Schacht enjoys 4-H farm trip to Greece

Floydada High School senior Spencer Schacht, spent three weeks in Greece as part of the International 4-H Student Exchange Program. Spencer has been a 4-H member for the past 9 years.

Spencer, the son of Clar and Judy Schacht of Floydada, was one of four 4-Her's selected from the state of Texas to participate in the exchange program. The trip, from June 21 through July 10, was sponsored by the Texas Cooperative Extension and the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

The first week, Spencer visited the American Farm School in Thessaloniki, Greece. The school was founded over 100 years ago by an American and is dedicated to promoting the latest agricultural technology on the 320 acre farm. This year they were celebrating their centennial year.

"We stayed in a large dormitory-like guest house with twenty to thirty rooms, with two boys per room. There was a large dining area. We ate fresh eggs for breakfast every morning. On this farm they used garden tractors in their vineyards, olive orchards and vegetable gardens. They raised lots of sheep dogs, dairy cows, pigs, chickens, cattle, goats and sheep," said Spencer.

During this first week, Spencer said they were given language lessons and traditional dancing lessons that are performed at birthdays, anniversaries, weddings and any special gatherings.

There was wine tasting from the local vineyards, where they learned pruning and weeding. They visited an organic vegetable farm that grew corn, okra and all sorts of vegetables.

Saturday, at the nearby beach, they spent about half a day swimming. "Later that day we hiked

around 200 meters into the Pretolona Cave, where the first Homo sapien in Europe was discovered. It was about like Carlsbad Caverns," Spencer said.

Back at the farm school, Spencer said, "They had a graduation ceremony in connection with their centennial celebration. It was not much different than what we have here."

Spencer said he spent the second week with his host family in Nea Peramos. The family of four, consisted of the father, Cristos Poursatidis, a mother, a son named George, and daughter. Nea Peramos is a village about 90 miles from the American farm.

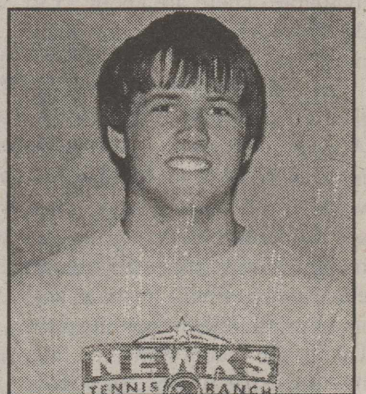
"George was an exchange student with a family in Houston during spring break," said Spencer.

"Cristos is an architect and he has built this three story apartment building. They (the host family) live on the top floor with three bedrooms and two baths. I was given a private bedroom to stay in."

George took Spencer on a tour of nearby Phillipi and the area by scooter. They went swimming every day, and Cristos took them to visit the ruins of King Phillip's castle. "King Phillip was the father of Alexander The Great. We stood where the Apostle Paul stood. We visited Aggitis Cave, which is the second largest in the world with a river running through it. It also had bats, stalagmites and gold specs in the sand."

"The Greek people were very hospitable. We ate a lot of sea food, because we were so near the ocean. My favorite food is their Tzatziki sauce made of yogurt, cucumbers and garlic. It goes on everything, meats or salads."

During this second week Spencer said, "We traveled about

30 miles by bus to Kavala, a port city of about 50,000, where we visited an archeological museum and went snorkeling on the beach. I had my goggles on and the water was very clear. I saw this rock that looked like it was breathing. I went over close to it, and thought 'whoa', this is an octopus. I had found a live octopus. It freaked me out! A bigger one was swimming nearby. George speared the smaller one and it squirted out dark ink. This was my first encounter with an octopus. They brought it back to the house, I suppose, to eat it."

"We also went to the island of Thassos and it was cool. Riding the ferry was half the fun. A flock of sea gulls would follow us and hope that people would throw food overboard. I could literally reach out and grab one from the deck, if I wanted to. There were also little fish that jumped out of the water alongside the boat, and some of the birds ate them. The island was cool and mainly mountains with pine trees. On the coast there is palm trees. It's crazy," Spencer said.

Spencer said he was able to go to a Greek wedding near Xanthia with about 200 to 300 people in attendance. "The wedding family were friends of the host family," said Spencer. "It was a very expensive wedding with a lot of

City proposes tax rate increase by four cents

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, July 20, and unanimously approved a four cent increase in the proposed 2004-2005 tax rate to fund a new proposed budget of \$4,220,080. The present tax rate is \$.36 cents and the proposed tax rate will be \$.40 cents per \$100 property valuation.

The council set a budget and tax rate Public Hearing for Tuesday, 7:30 P.M., August 17, at their next scheduled regular meeting. Following the Public Hearing, the council will take the final vote on the increased tax rate and the new 2004-2005 budget.

