# How Much More Will I Have To Pay?

If the FISD Bond Election for \$14,500,000.00 Passes, the FISD Taxpayer Will Pay an Additional 27¢ Per \$100 of Valuation on All Property. This is a "debt tax increase to pay off bond" and is over and above the current FISD Tax Rate of \$1.44 per \$100 valuation. This is a 30 year Payback Period. (Remember that all

homeowners receive a \$15,000 mandatory Homestead Exemption-if they sign up. For example: A \$50,000 home is only taxed on \$35,000 (\$50,000 - \$15,000 = \$35,000 Taxable Value). Those 65 years and older have a \$25,000 Homestead Exemption. The example below shows the increase in taxation on homes only--it does not include farm land or other property.

# Citizens question **Board on future bond election**

The FISD Board met Tuesday, June 8, in regular session and unanimously approved to hold a Bond Election on September 11, 2004. The election will be for the purpose to let Floydada citizens decide whether to go ahead with the proposed \$14.5 million FISD Facility Renovation and Demolition Plan.

Several local citizens were present expressing their opinions during Open Forum and asking questions concerning the bond election proposal before the board voted.

Master Plan is very specific, but it concerns me, as a voter and a tax payer, what are you going to do with the old facilities (R.C. Andrews Elementary and Floydada Junior High School) that will not be used anymore. I would like to know, before the bond election, what are you going to do with them. Do you plan on continuing to use them or demolish them? I would like to have an estimate of what kind of cost that will be either way and how you are going to fund that."

Carthel reminded the board about the \$700,000 demolition

estimate given by Superintendent Jerry Vaughn at the last board meeting. "To make a good decision on this issue, I think the tax payers ought to know what you are going to do with the old fa-

Another issue Carthel asked the board to consider was to hold the Bond Election on November 2, the General Election date, instead of September 11. "The turn out should be the greatest on that date. I would think that would give the best indicator of what the public wants to do. I think it is your job to let the public decide. Floydada citizen Hulon You need the majority of voters Carthel asked the board, "Your to turn out for this. Thirty years is a long time to pay on these bonds. Advertise it.'

Carthel asked, "How many voters do you think will turn out on September 11, how many on November 2, and how many FISD employees are there?" Following some discussion, Board Member Kerry Pratt agreed that about 300 voters would be "a good turn out" for September 11, and about 500 for November 2.

Superintendent Vaughn responded, "We have 194 employ-


Carthel said, "Then I think that would definitely influence

the vote on September 11. If the bond election fails, the board can call another bond election, but if it passes, the people cannot do anything (to reverse it)."

Joyce Williams, Ray Nell Bearden asked questions about the raising of property taxes for seniors living on fixed incomes, the declining of school enrollment and the cost of renovations to all the existing buildings.

Vaughn responded to Carthel's questions about the old structures. "If you notice the bond total previously was \$14,000,000. We have raised it to \$14,5 00,000 to cover the cost of demolition. I think the old structures should be torn down because the insurance on them is astronomical when they are vacant. Renovations will cost more according to our studies. The north part of R.C. Andrews Elementary could be used as an activity center. The Junior High cafeteria and gym could both be saved and used for other purposes. You as a board will make those decisions. A safety issue is involved."

# Homeland Security gives Floyd County equipment

The Floyd County Commissioners met Monday, June 14, and unanimously approved a Homeland Security 'Memorandum of Health Understanding Alert' between Floyd County and Texas Department of Public Health Region I.

Floyd County Judge William D. Hardin told the commissioners, "One of the two computers sent to us will be located at the Sheriff's Office. Someone will be on alert 24/7. We are still waiting on the software. The other computer will be installed here at the court house. This has to do with homeland security."

In a related matter, a public hearing was held to review and receive comment on the South Plains Regional Mitigation Action Plan (a FEMA approved plan). According to Judge Hardin, this involves a \$28,782 grant to be used for the purchase of equipment for the Sheriff's Office, the Department of Public Safety, the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department and the Floydada Volunteer Fire Department. \$23,782 worth of equipment has already been distributed.

