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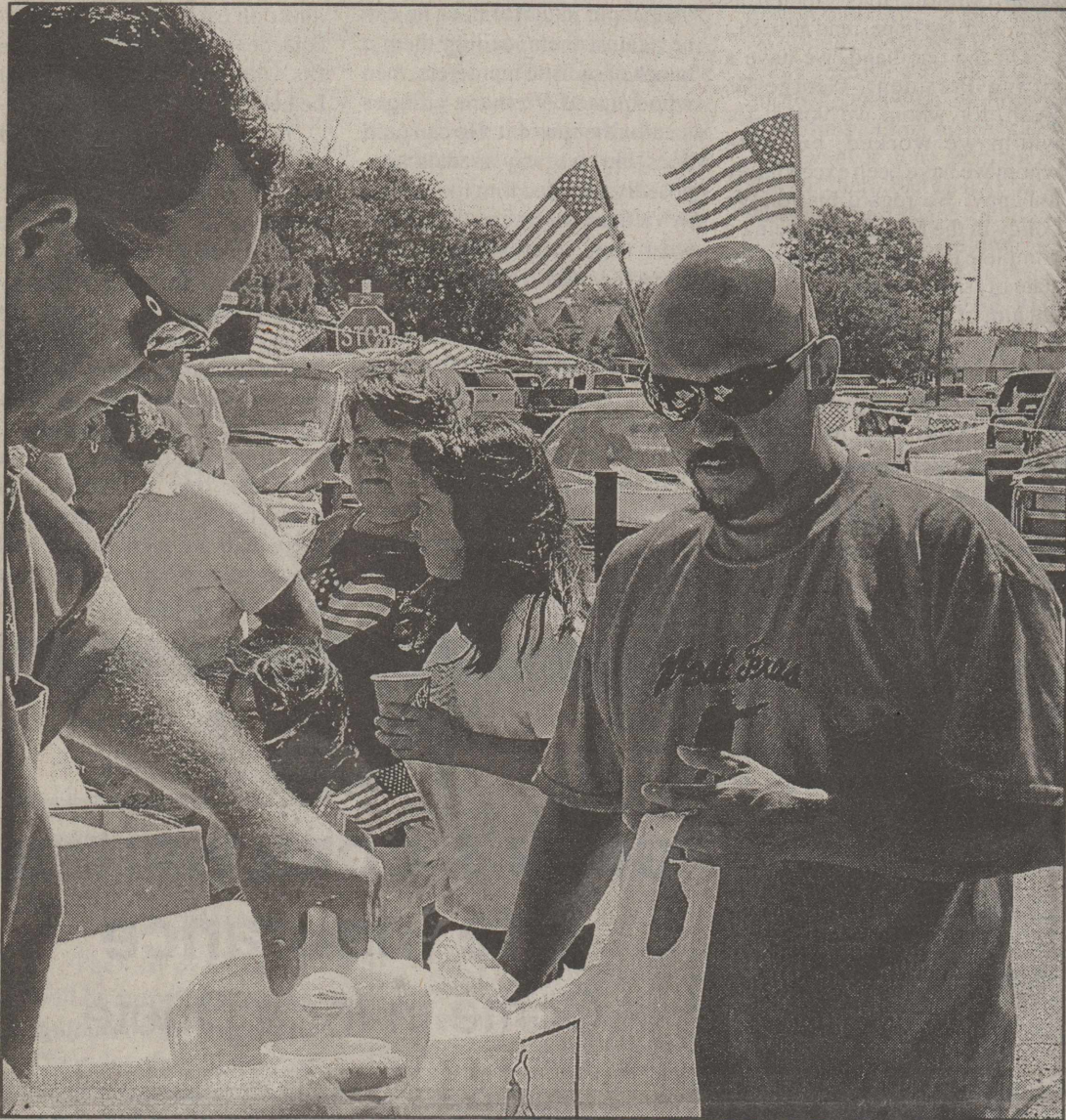

