My family had a "first" experience this spring break

While in Austin over Spring break, my husband, son, and I took a trip to Manor Downs (a racetrack 10 miles east of Austin on 290). I love horses and have always wanted to go watch them run at the races. Since I don't believe in gambling I was a little worried about the example we were setting for my son. The thoroughbred race was lots of fun because I got to cheer longer--and I picked the winner! I won enough to cover the three bets plus \$1.60. Wow.

However, my son was keeping track of our "in-the-red" budget in his head. He piped up with, "I guess this is why you're not supposed to gamble!"

'Absolutely!" we admitted.



An old friend has gotten his tail in a crack down at the Austin American-Statesman for activities that used to be regarded as a no-no before the days of "civic journalism." Now, one can only wonder what the fuss is all about.

The problem, of course, is that during the past 130 or so years, the Democratic Party has changed many times, as have the Republicans. But the Statesman has never changed. It still mouths whatever the Democratic Party dictates, and McNeely fills the bill as political editor quite nicely. When the Democratic Party zigs, the Statesman zigs.

When the Democratic Party zags, about Craddick, or Pete Laney? the Statesman zags. Whatever the Party thinks, it can always be assured a loyal voice in the Austin American-Statesman.

(For the benefit of those who do not read the American-Statesman, the current flap began when Mr. Earle decided he and a few friends would ostensibly explore the manner in which Mr. Tom Craddick, of Midland, became Speaker of the House of Representatives. In point of fact, one of the principal reasons for Mr. Earle's Grand Jury probe was the recent Congressional Redistricting, wherein entrenched Democrats didn't fare too well. Mr.

Earle, responding to party pressure, sought something that might embarrass, or it was hoped would embarrass, Rep. Tom Delay in Washington. Under pressure from more than just his fellow Democrats, Mr. Earle theoretically expanded his probe to include former House Speaker Pete Laney of Hale Center, among others. Can you imagine, gentle reader, finding out the truth of how and why an obscure member of the Texas Legislature from a rural area of West Texas suddenly found himself the darling of Austin's lobby, so much so that they selected him as their choice for Speaker, able to assign various members to various committees to consider various matters that might end up taxing various groups? And are we talking

Or any other Legislator that somehow ends up as Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives. Perish the thought.

The newspaper's publisher, Mr. Rich Oppel, has weighed in on the matter, indicating publicly

At any rate, that required Mr. Earle to cast a wide net, and it also required that he be well perceived among the party faithful while all this was going on. Hence the active collusion on the part of the local newspaper (of whom Dave is the political editor), and the District Attorney's office. It develops that some Republican legal beagles went to court and subpoenaed Mr. Earle's records, some of which he turned over to the court. Among those records were indications that Mr. McNeely had forwarded to Mr. Earle the drafts of certain prospective stories in the Austin American-Statesman, asking for comment. Dave says he only did this to assure the accuracy of what he had written, but one has to wonder why a reporter with some 25 or 30 years of experience has to clear his facts with the guy he's writing about. Especially when they are old college chums (UT) and fellow politicos. The common reader can perhaps be forgiven for entertaining some doubts.)




I also wish to tell the Scouts how proud we are of them and of the manner in which they represent all youth in the community where they live. They aren't aware of how they are observed

Mr. Alexander passed away on Saturday, March 20, 2004.

He was born in Canadian on March 23, 1912 to R. T. Alexander. Sr. and Mae Palmer Alexander. He is the grandson of Mary Jane Alexander (the founder of the Alexander Ranch) and Reverend C. W. Alexander, the first Presbyterian minister in the Panhandle, who was sent to Mobeetie and Ft. Elliott in 1884.

He graduated from Texas A&M in 1934 with a degree in Animal Husbandry. He was a member of "F" Company in the Cadet Corps and held a U.S. Army reserve commission.

He married Doris Johnson on May 22, 1981 in the First Presbyterian Church in Santa Fe, New Mexico.

He was called into service as First Lieutenant following Pearl Harbor where he was assigned to the 818th Tank Destroyer Battalion. The Battalion became a component of Patton's Third Army. At the time of the D-Day Invasion, June 6, 1944, he was Operations Officer and held the rank of Major. He and his battalion of 36 tank destroyers landed on Utah Beach, fought across France into Germany, wheeled with the crack 4th Armored to rescue Bastogne at the Battle of the Bulge. He won

five battle stars: Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes (Battle of the Bulge), and Central Europe. The Battalion met the Russians attacking from the East in Czechoslovakia. The Alexander's hosted the annual reunion of the 818th in Amarillo in 1999.

Mr. Alexander served two terms as President of the Texas Hereford Association. During his tenure he originated the first World Conference of Hereford Breeders. Cattle were flown in

her residence in Lockney.

She was born October 31, 1919 in Goliad to the late Pedro and Maria Reyes. She married Anastacio Amador in 1935 and they moved to Lockney from Clute in 1960. She was a housewife and a member of the San Jose Catholic Church in Lockney


