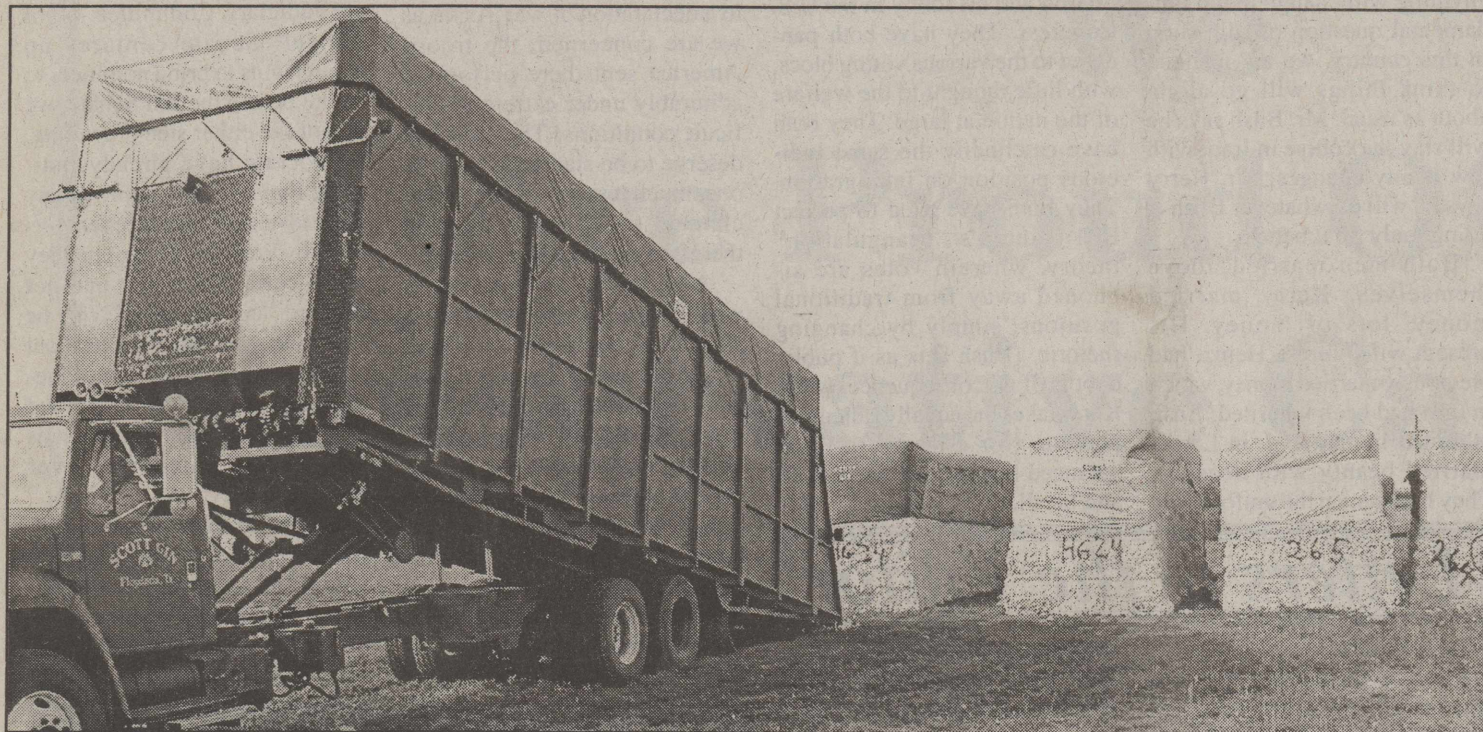


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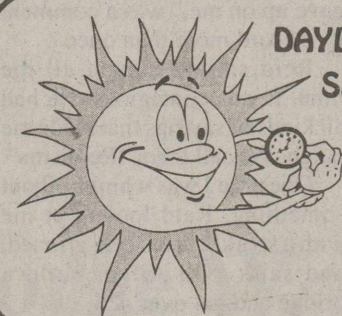

Superintendent search brings division in LISD board

An announcement of the upcoming retirement of Raymond Lusk has led the LISD Board into discussions concerning the methods to find a new superintendent.

In a regular board meeting, October 19, after a lengthy discussion trustees voted 4-3 to open the search to outside contenders and to hire a consultant to conduct the search. After the vote the board decided to check on the references of two different consultants and to meet again on October 26 to vote on which consultant they would hire.

A division has occurred among the board after being notified that Lockney Principal Phil Cotham intended to apply for the job of Superintendent. No other LISD faculty member has expressed an interest in the position.

Several members of the board, Mike Ford, Aaron Wilson, Jeff Terrell and Jesse Garza want to open the search outside the LISD faculty. Trustees John Quebe, Lonnie Hooten, and Robbie Long

argued on behalf of first looking, and hiring, within LISD if the applicant was qualified.

To answer questions the board might have concerning a consultant search, Board President John Quebe asked two consultants to meet with the board.

Kathee Lupton, a search consultant with the Texas Association of School Boards, addressed the LISD Board first.

Lupton told the board the search process is very time consuming for the trustees themselves. There will be many meetings over a period of 5 months. Her cost would be \$5,500 plus expenses (expenses would be approximately \$500 maximum).

Lupton stated an Open Search would allow "insiders" to apply and also open it up to those outside LISD.

"This might affect the pool of applicants," said Lupton, "but to be honest the pool is a puddle."

When asked by Quebe if it was hard for "outside" applicants if there is someone from inside

LISD applying, Lupton said,

"If you look at the insider first and then decide to go with a search you are sending a message" (to the insider).

Lupton also said that if there was an insider with the support of the community, etc., it would be hard to find outside applicants who would want to go up against that.

"Your applicants will probably be 1A school superintendents and principals here (in LISD)..."

"Judging from the pool that I know is out there, it is best to hire inside first--if the applicant is qualified and has performed well."

Richard Roberts, an independent consultant with Texas Retired Teachers Association, also addressed the board.

Roberts told the board his cost was \$325 per day plus 25¢ a mile (with a \$4,500 cap on pay and mileage).

"The average search last 10-

12 days," said Roberts. "Advertising for a superintendent was the easiest part of the process. "You will get applications from everywhere".

When asked, Roberts also said it would be good to look inside first.

Quebe asked Roberts how many applicants he thought there would be.

Roberts had a more positive outlook on the amount of people who would apply. "I believe you will get about 60 applicants. You will get applicants from smaller school districts and young bright principals. You will get applicants from older and more weathered superintendents and from superintendents running from something."

"You will get quite a few from out of state. They may be good quality but will know nothing about Texas schools. Many will want to retire from another state and move here."

"You need to find a person

who is likely to stay."

Before the discussion began among the board members each trustee was handed copies of 33 letters that had been delivered to the LISD office, for the trustees, in support of Principal Cotham.

