## Floydada Chamber honors citizens

The Floydada Chamber of Commerce honored their outstanding citizens at the annual Chamber Banquet Thursday night at the Floyd County Friends Unity Center in Muncy.

Floydada auctioneer/businessman Tim Assiter was honored as the Citizen of the Year, while JoLynn Dean was given the Extra Mile Award.

Lorilla Bradley was presented the Volunteer of the Year and Dentist Bill Dean was named the Employer of the Year.

Laura Farris presented Assiter with the Citizen of the Year award. She praised Assiter for his help in maintaining the Floyd County Friends Unity Center "through his efforts at the annual gala," his involvement in the Old Settlers celebration each year and his help at Punkin Days. "He is such a big part of our community, not only because he is part of a family owned business that has been part of this community over 25 years, but because of what he gives back to the community," Farris said.

"He helps teach the Floyd County 4-H auctioneer techniques. He has helped organizations like Ducks Unlimited and West Texas Cystic Fibrosis Foundation with its auctioneer talents. He was the 1st Runner-Up in the Texas Auctioneers Contest and has been with the top 15 in the International Auctioneers Contest twice," said Farris.

Assiter auctioned and sold the Top Dollar Car at the world's greatest classic car auction, the Barrett-Jackson Classic Car Auction at Scottsdale, Arizona. He also has a new mapping software called Farm Works Solutions, Farris added.

Assiter has three children, Memory, Kelsey and Bandy, all of Lubbock and one grandson, Kyler.

Julianne Cornelius presented the Extra Mile Award to JoLynn Dean. Julianne was filling in for her son, Skyler, who was away on school competition. Cornelius said, "Tonight's" recipient of the Extra Mile Award is one of the

most enthusiastic people I know.

She has brought a freshness and second wind to the Floydada Chamber of Commerce in promoting Punkin Days, Christmas Downtown, the Ole Country Farmers Market and she helped bring the infamous Krispy Kreme Donut Fund-raiser to Floydada."

"She is actively involved in the American Cancer Society, helps with the Christmas Brunch and was the first Co-Chairman of the Relay for Life at the Floydada Track Field. They were hoping to raise \$10,000, but they went above and beyond that goal and raised \$30,000. She is a member of the Floydada's Lions Club and actively participates in their Radio Days, Broom Sale, Fish Fry and has been teased about being President for three years, even though elected for one year. You see, she assisted her husband and father through their year as President," added Cornelius.

JoLynn is a member of the Floyd County Veterans Memorial Board and a member of the First United Methodist Church. She works with her husband, Bill, at their dentistry business and they volunteer their services at Girls Town annually. They have two daughters, Angie and Laura, and a son-in-law, Dusty.

City Manager Gary Brown, representing Floydada Power & Light, presented the Volunteer of the Year Award to Lorilla Bradley. "She is a bold leader who is not afraid to give her abilities. She is a native of Girard. She married an orchestra leader in 1947 and they both worked at the Estacado Gin. She sang in the trios and quartets at the Lighthouse Electric meetings," said Brown.

"She served as a pink lady volunteer at People's Hospital. She has been honored by both Lubbock Christian University and Abilene Christian University for her service to others. She has been a member of City Park Church of Christ for 54 years."

Bradley is the mother of Sammy, mother-in-law to Sandra and grandmother to Josh and

Jessalyn. She has been in charge of the Floydada Rehab and Care Center monthly birthday party for over 30 years. She writes poetry for the celebration. She writes for her family and is looking for ways to serve others.

Dr. William (Bill) Dean, DDS, was presented the Employer of the Year Award by Jose Alaniz. Alaniz said, "He is the best. His qualities include going above and beyond, not only with his employees, but with his patients as well. He makes sure new and nervous patients are put at ease with his sense of humor, gentleness, compassion and warm smile. We treasure his friendship."

Lady Raider and senior at Texas Tech University, Natalie Ritchie, spoke to the audience about her life's experiences. Her theme was "You Can Be What You Want To Be With God's Help."

Ritchie told about her early childhood. Even as a premature baby, she almost died twice, but her mother prayed for her and she lived knowing she was a special child for a special purpose in life. "Being raised by Christian parents has influenced my entire life," said Ritchie.

