Cotton Conference is Success

Economist says local crop is best ever

The 2005 Caprock Cotton Conference was held January 26th at the Plains Baptist Assembly camp. There were 147 producers in attendance and 26 commercial booths displaying their goods, according to Floyd County Extension Agent J.D. Ragland.

One of the many speakers at the conference was retired Economist Dr. Carl Anderson of Texas Cooperative Extension at College Station. Anderson told the producers, "The 2004 South Plains cotton harvest is the biggest harvest since 1949. In 1949, this region harvested 5.5 million bales of cotton. In the 2004 harvest, we have harvested over 7.5 million bales of cotton on one-half the number of acres than in 1949. Some of our gins will be working into April of 2005 (to finish this harvest)."

Ragland told the Hesperian-Beacon, "Yield-wise this is the best cotton harvest I have ever seen in my life time. The quality of the cotton was excellent in the early part of the harvest. The quality was not so good after the rains and the moisture we received later."

"The average yields, on both irrigated and dryland cotton, are running around 750 pounds per acre. The irrigated is averaging about 900 pounds per acre, while the dryland is averaging around 400 pounds. The average price per pound for the 2004 cotton harvest is around \$.52 cents per pound," said Ragland.

Most all the Floyd County ginners were saying about the same thing Monday afternoon and that is "the 2004 cotton harvest will be the best ever on record."

Manager Heethe Burselson of Lockney Coop Gin said, "We still lack about two weeks to finish ginning, but this harvest will be our best year ever."

Manager Leighton Stovall of Floydada Coop Gin said, "We are setting records this year, but we still lack about five weeks more of ginning."

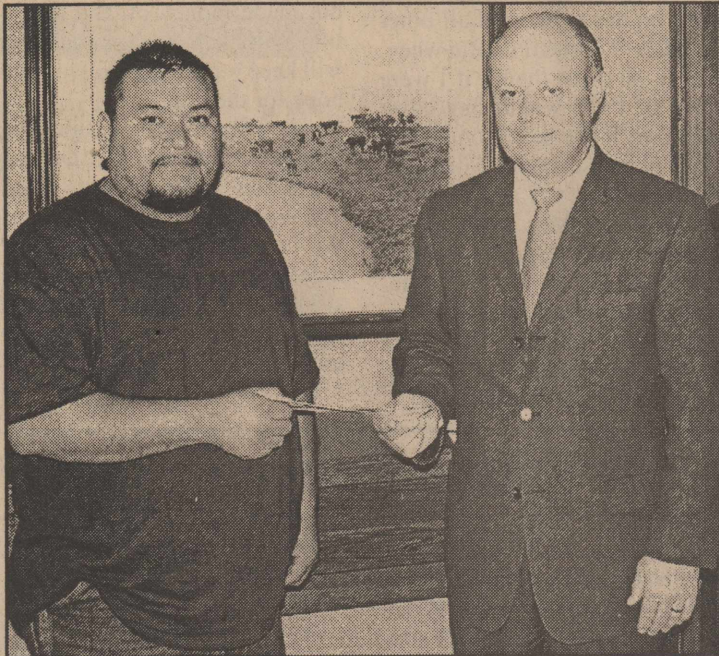
Darty Gin Manager Randy Pernel told the Hesperian-Beacon, "This year will be our best bale count on record and we have owned this gin since 1960. 13,300 bales was our largest number of bales ginned, but this year we should gin over 21,000 bales. We still lack around two weeks of ginning."

Don Marble of Marble Brothers Gin in Lockney said, "We made more per acre in 1981, and more dollars in 1973, but yes, this year's harvest has been good. We still lack about two weeks to finish."

Stacie Woelfel of Scott Gin just south of Floydada said, "We are through ginning 21,300 bales of cotton. This is the most we have ever ginned."

Barwise Gin reported that they were finished ginning for the year. Office Manager Bryan Thomas said, "We ginned 32,232 bales, which was a record for us."

Manager Jody James of Blanco Gin said, "This will be a record bale count and a good year, but we ginned around 24,000 bales in 1996. We still lack about three weeks being through ginning and our count this year will be around 12,000."

Local climate and landscape good for meteorites

(Editor's Note: Several years ago we ran a story on Floyd County meteorites by Jeffrey Hunter, of Lockney. Dr. Taylor covers some of the same story but also has some very interesting information on meteorites on the South Plains. He presented this research in the hopes that people on the South Plains would once again develop an interest in looking for meteorites.)