City Manager Gary Brown told the council, "The 2004-2005 proposed budget does include a \$.40 cent tax rate. This is subject to a possible voters' recall, because it does exceed the percentage, or two cent increase, allowed by law."

"It (the new budget) also in-

cludes a slight raise in sewer rates, a \$1.00 increase in sanitation (trash pick up) rates, pay raises, capital expenditures, vehicles, voting machines and so forth. We are right where we should be in the budget in every department, except the Police department," continued Brown.

Councilmember Ruben Barrientos asked, "Must we raise sewer and sanitation rates to balance the budget? We raised our (sewer) rates last October didn't we?"

Brown responded, "If you are going to spend x amount of dollars, you have to bring in x amount of dollars. We did not actually raise rates last October, but we did change how we charged for sewer and water. We dropped the flat fee where everyone paid the same price. We established a base fee where if you use more water, you pay more, and if you use less water, you pay less."

The proposed new budget included: General Fund, \$1,318,424.00; Water, \$694,890.00; Farm, \$20,192.00; Sewer, \$243,338.00; Electric, \$1,517,227.00; Health, \$21,491.00; and Sanitation, \$404,518.00.

A City of Floydada Cash Report (including CD'S), dated June 30, 2004, was given to the council showing a Beginning Balance of \$957,927.70 and a Current Balance of \$880,447.42.

Councilmember Clar Schacht made the motion to approve the proposed tax rate increase and the proposed budget. It was seconded by Councilmember Bettye King and unanimously passed.

In other matters, the council discussed the Floydada Housing Authority and Farm Labor Camp Housing. City Manager Brown told the council, "It is not as bad as the USDA said it was. But they (the Farm Labor Camp/Floydada

Beneficial rains fell in Floyd County

A good light gentle rain fell across Floyd County Sunday, following several isolated downpours on Friday and Saturday.

South Plains received the most rain with 2.5 inches and Lone Star received 2.1 inches. Floydada had an overall total of about 2 inches, while Lockney only received a little less than a half an inch.

Floyd County Extension Agent J.D. Ragland told the Hesperian-Beacon Monday, "The rain could not have come

at a better time. It was very timely and it fell slow and easy. It all soaked in with very little runoff. It was very beneficial, especially on our dryland cotton."

South Plains producer Don Marble said, "The rain was good. We have the best crop this year that we have had in years, if nothing happens to it. We will need one more good rain in August on our dryland cotton."

Herman Graham of Muncy Elevator said, "It was a good rain. We sure did appreciate what we got (1.85 inches)."

FISD Bond Election Frequently Asked Questions

What is a bond?

A bond is an interest bearing debt instrument issued by a governmental entity following voter approval that is purchased by investors when the governmental entity needs to raise funds for projects beyond its normal operating costs. The entity repays the bond on a set schedule similar to funding for a mortgage or loan.

What will the bond money be used for?

Assuming the election passes and bonds are issued, the bond proceeds will be used to construct and renovate Floydada ISD edu-

cational facilities and demolish old facilities that will no longer be needed.

Why does the District need a bond?

The District needs to address its aging and outdated facilities, but does not have sufficient funds on hand to pay for new construction and renovation. Also, the District must incur some debt through a bond issue so it can qualify for additional state funding to help finance the construction and renovation of FISD's educational facilities.

What is EDA funding and how does it affect this bond issue?

EDA, Existing Debt Allotment, is state funding allocated by the Texas legislature to assist school districts that acquire debt for constructing and/or renovating school facilities. Funding is dependent on the economic status of the district. Approximately 60 percent of the District's potential debt qualifies for EDA and 40 percent will be shouldered by local tax dollars.

Housing Authority) have no money for repairs or for upkeep. There are not enough rentals going on. Only about three to five months per year do they have renters."

Brown added that a two million dollar grant had been approved to renovate part of the Farm Labor Camp into about 30, one and two bedroom apartments. Anyone who works in a farm related job will be able to rent these apartments on a year around basis.

"In a survey of the local farmer, they said we needed these types of apartments. But there needs to be a manager and caretaker who would live on the site and oversee its operations. We might could get a City patrolman to live there rent free. Migrants could still rent them, if they are available. There are about 25 to 30 (migrant families) out there now," said Brown.

In a brief report concerning the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, Brown said, "They may need to drill some additional wells, if the water is there. They are working on their proposed budget. Our (City of Floydada) electrical payment to them will increase \$4,000 this coming year. Due to the recent rains, the lake has risen some, and they now have about 12 to 15 months more to operate."

Concerning the Home Grant Program, Brown told the council, "The City of Floydada will build five houses for low income families. Those families must sign off on their houses, move out and allow us to tear them down in order to build the new house. Some people do not want to do that."

