Horse and mule take traveler around the country

A North Carolina world traveler came riding through Floydada last week riding a mule and leading a pack horse. It was an unusual sight. Many local people called the newspaper office to report the sighting.

Bernie Harberts from Stateville, North Carolina told the Hesperian-Beacon, "I'm on my way to California. I hope to be there by the first of the New Year (2005).

Bernie, a single 36 year old ex-farmer/rancher, horse trainer and wood worker, left the east coast of North Carolina on March 15, 2004 to ride his mule, "Woody", only over the mountains of that state. However, he liked it so well, he bought a pack horse, "Magnolia (Maggie)", and kept coming across the southern central states.

So far, he has "walked" Woody and Magnolia across the states of North Carolina, Tennessee, Arkansas, Oklahoma and now through Floydada, Texas, heading for Ralls. Bernie, and his mini caravan, walk 15 to 40 miles per day on the highways "facing traffic." He says, "It's safer that way. If I see something coming at us that I don't like the looks of, we get off the highway. We walk because trotting or running rubs sores on the animals.' Bernie keeps 'easy boots' on all the hoofs of both Woody and Maggie and "that keeps their hoofs from being eaten up walk-

ing on the highways. They are not supposed to be for long distances. but so far they are still in good

Bernie carries about four to eight pounds of feed for Woody and Maggie, and he buys it along the way. He stops each night at a favorable looking home, after asking permission, and has found southern hospitality everywhere

Bernie's parents live in Statesville, North Carolina on a farm and horse ranch where he was raised as a boy. He has one older brother who lives in France. Bernie learned to love horses as he grew up. Now he has trained and judged them at horse shows around the world. He has a web page www.riverearth.com where he tells all about his travels.

Bernie quit his good wood "molding" job in North Carolina back in November, 1998 and traveled around the world for five years in a 34 foot, personally modified, steel boat. He and his engine powered boat named "Sea Bird' travelled from North Carolina to Saint Thomas Island in 1998. Similar to this mule trip, he decided to "keep going and see how far I could get."

Bernie and Sea Bird made the 24,000 mile trip by water stopping at Columbia, South America, French Polynesia, Tahiti, New Zealand, where he spent a year and a half working with "herders" and replaced a burned out engine. He landed at South Africa and Australia, and finally back home in North Carolina on June 1, 2003

Bernie tells on his web page. "I'm not a sailor, but a farmer. I just travel from land to land by boat. I never lost my tendency toward sea sickness and I celebrated my 35th birthday in South Africa. I trained horses and judged horse shows in different islands and countries on that trip. I lived on lots of rice, fish (raw and cooked), tuna jerky and rain water. I read lots of books and I was in the sea for 65 days in the Caribbean."

Bernie came up the caprock from Quitaque and stopped for three days, during the heavy rains, at the home of Nathan and Connie Johnson. While there he was able to get on the computer and add to his already informative web page. When he got to Floydada on Thursday he stayed in the home of Tony and Pam Ricketts on the Ralls Highway, where this reporter caught up with him saddling his mule and

Bernie thanked the Johnsons, the Ricketts and Nick Long for all their help and "Incredible hospitality" while he was passing through this area.

When asked about the possibility of marriage, Bernie chuck; led and said, "I would have to find a woman who wouldn't mind traveling a lot and riding behind a mule day after day." He did say he was meeting a female

things along his mule trip across southern America. He has fixed the bridles and blinders for Woody and Maggie with old sunglass wire and other things picked up off the highways. He has even soaked parts of the bridles in his hot tea in order to give the bridles flexibility.

County approves purchases for Sheriff's office

The Floyd County Commissioners met Monday, October 11, 2004 and approved the purchase of another digital camera for use by the Sheriff's Department.

Deputy Sheriff Paul Raissez told the commissioners, "We spend around \$896 each year on (regular) film and developing, plus our time involved in delivery and pick up. For about \$15 to \$20, we can buy 300 floppy discs for a digital camera. Each floppy holds 36 pictures and we already have the printer to print out digital pictures. We already have one digital camera and we need a couple more to put in each deputy's car."

