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# Caleb McLean returns from African mission trip

Caleb McLean, of Lockney, has recently returned from his mission trip to Mbale, Uganda, and had two words to sum up his 3 month experience---"Worth It!"

McLean volunteered to catalog over 10,000 books which were donated to the Messiah Theological Institute. He expected to catalog about 200 books a day, but wasn't expecting the long delay in the arrival of the books and the consistent loss of electricity in the area.

McLean also had to grow accustomed to the slower pace of the native Africans.

A 2004 home school graduate, McLean has worked at the Lockney Library for 3 years, and had already catalog over 1,000 books for M.T.I. which had been donated by the Lockney Library.

There wasn't a lot about the Mbale (pronounced M-baa-lee) way of life that was hard for Caleb to adjust to.

"I had seen enough National Geographic T.V. that the country didn't surprise me," said Caleb. "Plus I had been told a lot about the mission work."

Living with an American family (from Texas), Caleb said the food was not unusual because he ate mostly Tex-Mex food.

"My favorite native food was a dish called 'Matookie'," said Caleb. "It is smashed green bananas put on a rock to dry and then into a tomato stew. They use it like we use mashed potatoes."

Caleb said the people were McLean was ready for the job extremely friendly and happy. "It to see them so poor--but they are still happy. I didn't see sadness anything else.

Caleb said the hardest thing for the West Texas boy to get used to was the climate. "It rains every day and it is very hot and

The language was not a barrier for Caleb because of the British influence in Africa. "English is the only language everybody relates to," said Caleb. "It is broken English but it is something everybody can get by with. There are 6 dialects among the tribes, but each tribe can't understand all the dialects, so they use English to communicate. My Texas accent was harder for them to understand than my English."


Caleb said the town of Mbale had a population of 60,000 -70,000 people, but most of them lived in outlying villages.

"They would come to town during the day to sell their produce at a very large farmer's market. A lady may have only 3 tomatoes but she would stay in town all day to sell her 3 toma-

# Jury Pool selection changing in County

The Floyd County 110th Judicial District is on the verge of moving forward with a computerized jury wheel selection service starting in January, 2005.

This first electronically selected jury pool will begin serving on juries, in this district, starting the first Monday of February, 2005, according to John R. (Randy) Hollums, District Judge. "The counties of Dickens and Briscoe, also in the 110th Judicial District, are already using this computerized method of jury pool selection."

The district will save time, labor, supplies and postage with this "new age" jury selection method, said Hollums. "The old method involved the District Judge, the District Clerk and the County Sheriff in order to select and verify a jury pool. This will all change come January, 2005."

According to Hollums, "As the voter registration and driver's license pool of names becomes more pure (accurate), then the new jury pool selection system will work more efficient. Those wishing to be exempt from jury duty should call Barbara

The 'Excuse From Jury Duty' form, signed by a 70 year old Floyd County resident, requires your voter registration number and/or your Texas Driver's License number and/or your I.D. card number. Also, according to Edwards,

"The District Court Judge may exempt one from jury service, if that person has a physical disability, a mental impairment, or an inability to comprehend or communicate in the English language. If anyone requests an exemption due to physical or mental impairment, that person must

Edwards at the District Clerk's office (806)983-4923 and an exempt form will be mailed to you."

District Clerk Edwards told the Hesperian-Beacon, "A person who is over 70 years of age may establish a permanent, or temporary, exemption from jury duty. They must fill out a written request form, furnished by the District Clerk, claiming a permanent, or temporary exemption."

There are still a few around who remember the events of that day first hand. We wish them

It appears that our Congress is about to work out some sort of compromise on the security overhaul bill. If everything stays on track, the deed will be done by the time this gets in print. That usually takes a couple of days, and the way things are going up there at the moment, that should be all the time it takes.

At any rate, we will not be disillusioned if Congress takes its time to perfect a bill before passing it on to the President for signature. It is far better, in our view, to do the thing right than it is to do it quickly.

As avid readers of this column well know, we have been agitating for an overhaul of our intelligence operation for many years. We can be grateful for our own Rep. Mac Thornberry (or he used to be our very own) in leading the way, or helping lead the way, toward some sort of overhaul that might result in a better security situation for the U.S. In the early days, George Bush didn't seem to care that much about shaking things up. Then came the attack now known as 9/11, and it became politically beneficial to be seen as in favor of change. Even then, Bush tended to laud the work of the out-going CIA Director after that Agency had mislead him at critical junctures. We understand the world of politics. Bush had little choice during the recent campaign other than to fight the battle on the ground that existed. But that campaign is over now, and we hope the Congress fixes those problems that have been holding things up before sending it along to the President for signature. In our own opinion the two big hang-ups are very legitimate concerns. We see no reason for our drivers licenses to betreated so cavalierly as to pass them out to aliens, nor do we see why our troops in the field need to be deprived of intelligence while bureaucrats wrangle over who gets to sign the check.

gone to fill out paperwork for another job. He ended up being gone for 2 or 3 days. The Africans here believe in "Later, Tomorrow". They are very rarely in a hurry to do anything and they laugh at the missionaries who are

always on the run and have a time

"September 15...I got a lift to the school and started right in on sketching the grounds again. I am supposed to come up with a landscaping layout for the courtyards..All of what we call annuals or house plants grow

outdoors and get to be huge here. Here a fiscus tree will get to be the size of an average live oak..The poinsettias get to be around 7 feet tall here, but aren't as pretty as they are at home."

