## Longhorns bring home county trophy

Stands at Wester Field, Friday, October 15, were filled with green on one side and red on the other as fans crammed into the stadium to see the top two teams of District 6-2A in a dog fight. Instead fans witnessed a runaway as the Lockney Longhorns defeated the Floydada Whirlwinds 42-14, bringing back the Floyd County Championship to Lockney High.

Mark Ford scored four touchdowns for the Longhorns. He had three rushing touchdowns of eight, 58 and 16. Ford's other touchdown came on a 29 yard reception from Cagan Cummings. Cummings also added a touchdown run of 11

yards. Ford finished the night with 170 rushing yards which put him over the 1,000 yard mark for the third consecutive season.

Here is a mouthful. Lockney's defense forced four Floydada fumbles stifling the potent Whirlwind offense. The defense also knocked out Floydada's starting quarterback, Luke Miller, with a shoulder injury early in the game which was a huge loss for Floydada.

Both teams got off to a slow start, but late in the first quarter the Longhorns put together an impressive drive. Lockney found themselves in a fourth and nine situation on Floydada's 29 yard line. Quarterback, Cagan

## Cornelius is "Woman of Distinction"

Julianne Cornelius, of Floydada, will be one of 8 women honored at the annual Women of Distinction Awards Dinner, November 16th, at the McInturff Conference Center in Lubbock.

The awards are presented annually by the Girl Scouts of Caprook Council to pay tribute to women who have made a direct and powerful impact on the lives of others through their support of and belief in the tenets of Girl Scouting and the betterment of the community.

Julianne was sponsored for the award by the 1950 Study Club in Floydada, and received recommendations from several in the community.

Jane McCulley wrote to the Council concerning Julianne and said, "She knows the value of integrity in the work place, the need for making home and fam-

ily a major priority in her life....It is evident in everything she does, it is in seeing others shine that gives her the greatest joy and satisfaction."

Nick and Melissa Long praised Julianne for her active role in activities and organizations in Floydada, including the Chamber of Commerce, 4-H, PTA, and church, and for her roles in securing a new library and the Veteran's Memorial.

According to the Longs, "The biggest asset Julianne possesses is the ability to involve a group in whatever project she undertakes....What makes her distinctive in her work is her ability to lead, make everyone an important part of any project and shower praise all along the way. Any time Julianne takes on a project you can be assured that it will be accomplished..."

Pastor Anthony Sisemore praised Julianne for her work in the church, particularly in the area of drama skits--directing and building "fabulous props".

Julianne is a native of Floydada. She has been married to her high school sweetheart, Eric Cornelius, for 23 years. They have two children, Skyler, 18, and Jordan, 12. She spends her time working at the family business, Cornelius Oil Co., chauffeuring her sons, and volunteering in her community.

She has served in a variety of capacities in the community, including: Chairman of Punkin Days Festival and on the Chamber Board for 10 years, PTA president, president of the American Cancer Society, President of the Floyd County Friends Library.

Julianne coordinated the IM-

PACT Literacy Program in Floydada Elementary Schools and is very active in different capacities in her church and 4-H. She and her son, Skyler, led a 4-H Veterans Memorial Project for Floyd County that resulted in a \$95,000 granite memorial with 4,089 Veterans names listed.

Julianne describes herself as Miss-cellaneous because it is the miscellany & variety that gives life that marvelous spice. ## FISD Board unhappy with Appraisal District

The FISD Board met Tuesday, October 12, and discussed a letter written October 8, 2004 by Superintendent Jerry Vaughn to Shelia Faulkenberry of the Floyd County Appraisal District.

Following the canvassing of the votes on the failed Bond Election at last month's FISD regular board meeting, September 21, Board Member Bill Dean asked Superintendent Vaughn to inquire "about the injustice done by the Floyd County Central Tax Appraisal District, as to why they reported to the public that taxes would double."

Therefore in this month's board meeting, Vaughn told the board, "Last month one of the board members asked if we could have an opportunity to discuss this and bring this information forward."

"A couple of things I will say going into this is, number one, there have been a lot of rumors going around. I have had phone calls and people coming in concerned about the lawsuit that had been filed. There is no lawsuit filed. There has not been a lawsuit filed. I can't do that. It takes the collective action of you folks (the board) to do that. There has not been a complaint filed to this point," said Vaughn.

"What we have done is made a request for information in writing. It was a request for complaint procedures; how to file a complaint; and to get some information about what business dealings we have with the Appraisal District. Then last Friday (October 8), we have an additional request for information about some

things we need here at the district. That is the only two things that has happened. There are a lot of rumors flying out there."