According to Hardin, safety Xtreme vests, tactical thermal goggles, millennium masks, ballistic helmets and Hurst tools and bagging equipment, Raid gar-

ments and Magellan GPS has been distributed to the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department - valued' at \$9,949.30; the Floydada Volunteer Fire Department - valued at \$8,637.05; the Floydada Sheriff's Office - valued at \$4,686.90; and the DPS - valued at \$360.00.

The commissioners approved the deputation and an official bond for Chelsea Kirk working in the Floyd County Tax and Voter Registration office at the courthouse.

The court approved a Texas County and District Retirement System Plan for county employees. This matching retirement plan increased from 150 percent county matching dollars for the employee to 175 percent matching. Hardin said, "This will increase the county's payment by

about \$300 per month. The commissioners transferred \$52,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund into the four precincts work funds at \$13,000

A bid by Bill Daniels of \$2.00 each for the county's used motor grader blades was approved by the court.

Five farm contracts were approved. They were: Pct. 1, farm terraces in a lake for a pivot, 15 miles south of Floydada, by James Hale; Pct. 4, bury old im-

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

# Food protection management training to be offered soon

Texas Cooperative Extension, is offering a food manager certification training. This program will be offered for \$79 on July 22nd and 23rd at the Ollie Liner Center in Plainview. Cost includes training, materials, and the State food manager certification examination. Melissa Long, County Extension Agent - Family and Consumer Sciences for Floyd County and Deana Sageser, County Extension Agent - Family and Consumer Sciences for Hale County will serve as instructors for the course.

This program is designed to not only prepare foodservice managers to pass the certification examination; it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied.

During a recent legislative session, a statute was amended that allowed the Texas Department of Health (TDH) to require each food establishment to have one certified food manager.

Recently, the Texas Board of

ment this statute. Many have already received a letter from the Texas Department of Health regarding this. Under these new rules, each food establishment permitted by the Texas Department of Health must have one certified food manager. New food manager certificates will be valid for 5 years.

By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn

• identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling

• preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food · teaching and encouraging

personal hygiene for employees complying with government

• maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings controlling pests

Foodborne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices. For more information about the Food Protection Management training program contact Texas Cooperative Extension in Hale County at 291-5271 or Floyd County at 983-4912. 

Diabetes is characterized by high levels of blood sugar (glucose). Blood sugar level is controlled by Insulin, a hormone produced in the pancreas that helps glucose get into each cell. While most of the food we eat is turned into glucose to provide energy, in diabetics, either the body doesn't make enough insulin or it cannot each diabetic. It is important to use insulin very well causing glucose to build up in the blood.

Symptoms of diabetes include always being thirsty and urinating a lot, especially at night, Blurred vision comes and goes, along with feeling tired, weight loss, dry skin, slow healing, and numbness or tingling in toes or amputations, dental disease, feet. Not everyone will experience all of these symptoms.

Risk factors include a family history of diabetes, lack of regular exercise, being overweight, and being of African American, American Indian, Hispanic/ Mexican or Asian heritage. Research has found that people can lower the risk and delay onset of diabetes by eating a balanced diet, controlling weight, and by exercising regularly.

Diabetes is not curable, but it is treatable. Many diabetics who control the disease live long, productive lives. Treatment is designed for each person depending on the type and severity of the disease. People with Type 1

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# FISD bond election discussed by board

tion, Vaughn asked Vince Vialle of First Southwest Company of Lubbock to respond to that question. Vialle explained that it was needed in order for the FISD board to have time to get the 2004-2005 FISD budget and Tax Rate set before the end of the year. "This is needed to get the State EDA 60 percent funding in January for this project. If you miss the deadline, then it will be 2007 before you can apply for it again. The EDA funding may not be there in 2007. Without the EDA funding, no more bonds would be sold and any existing bonds would be payed off early,' Vialle said.