"Caprock Community Action is planning to build three or four houses also. These houses will have 960 square feet of living space, rectangular and three bedrooms. When finished, it will be their house to do with as they please. No title deeds are involved," added Brown.

The council approved the construction of a new carport to be moved onto the property located at Lot 4 & North Half of Lot 5, Blk 138, Original Town of Floydada, at 712 S. Wall.

The council did not approve the bid of \$250 by Jane Garcia Garza for the purchase of both Lots 9 & 10, Blk 36, Original Town of Floydada, at 401 E. Jackson. Before the vote, City Attorney Karen Houchin reminded the council that there was on the books a previous vote by the council "not to accept any property bid less than \$250 per City lot." Councilmembers Schacht, King, Jon Nielson and Sheldon Sue voted against the motion to approve the bid, and Councilmember Barrientoz ab-

stained. In Public Forum, Councilmember Barrientoz questioned City Manager Brown, "When are we going to clean our streets? There are weeds growing and dirt in the street gutters. Why do we only clean the parade route before Old Settler's Day? This has been going on too long. As a councilmember, I want to see results. We give raises to our (City) employees, but these things are being neglected."

Brown replied, "When we had the Plainview prison crew, we cleaned the streets. Do you want us to pull the men off other duties to do this?"

Both City Police Chief Darrell Gooch and City Attorney Houchin said, "When our streets and curbs need cleaning, we get out there and do it ourselves."

No action was taken and no more comments were given.

The council unanimously approved a resolution concerning the South Plains Hazard Mitigation Action Plan. The agreement states that Floydada will work with SPAG and "reduce long-term risk to people and property from hazards and their affects; to save lives and reduce damages to property, infrastructure, and the environment, and minimize the costs of disaster response and recovery activities."

How much of the bond package will be paid for by the state and how much will be paid by local tax dollars?

According to First Southwest Financial, the District's bond underwriter, if the District qualifies and is approved for EDA (Existing Debt Allotment) funding, the state will pay 60% of the bond cost while local tax dollars will pay for 40% of the bond cost. The

District cannot apply or qualify for EDA funds until a bond issue has been approved by a majority of the voters of the District and the bonds have been issued.

What is a call feature on a bond issue?

A call feature with bonds gives the issuer a chance to repay the bonds annually at a specified date (usually after one year). If EDA funding from the state is not awarded to the District, the District could "call" all or some of the bonds, and only be required to pay the cost for issuing the bonds and any interest accrued up to that date.

What happens if the District does not receive EDA funding?

The bonds will have a call feature that permits them to be paid off in one year. If EDA funding is not awarded by the state, the District will not use all the proceeds and will pay off the unneeded bonds.

How much would Floydada ISD save if they were to consolidate into a single elementary campus and single secondary campus?

The District's auditors gave a qualified opinion that the total estimated cost savings for closing and consolidating campuses would be \$428,548 per year.

How much would the District's annual bond payment be?

The total annual bond payment for the District would be \$373,742.00.

Is there any savings for the District between the bond payment required and the projected savings?

The projected net savings by

the auditor's qualified opinion between the cost of the annual bond payment and the savings from consolidating campuses will be \$54,806.00.

What is the net savings to the District?

Using the figures from the qualified auditor opinion, the overall net savings to the District at the end of the 30-year bond payoff would be \$1,644,180.00.

According to the TASA Facility Study, the life expectancy of the new construction and renovation would be approximately 60 years. This being the case, the following calculations will show the total overall net savings by the District:

Savings during the years 1-30 would be:
\$54,806.00 x 30 years = \$1,644,180.00
Savings during the years 30-60 would be:
\$428,548.00 x 30 years = \$12,856,440.00
Total savings years 1-60 for FISD would be:
\$12,856,440.00 + \$1,644,180.00 = \$14,500,620.00

The board met in special session on Tuesday, July 27, 7:00 A.M., and again discussed both the proposed new budget and the proposed new tax rate for the coming year. The board set a Public Hearing, concerning the new proposed tax rate and the new proposed budget, for their next regular meeting at 7:00 A.M. on August 17.

In other matters, the board approved \$470.61 of Indigent Health Care claims.

The board approved the bid of \$250 by Jane Garcia Garza for

the purchase of both Lots 9 & 10, Blk 36, Original Town of Floydada, at 401 E. Jackson. The appraised value of both lots is \$500.