Board Member Amado Morales asked Vaughn, "Is it (this meeting) open where we can discuss what kind of information you are trying to get? I'm in the blind on you asking for information. I'm not following you."

Vaughn responded, "I asked for, on the first one (request), information on how do you file a complaint; what is your policy on filing a complaint; and a copy of our contract."

Morales said, "Let me rephrase my question then. You asked for a copy of a complaint. Are we saying we are trying to complain for the district? Is that what you are referring to and that is why you are asking for all of this? Why are we filing and what kind of information do we want? What kind of dig do you have with the Appraisal District?"

Vaughn said, "There were some things that went on during the election process and we (the district) don't feel like they (the Appraisal District) were above board and right, and for not being cooperative and working with our business office here. To date, that is what has been taking place."

The Hesperian-Beacon acquired a copy of the second letter sent from the FISD office to the Appraisal District. The five requests made on October 8 by FISD, and to be responded to within the required 10 day statutory time limit, were for: (1) all Floyd County Appraisal District

Every election, it seems, this country is seized with the argument over religion in politics, or politics in religion. The two are inexorably linked, and the argument is usually over whether that should be true, as if the two could ever be totally divorced. Nearly always, the argument revolves around the basic idea of whether people should vote their beliefs, or their pocketbook. As in all other aspects of political discourse, that subject has room for an awful lot of nuance and interpretation.

Right now the Catholic Church is torn over several issues involving fundamental teaching of the church, as enunciated by the Pope, who is head of that worldwide congregation. The principal difference, as we view the matter from the outside, is whether constituent members can or cannot participate in Holy Communion if they do not accept, and practice, the Pope's admonition relative to abortion. Even Bishops, as agents of the Pope in various American communities, vary greatly on the issue.

The Catholic Church, of course, is not alone in this controversy, although within that church the argument is so terribly meaningful, in a religious sense. The issue not only splits the church, it splits the country, with people willing to go to jail and suffer accordingly for their beliefs. Not many issues affecting the body politic engender such emotion. Perhaps the issue of so-called "gay marriage" would be up there as an emotion-grabber in political terms with some people, but as far as we are concerned it would run a good distance behind.

As far as we are concerned, the subject of legal marriage is strictly up to state civil authorities to define and enforce. And we're not talking about a bunch of un-elected judges. If the people of Massachusetts want to authorize a civil union between two queers and call it marriage, we

have no problems...so long as that couple can't then move to another state and invoke the legality of the state from whence they came. And if this church or that church wishes to give its blessing to such a union, again we have no problem...so long as the two queers cannot move into another congregation of believers without the acceptance of that group. Perhaps the way one views power and authority in civil matters, as well as the church in church matters, and at what level, has something to do with our thoughts.

Perhaps that is the problem, or at least one of the problems. Once a baby has been baptized as a Catholic, he or she is considered a Catholic (by certain members of the Catholic hierarchy) until death. Naturally, and obviously, things change, including the thoughts of people. A baby grows up. As a grown up, his or her thoughts stand to change just as their stature changes. Recent polls indicate a majority of Catholic practitioners do not agree with the church's position on matters like birth control, and a sizeable number do not agree with its position on abortion. Any church hierarchy that depends upon acceptance of church authority is bound to both see and feel the change, even as they resist that change.

As one who wants to see John F. Kerry defeated in his race for the Presidency, we should welcome all the problems he is now encountering on the abortion thing, and the "gay marriage" thing, and any other problem that might flow his way. But to be honest about it, our principle complaint about Kerry is the manner in which he conducted himself relative to the Vietnam war. We may even sympathize with his position on quarrels with his church in some matters, (though we think his position is politically stupid) but his reaction to the Vietnam episode is nothing short of fraudulent, and,

reveals a character that has no business being President of these United States. To now claim hero status after denouncing those who did the bidding of people like himself simply demonstrates a mind set that ought to have no place in politics anywhere but Massachusetts. It reveals a "say anything, do anything" approach to politics that we do not appreciate.

As far as religion in politics is concerned, or, rather, politics in religion, we've never seen the day when the two were distinctly different. For as long as we can remember, black politics has centered around black churches.

Black preachers are usually the political leaders within the black community, and we see nothing wrong with it. The fact that so much of the time money flows to the preacher as reward for endorsement may be deplored by some, myself included, but within the black community things look different, especially when the preacher uses at least part of the money for the benefit

of the congregation.

As a general rule, politics in religion is deplored when it benefits the other side, but is more than welcome when it benefits one's own side. Even honest politicians have been known to capitalize on the fact.

Kerry cannot be faulted, in our view, for sending his Jewish brother to Israel (and among domestic Jews) to make note of the fact that George Bush is a "born again" Christian, nor can he be faulted for sending his Roman Catholic sister among fellow Catholic practitioners with essentially the same message. Nor can Bush be faulted for using his religious faith to try to gain favor with those who think as he thinks. That is all part of the political process.