Keep a sharp lookout. There are some aliens about. They are not the one-eyed, one horned, flying purple people eaters; rather, the casual rock tourist that tends to drop in unannounced.

I refer, of course, to meteorites.

The Texas High Plains are a known hot spot for finding meteorites. Meteorites last longer in dry areas and the Dust Bowl of the 1930's exposed thousands of them from their dusty tombs. Floyd County is no exception, several meteorites have been found starting in 1910 through 1970's.

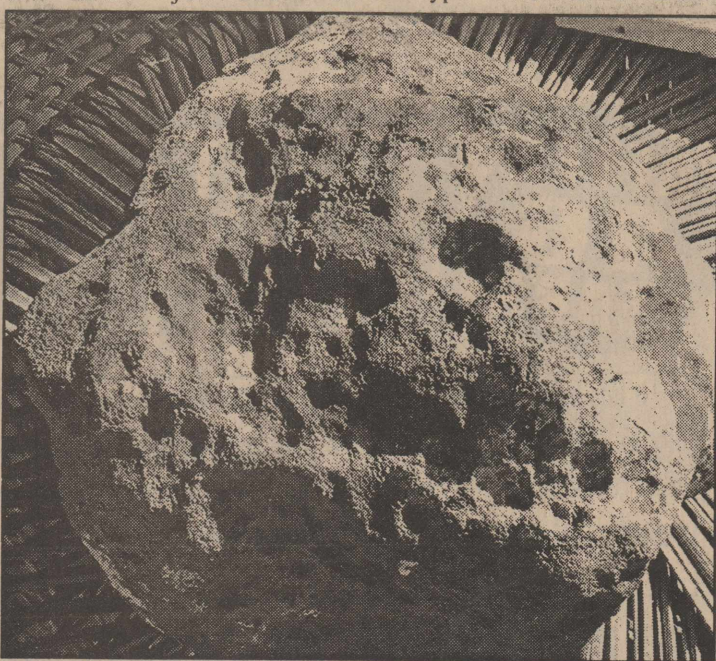
The Aiken meteorite was found through the efforts of Dr. Nininger in 1936 near Anton. It was a stone type and weighed about two pounds, which is about the size of a softball. The current whereabouts of the meteorite are unknown at this time, although Arizona State and the British Museum of Natural History may have samples of it.

The second meteorite, the Barwise meteorite, was plowed up a mile east of Barwise in 1950 but not recognized as a meteorite until 1965. It was a stone type and weighed in at 23 pounds and most of it now resides in Mainz, Germany at the Max Plank Institute, with samples at the Field Museum of Chicago and the Smithsonian.

The third, the Floydada, was an iron meteorite weighing 27.5 pounds found sometime before 1912 and recognized by Dr. Nininger in 1939. It now resides mostly at Texas Christian University, with samples at Arizona State University, the Field Museum, and the Smithsonian.

The fourth, the Lockney meteorite is a 1.5 pound stone recognized in 1944 but the find date is unknown. The fifth Floyd County meteorite has the great name of being called the Lone Star, and was found near Lone Star near the north edge of the county. This was a partial stone broken up, with only one piece recovered; the other is still out in the field somewhere. The last meteorite is the South Plains Meteorite, a stone type found 6 miles NE of South Plains. It weighed just over 10 pounds.

Further meteorites have been found in the surrounding areas. Dozens of stone and iron meteorites were either plowed up or found on the ground near Plainview, Crosbyton, Brownfield, Seagraves (a large 58 pounder one was found in an abandoned farmhouse), and Lubbock. Wellman, between Brownfield and Seagraves, has had so many meteorites found near it that the meteorite labels have extended from Wellman (a) to Wellman (f). As recent as October of 2004, the author was called in to confirm a large 37 pound meteorite found by a cotton farmer just south of

Wellman. Yet, most of the meteorites were found with the help of famed meteorite hunter and scientist Dr. Nininger.

Dr. Nininger toured the Texas High Plains from 1930's through the 1960's giving lectures on meteorites to townsmen, farmers and ranchers. Hundreds were found by the local population during these golden years, and then interest and new finds fell off over the following decades as the population aged and forgot about meteorites.