Quebe, Hooten, and Long also told the trustees they had been keeping a phone record of the calls concerning this issue. "The number of people calling are overwhelmingly in support of Cotham."

Lonnie Hooten said, "I don't need a consultant. I've heard around town. They all want us to go with someone we know--someone within the system. To be quite honest, I've only had one call for a wide open search."

Robbie Long said, "I want to hire Phil. I have a list of people who called and they want Phil. We heard right here that the pool is not a pool--it's a puddle. Phil has been here a long time."

Jeff Terrell said, "I would like to digest all of this awhile

longer."

"I don't want to delay this," said Quebe. "There is a lot of anxiety and the community doesn't need this."

"The way I see this is you are in favor of Phil Cotham or you want an open search. We have a decision."

"There is a large group for Phil," said Ford, "but there is also a large group who want a search to see what is out there. The way I look at it if we don't do a search it is like building a box and never peeking over the edge to see what is outside. A large percent of the community want us to explore the possibility."

"All I see is a preponderance of this," said Quebe, pointing to the letters. "Where are those people? (referring to supporters of an open search)."

"Maybe they don't want to talk to you," said Ford.

"Why not?" asked Quebe.

"I don't know," said Ford. Continued On Page 14

City of Lockney recognized by state officials for contribution to local effort

The Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA) honored Lockney Mayor Rodger Stapp, and City Administrator Ron Hall on October 18, 2004 at the Swisher County Courthouse in Tulia, the county seat, for having secured a \$278,368.00 Texas Small Towns Environment Program grant from the agency for a new wastewater treatment plant located on the city farm south of Lockney.

The City of Lockney was one of 119 grant recipients honored at the event, which recognized

awardees who had received over \$4,897,373.00 in total grants from ORCA between September 1, 2003 and August 31, 2004.

"We applaud and commend the efforts of every recipient for their commitment and dedication to rural Texas," said J. Randel (Jerry) Hill, ORCA's Acting Executive Director. "ORCA was created to assist rural Texans with building their own communities, and I am pleased to commend the leaders of every community who applied for funding to support and address the needs of their

community."

ORCA was created by the 77th Legislature to facilitate and focus the State's health, economic development, and community development programs targeting rural communities in Texas.

ORCA's programs and services support health care delivery in rural Texas, and address rural community planning activities, and housing and public facility needs such as sewer, water system, road, drainage improvements, and disaster relief funds.

Town Hall meeting in Lockney looks at downtown beautification

Approximately 60 citizens met Tuesday night at the Lockney Community Center to discuss the Downtown Beautification plan. Mayor Roger Stapp opened the meeting and gave a report of the old movie house clean up project. A number of citizens including a good turnout of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce Junior Board have been working on this project.

City Administrator Ron Hall gave an update on the "Citizens Collection Center" located at the old fair building. The center is expected to be in full use sometime around mid December. Citizens of Lockney, not businesses, can take tree limbs, old furniture,

appliances etc. to the center for disposal at no charge. "This will help clean up our alleys and community", said Hall.

The city is waiting to hear if they will be awarded a Solid Waste Management Grant in the amount of \$58,000 to help fund this project. Ron advised the crowd that he felt optimistic about a \$150,000 grant to repair some of the sidewalks on main street. (Since the meeting the City has been advised they have received the \$58,000 Solid Waste Management Grant).

Larry Mullins, representative of the Beautification Committee, addressed the meeting and presented two paintings showing

what downtown Lockney could look like with just painting the buildings, repairing or replacing awnings, street lights and a few flower boxes.

Larry also reported on the movie house project. "The Lockney Chamber Junior Board have done an excellent job," said Mullins. "We hope to build a stage area and upstairs meeting rooms in the theater."

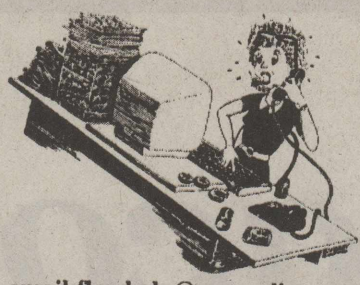

My family, and a lot other families, lost a dear friend last week.

Reid Rogers, 19, the son of Pastor Steve and Debbie Rogers, of Trinity Fellowship Church in Plainview, was killed in a tragic car accident Wednesday, October 20.

He was one of my son's best friends and we considered Reid part of our family.

Another young lady, Katee Mansdoerfer, was also killed in the accident. Four other Wayland students in the Jeep SUV with Reid were injured. One of the injured kids was Tyler Topper, 22, of Lockney. He is out of the hospital and was able to attend Reid's funeral.

The vehicle the SUV collided with, a Grand Am, had four inside. Two of them are still in the hospital.

The Jeep was attempting to pass an 18 wheeler and the sun in the driver's eyes prevented her from seeing the Grand Am. Both cars attempted to swerve but still hit almost head on.

It has been an emotional week-end. A lot of teenagers learned they aren't immortal and now understand why parents worry about them whenever they go anywhere in a car.

Danny Andrews, of the Plainview Herald, wrote a wonderful story about Reid, and his funeral, in the Sunday newspaper.

The funeral was really more of a "celebration of Reid's life". And what a life it was!

Reid made an impact on everyone he met. He had a gift of meeting someone for the first time and making that person feel, almost immediately, like they were the most important person in the world to Reid.

He asked questions--lots of questions--about everything he was involved in. He made us laugh over his curiosity. But it was that same curiosity that made him genuinely interested in whoever he was talking to. He knew all about you before he left the room and he remembered it.

He was an encourager. He worried over everyone. If he found out you had a problem, or were worried, or depressed--then he was the first one who called you or appeared on your doorstep to encourage.

He was a wonderful example to everyone around him--adults and teenagers. He truly walked his Christian faith and was wise and mature way beyond his years.

When I first got to know Reid he was coming to Lockney baseball games to cheer for Brandon. He started getting to know other Lockney kids and then started coming to different sporting events to show his support for those kids.

One of the first baseball games he showed up at was very cold (as usual) and we (teens and adults) were all cuddled under blankets. Brandon was called out to pitch (for the first time), and I jokingly said, "Oh--we need to pray!"

Reid said, "O.K. Let's do that". He grabbed the hands next to him, bowed his head, and said a quick and sincere prayer for Brandon.

He was not in the least embarrassed. In fact--it was obvious that it never occurred to him to be embarrassed. It was not a show for everyone to see--it was just a sincere sign of love and support for Brandon.

Some of Reid's friends got together Saturday night and told stories to remember Reid. We laughed and laughed. It felt good.

Some teens told us they wouldn't be in church if it hadn't have been for Reid. "He never gave up on me," was a comment I've heard more than once.

Reid smiled almost all the time. It was contagious. He had all kinds of sayings that made me laugh. We call them "Reidisms".

One time I was whining about something. Reid looked at me with a sparkle in his eye, grinned, and said, "Oh Alice, build a bridge and get over it!"