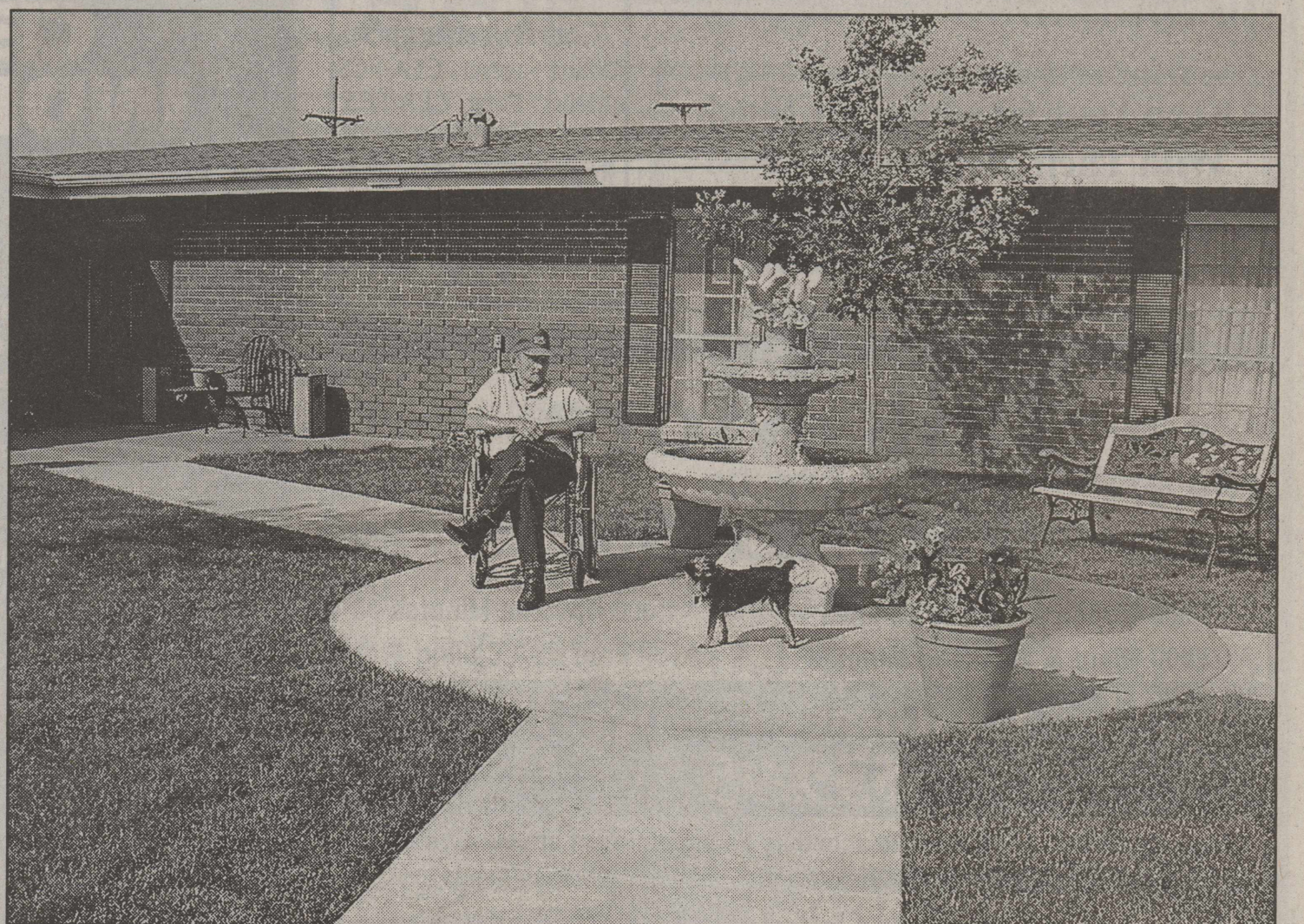

I recently received my monthly "Imprimis" newspaper from Hillsdale College and found an interesting speech from Philip F. Anschutz.

I won't go into all of Mr. Anschutz credentials because they are too lengthy, but he did recently decide to start producing movies-much to his wife's chagrin.

He said he got tired of complaining about the movies coming out of Hollywood and he wanted to make a difference.

He has recently produced *Holes* and the new *Around the World in Eighty Days*. He will soon be releasing a series of movies from C.S. Lewis', *Narnia Chronicles*. He makes entertaining films with life-affirming and moral messages that families can see together.