Meteorites are not the glowing kryptonite lumps you remember from cartoons. In fact, our ideas from Superman may be why most people don't recognize meteorites when they see them. Meteorites are not porous like lava rocks; they look more like rusty limestone rocks. In fact, Caliche, the water-deposited whitish mineral, will form on them after a few decades which can throw off even a geologist. Oh, and take a guess which occupation finds the most meteorites in the world? Yes, you guessed it - farmers.

The science of meteorites, called meteoritics, is still undecided about how many meteorites are on the ground. However, a current best guess is about one meteorite per 5.5 acres. One meteorite may only be the size of a pea and probably can't be found. Larger meteorites, perhaps the size of a golf ball, may exist every 100 to 200 acres, and

Officer Ramon unharmed after suspect's shotgun jams

Floydada Police Sergeant Reuben Ramon considers himself a very lucky man after a shotgun pointed at him in a traffic stop, Friday night, failed to fire.

According to police and a video tape of the traffic stop, Ramon stopped the vehicle at 8:15 p.m., January 28, on E. Houston Street for "backing down a roadway at excessive speed".

According to Police Chief Darrell Gooch, "As Ramon stepped up to the driver's window he was confronted with the driver holding a shotgun close to his chest with the barrel pointed up towards the window."

The video tape shows Ramon backing quickly from the door and running back to his vehicle to take cover. The driver then exits the vehicle with the shotgun in his hand and as he brings the shotgun up the suspect's car starts to roll which throws him off balance. The driver then gets back in his vehicle. At the same time Ramon is backing his police vehicle to put distance between him and the suspect and calling for backup.

Ramon and Floydada Officer Jerry Redding then follow the suspect to a residence on Grover and 12th Street where the suspect parks his car.

Chief Gooch met the officers at the scene and a standoff ensued.

The suspect was eventually persuaded to lay down the shotgun and step away from his vehicle.

Arrested at the scene was Kenneth Coleman, 56, of Floydada. He was charged with Attempted Capital Murder.

"When I was talking to him I told him thanks for not shooting my officer," said Gooch. "He told me, 'I tried, but I couldn't make my gun work. It was jammed.'"

"Sure enough, when we checked there was a shell jammed in the magazine."

present? If you can grind a little corner of the rock, you may see small specks of shiny metal. You barely have to grind the rock to see this, 1/32 of an inch is plenty.

Test #4 (Optional): Are chondrules present? If it's a broken piece, you might see tiny little balls called chondrules that look like small bb's the size of a pinhead. A magnifying glass will help here. Not all meteorites have these, but if you see these and Tests 1-3 are positive, then it's a meteorite.

Iron Types
Test #1: Does it attract a magnet?

Test #2: Are the edges rounded and smooth? Meteorites have no sharp edges; the fiery entry to earth melted them smooth.

Test #3: Is it solid and lacking bubble holes? Needless to say, iron meteorites are very heavy and solid.

Test #4 (Optional): Does it have thumbprints on it? Small dimples form on the outside of some meteorites. These look like someone squished their thumbprint into soft clay.

I encourage every farmer to keep a small magnet stuck to his tractor or in his combine. The magnet test on a suspicious heavy rock in the field will quickly filter out the "meteorwrongs" from ones worth examining closer at home. Remember that meteor-

ites belong to the property owner where they are found.

While meteorites may just be heavy rusty rocks, they still have value to universities and museums. To encourage recovery of more meteorites, the author is putting a bounty of up to \$100/pound. A recovery bounty is an 80-year-old tradition from the days of Dr. Nininger, the father of modern meteoritics. (Back then it was \$1/pound)

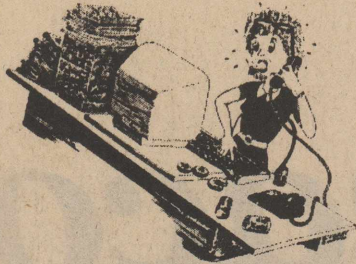

We note, from various sources, that our former Representative, Mac Thornberry of Clarendon (and the one we still look upon as "our" Representative in Congress although he now represents a different district), has been tapped to head a new Congressional Oversight subcommittee on Intelligence.