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy commented, "I do know that digital pictures are cheaper than regular film and developing."

Following a motion by Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden and a second by Commissioner Jon Jones, the court approved the purchase of a \$300 digital camera. The money will be taken out of the Sheriff's budget, according to County Judge William D.

In a related matter, the commissioners approved the spend-

ing of \$2,607 by the Sheriff's Department for supplies, cellular air time, commodities and miscellaneous. The money came out of the Sheriff's Criminal Asset Forfeiture Fund. According to County Treasurer Elva Martinez, there is \$5,239.67 remaining in the Forfeiture Fund.

The court voted unanimously to keep juror pay per day at \$11. This amount is the same as the past: Also, the commissioners transferred \$20,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund into the four precincts' working fund at \$5,000 each.

A yearly Interlocal Cooperation contract with the Texas Department of Public Safety regarding Failure To Appear System was approved by the commissioners.

County Treasurer Elva Martinez presented the September, 2004 Financial Report. The report showed a Beginning Balance of \$463,401.48, with Receipts of \$107,038.42. Transfers In and Out were \$234,582.54, Disbursed were \$235,948.38, showing an Ending Balance of \$334,491.52.

Floyd County Extension Agents J.D. Ragland and Melissa Long both gave reports to the commissioners.

"The Harmony Extension Education Classes have started meeting again. I will give their November program," said Long. She reported that there were 20



The Museum is in need of a pair of World War I military leggings for a display. If anyone has a pair they would like to donate please call the Museum.





Whirlwinds open district with win over Olton 35-19

Floydada senior Luke Miller rushed for 187 yards and three touchdowns and passed for two more scores to help lead the Whirlwinds to a 35-19 victory at Olton in the District 6-2A opener for both clubs last week.

The Mustangs fell to 3-3 for the season and are expected to' grab their first district decision tomorrow night when they host winless Dimmitt. The Whirlwinds, undefeated in district action a year ago, improve to 3-3 overall and will entertain Lockney this week in the annual Floyd County Championship. The Longhorns, 4-2 for the season, opened district play with a 35-13 win over Tulia last Friday.

The Whirlwinds had their biggest offensive output of the year at Olton with 497 total yards (397 yards coming on the ground). Floydada's tenacious, swarming defense, led by Ty Heflin, Tyler Chesshir and Jacob Reddy, limited the Mustangs' David Phares to only 123 yards. Phares, the South Plains' top Class 2A rusher and leading scorer coming into the contest, was averaging over 177 yardsper-outing. Most of Phares' yardage came in the second half when the game was all but wrapped up by the Whirlwinds.

Following a rather uneventful initial period, which saw both teams fail to keep drives alive by attempting to convert 4th-down plays, the Whirlwinds opened the second quarter with an 8play, 83-yard march to the Olton end zone. Miller hit a wide-open Jacob Reddy on a sideline pattern and the sure-handed junior carried for 66 yards and Floydada's first score. An Olton fumble on the ensuing kickoff was recovered by Lionel Williams, allowing the Whirlwinds to retain possession. On first down from the Mustang 34-yard line, Miller once again went to the air to his favorite receiver and Reddy had his second touchdown reception within 13 seconds of clock time. Luke carried for the 2-point conversion to put the Whirlwinds up 14-0 - a margin the Green and White would carry into the locker room at intermis-

Olton opened the second half with a sustained scoring drive, capped by a 5-yard touchdown run by David Phares. Just as it appeared that the Mustangs might have gained momentum after pulling to within 7 points, the Whirlwind offense responded with 46 and 17-yard scoring runs by Luke Miller. Three minutes into the final period, Miller ran 8 yards for his third score of the game. Paul Marmolejo's 2-point conversion run extended the Whirlwinds' lead to 35-7. Marmolejo had his best night as a Whirlwind by rushing 19 times for 158 yards.