She spoke of always wanting to be a Lady Raider in her early youth. By being home schooled, her dad took her to the local gym to shoot hoops and play basketball. This became her passion and goal in life. She gave God the credit for allowing her to be picked by TTU Coach Marsha Sharp to play at TTU.

Following an injury and questioning God's will in interfering with "her" plans, she finally gave in to the Lord and let Him have "His" way. "Now," she said, "I testify for the Lord at basketball clinics for young girls throughout the region."

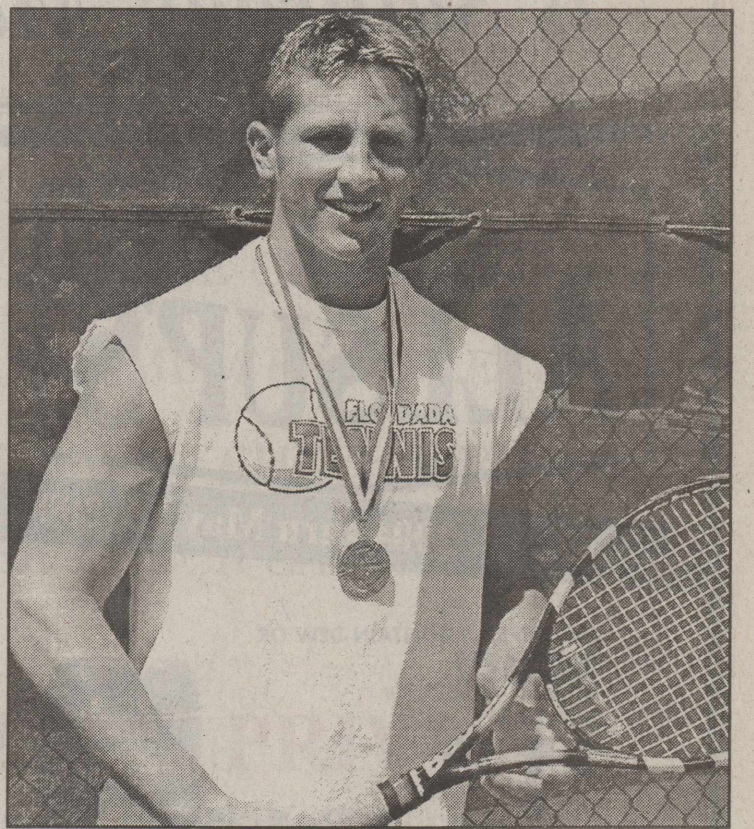
## Bennett advances to State

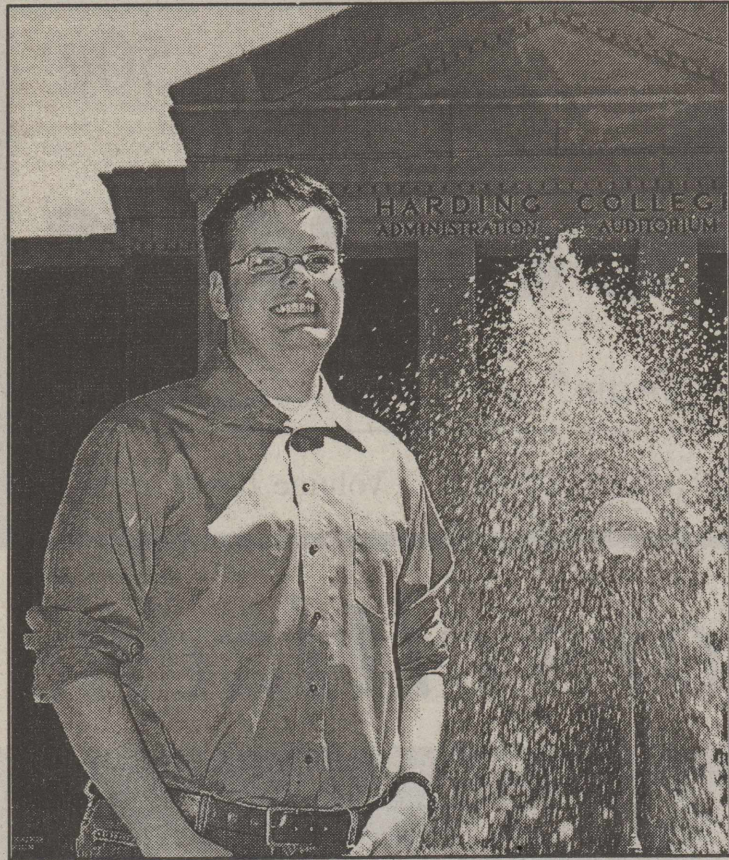

# The Lamplighter

We've finally finished reading a book we would like to recommend. It's titled "Stolen Valor", and deals with frauds who claim to have been heroes in the Vietnam conflict.