It was a good choice, and we applaud whoever had a hand in it. Mac has long been involved with intelligence matters, being one of the first to advocate bringing some sort of order out of the expensive chaos that has long marked our intelligence operations. He was named to his present Committee to replace Congressman Goss, who recently received Senate confirmation to head CIA. We have absolutely no idea what kind of relation Mac has with the new head of CIA, but from our perspective the new

setup will benefit American intelligence.

The new position will not be one that automatically enhances Mac's ability to garner press space, but he has never seemed to be overly concerned about that anyway. In other words, he will not, to our way of thinking, be inclined to issue a press release stating his findings on matters involving the leadership of CIA until he has exhausted all other avenues of correction. But when, and if, he does, then I, if I were head of CIA, would pay close attention. It will mean something, other than just another Congressman sounding off and trying to get publicity. Mac has earned a reputation as a responsible member of the House of Representatives, and his thoughts mean something in the dominate Party's leadership, both in Congress and at the White House.

It is still too early to reach definitive conclusions about the meaning of the vote in Iraq, but one thing is already certain: the exercise was indeed a resounding success. The question will always arise: was it worth the lives and treasure it has cost the United States? Those who lost loved ones there will likely have one answer. Those who lost no one, but made money off the operation, will likely have another. We will keep our fingers crossed and hope for the best.

Another thing for certain: a few lessons have been learned about how to cut down on fraud and corruption during elections. We first ran into the practice of indelible ink on the finger (as a sign of having voted), in the jungles of South America a quarter century ago, among tribal Indians who couldn't read, but

knew who they were supposed to vote for. The stained finger was used to assure that one voter didn't vote a second, or a third, or a fourth time. As we wrote in this column at the time, Lyndon Baines Johnson would never have won the U.S. Senate race against former Governor Coke Stevenson had such a test been in operation in South Texas at the time, and would never have subsequently become President.

That, of course, would have upset some folks who believe the ends justify whatever means are necessary to get there. And that, again of course, includes those federal judges who come up with ideas about how people ought to react to society's problems in this country, and religious nuts who kill themselves and anyone near simply because they believe differently.

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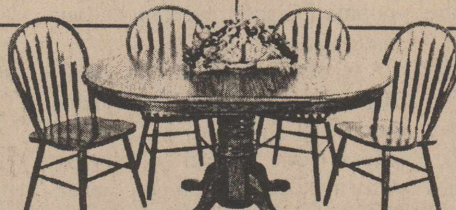