"September 19.. We set out th four and ended up at the church with at least 16 in the truck. We stopped several times along the road to pick up people who were walking to church. Shawn has a small, four door, short bed Toyota. I couldn't believe we fit so many in the back of that truck. I found out later what little I knew about Africans.

"The church was made up entirely of mud. The mud is so thick they didn't need wooden supports for the walls. There were around 50 people at the service; half of them were children. They could sing comfortably in 3 different languages: Lugandan, Swahili, and English...After the service had ended, we walked down to the truck. There were between 15 and 20 people and one bicycle in the bed of the truck already. Dennis and Shawn had the front seat already and I shared the back seat with 3 women, one 7 year old girl, and 2 infants...All together, we traveled less than 30 miles on rough roads for around an hour. I am just a few inches skinnier and I still can't pull my elbows and knees apart.

"October 2...I had the privilege of working with George and Diana Franklin at the eyeglass clinic at MTI. I saw people who were nearly blind walk out of there without needing assistance. It was amazing...I even saw an Anglican Priest come to get glasses. I also saw several Muslims get glasses....Diana told me about a time when they helped

the entire Muslim community. It built a strong bond between the Muslims and the church...It was funny to see men going out wearing women's horn-rimmed glasses, but they didn't care; they could see!

'October 16.. Sandi Piek had a garage sale next door. What a sale! I counted at least 50 people there at one time. It was also interesting to see all of the nations represented there. I saw people from Uganda, Kenya, America, England, Czechoslovakia, Lebanon, India, Isle of Man, Australia, and New Zealand.

"October 17...That night at devo I found out that one of the Australian families here in town had a tragedy happen. They put their adopted 18 month old down for a nap and forgot to close the window. A monkey came into her room and attacked her. She has some scratches on her head and some of her hair is missing. As

of that night they couldn't get any rabies vaccine...The monkey has now attacked six children and is still at large.

"October 18...The shipping container (of books) arrived at

"October 20...I got the computer set up and hooked up the Internet and started to work on putting more books in the computer. After one box of books the web site I use quit on me and I could do no more that day. I got a grand total of 34 books done.

'October 21...I went down and started again on books. I was able to catalog 119 books that day. The power held out long enough for me to print all of the cards and labels for the books. My goal was to get 200 books done a day but now I am not sure I can make that quota everyday. It all depends on if the power stays on and whether or not I have Internet service that day.

"October 22...I got down to MTI determined to get a bunch of books done. I went through 8 boxes of books and did approximately 275 books.

"October 23.. The power was off for most of the day so I couldn't work on the computer, but I could work on putting labels on the books.

"November 5...I have gotten over 2100 books cataloged and put on the shelves."

Caleb returned to Lockney with a new appreciation for mission work and believes that everyone has something to contribute to missions.

"Missions always need financial aid for building funds and staff salaries, but, they also need people. They always need teachers, even if it is just one week of

"I would like to do missionary work in the future. I don't know what I'd do, but I know your talents can be used. They will always find something for you to do even if it is just changing light bulbs."

"The school teaches men how to become preachers," said Caleb. "The library we were building would be used only by the students.'

Although Caleb had high hopes of getting right to work on the library he was delayed at least eight weeks because the books were stalled in Saudi Arabia.

While waiting for the books Caleb spent his time planning the layout of the library and building and installing shelves. He also helped substitute teach and landscape a courtyard.

While in Africa Caleb kept a weekly journal which he emailed to his parents. Eventually the journal was emailed to over 60 people, including this newspaper.

The detailed journal tells the story of Caleb's life experiences. Portions of the 10 week journal

"August 24....I went to the church and sat in on their weekly business meeting. Folks from the surrounding area come and tell the missionaries their needs. Tuesday is the only day they do this so the whole week isn't taken up with people coming into the church asking for money or medical attention..

"August 25:...I sketched a layout for the library room and now I am going to put the shelves in. I have been put totally in charge of the library. I have total freedom to do as I please with it up to a certain point...That night it rained very hard and knocked the power out for about twenty hours. I find it kind of exciting to be able to read by candlelight once in a while. The power is turned off in this part of Uganda about every third night here so that some other part of Uganda can have power.