Farris told the Hesperian-Beacon, "The EMS made 46 runs in June. This makes a total of 299 runs for the first six months of this year. We had one paramedic transfer to Lubbock UMC, so we are looking for a replacement. We always have three paramedics on hand. The PNS Cogdell Clinic is experiencing its usual summer slow down. 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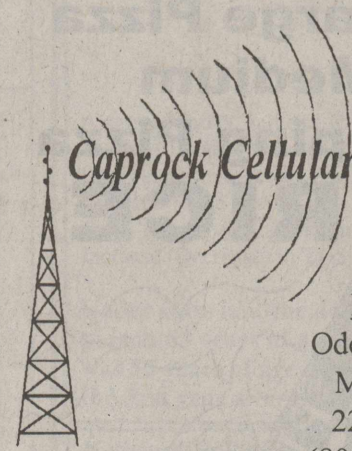

I received an e-mail this week from Wanda Kellison Jones telling me about her sister Beth's husband of 51 years Don

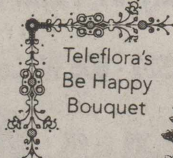
McNicol passing away July 16. Our thoughts and prayers are with Beth and her family.

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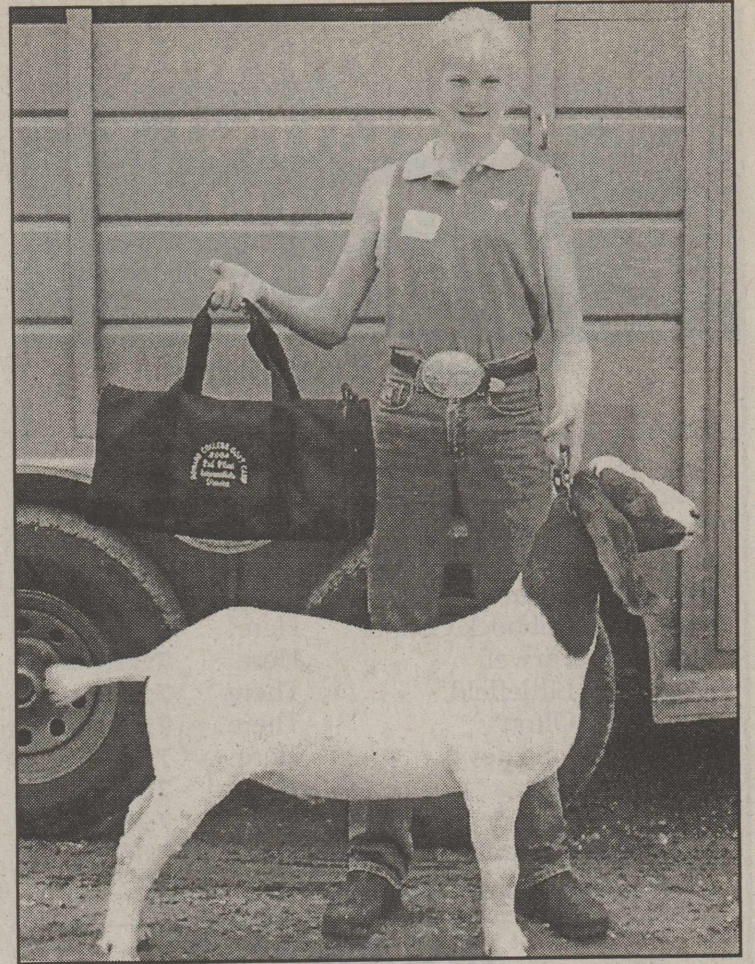
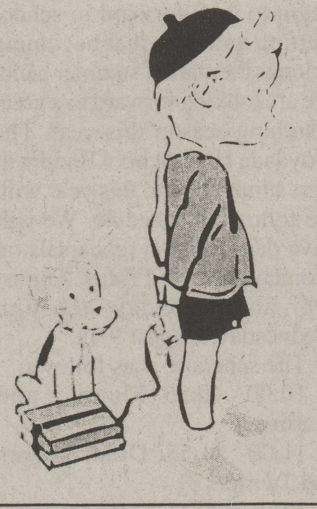

food and drinks for everyone. We got to the church about 6:00 P.M. and waited 30 minutes. Then the bride and groom came in a Mercedes and went into the packed church with family members for the service. We waited another 30 minutes and then we all went to the wedding reception in another town about 40 minutes away. Here they had the cutting of the cake, the dancing, and when we left at 1:00 A.M. they were still going strong."

Another stop on Spencer's tour was Athens. Here they vis-

ited the Panathenako Stadium, where the first Olympic games took place in 1896. They saw the Museum of Cycladic, the Byzantine Museum, the War Museum, the National Gallery and the Prime Minister's resident.