Mr. Anschutz said, "Since the year 2000, Hollywood has turned out more than 5 times as many R-rated films as it has films rated G or PG or soft PG-13. No less than 2,146 films released since 2000 received R ratings, compared to 137 films rated G and 252 films rated PG.

"Is this preponderance of R-rate films--as we hear so often--a response to the market? I would say not, considering that of the top 20 moneymaking films of all time, not a single one is rated R, and of the top 50, only five are rated R--with the remainder being G or PG. Don't these figures make you wonder what's wrong with Hollywood just from a business point of view? Why, in the face of these statistics, does Hollywood keep putting out so many non-family oriented movies?"

Anschutz said he has found that Hollywood has the idea that you have to grow up in the film business to understand it and to have the right creative instincts for it, and to get attention you have to utilize shock value.

So basically Hollywood is full of elitist snobs who are out of touch with the rest of the world.

I imagine you are now thinking, "Tell me something else I already know!"

Anyway, it is nice to know there is at least one man in Hol-

lywood trying to make a difference.

# The Lamplighter

What do we do now? Election day is, as they say, fast approaching. It will soon be time to make that fateful decision: Who do we want to occupy the White House for the next four years?

We have never been, and we are not now, in that camp with people who hypocritically urge others to "go down and vote", even if they don't know who they are voting for or why they are voting. The vote of any citizen is too precious to waste on an uninformed vote. The "why" of our vote is easy to determine. We've gone through another memorial day, in which we pay tribute to those who fell in various wars so we could vote if we wanted to, and we've just gone through another July 4th Independence Day celebration, so we can be reminded of the reasons we have to make that choice. But who to vote for is another thing. Who, in other words, will fulfill the promise of the "why."

Quite frankly, we are still of mixed minds about the upcoming elections, as far as the Presidency is concerned. We have spent a lifetime trying to give folks a choice, or at least more of a choice than they had when the only choice we had was when

the Democratic Party presented us with a list of candidates to vote for. And, if we didn't vote the way we were supposed to, in some cases our vote was cast for us. South Texas during the days of LBJ testify to that. In company with a lot of other people, we have been modestly successful in creating an atmosphere in which a little more choice is available. Now we have more choices, but the decision is no less difficult. In fact, if anything, it is more difficult.

On the national level, our choice is not as simple as it looks. (And, we will say before we go further, that this column, like all our columns, is a matter of personal opinion. It is labeled as such, and, we hope, read as such.)

On the one hand, we have a sitting President, George W. Bush, for whom we voted, for whom we worked, but with whom we have been exceedingly unhappy. We regard his foreign policy in the Mid-East as being a complete disaster, in thrall to the state of Israel, without any coherent aim of its own. We regard his immigration policies (we use the plural, because we can't figure out exactly what his single immigration policy is, if he has one)

to be a disaster in all respects save one...politics...and even in the world of politics, we can't understand it, or them. At bottom, we cannot escape the feeling that the sitting President, George W. Bush, was in a psychological war with his own father during his formative years, not at all unlike many others of his generation, and that psychological war, which could well be called a generational war, in our opinion guides many of his actions.

On the other hand, we have a Democratic standard bearer in John F. Kerry, whom we regard as a complete fraud, from beginning to end. When it suits his political needs he can be either for the people in uniform, or he can be against them, calling them a bunch of sadistic murderers, men who burned Vietnam villages just for the fun of it. He can (and does) throw away medals supposedly awarded him for service in Vietnam, or he can (and does) wear them, ostensibly proudly, when the occasion demands. In other words, he can, and does, preach (and vote) that the earth is either flat or round, depending on the political winds of the moment. In short, John Kerry simply cannot be trusted. That may suit many people, who see shiftiness as the true mark of a successful politician, but it does not suit us, nor, I believe, does it suit people who look for charac-

ter in any person seeking public office.

The list of differences and similarities goes on. In sum, we suppose it illustrates the dilemma constantly posed by the electoral process. Is it better to have a principled man (or woman) in office who can commit American troops to battle, even though he (or she) sometimes makes stupid decisions, or is it better to have in that office a slippery liar (like Bill Clinton) even though he probably will make better decisions, even if he cannot tell the difference between "is" and "is not." And even if his decisions are constantly subject to change, or differing explanations? It is a question each voter will have to consider and decide on. Who best fits what the voter decides will be best for the country?