We say "finally finished" because we've been on the book for some time. We have only one good eye left, and the good one is not quite as good as we'd like it to be. Still, with patience and perseverance we've been rewarded with what we would call a "good read." It was written by B.G. Burkett and Glenna Whitley, and published, according to the cover, by Verity Press, Inc., of Dallas. I don't know what it costs, but I imagine the local library has a copy, or can get one.

Perhaps one of the reasons, or even the principal reason, that I appreciate the book is that it explores a subject that has been near

and dear to me for many, many years. That is the proclivity for some men to claim heroics for which their records do not reflect, what the men who served with them do not remember, and for commendations to which they are not entitled. Everyone who has ever served in the military will recognize the story that Burkett is trying to tell. The difference between Burkett and most of us is that he spent many years researching the subject after having served honorably in Vietnam, returning to the states to an atmosphere of hostility toward all who had served there. His research led to some strange, though predictable, revelations. In many, many, cases, the loudest, most vociferous, critics of American involvement in that war were frauds from beginning to end. Many had never served

in Vietnam. Many had not even served in the military. Many had served, but claimed service their records did not reflect. Camp cooks became, in the retelling, machine gunners, or CIA agents on secret assignment (which of course was blamed for the lack of official records.)

In effect, it is these men who have "stolen" the valor due others. The Vietnam conflict was not unique in this regard, (we even had a fraudulent coward in our artillery battery on Corregidor, and he got to wear the Presidential Unit Citation just like everyone else in the battery) but it did seem that the situation surrounding Vietnam had more than its share of frauds, if Burkett's book is any indication of what really went on. Anyone who has sweated out a war in the presence of death and destruction can be

forgiven for looking with disdain upon the rows and rows of ribbons adorning the chests of officers who served in those same situations. And anyone familiar with the Vietnam war, replete as it was with a Commander in Chief and a Secretary of Defense who both thought of themselves as five-star Generals, and a military and Foreign Service establishment that looked upon Vietnam as a place to get their service records "punched" before promotion time, will know that our involvement there left much to be desired. But the men who served there cannot be faulted for their service, in our view, even though some returned to this country with political stars in their eyes and made outrageous claims that cannot be substantiated, merely in an effort to gain public attention.

up an anticipated showdown with the tourney's #1 seed and two time defending State Champion Rhett Heartsill of Wall.

Bennett gave his best shot at the best and was no pushover despite losing 6-2, 6-3. What happened in this match under the lights Friday night probably was significant to what would unfold the following day.

Saturday morning Bennett took on the #3 seed Cole Easterling of Post for 3rd Place. Bennett had lost to Easterling in a close match earlier in the season at the Slaton Invitational. The first set was extremely close before Bennett squeezed out a 7-6 win that required a tiebreaker. In the 2nd set Bennett took control and blew to a 6-2 win over the tall and lanky Post Junior. At the same time Heartsill was beating Carillo 6-3, 6-1 in the Championship match. The stage was now set for the "playback" since Carillo was from the other side of the bracket and they had not played each other.

Before the match that would decide the fate of who would represent Region I as the runner-up in Austin, Coach Nixon told Ross, "Go make a memory and live your dream." This would be Ross's last shot at State after making it to Regional the three previous years with teammate David Rodriguez in doubles. Rodriguez was in attendance and pulling hard for his best friend.

Bennett came out strong and jumped out to a 4-0 lead in the first set. Carillo showed why he was the highly touted opponent

by winning the next 5 games to take a 5-4 lead. The Reagan County Junior was one point from winning the initial set when Bennett changed the momentum and battled back like a heavy-weight boxer fighting out of the corner. The hardhitting Whirlwind won the game to even the count at 5-5 and then cruised for two more game wins to claim the first set 7-5.