Included on this trip was the Royal Palace, the Zappion Royal Garden, Hardrian's Arch, Paul's Church, Parliament, the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, Schlieman's House, the Acropolis Temple, the new site of the upcoming World Olympics Games and many other stops. They helped welcome the

Greek soccer team, who had just beat Portugal 1-0 and won the World EURO Soccer Cup. "This was the first time they have done this ever." The old stadium had a capacity of 69,000, but there were about 100,000 soccer fans in and around the stadium, said Spencer.

Spencer also took a cruise boat to the three islands of Hydra, Aegina and Poros. They rented scooters to travel throughout the countryside and were able to swim, hike and shop in the local stores.

Before leaving Greece, Spencer visited Delphi, the center of the Ancient World - the Omphalos, "the Navel of the Earth." On the beautiful slopes of Mount Parnassus, they visited the ruins of the Sanctuary of Apollo Pytheos and a museum of Ancient Greek sculpture. "We stopped for souvenirs, lunch and returned to Athens in the afternoon," said Spencer.

Following a free day to rest, relax and shop for more souvenirs, they boarded a plane in Athens to London and then straight back to Dallas, USA.

the date of the annual "Meet the Whirlwinds" event. Scrimmages will begin at 6:00 p.m.

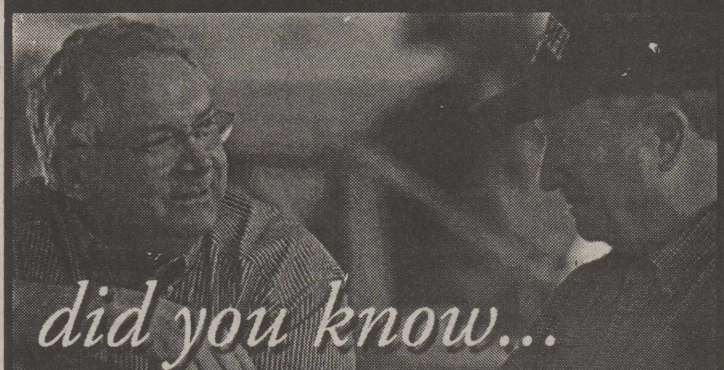
Saturday, August 14th will be the first scrimmage for the Whirlwinds. We will be hosting the Post Antelopes with the starting time at 10:00 a.m.

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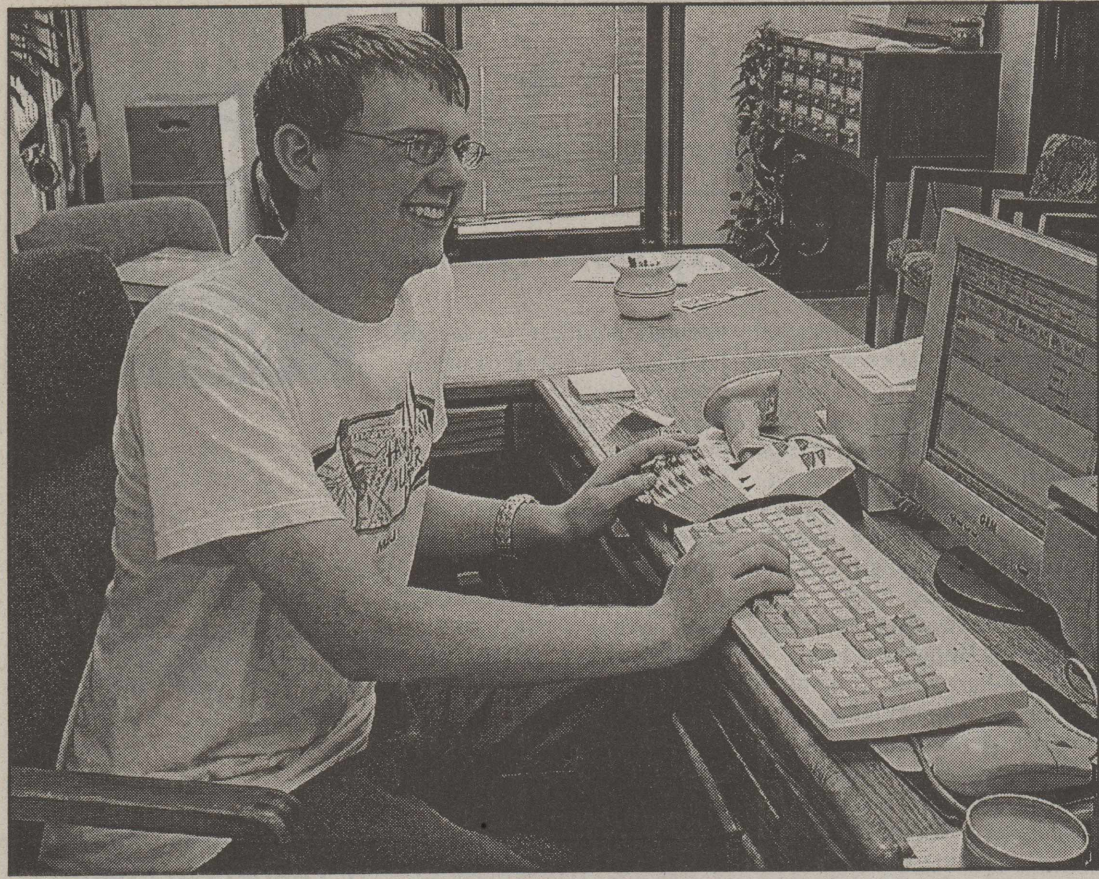

