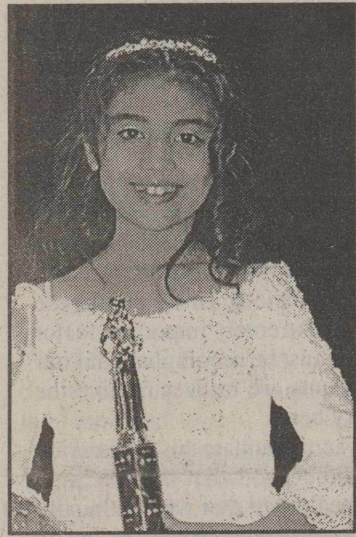

John Campbell to be honored for years of serving public

In 1954 John Campbell, 18 years old at the time, may not have understood what was happening when Ohmar Kirk, owner of Kirk and Sons Hardware Store, gave him a job at the store. But the segregation barrier was beginning to be broken in Floyd County.

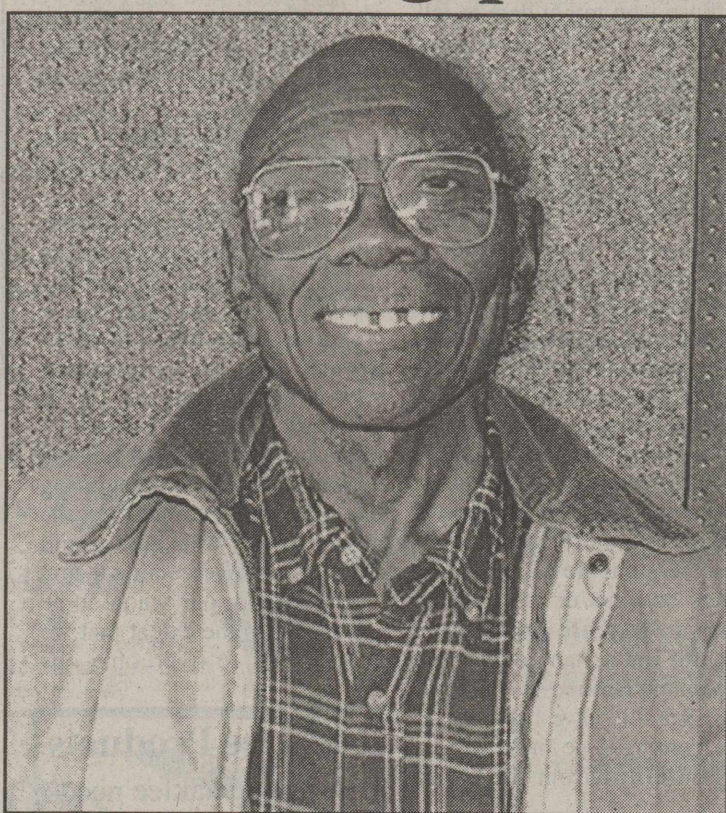
Layne Kirk, son of Ohmar, and now owner/manager of Kirk and Sons Hardware Store, told the Hesperian-Beacon, "The way I understand it, John was the first black man to be hired to meet the public by a white business owner in Floyd County. In 1954, I think that was very significant. This was about ten years before the Civil Rights Act was passed into law in the sixties."

Campbell, now 68, said, "I was first hired to clean up and do some janitorial work. After about two years, I began meeting the public and waiting on them as a clerk. Back then most people received me real good, but some didn't. Kirk and Sons are good people and they have been real easy to work for."

Kirk and Sons Hardware Store is planning a Reception and Visit celebrating Campbell's 50th Anniversary with the store, on Saturday, December 11, at the store (119 E. Missouri), 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

Campbell married Louise Davis in 1969 and they celebrated their 35th anniversary this year. They have two children: Althea Green of Amarillo and Cornelius Campbell of Childress. They have five grandchildren: LaShauntee, Emerald, Eugene III, Chance and Chelsea.