Vialle explained that the 30 year payback through year 2035 on \$14,500,000 bonds sold would be an average of \$390,000 yearly to be paid by FISD. This amount is based on an interest rate of 5.5 percent, a Taxable Assessed Valuation of \$149,828,606 yearly average and a Tax Collection rate of 97 per-

According to Vialle, there is no FISD "debt taxes" being paid by the taxpayers now because FISD is out of debt. Vialle suggested a debt tax rate to be set at \$.27 cents per \$100 property valuation, if the bond election

According to the Floyd County Tax Appraiser office, if the bond issue passes and the tax rate for interest and sinking bond fund debt is set at \$.27 cents, there will be a tax rate increase to the local tax payer. This debt tax would be an increase of \$94.50 on a \$50,000 home; an increase of \$121.50 on a \$60,000 home; an increase of \$148.50 on a \$70,000 home; an increase of \$175.50 on a \$80,000 home; an increase of \$202.50 on a \$90,000 home; and an increase of \$229.50 on a \$100,000 home.

Concerning any tax increases, Vaughn said, "Senior citizens' tax rates will be frozen and not raised." He gave an example of a possible tax increase, over and above the debt tax increase. "If school taxes went from the appraised value is \$1,000. present local budget tax rate of would increase in school taxes by \$604 per year."

Board Member Bart Greer said, "I should show up to vote, If I don't want to pay the extra \$604. I would like to see our tax rate lower.'

Concerning tax increases, Board President Mitch Probasco said, "If everything stayed the same, there would be no increase, but things don't stay the same. Salaries are our biggest expense. If the bond election fails, our school district's problems are not going away. In four or five years, our problems will cost more to fix. You cannot keep turning your back on your problems.'

Board Secretary Bill Dean said, "Our tax rate will probably

increase to \$1.50 anyway within a couple of years.'

Vaughn added, "Our studies show we have to bring our buildings up to code. An example of a public facility not being up to code is the jail. The longer wepostpone this, the more it will cost us. We have not been cited

by the fire inspector yet, but we do have electrical wiring problems and we need to fire proof the wood construction. We are trying to improve on our efficiency. With this (Facility Plan) our \$400,000 a year savings will be in place. We need to get into this EDA funding cycle.

Board Member Rachael Castillo asked, "Can we (board members) educate the public on

Vaughn said, "Yes, you can, but the FISD Administration cannot. We can only present the facts and answer questions with facts only."

Board Secretary Dean made the motion to approve September 11th as FISD bond election day and Board Member Mark McCormick seconded it. Before the vote Board Member Pratt stated that he appreciated Carthel's comments, but he disagreed with him on the date. Board Member Castillo made the comment that she was glad to find out that board members could educate the public. The motion unanimously passed.

In a related matter, the board unanimously approved the appointments of: Laveta Morren, Early Election Ballot Clerk; Kelli Reddy, Early Election Ballot Deputy Clerk; Kay Crabtree, Early Ballot and Election Judge; and Maybelle Monreal, Early Ballot and Election Alternate

In other matters and upon the recommendation of Superintendent Vaughn, the board approved a salary schedule for auxiliary personnel. Vaughn said, "Some of our employees have the same job description and the same years of experience, but different salaries. We need a sliding scale across the board. Everyone will get a pay raise based on job description and a pay scale. Last year they got a 5 percent raise and this year they received a 4 percent raise."

Scattered storms over the past week have provided more than a few producers with just what they needed in terms of moisture to either germinate recently planted seed or to keep young stands adequately supplied with moisture.

storms brought some people more than they bargained for when they sent in their request for rain. As a result some producers are dealing with crop loss situations and the need to move forward with crop insurance claims on damaged or destroyed acreage.