Carillo was not through. He rebounded by taking the first two games of the 2nd set. Both players requested a banana to help revive their weary legs. Both players down the game to even the stretch reversed line calls on themselves and gave "raquet claps" to each other for phenomenal shots. They were playing the gentlemen's game the way it was intended. Pet and Andre would have been proud.

The match much resembled Center Court at Wimbledon when the Floydada and Reagan County fans would chant words of encouragement after each great play. "Go Ross!" and "You can do it Leonel!" were heard before nearly every serve. Their nicknames of "Pony" (Bennett) and "Pachito" (Carillo) were used frequently.

Ross caught 2nd wind again and won six unanswered games to win the set 6-2 and the match. On the final point Bennett held up his hands and raquet in celebration that a life long dream of going to State had just come true. A Floydada cap from an enthusiastic fan was thrown onto the court to signify the gratifying accomplishment that was just made for FHS. Then over 60 Whirl-

wind fans in green and white covered the east half of the court congratulating Ross, the coaches and the Bennett family. There were frequent chants of "We're going to State!"

Afterwards Assistant Coach Regina Smith said, "He was totally focused and very confident. He will do fine in Austin." Reggie was just one of many who had tears in their eyes.

On the other side of the court was a worn out Leonel standing at the net and still maintaining the smile that is his trademark. Ross graciously acknowledged his worthy foe and friend. Ironically Bennett had spent the night in the Carillo home just two weeks earlier when Floydada played in a Regional Qualifiers Tournament in Big Lake.

Bennett will now advance to U.I.L. State Championships on May 10 and 11 at the University of Texas. The last representatives at State were Jenna Payne and Jessica Castaneda when they won a Silver Medal in girls doubles in 2002.

The reason Bennett had such a large following was because six of his teammates had also qualified for Regional and they all performed very well.

Seniors Melissa Dunlap and Molly Long closed out their career of playing doubles since the 8th grade by advancing to the quarterfinals for the second straight year. Dunlap/Long won their first round match against Andrews/Saldana of Tahoka 6-2, 6-2. They then faced the tourney's #3 seed Ridgeway/Cortinas of Reagan County and fell by scores of 6-3, 6-2 that included a one hour rain delay. The Reagan County duo went on to claim 2nd place to teammates Ridgeway/Aguilar and both will be going to Austin.

Floydada's boys doubles of Tate Greer/Chance Crossland lost in the first round to Baeza/Marques of Fort Stockton 6-2, 7-5. Two girls singles players Rachel Griffin and Lindsey Leatherman also fell in the first round. Griffin lost to Grape Creek's Kate Kuhlman 6-4, 6-1, and Leatherman was downed by the tourney's #2 seed Gretchen