Another time my son and I were arguing over what we were going to watch on T.V. Reid stopped Brandon by saying, "Hey Brandon, lets go watch the T.V. you payed for!"

One more time--he made us laugh.

I could go on and on. I know most of you didn't know him. I wish you had because your life would have been better for it.

The Bible tells us there is a season for everything. Obviously I think Reid's season was too short.

I couldn't help but be angry at God for taking Reid. It wasn't fair. He was only 19. I just knew he hadn't done all the things he was supposed to do.

Thank goodness that God's mercy and grace covers my anger. God understands grief.

As the anger wears off I'm beginning to thank God more for letting me know Reid. For giving us 19 years.

I know there has to be death before there is life. I know where Reid is right now. I don't know how anyone copes with these situations without that knowledge.

At the funeral, Wayland President Dr. Paul Armes told the packed church, "Maybe as we go along there will be fewer questions about why he was taken and more questions about why he was here."

I know we didn't deserve Reid, but I'm glad God gave him to us anyway.

Judging by what we read in the newspapers and hear on television, the upcoming election next Tuesday will be "the most important in our lifetime."

We don't see it that way. All elections are important, and this one is no less important than any previous election, and will be no less important than any that might follow. But in terms of what will change, or how much anything will change in the fundamental question of direction in this country, we are inclined to think things will go along about as usual. Mr. Bush says he will stay the course in Iraq, with few if any changes. Mr. Kerry says he will do whatever Bush is doing, only do it better.

Both men married above themselves. Kerry married money, lots of money. His present wife, Teresa Heinz, had previously married money, which in turn had been inherited. Bush inherited money and, in Laura, married beauty with decency. They both put on the uniform and

got out of it as quickly as politically possible, one with an eye to the future and one with no thought of the future.

So in many respects we think things will go along about as usual, no matter which one wins. Both have made their commitment to the status quo in the Middle East, which means they are both committed to pleasing Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon and his lobby in the U.S. Congress. They have both pandered to the various voting blocs, with little thought to the welfare of the nation at large. They both have essentially the same ludicrous position on immigration. They both have tried to perfect Bill Clinton's "triangulation" theory, wherein votes are siphoned away from traditional positions, simply by changing rhetoric. (Bush acts as if public debt is of no consequence, while Kerry takes the equally ridiculous position (for a Democrat) that balanced budgets are the end all and be all.)

We have made our own choice, difficult as it was. We have voted (absentee) for George Bush, not because of his position on foreign policy matters, but because of John F. Kerry's self-serving, baseless, slanderous comments about troops in Vietnam, a war, we might add, we were very much against until the Congress of the United States weighed in with what amounted to a declaration of war. As far as we are concerned, the troops America sent there performed admirably under extremely difficult conditions. They did not deserve to be slandered by anyone, much less by someone who claimed to be an officer, and therefore a leader, in that war.

Admittedly, we feel somewhat strongly about Mr. Kerry's slanderous comments. As far as we are concerned, his comments, and his actions, are among the lowest of the low, ranking only slightly higher than the gutless actions of those Texas House and Senate members who absented themselves from duty posts simply because they could not get their way on a political issue that might, or might not, affect their future paychecks.

Yes, this will be an important election, but all elections are important. This one may be important for reasons that generally escape media attention. The next President, whoever he is, is likely to select, and send to the Senate, one or more nominees for the United States Supreme Court. As long as the Senate is configured the way it is, we do not see any selection prevailing in the Senate Judiciary Committee. Until the full Senate conjures up enough guts to bring nominees to a vote before the full Senate, we do not see either side prevailing. Democrats have already indicated they will not approve any "controversial" nominee sent forward by President Bush, and they make certain that any one not deemed "controversial" will be someone a democratic President would nominate. If Kerry becomes President, the likelihood for "payback" from Republicans will be the same, and ever present.

About all the average citizen can do, is what we did. Make your mind and vote for the candidate you want to lead the country for the next few years, or "x" out the one you can't stand.

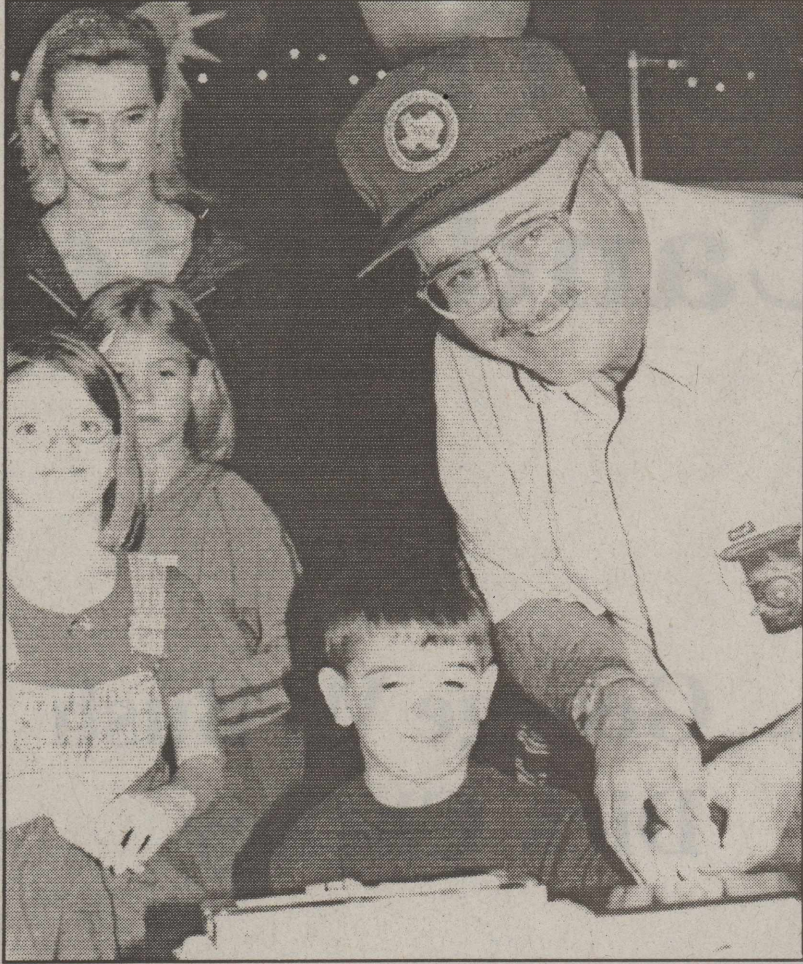

October 3, Lockney Police were investigating a burglary of a resident reported on September 23, and three suspects were found. The reports with suspect information have all been forwarded to the proper courts for procession.