Where we find most fault with Kerry, as we said earlier in this column, is how he reacted to the Vietnam episode. His reaction to the Vietnam experience displays a spiritual and moral weakness that ought not be rewarded by election to this nation's highest office.

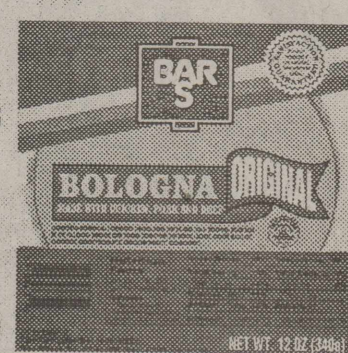

office records of all individuals who worked at the Appraisal District office between August 1, 2004 through September 13, 2004, (2) a list of all taxing authorities, (3) how much was collected for each taxing authority in 2002, 2003 and 2004, (4) the collected percentage that each authority received during those years, and (5) a copy of current year contracts of the taxing authorities and how much those authorities have paid in taxes to the Appraisal District in 2002, 2003, and 2004.

In a October 11 interview Tax Appraiser Sheila Faulkenberry stated she did not wish to make a comment as she did not know what the FISD complaint was.

Faulkenberry said the Appraisal District Board did vote in a special board meeting to hire Attorney Jeff Jones to represent the Board and to speak with FISD's attorney on any complaints.

The Appraisal District Board is made up of representatives of each taxing entity's board, including Kerry Pratt, from FISD. Pratt voted along with the rest of the Appraisal Board to hire an attorney. The attorney will be paid for by the taxing entities.

"I'm sorry we had to have an attorney," said Faulkenberry, "but the board members felt it would be best for the Appraisal District."

The attorney representing FISD is Fred Stormer from Underwood Law in Amarillo. Stormer failed to return calls made by The Hesperian-Beacon.

Following much discussion about the need for another school suburban, the board approved the purchase of another new suburban by a split vote of 4 in favor and 3 against. Board Members Mitch Probasco, Mark McCormick, Bill Dean and Bart Greer voted in favor of the motion made by Greer and seconded by Dean. Board Members Rachel Castillo, Kerry Pratt and Amado Morales voted against the motion.

Superintendent Vaughn told

the board there were already four suburbs in the school's fleet. One of those was bought with designated 'migrant' money and "could only be used for migrant transportation," said Vaughn.

According to Vaughn, there is a real need for another suburban when transporting teachers, staff and students in small groups to different events through out the school year.

Board Member Morales asked, "Can we use a small mini bus for this purpose?"

Vaughn responded, "The 15 to 19 passenger mini vans get only 8 to 9 miles per gallon of gasoline and cost around \$47,000, while the suburbs get around 20 to 23 miles per gallon and cost around \$31,000."

In a related matter, the board approved upgrading two of the school's used custodial/maintenance pickups for later models. Vaughn said, "The 1985 Chevy S-10 is in bad shape and the 1991 Chevy 1/2 ton pickup at the Junior High needs replacing. We think we can buy replacement used pickups in the \$6,000 to \$7,000 range." The motion to upgrade the pickups was made by Board Member Morales and seconded by Board Member Dean. The motion passed 6 to 1. Board Member Pratt voted against the motion.

The board unanimously ap-

proved a yearly resolution to allow Floyd County Extension Agents J.D. Ragland and Melissa Long, along with FCE personnel Pam Foster and Toby Lepley, to become Adjunct Faculty Members for FISD.

"This way when students are gone on Ag or FFA trips to stock shows, we can still count them as 'present' in our schools," said Vaughn.

The board approved the hiring of Nikki Oakes to be a teacher assistant at R.C. Andrews Elementary in the FLC unit.

In another matter, Board Member Pratt asked Vaughn about a whooping cough report at the CCLC school. Vaughn said, "Friday's week ago, one student was confirmed to have had whooping cough at CCLC. The Health Department was informed and it was traced back to Lubbock ISD. The student received treatment with antibiotic therapy and within two hours letters were sent out to parents."

#### Would you like to be permanently excused from Jury Service

The District Clerk's office is in the process of going to a electronic jury wheel system, therefore to help this system run efficiently we need your assistance.

A person who is over 70 years of age may establish a permanent exemption by furnishing a signed statement to the tax assessor-collector. A person summoned for jury service who files a statement with the Court Clerk under Section 62.107 of the government Code claiming an exemption from jury service on the grounds of being over 70 years of age may claim the permanent exemption by including in the statement a declaration that he desires a permanent exemption.

