# **Cities join together to fight Mackenzie** water shortage

The cities of Floydada, Lockney, Silverton, and Tulia, have joined forces and called on the Mackenzie Water Authority Board to immediately take steps to "assess the advisability of discontinuing water production from Lake Mackenzie to the member cities"

The resolution was unanimously approved by all council members during the regular Floydada City Council Meeting, August 27.

The resolution also points out that the cost of wholesale water to the cities is "extremely high, averaging over \$2.50 per 1,000 gallons. In addition to costs paid by the cities, the residents of our communities are paying approximately \$500,000 per year in property taxes to the Authority."

> The resolution says that with the declining population and "stagnant", municipal revenues, each city can "ill afford to support a facility that is not cost-effective"

> In the resolution the cities made strong "requests" of the Water Authority including:

> Directing the Authority to have auditors prepare detailed analysis explaining what expenses could be dropped by each city if water production stopped;

> Directing the Authority to retain a qualified financial advisor to deterdebt owed by each city to obtain lower payments;

With these concerns in mind the member cities called on the Authority to retain a "qualified engineering firm to determine the costs to move water within the existing system from

The engineer should also determine the cost to deactivate and preserve the condition of the Authority's facilities so they can be reactivated at a later date in a cost-effective manner."

The resolution scheduled a meeting with the governing bodies of the member cities within 60 days to report on what actions the Authority has taken, or plans to take.

'The resolution is not binding," said Brown. "There is nothing that says the Authority must do what we ask, however, we appoint the representatives to the board.

"I believe the representatives from Floydada understand and appreciate our concerns.





Councilman Sheldon Sue made the motion to adopt the tax rate and Ruben Barrientoz seconded. The vote carried 5-1 with Clar Schacht voting against.

"We should be increasing our tax rate by 2¢ because we will be adding an expense of \$10,200 to subsidize the hospital district," said Schacht.

The Council also approved the 2003 budget for the Floydada Economic Development Corporation.





# Wildcats edge Floydada 10-7 in season opener

A 30-yard field goal by Idalou's Casey Rollings, as time expired on the final play of the first half, proved to be the difference in a 10-7 victory by the Wildcats over the Whirlwinds in the season opener for both teams at Floydada's Wester Field last Friday night. The Whirlwinds had an opportunity for a tie with a field goal in the final 30 seconds, which would have sent the game into overtime. However, Tyler Helms' 26-yarder was ruled wide to the right by game officials.

It was a contest filled with superlatives by two of the better Class 2A clubs this year on the South Plains. According to Floydada Coach Lee Hurt, "It was a great game and our kids gave a great effort. I was really proud of the way they held their composure there late in the game as they put themselves in a position to either win the game or go for the tie. It just didn't work out for us, but we did give a great effort. After a close loss like that, they might be a little down, but they'll rebound, have good practices this week, and be well-prepared for Ralls this next week.'

The visitors fumbled the opening kickoff, with Brady Rainwater recovering the ball and putting the Whirlwinds in great position at the Idalou 27-yard line. The Whirlwinds were unable to capitalize on the opportunity and the Wildcat defense held and then blocked Floydada's 44-yard field goal attempt.

Wildcat quarterback Shae Reagan, who would pace all runners with 93 yards in 23 carries, converted on three fourth-down attempts to guide Idalou down the field late in the first quarter. Reagan hooked up with Trynt Sewell for a 20-yard scoring aerial to open the second period. Kicker Casey Rollings tacked on the PAT to put the Wildcats up 7-0.







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## **New Farm Bill makes a difference**

#### **By: Shawn Wade**

Figuring out how much the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act (FSRIA) of 2002 will mean on the turn row has been a topic for speculation ever since the Bill was signed into law May 13 of this year.

The only problem with trying to figure it all out was that, until recently, few of the rules governing base and yield updates options and the mechanics of signing up for the program had been finalized.

Recently released projections from the U.S. House Committee on Agriculture, however, indicate that overall the FSRIA program will indeed deliver a significant increase in federal agriculture assistance to rural communities in 2002.

Estimated 2002 program payments have not been computed for all counties in the Plains Cotton Growers service area at this time.

Economists with the U.S. House Committee on Agriculture, however, have computed estimated payments for several High Plains and Rolling Plains counties.

The analysis estimates the new program provides as much as 65 percent more assistance to producers than they would have received under the old Farm Bill.

Even though the analysis has only been completed for a small area at this time, it clearly illustrates just how much the new Farm Bill is going to mean to producers and rural communities.





their frontline research in nuclear transplantation - better known as cloning - scientists at Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine can envision cures for such diseases as diabetes and Parkinson's, as well as the rejuvenation of damaged organs.


'Cloning may one day be used to benefit both animal and human patients by constructing a new organ or tissue to replace a diseased one," said Mark Westhusin, a member of the university's cloning research team.

The cloning process begins with removal of the nucleus of an unfertilized egg from one individual, leaving an egg-cell composed basically of cytoplasm. Then this egg is essentially fertilized with a cell taken from the individual that is to receive the cloned organ or tissue, Westhusin explained. Once the resulting embryo begins to grow, its cells have the ability to develop into a variety of different organs and specialized tissues.

"By manipulating the growth of the cells, scientists may one day be able to change them into whatever type of tissue is needed," Westhusin said.

For diseases like diabetes, for example, a skin cell might be used to create a new embryo.

"The cells created from this embryo could be genetically engineered to produce and secrete insulin," Westhusin observed. "These cells could than be manipulated in a laboratory to develop into pancreatic cells, which could be transferred to the patient's pancreas. The cells would not be rejected because they originated from that individual. The resulting organ growth could cure the patient of diabetes."



### Study focuses on a new treatment for ulcerative colitis

An experimental medication, de- ing this life-long illness. rived from the aloe vera plant, could help patients with ulcerative colitis that is unresponsive to conventional treatment.

Medicine in Houston are participating in a multi-center, double-blind and randomized study that will follow more than 300 patients for six weeks. The Houston site will enroll at least 60 study participants.

"While some patients with ulcerative colitis respond to conventional medical management, approximately 20 percent do not," said Dr. Atilla Ertan, the study's principal investigator. "We have high hopes that this new treatment may work for that second group."

Approximately 250,000 Americans suffer from ulcerative colitis, an inflammatory disease of the large intestine. Most cases are diagnosed before age 30. Each year, the disease accounts for a quarter million physician visits, 20,000 hospitalizations, and loss of over a million work days in the United States.