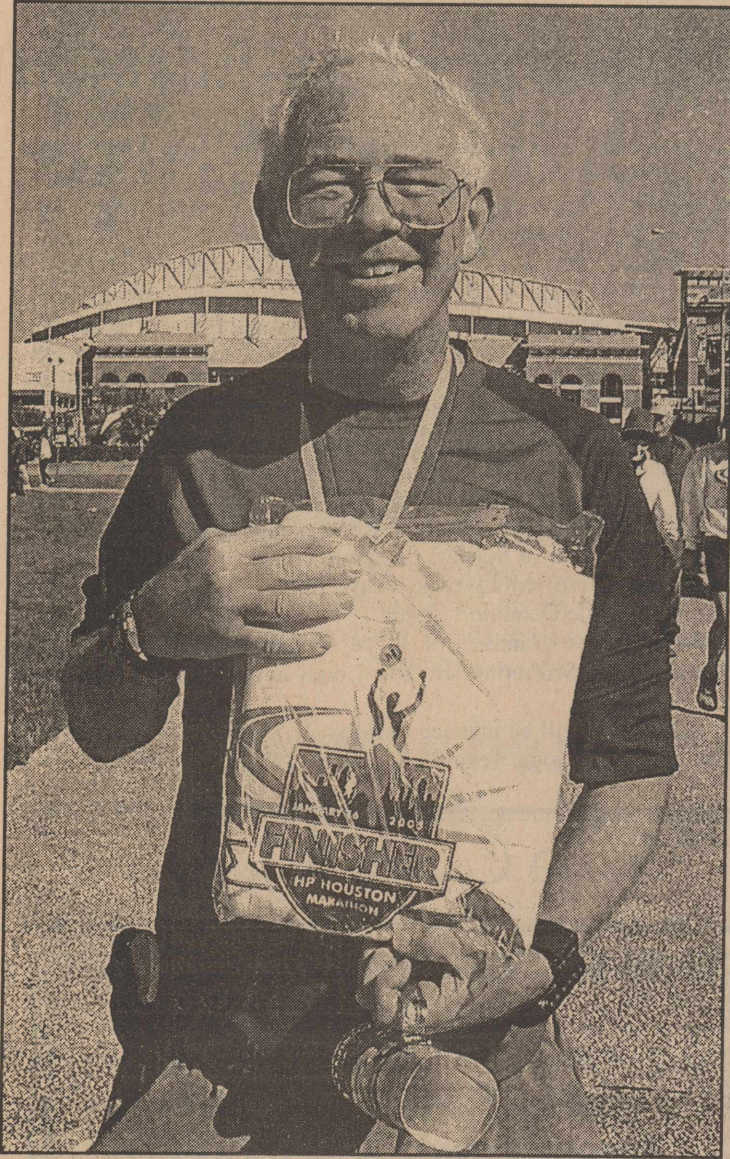

Since July 2004 he has logged over 700 miles. Dean is now ready to start training for the Marine Corps Marathon in Washington D.C. at the end of October.

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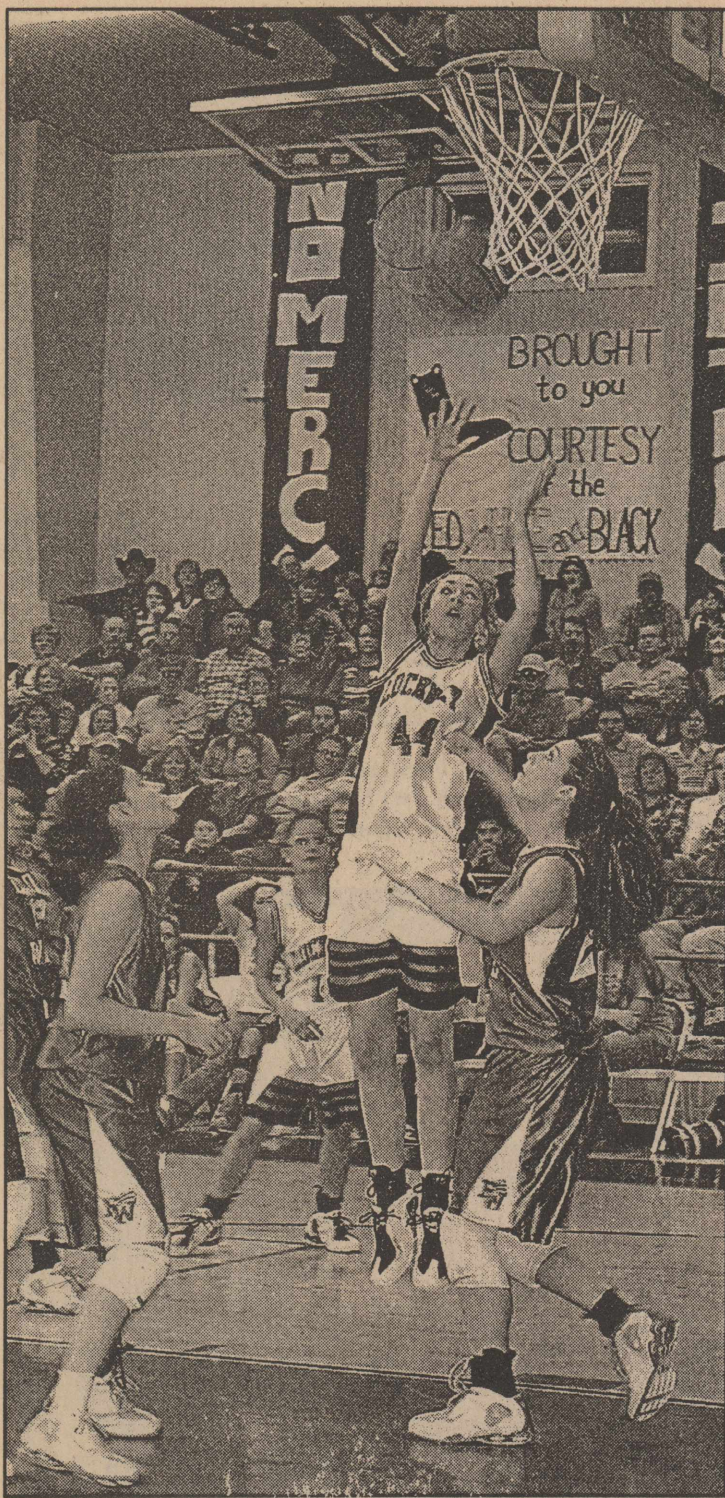

Floydada's Junior Varsity squad started the game and finished the game strong to defeat the Lockney Junior Varsity 38-36.