The Judge of a District Court may, by order, permanently or for a special period exempt from jury service a person with a physical or mental impairment or with an inability to comprehend or communicate the English language. If you are requesting an exemption due to physical or mental impairment, the person must attach a statement from a physician to the affidavit.

We would like to have you serve as a juror in Floyd County, but if you so choose to claim a permanent exemption you may do so by filling out and signing an exemption form. Please come by the District Clerk's office, Room 207, Floyd County Courthouse or contact the District Clerk's office at 983-4923 and a form can be mailed to you.

## Caprock Hospital Board discusses EMS expenses

The Caprock Hospital District Board met Tuesday, October 19, and discussed the renewal contract of Dr. Salman Ahmad of the Cogdell Clinic. Board Member Tom Farris told the Hesperian-Beacon, "We are all in agreement, but we are still in negotiation. The board fully intends to renew Dr. Ahmad's contract at next month's regular board meeting."

In other matters, the board voted not to purchase a new first responder Fox vehicle for EMS. However, the board did extend the maintenance contract on the existing first responder Fox vehicle for another 24 months.

Concerning EMS backup fire runs for the City of Floydada, the board voted not to charge the City for these backup fire runs, as had

been suggested by EMS personnel at a previous board meeting. Farris told the Hesperian-Beacon, "Because of a new law concerning overtime, the board did discuss the need to restructure the schedules of the EMS and the paramedics to keep their overtime in a manageable range."

According to Farris, the board tabled any action on Christmas bonuses for the EMS personnel. "The EMS made 56 runs in August and 57 runs in September. This gives the EMS a total of 473 runs for the year up to the present time," said Farris.

The board approved \$282.08 of indigent health care claims and according to Farris, the PNS Cogdell Clinic made a profit of \$18,314.18 for the month of September and it has shown a quarterly profit of \$61,780.61.

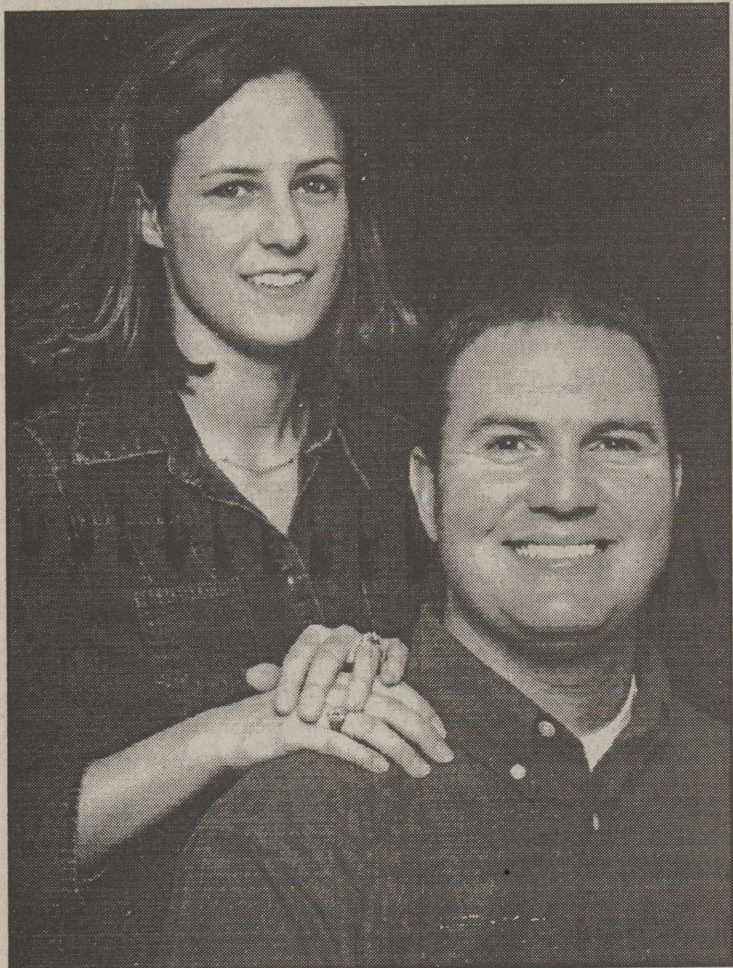

Not only statistics but common sense tells you it is better and less expensive to prevent a crime than to investigate, prosecute, and incarcerate the perpetrator - to say nothing of the cost to the victim of the crime. Simple deductive reasoning will lead anyone to the conclusion that if Law Enforcement will aggressively target known criminals, crime can be lowered and sometimes prevented. The citizen that steps out of the Post Office and drives a few blocks to the Dairy Queen, and forgets to buckle up their seat belt, is not the person who wants to rape your daughter, burglarize your home or sell drugs to your children. Yes, traffic laws need to be enforced but there has to be a sense of proportion and priority to Law Enforcement. If elected sheriff I will focus efforts to prevent serious crimes by aggressive patrol, surveillance of known drug dealers, burglars and other criminals. We will work hard at catching parole and probation violations to send convicted felons to prison where they can't commit more crimes against Floyd County citizens.