The game's final eight minutes belonged to the Mustangs as Dustin McFadden scored from 11 yards out at the 7:44 mark and Phares ran for his second touchdown with but 37 ticks remaining on the clock. Olton gained close to 200 of its 362 yards of total offense in the game's final 9 minutes - long after the final outcome had been determined. In a post-game interview, Coach Lee Hurt commented, "You've got to give Olton credit...they didn't give up and they came out and played hard in the second half. They've got a good football team and they are going to beat some people (in district). We were just fortunate to know that we played a little bit better tonight.

Coach Hurt added, "Early on, we were trying to figure out what they (Olton) were doing on defense. They were giving some different looks we hadn't seen. We finally got some plays that started working. Our kids started executing and did a super job. We're 1-0 in district and I am very proud of them...that's where we wanted to be. We executed well on offense, and our offensive line did a super job of blocking. Our backs blocked well and carried out their necessary assignments. It was a great, overall team effort. We'll be ready for Lockney...like I was telling the kids...we just want to win one game a week. And this week, it just so happens to be Lockney.

And, Lockney it will be, this week - as it has been for 80-plus years. In one of the oldest rival-

ries in Texas schoolboy football, the Longhorns and the Whirlwinds will go at it again tomorrow night at Floydada's Wester Field. The 'Horns bring a lot to the table, headed by talented senior Mark Ford.

An earlier illness has hampered Ford up to this point, but he was back in the groove last week with three touchdowns and over 260 rushing yards against

Ford, Rance Schumacher and the other Longhorn seniors have only managed to be on the winning side once against the Whirlwinds during their high school careers. What better way than to have a victory over the 'Winds during their final year as Longhorns. Of course, Luke Miller, Ty Heflin, Lionel Williams and a whole bunch of Whirlwind seniors may have something to say about that!

A lot of publicity and recognition have been given to Texas high school football this year, especially to the Odessa Permian Panthers (of the book and movie Friday Night Lights fame).

The story and motion picture are quite a tribute to BIG TIME high school football in the Lone Star State. But the REAL Friday Night Lights can be found along the highways and biways of small-town West Texas whether they are the roads leading to Silverton, Ralls, Idalou or Slaton, or others too numerous to mention here. It's something no one else in these United States understands unless they've been here and done that." And, I am just glad - and VERY fortunate - to know that I have a sideline spot at that very special field tomorrow night.



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Northern High Plains Bolt Weevil Referendum ballots due

Susan Combs reminds cotton continued in the zone with a producers voting in the Northern High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone referendum that their ballots must be postmarked by Tuesday, October 19, to be counted. Results of the referendum will determine whether to continue a boll weevil eradication program in the six county area of the Northern High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone.

Eligible voters should have received an official ballot by mail. A postage-paid return envelope was included. Producers in the zone who planted cotton in 2004 but did not receive a ballot should immediately contact the Texas Department of approximately 542,000 acres of Agriculture at (512) 463-4879 or (800) TELL-TDA (800-835-

In addition to deciding if an

Agriculture Commissioner eradication program should be maximum annual assessment of \$12 per land acre of irrigated cotton and \$6 per land acre of dryland cotton, including skip rows, voters will elect a board member to serve on the statewide board of directors for the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation, Inc. TDA received one nomination for this position before the September 17 filing deadline. The name of Weldon Melton of Hale County will appear on the ballot as a board nominee. Melton has been a cotton producer since 1975.

The Northern High Plains Eradication Zone consists of cotton in all of Hale and Swisher counties; and parts of Armstrong, Briscoe, Floyd and Randall counties.

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

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Appeal is next step in Brazil cotton case

It appears that the next phase of the WTO Brazil cotton case is about to begin. Recent talk implies that Brazil will soon request that the WTO delegate body adopt the findings of the dispute panel report that found U.S. cotton programs were not fully compliant with the Uruguay Round Agriculture Agreement and caused serious prejudice to Brazil's interest by suppressing cotton prices.

As soon as the Brazil request is filed the United states is expected to file its appeal of the dispute panel's findings and formally begin the 90-day appeal process.