In our own case, we are still of a mixed mind. How things play out between now and election day will make a difference, to us. We do not see any way we could ever vote for John F. Kerry, simply because I would see that as an endorsement of his stupid, baseless, charges against American servicemen in the 70's. But on the other hand, whether we vote for Bush, or abstain on that particular line, will depend on many factors. In the meantime, there will be many races here closer to home in which there will be no ambiguity.

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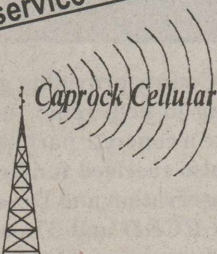
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# Silverton feeds an army

You have always heard, "We had enough food to feed an army," but you really didn't know exactly how much that really was. However, thanks to the fine citizens of Silverton and the 75th Field Artillery Division we now know the answer to that question: 1010 sandwiches, 31 freezers of homemade ice cream, 100 dozen cookies and brownies, enough Coke to float the battleship "Texas" and enough Cheetos to finger-paint it orange when they were done.

For over thirty years, those of us who have grown up in this area have watched convoy after convoy roll down Highway 256 until it linked up with Highway 86 then on through Silverton and Tulia until they reached New Mexico for a week or two of war games. From time to time, groups of 25-50 soldiers would stop on the square at the courthouse in Silverton and eat their lunch beneath the shade of the old elm trees surrounding the courthouse. On their last trip through on the way to New Mexico someone talked to the soldiers and found out they were training for Iraq and would be shipping out in the

next three weeks.

On their way back to Fort Sill, we witnessed the citizens of Silverton put on one of the most sincere out flowings of personal

thanks we have ever seen a community demonstrate. It should have been the front page story of every newspaper in the country and it should have been the lead for every national news broadcast in the country. For the first time, many of these young men received a demonstrable re-sounding "thank you" from people they did not know. From old to young, from male to female, every citizen in Silverton participated in the biggest, best picnic you have ever seen in your life.

It began like this. As the soldiers first entered Silverton they were greeted by the flag-waving kindergarten class bearing signs of support. The soldiers all smiled and waved back, preparing to make the turn so they could stretch their legs and enjoy a fine meal of freeze dried pork chop heated in a brown plastic bag. But when they made that final turn, they were greeted by a 60-foot sign of support hung on the Volunteer Fire Department's tanker and throngs of small town Americans eager to say thank you and serve them homemade food instead of something out of a plastic bag the color of mud. The elementary classes showed up with pictures they had painted and made for the men and women (most not much more than boys and girls themselves).

As they mingled with the crowd the personal stories began to come out.

One man (obviously not from around here) said he had never had homemade ice cream before as he tried to balance the three styrofoam cups on one hand as he ate and tried to pull himself into the Humvee with the other. One soldier latched on to Trena Burson's grandbaby, and as he cuddled and bounced the baby he told of how he had one just this size at home that he had not seen or held yet. He said he was the lucky one though because it was his second child. Many of the boys here had yet to see their first born. As they watched and talked to the school kids, they answered questions and made reference to their kids at home that were just about their age. They gladly swapped their MRE's (meal ready to eat) with the kids for another sandwich or brownie. The commanding officer said no one had ever done anything like this for them before and he was surprised and thankful. Before one group left, the children stood on the east courthouse steps and sang "God Bless America" as part of the convoy rolled off only to be joined by the troops in a second chorus. There was truly not a dry eye on the courthouse lawn. We have done so little for a group of people who have given so much more for us. If you find yourself in a position where you are able, do something to let these men and women know they are loved and appreciated by all of us.