## Whirlwinds upended by Longhorns in Floyd County Championship

The Lockney Longhorns jumped to a 14-0 lead and capitalized on four Floydada turnovers to coast to a 42-14 victory last week in the annual battle for Floyd County bragging rights for the next year. More importantly, Lockney's win moved the Longhorns into sole control of first place in the District 6-2A race - with three weeks remaining in the regular season. Gaining revenge for Floydada's 28-18 victory a year ago, the Horns improved to 5-2 overall and 2-0 in district action. The Whirlwinds dropped to 3-4 for the season and 1-1 in the district campaign.

The Longhorns' Mark Ford rushed for 191 yards and 3 touchdowns, and added another score via a 30-yard pass from Cagan Cummings to start Lockney's scoring onslaught at Floydada's jam-packed Wester Field. Lockney's defense held the Whirlwind attack to almost a hundred yards under its per-game average. A shoulder injury to Luke Miller, apparently during the Whirlwinds' first series, was a definite factor in the Whirlwinds' lack of offensive output.

Both defenses were pretty well in control for most of the opening period. The Longhorns' first scoring drive, starting at the 5:25 mark of the first quarter, featured two runs by Ford of 11 and 12 yards, respectively, for key first downs. Trey Graves recovered a loose ball near midfield, helping Lockney retain possession during the drive. Cummings capped the 11-play, 71-yard advance with the touchdown toss to Ford in the final seconds of the first period.

Following the ensuing kickoff, Floydada had its first of four turnovers. Graves recovered for Lockney, putting the Horns back in business at the Whirlwind 19. Floydada's defense toughened and took over on downs at the Whirlwind 9-yard line. But the 'Winds committed their second turnover in the early stages of the second quarter, as Rance Schumacher recovered to give Lockney the ball at the Whirlwind 8-yard line. Ford crossed the double stripe on the next play and Dahlen McCarter connected

## Ford, Marricle, Beedy and Harris win football contest

In determining third place, Beedy and Harris both chose Floydada to win. The second tie-breaker was needed to decide who would win the third place prize. But both entries again chose the incorrect team as they both chose Dallas to win. (Dallas lost to the Pittsburg Steelers).

Melanie Beedy and Franklin Harris, both of Floydada will split the third place check of \$10. Honorable Mention goes to Jackie Chadwick and Max Yeary,

on his second of six extra-point attempts to extend the Longhorns' lead to 14-0.

In a post-game interview, Floydada coach Lee Hurt commented, "It really hurt us to lose (Luke) Miller there in the early going. We just made too many mistakes and those turnovers, giving Lockney the short field and all, were critical. A good team, such as Lockney, is going to take advantage of those mistakes...and they certainly capitalized on our errors."

Following a Floydada punt midway through the second quarter, Mark Ford ran for a 78-yard touchdown - only to have it nullified by a holding penalty. After an exchange of punts, Floydada struck quickly. On a second-down play at midfield, backup quarterback Trey Helms pitched to Ty Heflin, who lofted a pass to wide-open Jacob Reddy - streaking down the East sideline toward the North end zone. The perfectly-executed halfback pass covered 50 yards, Helms added the conversion kick and the 'Winds had cut the Longhorn lead by half. However, Lockney scored in the final seconds of the first half, with Monte Lass covering the final 8 yards. McCarter's kick was again true, pushing Lockney's lead to 21-7 at intermission.

The third period was all Lockney, as Ford scored on a 57-yard run and Cummings carried in from 11 yards out. Ford again found the end zone 7 seconds into the final period. His third rushing touchdown of 15 yards, followed by McCarter's kick, assured the Longhorns' the victory in the Floyd County Championship series. The Whirlwinds refused to quit, however. Freshman backup quarterback Payte Beedy ran for a 32-yard touchdown on a busted play with 41 seconds remaining in the game.

"I was pleased the way our kids didn't give up...even when the game was totally out of reach," said Coach Hurt. "It was our worst defeat in this series in several years, but our kids kept playing hard to the bitter end. We missed Luke almost as much on defense as we did on offense." Sophomore Tate Jones had his

best game as a Whirlwind with 13 tackles. Justin Martinez was able to make 10 stops, after missing the Olton game due to a foot injury. Rance Schumacher led the Longhorn defense with 9 tackles.