Concerning those early years, Campbell said, "Some interest-

ing changes began to take place. The biggest change here (at Kirk and Sons Hardware) included, a big warehouse for furniture which was built next door in 1960 (now the east side of Kirk and Sons). Business was really good back then. In 1918, I was told, J.T. Kirk (Layne Kirk's great grandfather) bought the old Stan Goen building on the west side. J.T. died in 1950."

According to Campbell, his dad, L.A. Campbell, was a farmer. He worked for Bill Brock and Layne Decker. It was here, just south of Floydada, John grew up on the farm. He began his schooling at the age of seven. "In 1947 or '48, we moved into town and my dad bought a truck. He

began hauling produce to Dallas and to the valley in South Texas."

Concerning segregation, John said, "I really had no bad experiences here. I do remember we, African-Americans, had to go to the back doors of the cafes and restaurants to eat our meals."

"Our school, Northward High School on Washington Park, was a one room school house. We had grades 1 through 10. Because it wasn't large enough, later we were split up and some went to school at the Mount Zion Baptist Church. My teacher was Mrs. A.M. Taylor."

In those early years, Campbell said he worked at Arwine Drug Store part-time, also. In 1962, he

Santa Claus will also be a participant in the parade and will be brought to the former Hale's Department Store to visit with children. Children can have their picture taken with Santa for \$5.00.

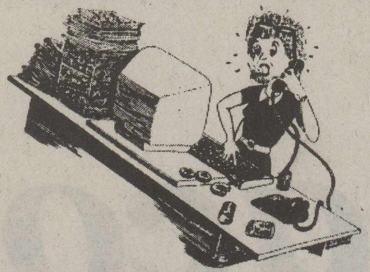
Businesses who have chosen to be open until 7:30 p.m. will be marked with a large red bow. Refreshments will be available at some businesses.

City of Floydada to raise reconnect fees this month

Beginning this month the City of Floydada will now charge a \$15 reconnect fee for electricity and a \$15 reconnect fee for water for any accounts that are not paid on time.

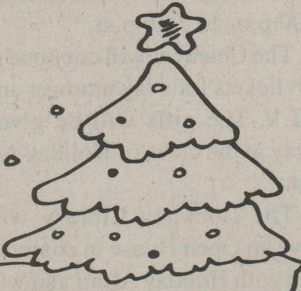

A Community Effort

Meeting the educational needs of today's students has become an extremely complex and difficult process. Schools can no longer concentrate merely on providing the basic academic foundation necessary for life after high school. Rather, they are asked to deal with a myriad of societal issues. Many phases of a child's training, which were once considered to be the responsibility of parents, are now included in the school curriculum.

Schools are now conducting classes for 3 year olds, and the increased demand for these classes grows each year. Many times basic training that should be occurring at home between child and parent is taking place in these early childhood classes. Schools are required to offer in-depth feeding programs, to include breakfast and lunch. Summer months are now a part of this requirement. Throughout the grade levels, pre-k - 12, the scope of required subject offerings and school responsibilities has increased and broadened to an almost unrealistic level.

A few years ago the greatest problems teachers faced in the classroom were with students who did not turn in homework, or those who might dare to talk out of turn or chew gum in class. Normally those students were taken to the principal's office for a paddling and promptly returned to class. If their parents learned that they were paddled at school, many times they received more of the same when they got home.

In contrast, teachers today face classrooms where students refuse to do homework or class work, and many parents refuse to require that their children attend to these tasks, or are unable to require them to do their schoolwork. Students across the nation are known to bring weapons to school, and more and more of these weapons are being used on others students or on teachers. Many students are openly disrespectful and defiant to teachers, to one another and to their parents. Schools have been forced to shorten classes, we must have a unified effort from the entire

to hire mil-time security personnel to patrol halls and campuses. Gang activity and drug usage, as well as other societal factors, have spawned fighting in schools as a regular activity.