**IN NEED OF WHEELCHAIR**--Carol Eldridge, age 40, has lived with Cerebral Palsy since birth. In her case, she does have some limited movement in her arms, but none in her legs. "My mind tells my legs to move, but my legs don't hear it," said Carol with a smile. It has also affected her speech and eyesight. Born in Coos Bay, Oregon, she moved to Texas with her family. She has lived at Lockney Health and Rehab Center for the last nine years. In the past, her only mobility came from a specialized wheelchair that would support her head and keep her body in an upright position. That wheelchair has worn out and now Carol is limited to laying in her bed or on the recliner next to her bed. Carol enjoys crocheting, watching Christian TV programs, and listening to Christian music. Her other favorite activities, visiting with her neighbors and participating in the Center's programs, have been curtailed without her wheelchair. 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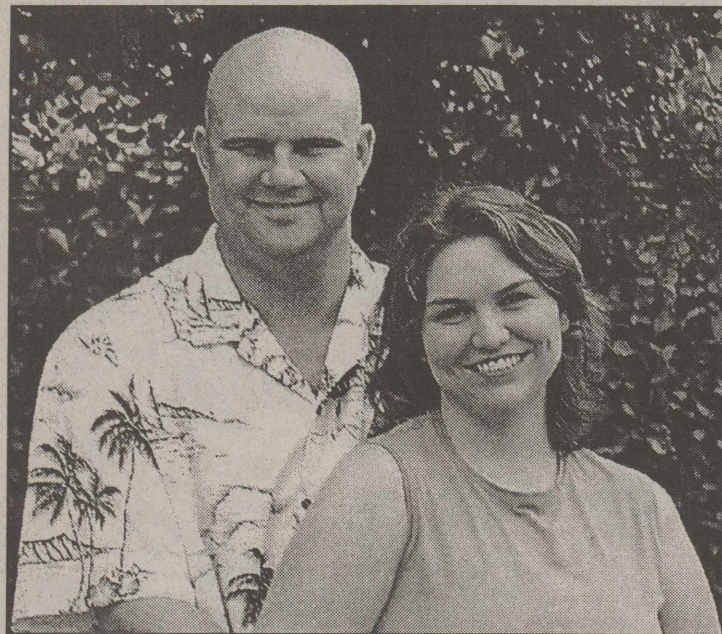

## Breakfast with Mamie at Virginia's

Did you know there were 7,500 varieties of apples, five seeds in the average apple and five grams of fiber in each apple and that the state of Washington grows the most apples in the United States?

Over 100 guests and hostesses learned this and much more about apples, the theme for the annual "Breakfast with Mamie Wood" held on June 9, 2004 at the home of Virginia Taylor.

The theme of apples prevailed in sight and smell in Virginia's backyard where the trees, table decorations and baskets were filled with apples. Even the hostesses wore apple costumes. Apple delicacies to delight the palate included apple fruit plates, apple cider, apple and sausage balls and apple and cinnamon toast, to mention but a few. (The hostesses discovered that there are almost as many recipes for apple dishes as there are varieties of apples.)

Virginia Taylor, mistress of ceremonies, introduced guest speaker, Susan Brints, whose family owns and operates Apple Country, which includes a 22 acre apple orchard, bakery, cafe, gift shop and country store. Susan told the group that her family grows 30 different apple varieties and that the family and staff provide guided tours

through the orchard to explain to visitors the importance of bees and pollination to apple trees, pruning and maintaining apples, cider production and harvest.

Susan said that throughout apple harvesting time (July through November, depending upon the variety of apple desired), visitors can pick their own apples. She also said that she eats an apple a day, one of the few fruits that is available year round. Apple Country is located on Highway 62-82 just a few miles east of Idalou and has an open-year-round buffet lunch Monday-Saturday.

Following Susan's presentation, Virginia announced that it was apple pickin' time, read the winning numbers for the door prizes, instructed each winner to pick an artificial apple that the hostesses had attached to one of the trees and find the corresponding number of the prize on the prize table.

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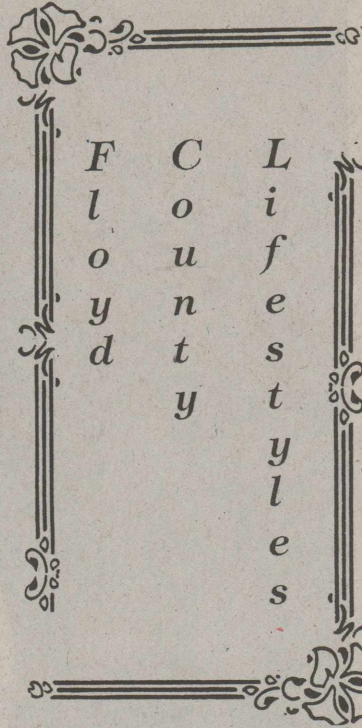