Employees of the First Baptist Church reported to police that the Church had been burglarized sometime during the night. In excess of \$400 dollars worth of property has been reported missing. 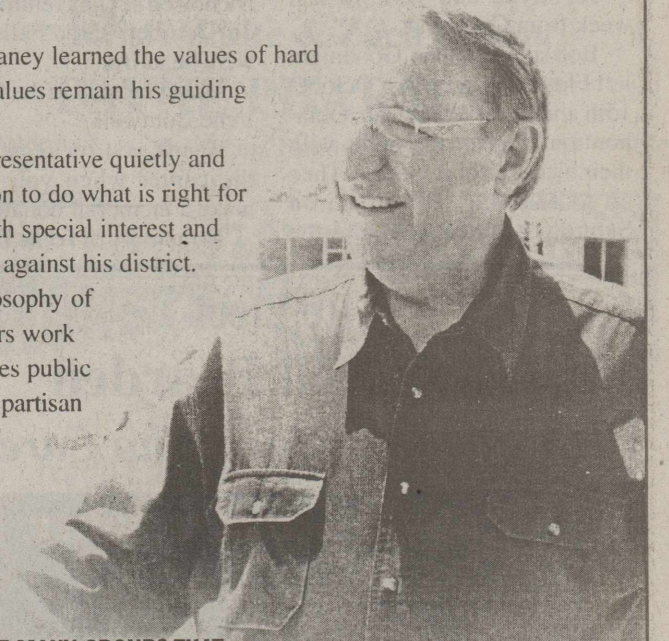

The First United Methodist Church of Lockney is sponsoring a new on-going project to supply new small toys for young children who are admitted to W. J. Mangold Memorial Hospital. It is intended to make hospital stays easier for the little ones.

The name "Peanut Project" came into being out of the experience of one young family in the Church. Shane and Jennifer Timms' baby son, Jayden, started having repeated bouts of respiratory trouble. Finally an x-ray showed a peanut lodged in one of his lungs. Jayden had surgery, is now twenty months old, and doing fine.

Mrs. Timms realized the need for toys or other activities to be made available for inpatient babies and children. "I felt God laid it on my heart to come up with a way for our Church family as well as others in the community to contribute toys, books, videos, games, blankets, crayons, etc. to the hospital for the children," she said. "The toy given to a young patient, will go home with him or her, as the hospital cannot properly sanitize it for another child to use."

The "Peanut Project" will begin this Sunday, October 31 during the morning service. "I will call the children present to come

forward with the toy they bring for a lesson on unselfish giving and an explanation of the project," said Pastor Neely Landrum. "Then we will say a prayer of dedication."

"We at First United Methodist Church would like to invite the community to come share with us Sunday morning during this special time," remarked Pastor Landrum. "Any toys bought for this project are to be brought to the Church office. Again, due to the continuous need, this will be an on-going project."

The following is a list of just some ideas of useful things: Golden Books or other sturdy books with thick cardboard pages, small/medium stuffed animals, plastic cars, blocks (Peek-A-Block, etc.), coloring books, cans of Play Doh, Crayons/washable markers/pencils, Doodle Boards, baby toys, snap together models (for beginners), Leap Frog Books (6 months through school age), DVD/VHS tapes for all age groups of children. (Because a lot of children need to be placed under a "mist tent" for oxygen, please do not buy anything that contains metal parts.)

The hospital estimates they have around 30 - 50 kids a month as patients.

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Chieftons hold on to defeat Whirlwinds in tough battle 17-6

Anyone who doesn't believe high school football can sometimes be a game of inches should have been in Friona last Friday night for the District 6-2A matchup between Floydada and the Chieftains. A Friona field goal in the first quarter, which hit the right upright before falling in for the score.

A deflected second-quarter pass that found a Chieftain running toward the double-stripe in full stride. A Floydada touchdown being called back due to a holding infraction. A Floydada runner blazing down the sideline for an apparent touchdown, only to have it ruled that he stepped out-of-bounds (ever-so-slightly) well upfield. Three Whirlwind turnovers which led to Chieftain scores. Friona fumbled six times, but was able to recover to retain possession each time.

All of these Friona breaks, coupled with the misfortunes for the Whirlwinds, resulted in an important 17-6 victory for the Chieftains. Friona improves to 4-4 for the season, and the Chieftains' 2-1 district mark enhances their playoff possibilities. The Whirlwinds dropped to 3-5 for the year and 1-2 in district play, with two weeks remaining in the regular season.

The Whirlwinds' turnover late in the opening period gave Friona good field position at Floydada's 27-yard line. Friona moved down to the Whirlwind 2-yard line, but a good defensive play by Justin Martinez tossed the Friona quarterback Derek Fairweather for a 3-yard loss. The Green Gang's defense stiffened and held the Chieftains to the 27-yard field goal by Antonio Monreal. Four minutes into the second quarter,

Fairweather aired out a pass which bounced off Willy Castillo and into the arms of David Devila for a 26-yard score.

Monreal's kick was true and the Chieftains took a 10-0 lead into the locker room at intermis-

sion.

With starting quarterback Luke Miller still nursing a shoulder injury, suffered last week in the loss to Lockney, Trey Helms drew his first starting assignment for Floydada. The junior signal-caller hit several passes on the money, but they were dropped by receivers eager to continue down field.

Helms hooked up with freshman Payte Beedy over the middle for a 9-yard touchdown late in the third quarter, drawing the 'Winds to within four points.

Monreal picked off a Helms pass early in the final stanza, setting up Friona's final, and deciding touchdown by Freddy Reyes from 7 yards out at the 10:44 mark of the fourth quarter.

Floydada was given another chance, late in the game, when freshman Blake Greer intercepted a Fairweather pass. A good open-field tackle was the only thing that kept Greer from scoring on the play. Moments later, Lionel Williams scored an apparent 24-yard touchdown - only to have it nullified by a holding penalty. Helms tossed a beautiful fade-route pass, which missed the out-stretched hands of receiver Jacob Reddy - again, by just inches. The Chieftains took possession, and made two first downs in the closing minutes to guarantee the win.

Whirlwind coach Lee Hurt, "Gosh, I guess they (Friona) got the breaks in the game and really capitalized on them...the field goal hitting the upright and dropping in, the deflected pass for a touchdown and all. It just seemed that we couldn't buy a break. Then, it was a killer to have Lionel's score called back due to a hold. I still haven't been able to pick that out in the film." The coach added, "I thought Trey (Helms) played well in his first start. It's just kind of hard to replace an experienced and talented senior such as Luke (Miller). But, we had our chances...things just didn't go our way."