Teachers and principals who attempt to paddle or otherwise discipline kids for misbehavior face many forms of resistance, to include:

- Refusal of the student to accept the discipline.
 - Refusal of the parent to allow the child to be punished.
 - A trip to the courthouse because of a lawsuit resulting from the discipline that was administered.
- These, and many other problems, exist and are real to some degree in almost all public schools today. Fortunately, they are less severe in the smaller towns and smaller schools such as Lockney. Even though Lockney Schools is not without its share of problems, we can be thankful that we do not experience those that many schools face. There are many reasons for this, to include:

- We have a caring and competent teaching staff that is dedicated to teaching our kids the academic skills included in their subject matter.
- Just as important, these are also teachers who work with each student as a whole person in an attempt to prepare them for all phases of life.
- Most parents care and support their children, the school and the teachers.
- We live in a caring community, one with a great deal of pride in the activities of all Lockney citizens, young and old alike.
- Our churches and civic groups actively support our schools and our kids.

Those are but a few of the important ingredients that come to mind; however, in recognizing our strengths, we must also be aware of our weaknesses and work toward overcoming them.

In order for our school to be successful to the extent that we desire, and to overcome our

community. Teachers and other school personnel must be sensitive to the needs of the students and the community and to continually search for ways to better fulfill these needs.

We must make sure that we employ only teachers who are competent and who truly care about every child and the whole education of every child. They must all be positive role models for their students.

All parents must show a supportive attitude toward the school and must work with the school and with their children in bringing about required and desired results. In order for teachers to be successful in leading students to meet expectations, the parents must also require that those expectations be fulfilled.

If ours is a school where parents and teachers work together, rather than against one another, then we will be successful with larger numbers of children.

We must be a school and a community who feels free to communicate with one another

rather than talk about one another. "Rumors", "gossip" and "jumping to conclusions" are perhaps the most damaging factors in threatening the overall success of a school or community.

Differences of opinion and a certain degree of conflict will always exist when two or more people associate with one another. How we deal with this conflict is important to the success of our school. Unity in purpose is an extremely important factor and must be accomplished if our students are to ever receive the very best.

I congratulate this community for the good that does exist. I appeal to all that we continually recognize our weaknesses and do all in our power to overcome them. Problems that do exist can only be corrected when we recognize them as problems.

Our children are our greatest joy, our greatest asset. Let's join together as school personnel, parents and community in providing the very best for their future.

Wetsel and Nelson exchange wedding vows



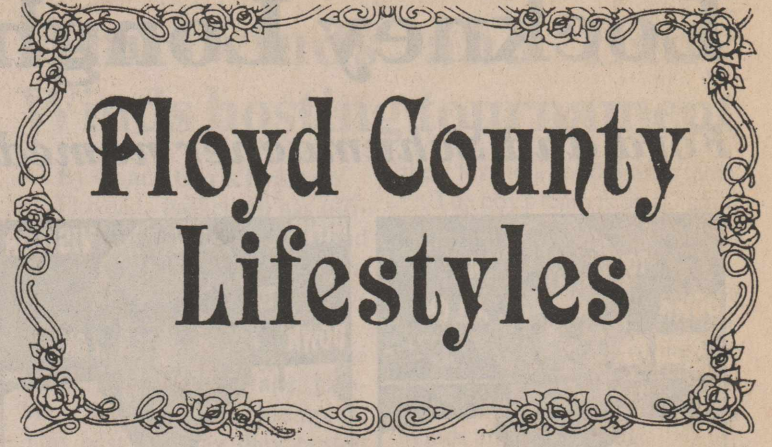

Gene chips will show the way in the cotton industry

Working with agricultural research funding from Cotton Inc., Texas A&M plant geneticist, Dr. Jeffrey Chen, has created what can conservatively be described as a research coup for the U.S. cotton industry.

Chen and his staff have adapted a unique tool for cotton that can be used to create improved varieties and fiber quality characteristics. DNA microarrays, or "gene chips", can be used to study the way genes express or trigger cotton trait development.

"Gene expression controls how any organism develops and reacts to the surrounding environment," explains Dr. Roy Cantrell, vice president, Agricultural Research for Cotton, Inc.

Since his arrival in 2002, Cantrell, a seasoned plant breeder and geneticist, has established a path of breeding and genetic research projects and related programs, that will lead to an overall improvement in varieties that are offered to the cotton producing community.