Caleb McLean, 17 year old son of Steve and Darla McLean of Lockney will be flying off for Mbale, Uganda, accompanied by Pat Andrews (of the Northwest Church of Christ in Abilene) on August 21, 2004. He will turn 18 on the day he is scheduled to return, November 17.

McLean volunteered to catalog over 11,000 books which have been donated to the Messiah Theological Institute over the three month period he is there. "I should be able to catalog about two hundred books a day," he said. "I will only be working five days a week, taking Sundays and Mondays off."

McLean, a 2004 home schooled graduate, is well prepared for this job after finishing the cataloging of over 1,000 books donated to M.T.I. by the Lockney Branch Library, where he has worked as a Junior Volunteer for the last three years.

Lockney Librarian Neta Marble quipped, "Caleb had just been working with the electronic card catalog at the library. It would seem it's meant to be."

Why Africa? Shawn and Linda Tyler, missionaries with M.T.I., gave a presentation at Lockney's West College and Third Street Church of Christ (where Caleb's dad ministers). "The M.T.I. Library is really the only reason I'm going. I would never have thought about going to Africa otherwise," McLean said. "Of course I'm also excited about rafting on the Nile and seeing all those animals in the wild."

"I will be living with the four

families that work full time at M.T.I., (Shawn and Linda Tyler, Ian and Danetta Shelburne, Phillip and Laura Shero and Mike and Judy Shero) and I will be going with them on short mission trips to Kenya as well as small villages," said McLean.

"Phillip Shero helped me pack the 8'x10'x20' shipping crate on June 26," he added. "The crate was filled with 600 boxes of books and other items such as: a washer and dryer set, single washer, mattress and box springs, bicycle, two computers, eye glasses, personal items...and rolls of toilet paper stuffed into every available space!"

M.T.I. is a school formed to teach local men to become ministers. It was originally located in a church building and received a Basic Certificate in 1995. They received Advance Certificate status in 2002. M.T.I. has served over 1,000 students from 1995 to the present, and now has 400 active students.

"M.T.I. purchased an old high school building and refurbished it to house their classrooms and new library of over 10,000 volumes, which entitles them to attain something similar to an Associates Degree," said McLean. "This will be their first cataloged library, and I'm excited to be able to get on at the ground level."

"Both my parents have been supportive and excited for me from the very start, wishing they could go with me!" he laughed. "My expectation?--- To get it all done!"

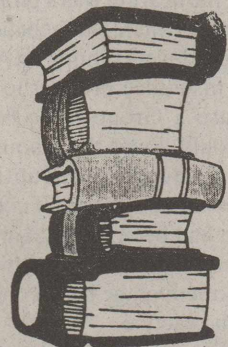

APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION. City of Lockney, P.O. Box 387, Lockney, Texas 79241, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a major amendment to Permit No. WQ0010211001, to authorize an increase in the daily average flow from 200,000 gallons per day to 350,000 gallons per day and to decrease the acreage irrigated from 160 acres to 112 acres of nonpublic access agricultural land. The proposed amendment requests to reduce monitoring frequency for BOD5 from once per week to once per month. The current permit authorizes the disposal of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 200,000 gallons per day via surface irrigation of 160 acres of non-public access non-food crop land. This permit will not authorize a discharge of pollutants into water in the State. This application was submitted to the TCEQ on February 24, 2004.

The facility and disposal site are located approximately 0.1 mile south of U.S. Highway 70 and 1.0 mile east of Farm-to-Market Road 378, and southeast of the City of Lockney in Floyd County, Texas. The facility and disposal site are located in the drainage basin on White River Lake in Segment No. 1240 of the Brazos River Basin.

The TCEQ executive director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under the facility must operate. The executive director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The permit application, technical summary and executive director's decision and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at the Lockney City Hall, 218 East Locust Street, Lockney, Texas.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit written or oral comment or to ask questions about the application. Generally, the TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

Written public comments and requests for a public meeting should be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TCEQ, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087 within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of the notice.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. **The response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who requested to be on a mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the executive director's decision.** A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn. Issues that are not raised in public comments may not be considered during a hearing.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The executive director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or a timely request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or a request for reconsideration is filed, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and requests to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

Bond Election workshop held

FISD Board Members, community committee members and several citizens met Monday, July 26, at the Massie Activity Center in Floydada to see and discuss a slide show presentation concerning the upcoming Bond Election.