"August 26...We got a carpenter named Robertson to start cutting the wood for the shelves. He has been cutting the wood with a handsaw. I cannot believe the speed and accuracy of his work. He says that by next Monday he should have all of the wood cut and ready to be sanded. In a week or so we should have all of the



Program provides income option for producers in 2004

Producers interested in securing a Commodity Credit Corporation Seed Cotton Loan on cotton harvested, but not ginned before the end of the calendar year, need to be aware of some changes that will make it a little easier to avoid unwelcome tax problems due to delayed harvest.

The tax implications for a producer are two-fold. Producers unable to get their 2004 crop harvested face the possibility of having what would normally be two years of income fall into a single year. When this happens it creates an overly large tax situation in the following crop year and creates current year tax problems by not having the income expected for the current year in time to report for the 2004 tax year.

One possible remedy is the Seed Cotton Recourse Loan program offered by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Through the program producers with cotton harvested and stored in modules can apply for a recourse loan on the cotton and potentially generate a 2004 cashflow that can be reported for tax

purposes. In the past, many producers who participated in marketing pool operations have chosen not to utilize this mechanism because of the complicated nature of the process and the additional hassle it causes for themselves and their Cooperative Marketing Association (CMA). Recent rule changes

They essentially provide marketing pool participants the same flexibility to use Form G loan proceeds to repay the seed cotton loan. Previously, only producers who used the Form A loan were allowed to direct marketing loan proceeds to repay an outstanding seed cotton recourse

For that reason, seed cotton recourse loans have not been a great option for producers whose cotton would be marketed through a pool that uses the Form G loan program. Before the rule change, cotton marketed through a CMA, that was pledged as collateral for a seed cotton recourse FSA. loan, had to have the seed cotton loan repaid before the cotton was allowed to be put into the Form G loan program. This requirement greatly complicated the job of the marketing pool and the pro- deliver that confirmation to their

The changes announced by FSA now require a County FSA office to verify several pieces of information when a producer seeks to obtain a seed cotton re-

FSA Seed Cotton Loan required to determine if the producer is a CMA member by referring to the producers file.

Secondly, the FSA office will provide the CMA with the applicable producer names and Farm Serial Numbers for all cotton pledged as collateral for a Seed Cotton Loan.

# Cotton Market Weekly 🕹

A service provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

According to analysts, cotton trading on the New York Board of Trade showed little reaction to weekly export figures from USDA and concentrated more on day-to-day market functions.

USDA's weekly export sales report showed sales were within market expectations, but some sources called the report "disappointing.'

"Export sales were a little disappointing as the market needs to have 200,000 bales of sales each week to meet target figures," said one analyst. Others in the industry, however, remained optimistic about the week's slightly lower export sales figure.

"Export sales probably slowed some because of the holidays, but it is beginning to pick up, and we'll need that to absorb the large crops here and outside the U.S.," one trader explained.

Net export sales of 188,000 bales of U.S. cotton in the week ended Nov. 25 was down onefifth from the previous week but five percent more than the fourweek average, according to

Primary buyers were Turkey, Mexico, China, and Hong Kong. Sales of 18,000 bales reported for delivery in 2005-06 were for Mexico

Export shipments of 143,100 bales were four percent less than the previous week but 17 percent more than the four week average. Major destinations included China, Mexico, Indonesia, and South Korea.

On the spot cotton scene, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 26,762 bales online in the week ended Dec. 2 compared to the previous week when 18,601 bales were traded. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 35.89 to 38.25 cents per pound versus the previous week's range of 35.89 to 38.34 cents per

Meanwhile, the U.S. cotton harvest is progressing. Harvesting in five of the 11 major US. cotton producing states is more than 90 percent complete, and picking is finished in Mississippi and Louisiana.

Also, the latest USDA crop progress report showed 46 percent of the Texas cotton crop was harvested by Nov. 26, down from the same time last year when 67 percent of the state's crop was out of the field. Persistent rain and snow have delayed the harvest across Texas, and market sources said the wet weather and cold temperatures likely have lowered the quality of cotton fiber there.

However, dry conditions in West Texas are expected through the weekend and into Tuesday of next week. Although fields still are muddy in many areas, some farmers on the High and Rolling Plains have resumed harvesting activities. Outside activities are expected to gain momentum this weekend as producers rush to get as much of the crop off the stalk as possible before adverse weather conditions return. Many gins have increased their hours of operation as seed cotton supplies recently have mounted. Quality and yield concerns continue, but it likely will be a while before classing information is

"It may take a week to 10 days before there is enough government classing data back to know the effects of the wet weather on quality," said one market observer. "It may take a bit longer than that before the impact on quantity (yields) is apparent," he


