rest, but a key injury here or something else there could make the difference.

This writer would probably be "run out of town on the rails" (if we still had rails) if I picked any team except the Whirlwinds to win it all this season. The Whirlwinds last picked up the district trophy 10 years ago, and their last appearance in the post-season party was in 1998. Coming off a

disastrous 1-9 season in Lee Hurt's first year as head man, the 'Winds rebounded with a respectable 7-3 a year ago. I think they'll improve upon that overall record, throw in a couple more district victories and delay basketball season for a bunch of 'em for awhile. This could be the year for the Whirlwinds to play in December. As for the other playoff spots? I look for Lockney to improve tremendously. The 'Horns won't grab the district title, but I look for them to nose out Abernathy for one of the remaining playoff tickets. As for Friona and Hale Center...Take your pick!



10:25-11:00: Tour Stop 2 - Rick Reddy Farm, McCoy Community, (located 6 miles south of Floydada on U.S. 62 then 2 miles west on FM 54). "Drip Irrigation Systems." Darcy Martin and Jay Moore with Diversified Crop Irrigation Systems will discuss the first year crop installed on the Reddy Farm.

11-25-12:10: Tour Stop 3 - David Cook Farm, Sandhill Community (located from Muncy Elevator 2 1/2 miles west on FM 786 - dead end go straight on County Road 192 1 mile then 1 mile back north). "Cotton Variety of Harvest Aides". Dr. Randy Bowman, TCES Cotton Specialist, will discuss cotton varieties and harvest aide treatments. ## Cotton Market Weekly

A service provided by plains Cotton Cooperative Association

The cotton market rose and fell in search of a clear direction this week. Observers were surprised on Thursday, however, as futures on the New York Cotton Exchange settled with marked gains in spite of disappointing export sales, falling international prices and a strong U.S. dollar.

Although export registrations of 2002-03 crop U.S. cotton in the week ended Aug. 15 were cut nearly in half from the previous week, sales basically were what many analysts were expecting.

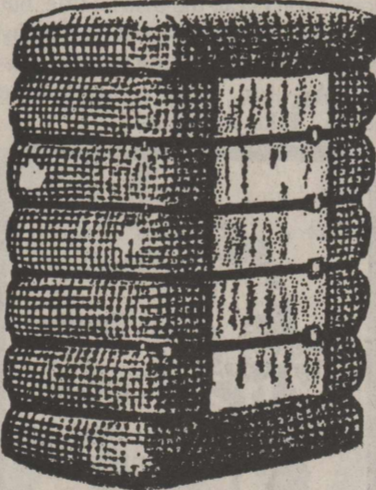
According to USDA, net export sales of 2002-03-crop U.S. cotton totaled 93,000 bales for the week, down 48 percent from the previous week. China was the main buyer with purchases totaling an impressive 40,000 bales. Mexico and Indonesia rounded out the list of top buyers with commitments for 13,800 and 5,800 bales, respectively.

Export shipments of 108,800 bales for the same period were 17 percent less than the previous week and 34 percent lower than the four-week average. Shipments primarily were destined for Mexico, Thailand and Turkey.

According to some analysts, USDA's export report was noticeable mostly for the impressive sales to China. Rumblings about the sales had been circulating prior to the release of the weekly report, and many market observers were impressed that the rumor actually proved true. Meanwhile, some skeptics in the market continue to use comparisons with previous years as evidence that USDA's latest export shipment forecast is too optimistic.

"We're not in that camp," one cotton analyst from the Mid-South commented. "Shipping an average of 200,000 bales per week, even with outstanding sales at their current level for this stage of the marketing year, is very possible."

## TDA receives exemption to use Tracer on pasture

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs announced today that the Texas Department of Agriculture has been granted approval by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to issue a crisis exemption to use spinosad (Tracer 4E Insecticide) on pasture and rangeland for control of beet armyworm, true armyworm, fall armyworm, Southern armyworm and yellow-striped armyworm.

Tracer 4E Insecticide, manufactured by Dow AgriSciences, may be applied following all directions, restrictions and precautions on the EPA registered product label, as well as restrictions within the exemption notice. Use is authorized to begin on Aug. 2, 2002, and will remain in effect until EPA grants the FIFRA Section 18 Emergency Specific Exemption that TDA will submit.

Applications will be made only by certified applicators, by licensed applicators or by persons under the direct supervision of licensed applicators.

The product may be applied at a rate of 1.0 to 2.0 ounces (0.031 to 0.062 pounds) active ingredient per acre and up to a maximum of six treatments per season. Do not apply more than three times in any 21-day period. If Tracer 4E Insecticide is applied three times in succession, do not apply again for at least 21 days.

Do not harvest hay for three days after treatment.

There are no grazing restrictions.