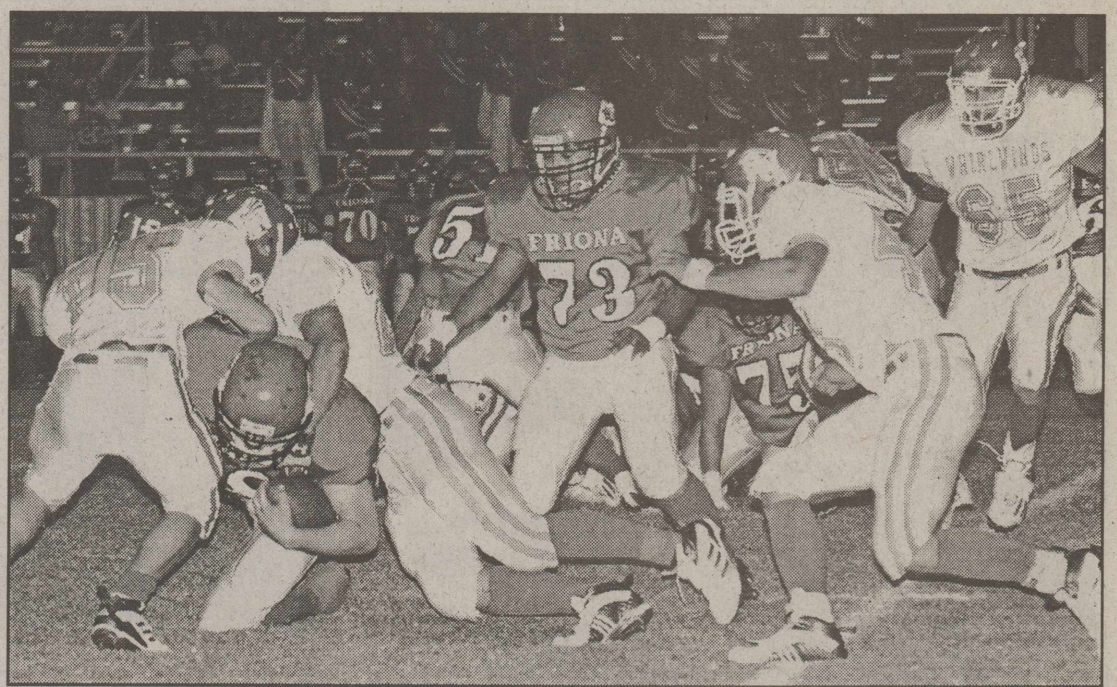
"We've got to shake this one off, and get ready for Tulia this week. It is very important for us to win our final two and it starts this week with Tulia," said Hurt. "A lot of things can still happen in the next two, and final two, weeks. We've just got to take care of the business at hand." The Hornets come to Floydada tomorrow night fresh off a 56-0 drubbing of hapless Dimmitt. The Hornets ((6-2 and 2-1) are in the thick of things for a play-off spot and a Whirlwind victory will put Floydada right back in the running for a post-season playoff berth. Friona hopes to keep its playoff hopes alive when the Chieftains travel to Olton this week. Olton lost 14-6 to District 6-2A leader Lockney last Friday.

The 7:30 P.M. kickoff at Wester Field tomorrow night between the Whirlwinds and Hornets will mark the first meeting between the schools in a while.

It has been a number of years since Floydada and Tulia have met on the gridiron. When they were members of the same district back in the 1980s, a fierce rivalry developed - mainly after long-time Floydada coach L.G. Wilson took over the Hornet program.

Following Wilson's retirement, Dan Pair assumed the head job in Tulia. Current Floydada High School principal Wayne Morren coached under Dan Pair at Tulia, prior to Pair's moving on to the Class 5A ranks. Pair is now an assistant at Lubbock Monterey, where former Friona mentor James Morton is now the head coach.

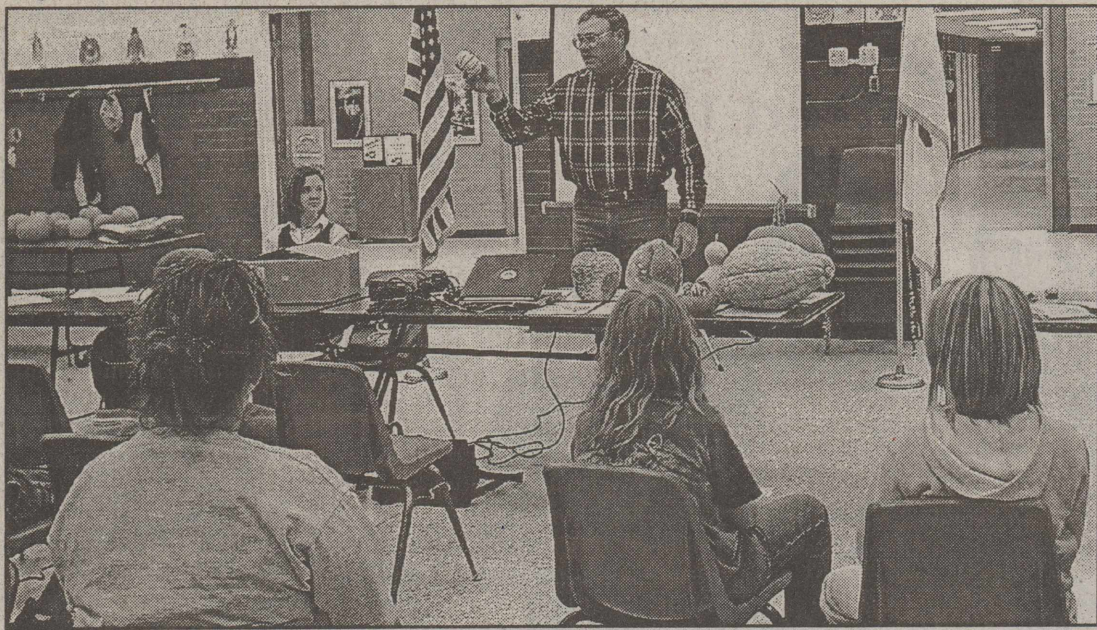

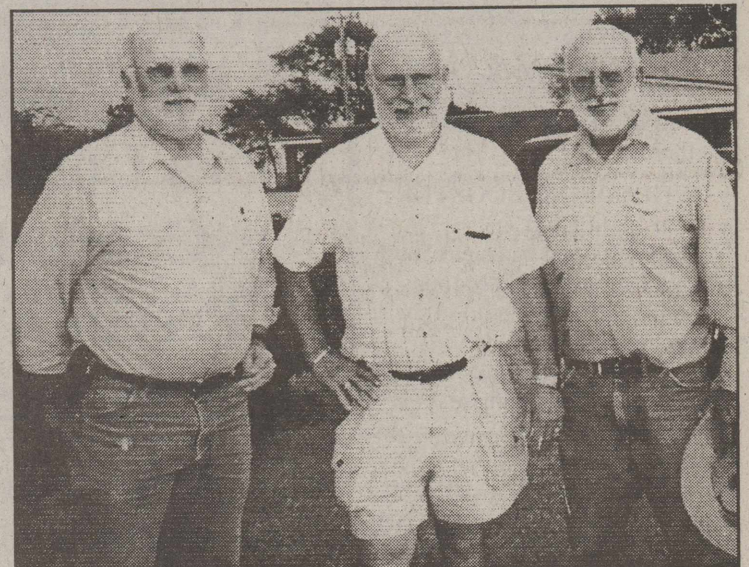

Longhorns win hard game against Olton 14-6

Everyone that showed up to Mitchell-Zimmerman field was able to see an exciting smash mouth football game which included the top two leading rushers in West Texas.