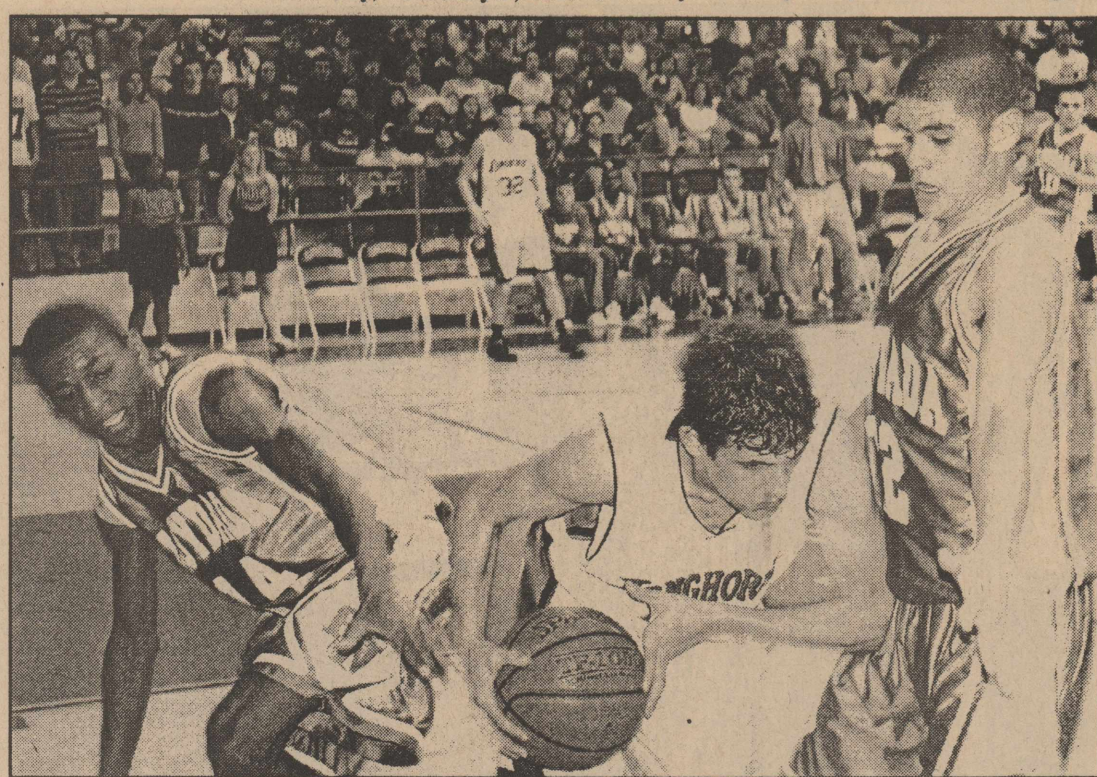

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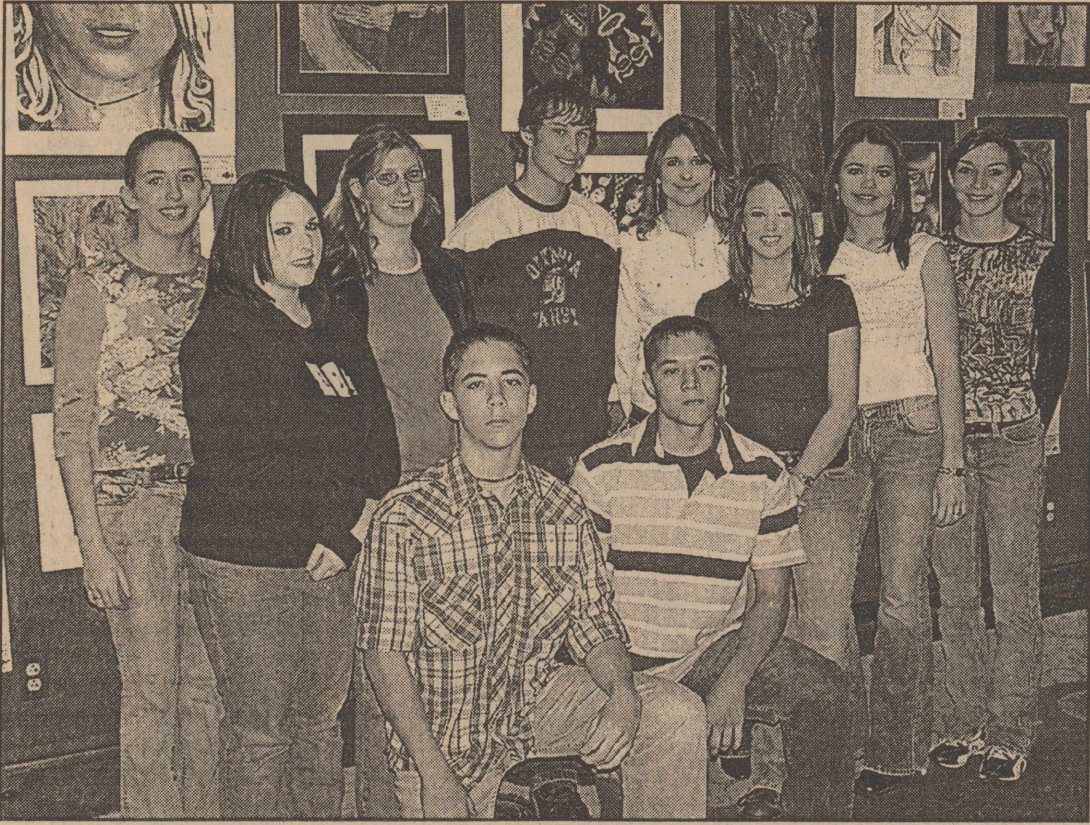