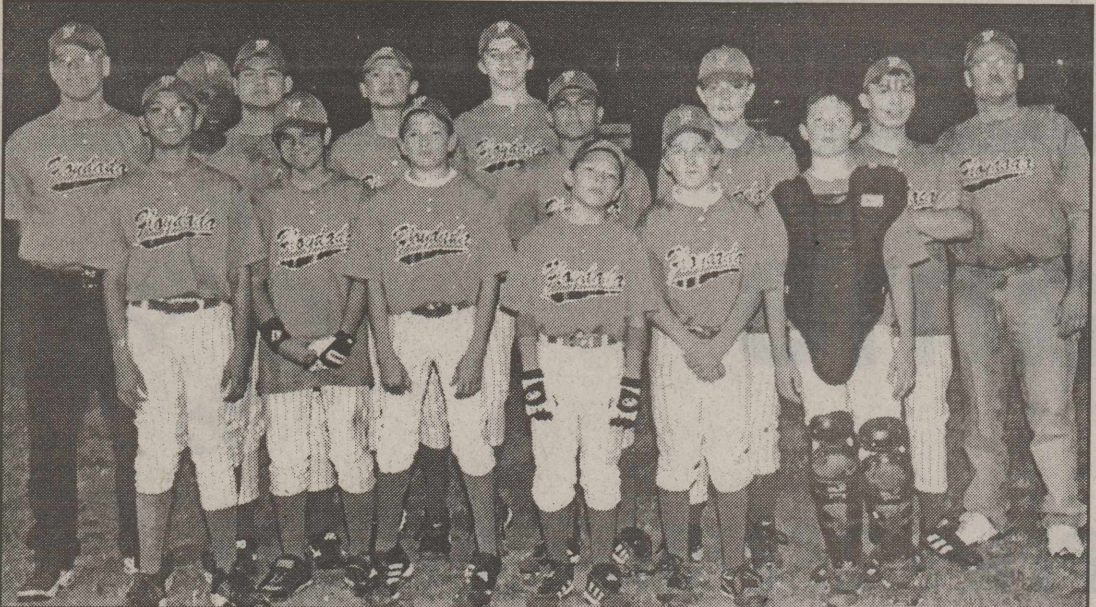

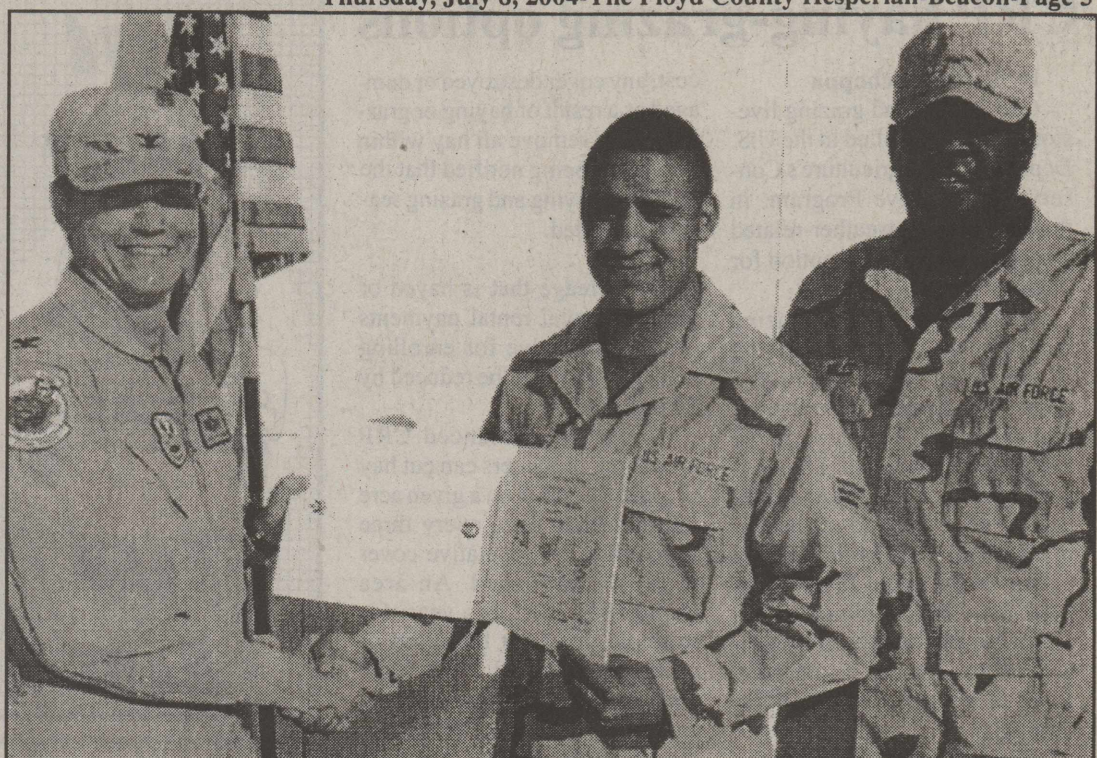

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## CRP haying-grazing options

Cutting hay and grazing livestock on land enrolled in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program, in the absence of a weather-related emergency, is now an option for Texas producers.

Managed haying and grazing is allowed on CRP lands. Haying is approved in Texas July 2 through September 29 and grazing is approved beginning July 2 and ending October 29. The starting date for both haying and grazing is tied to the end of the primary nesting and brood rearing season in the state. Prior to the 2002 Farm Bill, commercial use of CRP land was generally prohibited except for weather-related emergencies such as droughts.

To take advantage of the haying and grazing options, producers must modify existing conservation plans for the CRP acreage to include managed haying and grazing practices. The plans must be developed in conjunction with USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) or one of its technical service providers.

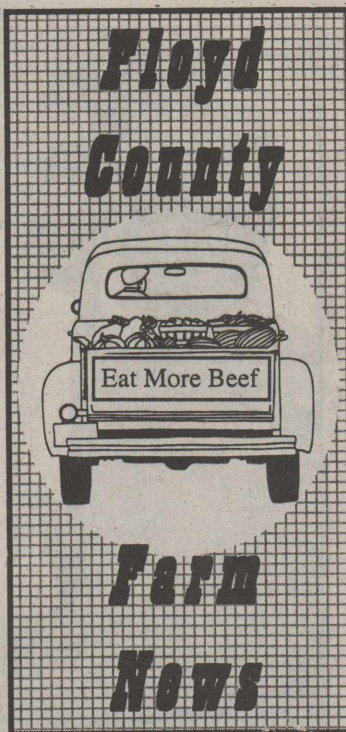
Producers must also agree to certain terms and conditions, including signing an agreement to reestablish, at the producer's own

cost, any cover destroyed or damaged as a result of haying or grazing and to remove all hay within 10 days of being notified that the managed haying and grazing season has ended.

For acreage that is hayed or grazed, annual rental payments producers receive for enrolling land into CRP will be reduced by 25 percent.