This was also an important District 6 2-A matchup which had plenty of playoff implications.

In the end, the Lockney Longhorns got the best of the Olton Mustangs. Lockney managed to pull out a victory in a hard fought contest 14-6.

Mark Ford and his offensive line racked up more yards on the ground than did area leading rusher, David Phares and his teammates. Ford finished the night with 193 yards on 27 carries and two touchdowns while Phares, who was averaging 177 yards per contest, was held to 89 yards on 23 carries.

"The old Mustangs came to play tonight," Coach Joe Robertson exclaimed. "Coach Gorman (Olton's Head Coach) did an excellent job getting his team ready for this type of ball game. Our defense has been awesome since district play began. These boys are just such hard nose competitors and I'm just glad that I get to stand on the sidelines with these warriors wearing the red jerseys."

Lockney's offense only managed to cross the goal line twice, but a couple of costly penalties and a strong Olton defense kept the Longhorns from running away with the game.

"We did not play very sharp at times especially when we had a couple of good drives going," Coach Robertson said. "That had alot to do with Olton's defense doing such a good job."

The Mustangs fumbled the ball to Longhorns on the first possession of the game, but Lockney failed to convert the turn over. Lockney drove the ball inside Olton's 20 yard line, but a

holding penalty backed the Longhorns out of the red zone. On the very next play, Cagan Cummings pass was intercepted by Olton's Tracy Deberry. Both teams traded a couple of punts ending the first quarter scoreless.

At the start of the second quarter, Lockney managed to put together a 12 play drive that went inside Olton's 25 yard line, but ended up turning it over on downs. Lockney's defense stayed tough forcing the Mustangs to punt the ball back to them. With just under four minutes to play in the half, Lockney used one of its new plays of the week and scored as Mark Ford busted through Olton's defense for a 32 yard touchdown. Dahlen McCarter's kick was good giving Lockney a 7-0 lead with 3:58 remaining in the second quarter. Lockney forced the Mustangs to punt on their next possession which ended the half.

The Longhorns started off the second half with a bang. On the third play of the second half, Ford found a seam and out ran Olton for a 58 yard run. McCarter's kick was good increasing their lead 14-0 with 10:30 left in the third quarter. Lockney was able to pin Olton deep in their own territory on the ensuing kick-off as Lee Fortenberry tripped up Deberry making the Mustangs start on their own 10 yard line. Olton had to punt the ball giving the Horns superb field position. But a Lockney penalty and Olton's defense forced Lockney to turn the ball over on downs. Lockney's defense returned the favor as they forced them to punt after an impressive nine play drive.

As the fourth quarter began, the Horns offense were putting together a strong push against a tired Mustang defense. But a delay of game penalty and a holding penalty that wiped out a 35 yard gain by Ford which would have put themselves at Olton's 10

yard line resulted in a punt. Starting at their own 15 yard line with under six minutes to play, the Mustangs still had hope as they began their final drive. On the twelfth play of the drive, Dustin Synatsck connected with Billy Barnett for a 20 yard touchdown. Lance Terrell blocked the point after leaving the score 14-6 with 3:04 remaining in the contest. Olton's onside kick was recovered by Lockney. Olton's defense forced Lockney into a fourth and three situation with fifty seconds left in the game. Coach Robertson once again reached in his bag of tricks and faked the punt which Mark Ford did and got the first down to end the game.

"My coaches work hard and they come up with certain plays for certain situations which we work on during the week," Coach Robertson said. "The fake punt and the first touchdown run that we had were a couple of those situations which we worked on and they both were executed just like we practiced it."

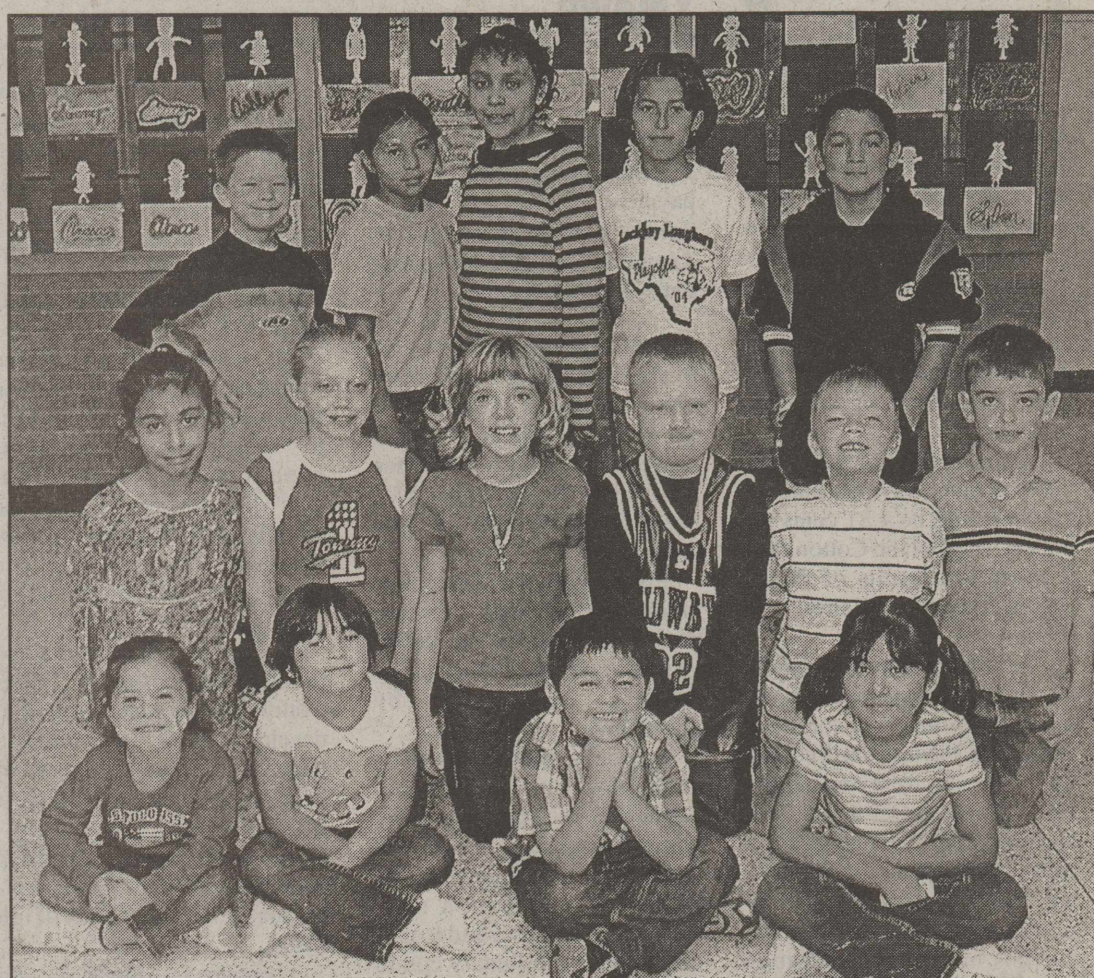

Lockney JV used a trio of Longhorns to complete a shut out against the Olton Mustangs last Thursday night, 38-0.