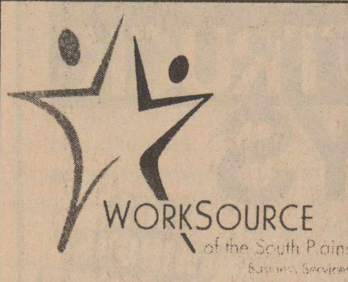

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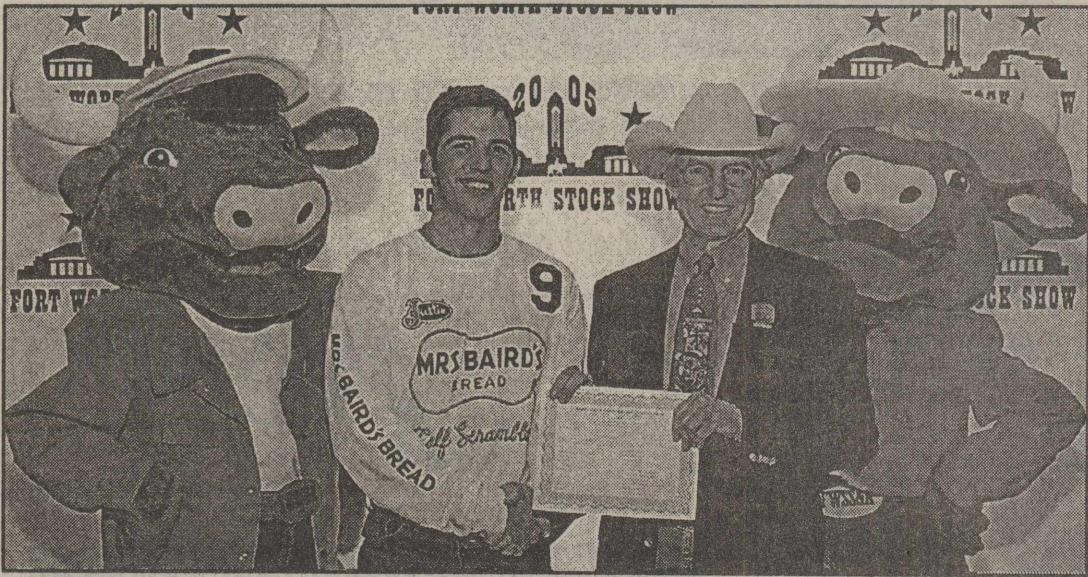