FISD Board Member William Dean was in charge of the slide presentation and the discussion that followed. Other FISD Board Members present for the meeting were Bart Greer and Rachael Castillo. FISD Business Manager Sharon Rainwater, Principals Wayne Morren and Charles Tyer were also present to answer questions concerning the need of renovations at the school campuses.

According to the slide presentation and the District's qualified auditors the total estimated cost savings for closing and consolidating campuses would be \$428,548.00 per year.

Also, the group was told that 60 percent of the \$14.5 million dollar renovation and consolidation of campuses will be paid for by the state's EDA (Existing Debt Allotment), if the Bond Election passes, and if the EDA is available.

The other 40 percent of the \$14.5 million will have to be paid by FISD for the next 30 years, if the Bond Election passes.

According to a chart handed out at the meeting, taxes will be levied at a \$0.27 increase, over

I'm going to conclude by presenting a letter sent in response to my request when I asked for "I Remember" times. Those before us would want us to be joyful instead of sad.

I Remember By Billy G. Warren

I remember when the paved road between Floydada and Ralls was built. The center stripe was black, not white.

I remember when the Starkey school taught 12 grades. The school house was a 2-story building with the bottom floor of stucco and the top floor brick. The bottom floor had 4 rooms which were used for classes. Later, 2 rooms were for classes and 2 rooms were used for teachers' quarters. The top floor was the auditorium with a stage. It was used for community activities and church services. The church was of Baptist denomination, but all church affiliates would attend and worship God.

I remember when Starkey and McCoy schools would get together on Friday afternoons to play softball. I don't like to talk about who won, but I don't remember Starkey ever winning a game with McCoy.

I remember when the Starkey boys would get together on Sunday afternoons and ride horses. They were Tommy Assiter, Leroy Parrish, Bonnie Permenter, Albert Jones, and myself. My horse had a crooked foot.

I remember when my Dad farmed with teams. I also remember when we lost most of our cattle from bloating on tumble weeds, which was about the only vegetation growing during the drought. That same year, four of Dad's work horses died from sleeping sickness. Only one horse and one mule survived.

I remember dust clouds rolling in. They would block out the sun so we would have to light the coal oil lamps to see.

I remember my brother Elvis and I cleaning out the dirt from the ceiling of the house to keep it from falling in.

the current tax rate, for the next 30 years. The 30 year cost to the homeowner will be nothing, if your home is worth \$15,000 or less. It will cost \$94.50 increase per year, if your home is worth \$50,000, and it will cost \$175.50 increase per year for 30 years, if your home is worth \$80,000.

Also, taxes will be levied on farm land at \$0.27 increase, over the current tax rate, for the next 30 years. Irrigated farm land valued at \$280 per acre will be taxed, above the present taxes, for the next 30 years per section of farm land at \$486. Dryland valued at \$137 per acre will be increased in taxes by \$236 per section per year for the next 30 years. While grassland valued at \$55 per acre will increase in taxes to \$96 per section per year for the next 30 years.

In the meeting, some slides were displayed showing the deterioration of the R.C. Andrews Elementary School building and the Floydada Junior High School building. According to Dean, bringing these buildings up to code would cost more than the proposed renovations and consolidations of schools.

In the citizens comments following the presentation, "Safety for our kids" and "What would happen if there is a fire" in these old buildings was the theme of everyone's discussion. One comment was, "It is our turn to pay the price in the Bond Election for our kids today."

Cotton issues top Washington news

Center stage has been a busy place in Washington, DC during the month of July with the usual jumble of individuals and issues vying for the spotlight.

For cotton the top candidates for attention have been consideration of the House of Representatives FY05 Agriculture spending bill, development of the U.S. appeal of the WTO's Brazil/cotton decision, and efforts to gain improvements in the federal crop insurance programs.

House Approves Agriculture Spending Bill

As Congress competes its last legislative week before their month-long August recess, a large number of important issues remain unresolved. For those in agriculture the most critical issue on the table is the 2005 Agriculture Appropriations bill.

The process did move forward slightly last week when the House of Representatives approved its version of the FY05 spending bill. The Agriculture Appropriations bill is the seventh of 13 spending bills acted on by the House to date.

With no action on a Senate version of the Agriculture Appropriations measure, it appears the Congress will add agriculture to the growing list of unfinished spending bills.