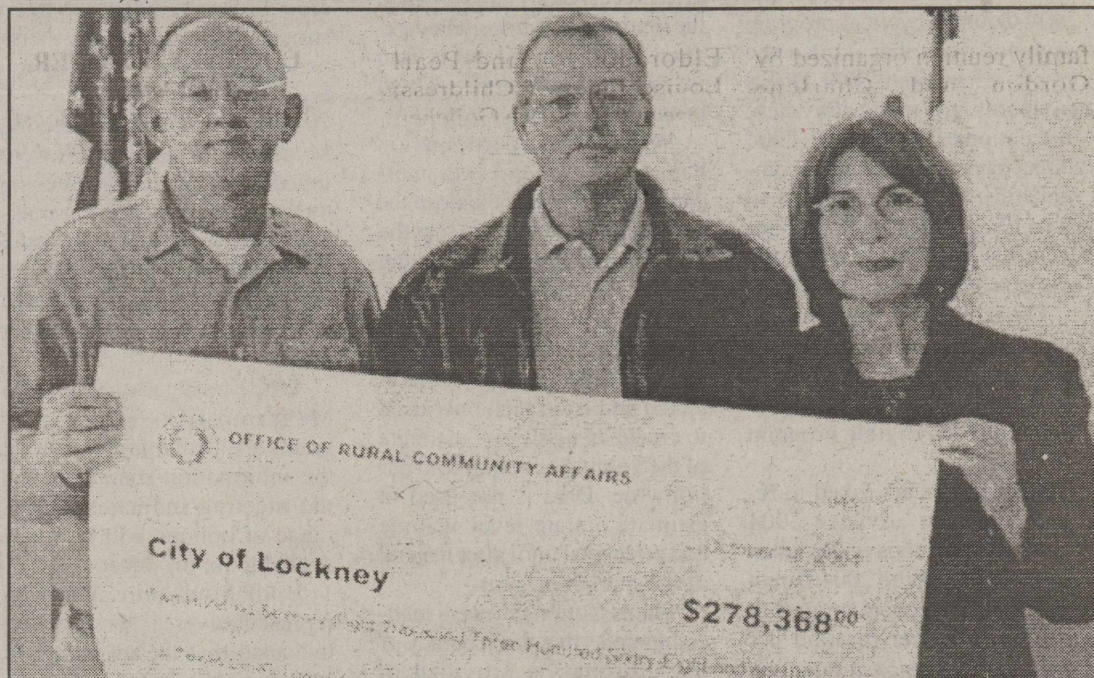

Moving from speculation to confirmation, USDA Secretary Ann Veneman announced that the final 2003 Counter-cyclical payment rate for Upland Cotton would be 3.93 cents per pound. The announcement came during a radio address on Friday morning and also included announcement of the first 2004 Advance Counter-cyclical payment rates for program commodities.

Veneman announced that the 2004 advance payment rate for cotton would be 4.81 cents per pound. The Upland Cotton rates confirm the results of PCG's calculations published last week.

Veneman's announcement also included payment rates for peanuts, corn, grain sorghum, and wheat. Payment instructions for these crops were sent to State FSA offices on October 1. This allowed final Counter-cyclical payments for peanuts, whose final 2003 payment rate was already calculated, to be made earlier this month. These instructions also expedited the processing of 2003 Counter-cyclical program overpayments on corn, wheat, and grain sorghum.

In addition to the 2003 and 2004 Counter-cyclical program payments, October is also the month when final 2004 Direct payments are made. Payment instructions for the final 2004 Direct payment for eligible commodities were transmitted to State FSA offices on September 30, 2004 with payments to be processed as soon as possible.

The table below includes the final 2003 Counter-cyclical payment rates and the first 2004 advance Counter-cyclical payment rates for eligible program commodities.

Most producers asked to receive the first advance 2004 Counter-cyclical payment when they enrolled in the 2004 Direct and Counter-cyclical program.

Any producer that did not ask for the advance at that time must file their request before the end of October.

Farm Service Agency officials note that the cut-off date to request the first 2004 Advance Counter-cyclical payment is

October 29, which is also the last day that County FSA offices will be able to issue the first 2004 Counter-cyclical advance payment.

Survey Cooperation Key To Accurate Cotton Volume and Price Reporting

Announcement of the 2003 final Counter-cyclical payment rate is serving as a reminder of the important role the National Agricultural Statistics Service plays in the delivery of the 2002 Farm Bill's Counter-cyclical program.

Final Counter-cyclical program payment rates are computed based on the marketing year average price received by farmers weighted by marketings.

In order to collect this information for cotton, which does not have a mandatory price reporting requirement, cotton producers and NASS rely on the cooperation of cotton merchants. Merchants asked to participate in the voluntary cotton survey program provide accurate volume and price information for cotton that is used to develop the monthly average price received by growers and the marketing year weighted average price received that is used to calculate Counter-cyclical program payments.

While 100% participation has not been achieved, merchants asked to participate in the survey, can rest assured that the information they provide is kept strictly confidential.

The information NASS collects is not reported until the end of each month on which it is collected and is, in fact, only used to create an aggregate estimate of the volume of cotton sold nationwide. Data is not used to estimate a state level volume and price total until after the end of the marketing year.

Plains Cotton Growers leadership notes that the accuracy of the information provided to NASS is critical to the proper function of the Counter-cyclical component of the 2002 Farm Bill. PCG encourages every merchant contacted by NASS to participate.

Monsanto Expects Trade Ideas with PCG

Representatives from Monsanto Corporation sat down with members of the Plains Cotton Growers Executive Committee earlier this week to discuss Monsanto's thoughts on the West Texas market and to gather producer feedback on the company's plans for the 2005 growing season.

The exchange strengthened the close relationship that Plains Cotton Growers has worked to develop with Monsanto over the past half decade. As a result of PCG input several of the most innovative risk-sharing programs in the country have been pioneered by Monsanto and introduced on the Texas High Plains.

Programs like the Monsanto Replant Program, the Crop Loss/Destruct Refund Program and the 2004 Texas Cotton Crop Loss/Destruct Refund Extension Program have all been strongly influenced by the membership of Plains Cotton Growers.