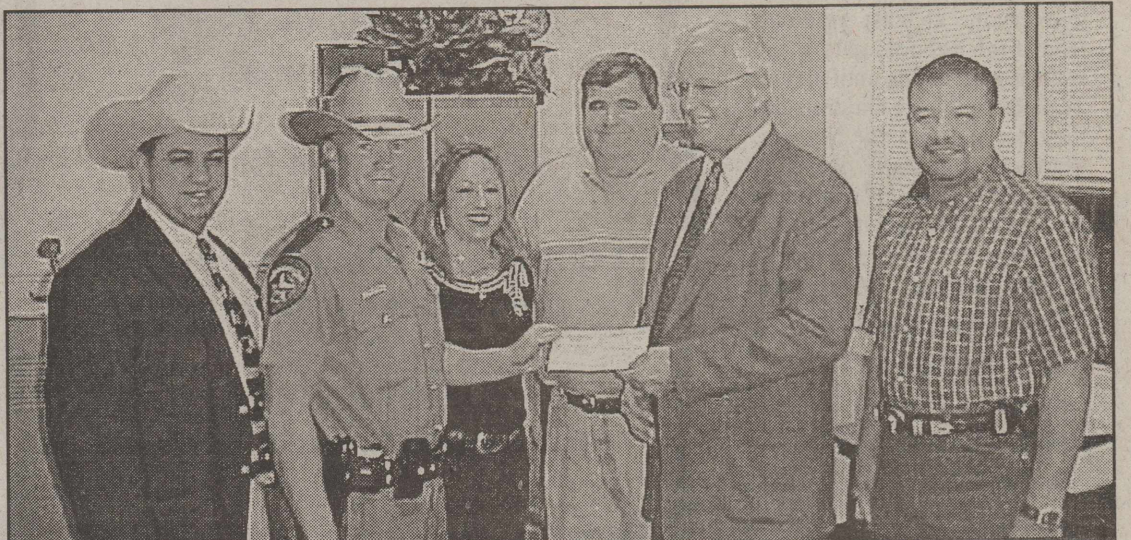
"Cotton breeding is a long and arduous process, but when we have advances like this one from Dr. Chen, it's clear evidence that we're heading in the right direction," says Cantrell.

Gene chips can be used in various contexts including genetics (genotypes and germplasm), physiology (stress responses), development (fiber, non-fiber i.e....gossy-pol) and environment

(temperature and water).

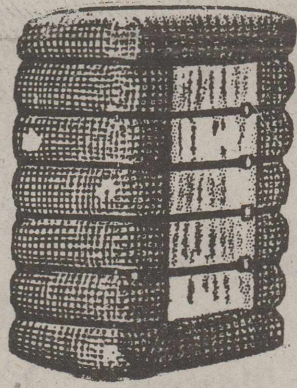
Chen manufactured the gene chips by "spotting" or making bio-molecules on 1x3 inch laboratory glass slides. "One side can contain more than 30,000 different DNA elements - each corresponding to a specific gene within the cotton plant," explains Chen

This is a new and reliable "high-throughput tool" that can now be used to directly improve a cotton plant's ability to withstand all types of environmental influences, to improve fiber quality characteristics and even help explain interactions among genes in a cotton plant's internal control mechanism," concludes Cantrell.

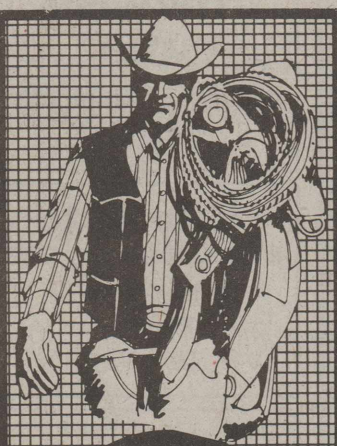

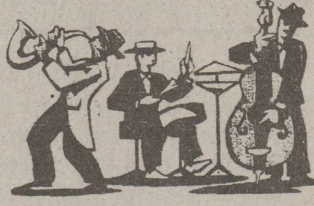