Lockney returns home to Mitchell-Zimmerman Field tomorrow night to host the rebounding Olton Mustangs.

After losing to the Whirlwinds 35-19 on the opening night of district action, the Mustangs blasted winless Dimmitt 60-0 last Friday. The Mustangs' David Phares scored on runs of 95, 52, 22 and 22 yards and returned a Bobcat punt for 70 yards and another touchdown. Phares finished the night with 230 yards on just 12 carries. Coach Hurt added, "We've still got three tough district games to go, and a lot of things can still happen...we're still in the playoff hunt, and we've got to rebound to face a good Friona team next Friday." Friona gave a favored Tulia team all it could handle until the Hornets pulled away with two fourth-quarter scores. "We've just got to put the Lockney loss behind us and concentrate on this week's game against Friona," said Hurt. "We'll be O.K....we've just got to correct some mistakes and continue to take them one week at a time."

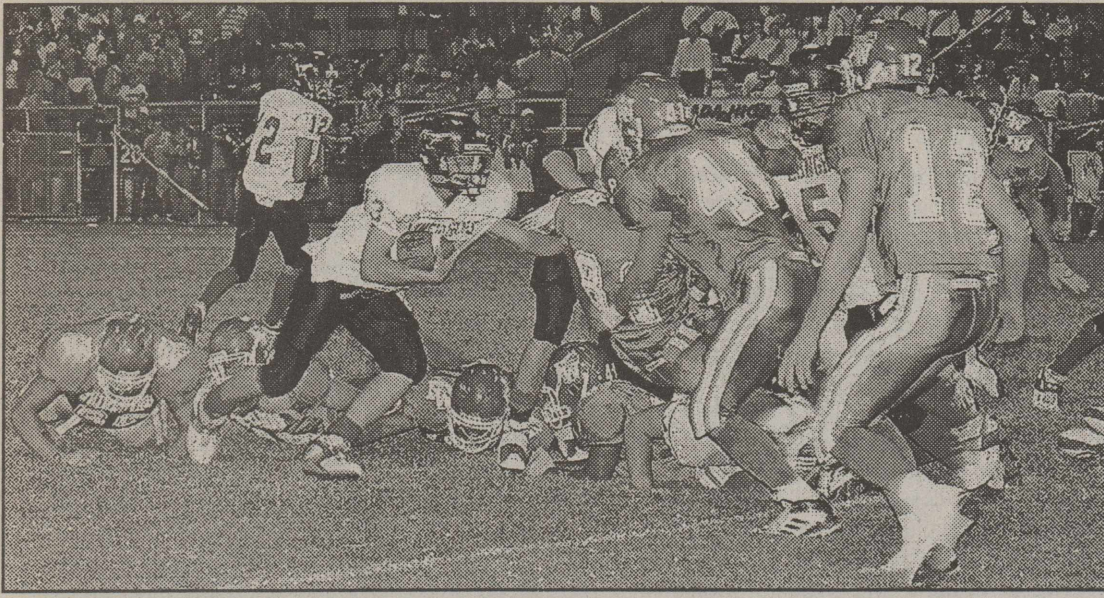

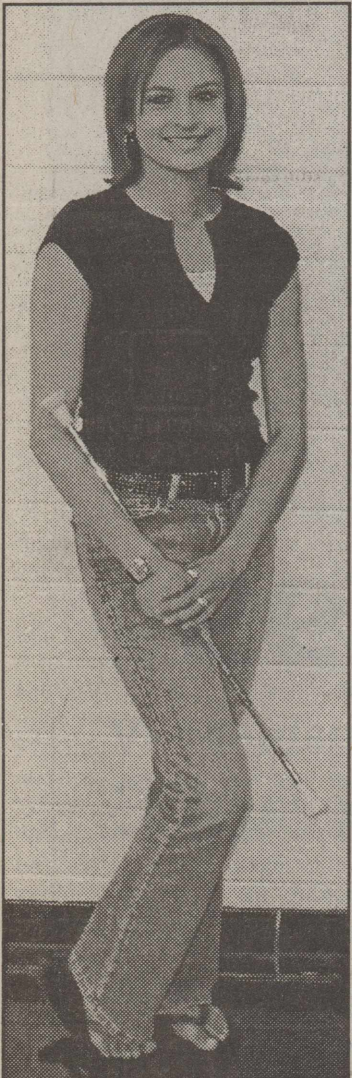
## Longhorns roll over Whirlwinds

"This was a big win for us," Coach Robertson said. "Not only did we win a Floyd County Championship, but we won an important district ballgame which puts us in the driver's seat."