During this week's meeting Monsanto representatives were especially interested in focusing on the issues and decision-making processes that non-irrigated growers go through when deciding about investing in technology enhanced varieties on their farms.

While no details about 2005 Monsanto risk-sharing programs are available at this time, the information shared during the meeting indicates a full-range of options will be made available for producers.

Both Monsanto and PCG representatives at the meeting indicated that the exchange of ideas was the key to ensuring that the latest technology is made available at affordable prices. They understand that the partnership between the technology provider and the producer must continue to be one with mutual rewards and shared risks in the future.

Cotton Market Weekly A service provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

According to traders, cotton futures on the New York Board of Trade fell lower Thursday in response to December's failure to break through resistance at 49 cents per pound. USDA's export sales report did little to boost the market.

Net export sales of 187,100 bales in the week ended Oct. 14 were 89 percent higher than the previous week and a 27 percent increase from the four-week average. China was the primary buyer with smaller quantities sold to Turkey, Taiwan, Indonesia and Mexico. Sales of 4,800 bales for delivery in 2005-06 were for Guatemala and India.

At 103,800 bales, export shipments were 21 percent more than one week earlier and 32 percent higher than the four-week average. Primary destinations included Turkey, Mexico, South Korea, Indonesia, and Canada.

"Thursday's export sales report was improved from recent reports but fell short of market expectations for 300,000 to 500,000 bales worth of sales," said one analyst.

Sales continued to be strong on the spot cotton scene as Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 6,963 bales

online compared to the previous week when 4,070 bales were sold. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 39.57 to 44.03 cents per pound versus the previous week's range of 40.27 to 44.34 cents per pound.

Good harvesting weather prevailed on the Texas High and Rolling Plains this week with temperatures dipping into the mid to lower 30-degree mark one morning. The drop in temperature failed to produce a killing freeze, and growers wanting to begin stripping as soon as possible continue to apply harvest aid chemicals to hasten the progress.

Defoliation is gaining momentum, and cotton stripping is expanding. Light rain was forecast for the end of the week, and growers were harvesting at a rapid pace in an effort to get as much cotton off the stalk as possible before wet weather arrived.

Elsewhere in Texas, virtually the entire cotton crop in the Texas Rio Grande Valley has been harvested, and very little seed cotton remains to be ginned.

As of this writing, only one of the region's 15 gins remains

in operation. Meanwhile, the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) reported a modest improvement in the U.S. crop during the week ended October 17.

Cotton rated good to excellent amounted to 68 percent, two points higher than a week earlier and 18 percent higher than one year ago. Improvement was witnessed in five of the 14 primary cotton producing states while six were unchanged for the week, and deterioration was noted in the remaining three.

NASS reported plant health in the Southeast was better on balance with three of the region's five states showing improvement. Four of the five Memphis Territory states were either better or unchanged. Cotton in the Texas/Oklahoma region was unchanged while plant health in California held steady, and Arizona improved. Thirty-six percent of the crop across the Cotton Belt had been harvested, slightly better than one year ago but slightly behind the 42 percent five-year average.

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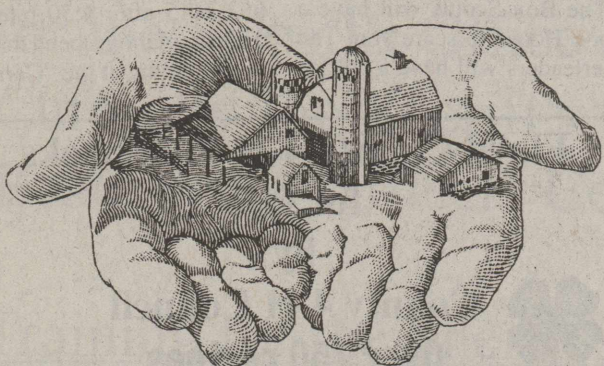

When discussing the cost of the consultant, Ford said, "the cost (of a consultant) is only 1/10th of 1% of the annual budget. I see this amount of money as a small investment to make an enlightened decision."

"Whoever we hire," said Quebe, "they need to have a clear vision on how to make the school district better. A full interview should be done with our in-house man. He (Phil) wants to be treated like everyone else. I have no fear of putting Phil's record up against anybody. He won't be a slacker and he wants to prove himself so there will be no questions. But we have to make a decision now on how we are going to look at him."

"An outsider is unknown," said Hooten. "They don't know us and we don't know them. We should try and match up as best as possible and look inside first. If they fit—then hire them. We know what Phil has done."

"We want to do something better for the school district," said Jesse Garza. "If we hire Phil it would be the same."

"It won't be a rubber stamp," said Quebe. "Phil is very progressive."

"He might be the best," said Jesse. "but how do we know?"

"I would hate to do an in-house search and not hire Phil," said Wilson. "It would put him at a disadvantage."

"I have a feeling from the table that the search will be opened up," said Quebe. "I think that is an insult to Phil and the faculty. Both consultants said that."

"No one has said don't consider Phil," said Ford. "I am not against Phil. I don't want anyone to think that."

"Everybody at school is calling and saying they are in favor of Phil," said Garza. "Why?"

"I think there is something fishy there. They say they don't want to lose him, but they would support him for superintendent. It is like they are trying to mess with our brain. Why are they calling?"

"They want you to know how they feel," said Hooten.

"Well, I've only gotten one call from a constituent in my pre-

cinct," said Jesse, "and of course, they were in favor of Phil."

Quebe again emphasized that he felt an outside search was sending the message to the faculty that they weren't good enough to be considered for this type of job. "It is like they are being told we have to hire outside to get someone good enough. I think we owe the faculty loyalty first."

"I want to be loyal to my people first," said Ford. "I owe loyalty to the children and parents in the community."

"Who is Phil loyal too?" asked Garza.

"He has been here 22 years," said Robbie Long, "How can you ask that?"

When Quebe called for a motion, Ford made the motion and said, "Based on what I've heard from the people who have talked to me—the people I've heard from—I make a motion we have an Open Search for the superintendent position."

Garza seconded the motion. In favor were: Ford, Garza, Wilson, and Terrell.

Against were: Hooten, Long and Quebe.

Discussion was then opened up as to whether or not the board should hire a consultant to do the search or whether the board should do the search.

"The consultants are head hunters," said Long. "Their job is to put someone in the chair and they are going to make them look good."

"This task is overwhelming," said Ford. "A consultant could help me muddle my way through. I think they could be an asset."

Quebe appeared surprised by the comment from Ford and said, "Frankly I'm surprised you say that. You want to hire a consultant—but you are ignoring the first advice they gave you to hire a qualified person from within."

The board was in agreement that it would be difficult for the trustees to handle the search and that more than likely the task would end up falling in Superintendent Raymond Lusk's lap.

The trustees agreed to divide up the names of references on the consultants and to report back at a October 26 meeting to vote on which consultant to hire.