This product is highly toxic to bees exposed to direct treatment on blooming crops or weeds. Do not apply this product or allow it to drift to blooming crops or weeds while bees are actively visiting the treatment area. 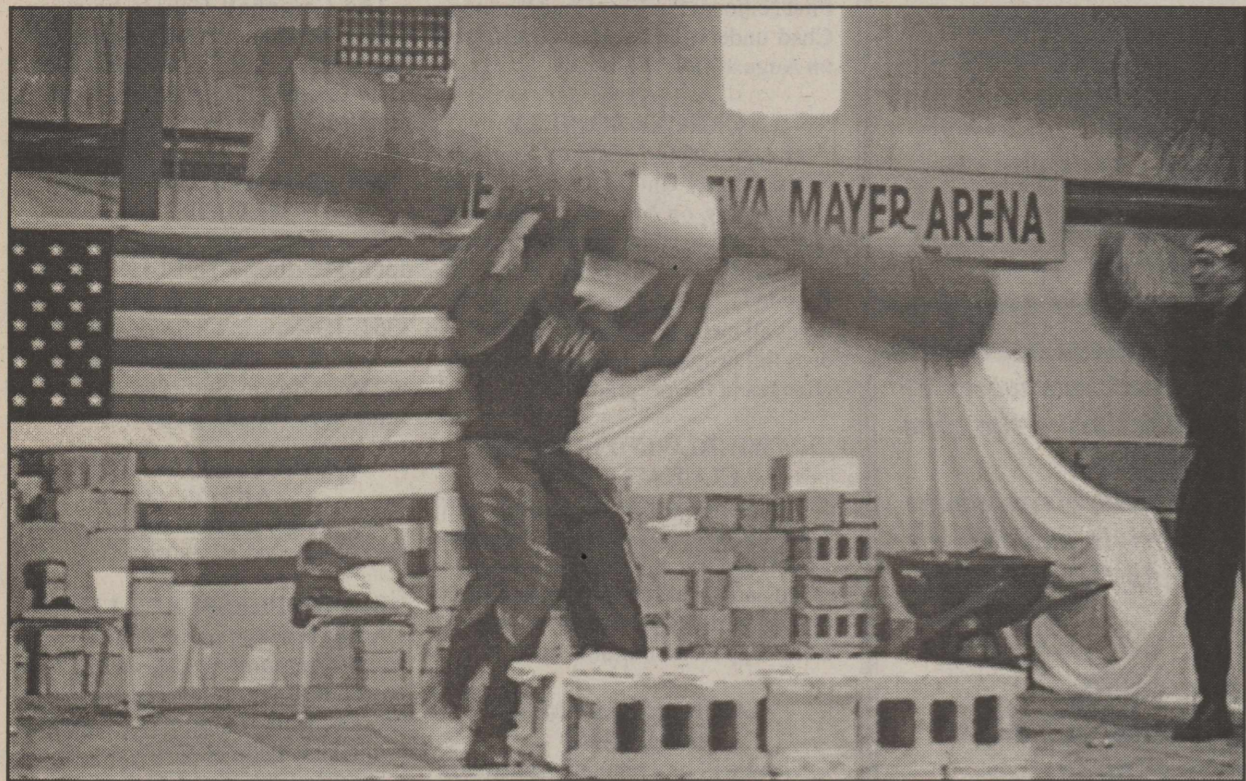

with the arrival of the Power Team. Every night, all through the crusade, a prayer team kept praying until it was over. That is the reason so many lives were touched."

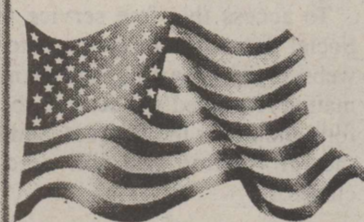

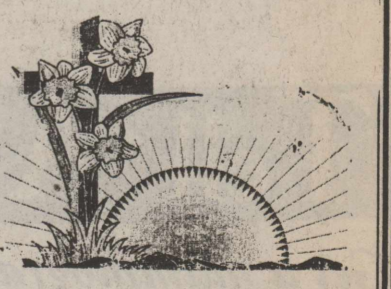

# Social Security News

A young man who's getting both workers' compensation and Social Security disability benefits called our office to ask why his Social Security benefits are being reduced. We told him that ordinarily disability payments from other sources don't affect Social Security disability benefits.

But, if the disability payment is workers' compensation or another public disability payment, his and his family's Social Security benefits may be reduced.

A workers' compensation payment is one that is made to a worker because of a job related injury or illness. It may be paid by federal or state workers' compensation agencies, employers or insurance companies on behalf of employers.

Public disability payments that may affect your Social Security benefit are those paid under a federal, state or local government law or plan that pays for conditions that are not job-related. Examples are civil service disability benefits, military disability benefits, state temporary disability benefits and state or local government retirement benefits that are based on disability.

However, Social Security benefits are not reduced when the person is receiving federal, state or local government benefits for work that was covered by Social Security, private pensions or insurance benefits, or Veterans or Supplemental Security Income payments.

We told the caller that his Social Security benefits were reduced so the combined amount of the benefit he and his family receive, plus his workers' compensation payment and any other government disability payment, won't exceed 80 percent of his average current pre-disability earnings. If this sum exceeds 80 percent of those earnings, the excess amount is deducted from his Social Security benefit. The combined benefits will never

be less than the amount of his and his family's total Social Security benefits before they were reduced.

Most seniors are aware that they can file for their Social Security retirement and/or spouse benefits either by phone or in person, but now there is a third way—online!

To access this free service from Social Security, simply log onto our website, [www.ssa.gov](http://www.ssa.gov), enter the information requested and send us the information over the Internet. Some of the information you will need includes:

Your Social Security number. Your date and place of birth. The amount you earned last year and the amount you expect to earn this year. The name and address of each employer for this year and last year. Military service dates. The name, Social Security number and date of birth of your current and/or any prior spouse, and the date and place of each marriage and, if appropriate, the date and place the marriage ended.

Then print, sign and mail or take the paper application to the address provided along with the documents we need. These may include:

Your birth certificate or other proof of age, your naturalization papers, your U.S. military discharge papers, your W-2 forms and/or self-employment tax returns for last year.

With some exceptions (e.g. evidence of wages and/or self-employed income) SSA accepts only original documents or copies certified by the office that keeps the record.

So, why delay? If you have been thinking about retiring, check out [www.ssa.gov](http://www.ssa.gov) and apply for your benefits directly online. For additional information, you may also call toll free 1-800-772-1213 or visit your local Social Security office.