Under this enhanced CRP provision, producers can cut hay or graze livestock on a given acre no more than once every three years after the vegetative cover is fully established. An area hayed or grazed this year, for example, may not be hayed or grazed again until 2007. CRP participants can choose to hay or graze their entire CRP acreage in the first year, or only a portion of their CRP acreage each year. Producers may not harvest hay and graze livestock on the same land in the same year.

The managed haying and grazing option provides producers latitude when making land management decisions regarding their operations. The periodic disturbance of vegetative cover under managed haying and grazing will increase the diversity and quality of the cover and improve wildlife benefits.



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## Patronage distribution benefits GPAC stockholder borrowers

The Board of Directors of Great Plains Ag Credit, ACA has declared a \$662,000 cash patronage distribution to its stockholder borrowers, the largest amount in the lending cooperative's history according to Carroll Haygood, the agricultural lending cooperative's president. It was reported that a total of \$5.8 million in earnings has been allocated through GPAC's allocation of earnings program since the 2000 year. Such cash distributions defray interest costs to both short and long term borrowers, according to the release.

GPAC, which is headquartered in Amarillo, provides short-term loans through its Production Credit Association and real estate loans through its Federal Land Bank Association throughout the Panhandle and upper South Plains. Other loan offices are in Plainview, Dalhart, Dimmitt, Dumas, Friona, Olton, Muleshoe, and Tulia.

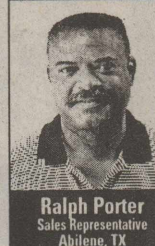