Olton beat Dimmitt 60-0 as they too are 1-1 while the Bobcats are 0-2. Lockney will continue district play on Friday as they host the Olton Mustangs starting at 7:30 p.m.

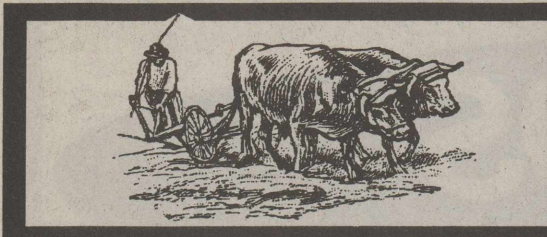

## FSA makes CC program announcements: final 2003 CCP rate and 1st 2004 advance CCP rate

The wait is almost over for growers eager to learn what the final 2003 Counter-Cyclical Program payment rate will be. Announcement of a 2003 market year average price of 61.8 cents per pound by USDA's National Ag Statistics Service put the wheels in motion for Farm Service Agency officials to make the final calculations and begin the process of making payments to DCP program participants. NASS published the data on October 12.

Using the 61.8 cent figure announced by NASS, the final 2003 Counter-Cyclical Payment rate is estimated to be 3.93 cents per pound. Growers who received the initial 2.01 cent 2003 CC advance payment in October 2003 would receive an additional 1.92 cents per pound.

Growers who did not receive the first 2003 advance payment would receive the full 3.93 cent payment amount because the second upland cotton advance payment rate was set at zero.

As if the pending announcement of the 2003 final CC payment rate weren't enough, USDA is also expected to announce the first 2004 advance payment rate for Upland cotton.

It is thought that the 2004 program announcement will come at the same time as announcement of the final 2003 CC payment rate. If that is the case FSA could be making both payments at the same time.

FSA will set the first 2004 advance payment rate based on the supply, demand and price implications included in the October 12 World Supply and Demand Estimate report. Based on this report, the first 2004 advance payment for the CCP is expected to be the maximum allowed under the 2002 Farm Bill.

If that assumption is correct growers can expect to see an advance payment rate of approximately 4.8 cents, or 35 percent of the maximum 13.73 cent Upland cotton CC payment rate.

Based on these estimates, producers could receive between 6.72 and 8.73 cents per pound in 2003 and 2004 CC program payments within the next few weeks. Some growers may net less than these amounts if they received any advance payments on grain sorghum or corn in 2003.

The final 2003 payment rate for these two crops are expected to fall to zero because price rallies carried their average market price above the point at which a CC payment would be triggered.

## Disaster signed and sealed by President, focus now shifts to FSA to get it delivered

Signed, sealed and awaiting delivery is the most accurate description of the 2003/2004 Crop Disaster Program that charted a painful course through Congress over the past few weeks.

The bottom line for High Plains cotton producers is that help is on the way to those that came up short in 2003 or 2004. The next step is to figure out how the new program will be implemented.

Fortunately, most of the nuts and bolts of the program were assembled way back in 2001 for growers who suffered crop losses during the 2000 growing season.

That year the program instituted a differential payment rate for insured and non-insured crops. In the 2000 CDP the new payment rates were calculated as 65% of the multi-peril insurance (MPCI) price for insured crops and 60% of the MPCI price for uninsured crops. The program

also initiated a new quality adjustment provision for cotton that allowed growers to apply for benefits on a bale-by-bale basis.

Much of that same program was carried forward for the 2001/2002 Crop Disaster Program (CDP) except: a lower 50%/45% pay structure for insured/non-insured crops; the inclusion of a 95% benefit cap; and a gross income test to determine program eligibility.

An \$80,000 payment limit is also expected to be in effect for the program as was the case in past CDP programs. The three-entity rule is also expected to be in effect for benefits under this program.

What this means for the 2003/2004 Crop Disaster program is that the FSA shouldn't have to reinvent the wheel to get things rolling.

The similarities between the last two disaster assistance programs and the 2003/2004 assistance package should also; allow FSA to quickly verify the common parts of the programs in question; give FSA an opportunity to correct some of the unexpected problems that were identified during delivery of the last program; and then update the software that will help deliver the program.

The following is a rough estimation of what Plains Cotton Growers thinks the 2003/2004 CDP will look like, based on the information currently available.

As more information is developed PCG will be pulling together a 2003/2004 Disaster spreadsheet to help growers determine if they are eligible for assistance and how much benefit they will be able to receive.

Looking at previous CDP programs indicates the 2003/2004 program will provide assistance for both quantity and quality losses. As in the 2000 CDP program, 2003/2004 applications should be accepted on a unit-by-unit basis when the actual production in the year of the application is less than 65% of the higher of the producers Actual Production History (APH) yield or the county average yield.