Each year when these situations arise the potential for confusion exists as producers and insurance providers begin wading through the rules to determine what can or cannot be done and

While the 2004 crop year includes a new rule that applies to secondary crops and insurance coverage, the provisions that apply to appraisals on crops remain unchanged. For crops damaged or lost to adverse weather events, or that fail to emerge, the rules remain the same as they were in

The most confusing situations generally involve non-emerged seed. Over the past couple of years there have been several changes in the rules that apply to non-emerged seed and how acreage that is caught in this situa-

For emerged crops the rules have not changed significantly for several years and allow for timely appraisal of damaged or destroyed acreage, especially if that damage occurs after the applicable final planting date.

Generally speaking any crop planted before the final planting date that emerges to a stand is eligible to receive an adjustment almost immediately after the loss event is reported to the insurance company.

In order to allow for a proper evaluation most appraisals are scheduled 3-5 days after the damage report is received. This allows the adjuster to see how well crop. damaged acreage rebounds from

The bottom-line for producers that have recently lost standing cotton to high winds, localized flooding or hail is that a minimal waiting period can be expected before an adjustment is Unfortunately, those same made, but the process can be put into motion immediately after the damage report is submitted to insurance.

For producers that have cotton in the ground but do not receive adequate moisture to bring the crop to a stand, insurance ruled are different and require a specific waiting period after the final planting date before an appraisal can be scheduled.

For non-emerged seed the current rule states that no adjustment can be made until after the end of an 8-day deferred appraisal period that begins at the end of the crop's late planting period. For cotton, that means that non-emerged acreage cannot be appraised for 23 days after the applicable final planting date.

For counties with a June 5 final planting date, insurance appraisals on non-emerged acreage will begin no sooner than June 28. For counties with a June 10 final planting date appraisals cannot begin until July 3.

In the past the additional waiting period after the 15-day late planting period has been revised by RMA. Whether or not a similar relief from the rules will be allowed in 2004 has yet to be determined although it appears the situation could develop that warrants such consideration.

New double insurance provision adds new twist for 2004

While the rules that pertain to crop damage and appraisals have not changed from 2003-2004, there has been one important change that will affect producers who lose crops early in the 2004

The crux of the change in- claim check is cashed

volves the implementation of a new "double insurance" provision that was originally included in the Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000. The purpose for the new rule is to prevent a producer from collecting crop insurance indemnity payments for multiple crop losses on the same acre in the same crop year.

The final rule, as implemented, requires for the first time that growers who lose their first insured crop may only receive 35% of the calculated indemnity (and only pay 35% of the first crop premium) if they elect to plant a second insured crop on the same acreage.

In an attempt to provide more discretion to the grower that incurs an early season loss, Plains Cotton Growers and the National Cotton Council worked with the Risk Management Agency to craft an alternative that gives the growers more flexibility.

The result of that effort was inclusion of an option that the grower can exercise to receive 100% of the first crop indemnity if they elect not to insure a subsequent crop on the acreage during the balance of the growing season.

Growers that lose crops early in the season have the following options. They can: 1) Opt not to take insurance on a subsequently planted crop. This option is to be exercised on a unit-by-unit basis and the producer must make their insurance provider aware of their decision before the acreage reporting date for the second crop or when the claim is signed for the first insured crop; or, 2) Insure the second crop, but decline to accept any second crop claim payment. Producers who insure a second crop but later choose not to accept payment for a second crop claim will receive the re-In 2004 growers who wish to maining 65% of their first crop claim less the remaining 65% of the premium due on the first crop and 100% of the premium due on the second crop. Producers may decline to accept a second crop indemnity up until the time the

Currently, there are no soil chemicals labeled for this pest in cucurbits as carbofuran (Furadan®) granules were abolished in 1994. The only control is cultural, leaving the soil fallow or waiting until the majority of adults have emerged prior to planting any crop - they just happen to be in cucurbits in this case



trol ABC, CBS and NBC. This is the reason it is impossible to elect a 100% conservative president like Douglas McArthur, Goldwater and Pat