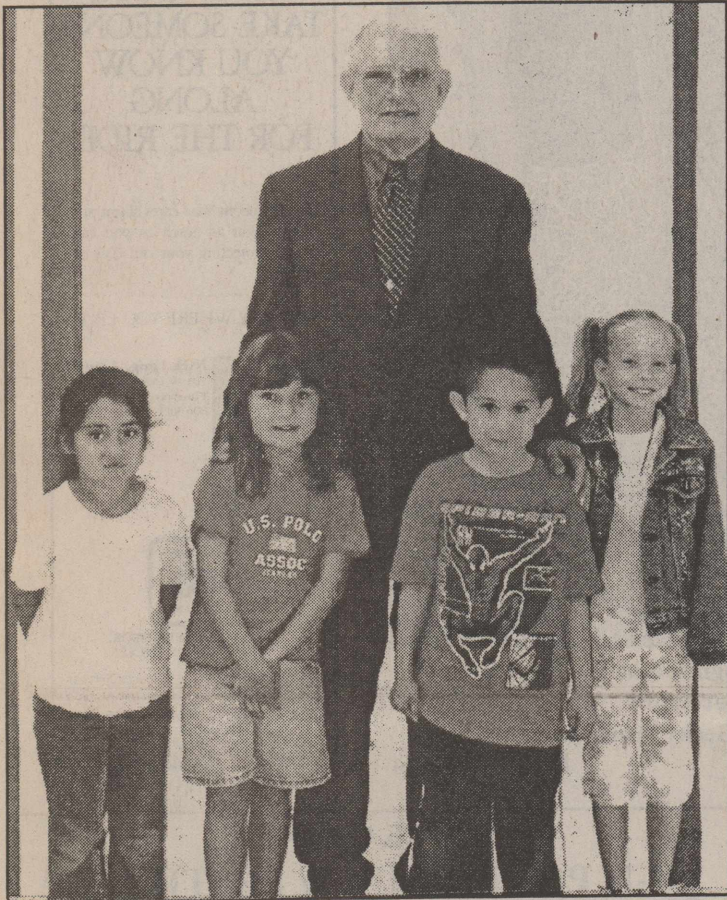

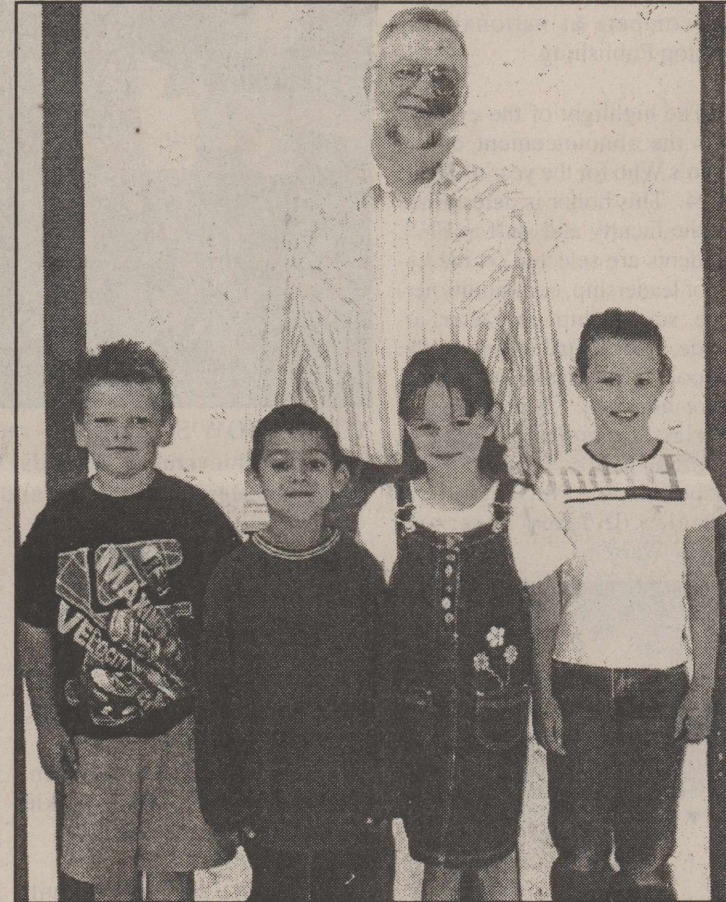

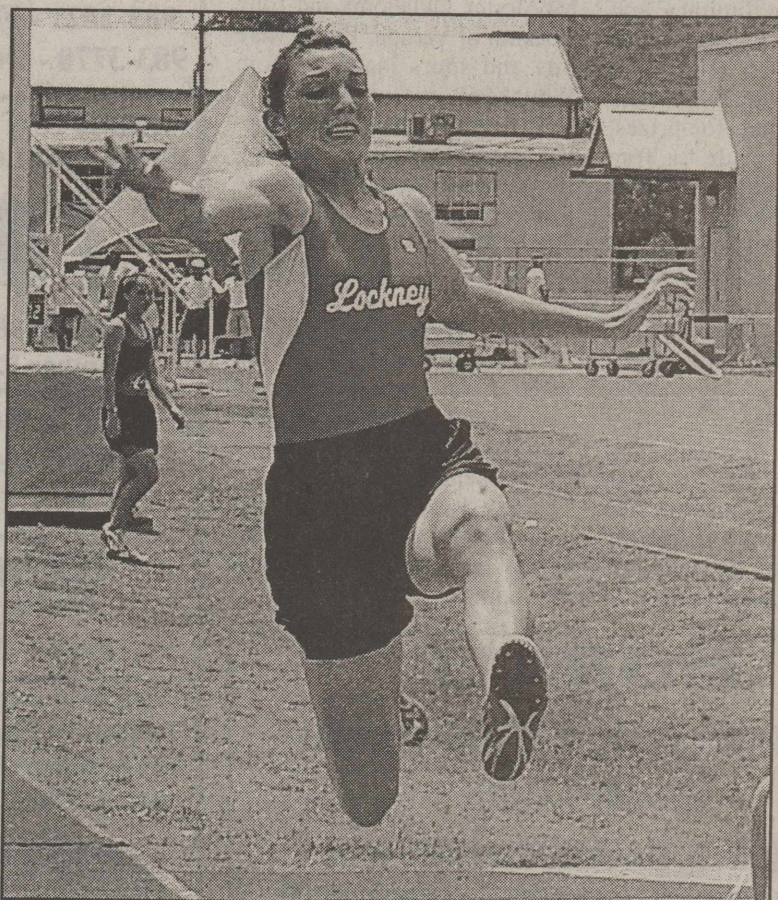

that didn't attend please feel free to stop by at your convenience.

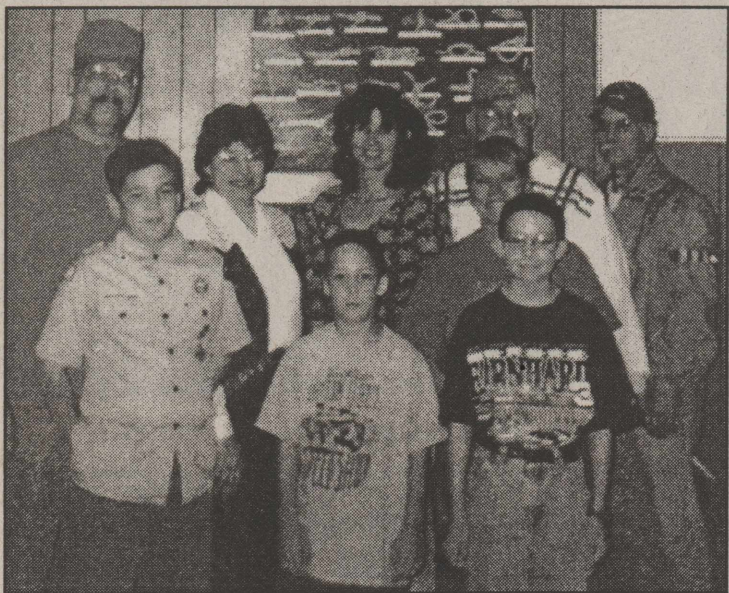