High Plains Congressmen Randy Neugebauer, Charlie Stenholm and Mac Thornberry all voted for the legislation that provides \$16.77 billion in discretionary funding for FY05 on top of \$66.746 billion in mandatory spending. The final vote passing the Bill was an overwhelming 389-31.

In the House bill Conservation programs were funded at the following FY05 levels: Conservation Reserve Program, authorized for full funding estimated at \$1.9 billion; Environmental Quality Incentives Program, capped at \$1.01 billion; Conservation Security Program, capped at \$14 million; Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program, capped at \$60 million; and, Wetlands Reserve Program, capped at \$248 million.

While the House approved budget did trim back some of the intended spending increases originally called for in the 2002 Farm Bill provisions such as payment limitations were left untouched during the legislation's consideration by the budget Committee or during consideration on the House floor.

Crop Insurance Hearing Highlights Important Issues

House Agriculture Committee members heard reports and questioned Federal Crop Insurance Corporation Board Chairman Keith Collins and Risk Management Agency Administrator Ross Davidson during a July 21 hearing to update the Committee on the latest developments in the federal crop insurance program.

During the hearing, Ag Committee members Randy Neugebauer and Charlie Stenholm questioned Collins and Davidson about recent RMA actions and noted the importance of key issues affecting producers.

Among the issues brought up during the hearing were the recent Standard Reinsurance Agreement negotiation process, the need to develop a solution regarding the deferred appraisal requirement for non-emerge seed, and increasing the ability of producers to tailor a risk management program to their situation.

Among the ideas discussed during the hearing was a proposal by congressman Neugebauer to allow producers buying an APH-based insurance product to also purchase a Group Risk Policy that would cover the amount of their production deductible. Neugebauer also asked if consideration had been given to allowing a producer to select different levels of coverage based on production practice.

Collins and Davidson acknowledged the need to fully explore new risk management options. Collins noted that the FCIC Board has previously passed a resolution discouraging the Risk management Agency from looking into the idea of al-

lowing a producer to select different plans of insurance and coverage levels. He explained that the Board's decision was based on their perception that it would increase the complexity of the program for both producers and agents, and introduce additional opportunities for program abuse.

Plains Cotton Growers officials have suggested adding a limited amount of flexibility to the grower. PCG's concept would maintain the requirement that the producer pick a single insurance product, but add the ability to select different levels of coverage for dryland or irrigated production.

WTO Update

The National Cotton Council and the U.S. Trade Office continues to develop an aggressive appeal that will be filed in response to last month's release of the Brazil/WTO dispute panel report finding fault with the U.S. cotton program.

NCC and USTR officials have been publicly countering some of the conclusions drawn by the WTO panel and will continue to do so as additional details are released.

Resolution of the Brazil/WTO case following consideration of the U.S. appeal is not expected until the end of this year.

Keep Foliage Feeders in Peanuts Under Control

The new peanut program rewards growers for production efficiency. With some peanuts being planted later in the spring to avoid issues with Tomato Spotted Wilt Virus (TSWV) and other early season problems, it increases the potential for damage from foliage feeding insects later in the year.

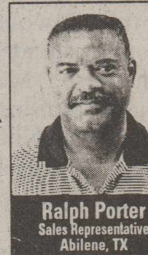
Scouting throughout the growing season is critical in making the decisions to help your bottom line. And, proper timing application is key when you're trying to maximize insect control. To catch early signs of foliage feeders such as loopers, armyworms, European corn borer, red-necked peanutworm, saltmarsh caterpillar and others, begin scouting at bloom.

NOTIFICATION OF TOTAL COLIFORM VIOLATION

The City of Floydada water system collected one (1) water sample during the month of July, 2004, that contained Coliform bacteria. The City of Floydada water system is required to submit a minimum of four (4) water samples each month for bacteriological analysis.

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) sets drinking water standards in Texas and has determined that the presence of total coliform is a possible health concern. Total coliform are common in the environment and are generally not harmful themselves. However, the presence of these bacteria in drinking water, generally is a result of a problem with water treatment or the pipes which distributes the water and indicates that the water may be contaminated with organisms that can cause disease. Disease symptoms may include diarrhea, cramps, nausea, and possibly jaundice and associated headaches and fatigue. These systems, however, are not just associated with disease-causing organisms in drinking water, but may also be caused by a number of factors other than you drinking water. The TCEQ has set an enforceable drinking water standard for total coliform to reduce the risk of these adverse health effects. Under this standard, no more than 5.0% of the samples collected during the month can contain bacteria, except that systems collecting fewer than 40 samples/month that have one total coliform-positive sample per month are not violating the standard. Drinking water which means this standard is usually not associated with a health risk from disease-causing bacteria and should be considered safe.