The county average yield will be calculated using figures supplied by the National Agricultural Statistics Service. It is not known what time periods will be used to calculate the county average yields for the 2003/2004 CDP.

A Non-harvest factor will also be developed by each State and applied to disaster payments on acreage not harvested.

Payment rates for the quantity loss portion of the program

would be calculated as they were in the 2000 crop Disaster Program. Under this scenario the payment rate for insured crops would be 65 percent of the multiperil crop insurance price election for the year of loss. Uninsured crops would be paid at a rate equal to 60 percent of the MPCI price for the crop.

Crops for which no insurance is available would be paid at a rate equal to 65 percent of the Non-insured Assistance Program (NAP) price.

MPCI price elections for upland cotton were 52 cents per pound in 2003 and 60 cents per pound in 2004.

As mentioned earlier in this article, quality losses will also be included in the 2003/2004 CDP. Implementation procedures for the quality provisions are expected to mirror those used in both the 2000 and 2001/2002 CDP programs.

In the last two programs quality losses were calculated in two different ways, depending on how the losses manifested themselves during the year.

The first method available for growers in previous programs is through an adjustment in the amount of production to count in the CDP payment calculation. Under this portion of the Quality Loss Program, average quality data for crops harvested during the year can be provided to the County Office and used to lower the amount of production counted against the maximum disaster level.

Additionally, the previous two CDP programs offered a separate bale-by-bale Quality Loss Program (QLP). This could be an extremely valuable program for producers who suffered primarily quality losses and whose actual yield losses were not large enough to meet the 35 percent loss threshold for the Crop Loss portion of the program.

The stand-alone Quality Loss program will require a complete listing of all bales produced and the average loan value for each to determine eligibility and payment amounts.

Many of the details of the 2003/2004 CDP will not be known for several weeks. The information provided in this article is offered as an educated guess about how the program might look and to remind producers about the type of information they will need to gather when the signup period opens.

Additional information and specifics about the 2003/2004 program will be provided as it becomes available.

### How 2000 CDP Payments were calculated:

Acre x APH Yield or County Average x .65 = Max. Disaster Level (lbs.)

## Cotton Market Weekly

Cotton futures at the New York Board of Trade rebounded after settling sharply lower Tuesday in response to USDA's October supply and demand report. The figures contained in the report came as a surprise to many analysts and industry experts who had anticipated a lower U.S. crop estimate.

The 2004-05 U.S. projections by USDA included higher production, exports, and ending stocks. Production was raised 650,000 bales to a record 21.5 million as decreases for the Southeast due to storm damage were more than offset by production increases in Texas and the Mississippi Delta. The department left domestic mill use virtually unchanged. Exports were raised 100,000 bales to 12.3 million, and U.S. ending stocks were boosted 10 Percent to an estimated 6.7 million bales.

Industry participants had been expecting USDA to reduce its estimate of U.S. cotton output to around 20.3 million bales due to harsh weather in several cotton producing states.

"As it turned out, storms that roared into the Southeast, the second largest cotton producing area in the United States, did not have much of an effect on the overall size of the U.S. crop because production in other parts of the nation was so high," said one cotton market observer.

According to USDA, world cotton production for 2004-05 will reach 109.7 million bales, more than 10 percent higher than the previous record set in 2001-02.

Sharply higher production relative to the department's September figures raised world ending stocks despite a moderate increase in world consumption.

A nine percent increase in India's crop, attributable mainly to more planted acres, accounted for approximately half of the world cotton production increase in the October report. In addition to the United States and India, production also was expected to be higher in Pakistan and Turkey.

World cotton consumption was raised 0.5 percent from last month due to increases in China, India and Pakistan. World trade virtually was unchanged as higher projected imports by China were offset by decreases for India and Pakistan. World ending stocks were raised almost five percent from last month to approximately 42.0 million bales.

Meanwhile, USDA also reported net export sales of U.S. cotton in the week ended Oct. 7 totaled 98,800 bales, 25 percent lower than one week earlier. Primary buyers included Turkey, Hong King, Thailand and Indonesia. The decrease in export sales was not a surprise to most analysts.

"With the potential of having a record U.S. and world crop, many mills continue to buy cotton on a hand-to-mouth basis," one observer noted. "The Chinese are down to two weeks of supplies because they are not worried about a shortage of cotton at any point because

the world crop is so big."

Export shipments of 85,600 bales were 15 percent lower than the previous week but 18 percent higher than the four-week average. Major destinations were Mexico, Turkey and Canada.

On the spot cotton scene, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 4,070 bales online compared to the previous week when 4,510 bales were sold. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 40.27 to 44.34 cents per pound versus the previous week's range of 41.05 to 44.53 cents per pound.