Wheat varieties featured are: TAM 110, Jagalene, Jagger, TAM 200, Cutter, TAM 105 and Dumas.

### New lake record set



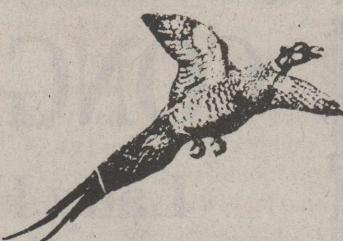

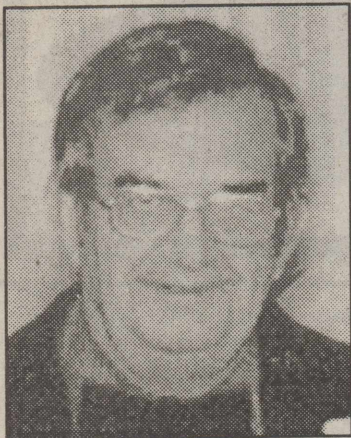

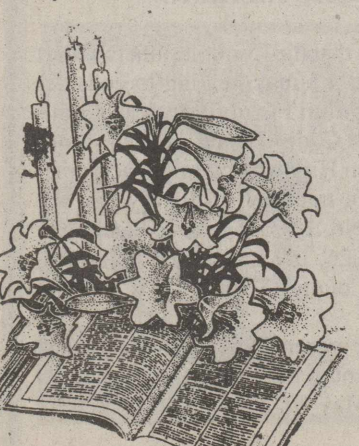
