Floyd County honors Old Settler's

Beautiful weather greeted visitors of Floyd County's Old Settler's celebration.

An opening ceremony paid tribute to the County's Pioneer Man, Pioneer Woman and Pioneer Couple of the Year.

Duard and Mary Reves, of Lockney were chosen as the Pioneer Couple. The Pioneer Woman was Effie Parker, of Lockney, and the Pioneer Man was Kearney Edmiston, of Floydada.

Effie Lee Parker was born Effie Lee Brooks on June 21, 1910 in Hunt County, to James Andrew and Leola Haney Brooks.

The family moved to Allmon community in Floyd County in 1924 where Effie attended school at Allmon and Petersburg.

She married Charlie Smith, July 19, 1933. They had 3 children: Alfred James, Clara Lee, and Charles. Charlie and Charles are both deceased.

July 6, 1958 Effie married Raymond Parker. They owned and operated Parker Grocery until they retired in 1972. Raymond passed away in 1984.

Effie has been making her home at the Lockney Nursing Home for 3 years and will celebrate her 95 birthday June 18.

Kearney Edmiston was born June 14, 1918 in Hamilton County, to Clarence and Willie Edmiston. He was the 10th of 12 children.

He went to school in a one room schoolhouse in Pottsville, and graduated from Hamilton

High School.

He came to Plainview after graduating High School and went to work for his brother, Jay, and his future father-in-law, J.B. Bartley, at a Sinclair Gas Station.

Kearney and his future wife, Margaret Bartley eloped to Clovis, New Mexico, and married on December 31, 1938. They had three children, 8 grandchildren, and 8 great grandchildren.

Kearney worked as a rubber tire welder in business with his father-in-law when WWII caused tires to be in short supply. He was also a distributor for the Coca Cola Company. While living in Waxahachie, in 1942, he commuted to Grand Prairie to work on B-24s at North American.

He was called into the Navy in 1944 and served 2 years on the battleship, USS California as a fireman in the engine room.

After he returned from the Navy he and Margaret moved to Floydada and have lived here for 60 years.

He first farmed with Calvin Steen and the bumper crop of wheat in 1947, from 100 acres, made him enough money to build and pay off a little house on Jackson Street. Margaret was also able to buy a cook stove that she still cooks on to this day.

Kearney also worked odd jobs in Floydada--one being a plumber's helper to Mr. Williams. Kearney eventually took over Mr. Williams plumbing business. He retired in 1983.

Floyd County's Pioneer Couple, Duard and Mary Reves,

were married in December 1953.

Mary Reves was born Mary Hopper, July 21, 1920 at Whitewright, Texas to Otto and Addie Owens Hopper. She graduated from Lorenzo and Wayland Baptist University in Plainview.

Duard was born October 7, 1919 at Stanford in Shackelford County to John and Jewel Shugart Reves. The Reves family moved to Floyd County in 1929.

Duard went to school at South Plains and graduated from Lockney High School and West Texas University. He served in the Army from 1942 to 1946.

Mary met Duard in 1950. After their marriage they moved to a farm in Floyd County and have lived there for 52 years. They are the parents of 3 daughters: Willa Gayle, Edith and Peggy. They also have 5 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

A memorial service also led off the day's events with thoughts from Flora McNeil and then a reading of the Floyd County residents who had passed away since Old Settler's 2004.

The Floyd County Museum was busy with activities and the square stayed full of bargain hunters browsing through the Arts and Crafts booths.

Entertainment from local singers could be heard all afternoon under the pavilion, and visitors enjoyed classic cars, antique tractors, a variety of foods, and money to win at Cow Patty Bingo.

City adds charge to sanitation

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, May 17, and observed the swearing in of the mayor and three council members, approved nine capital improvement projects and added a \$.75 cent fuel surcharge to sanitation customers.

City Secretary Karen Lawson swore in Mayor Bobby Gilliland and Council Members Ruben Barrientos, Sheldon Sue and Monte Williams for two year terms.

The council elected Sheldon Sue as Mayor Pro Tem for one year and Tali Jackson was appointed Municipal Judge for another two year term.

After lengthy discussion, the council approved a motion made by Council Member Clar Schacht, seconded by Council Member Jon Nielson, to proceed and start work on the list of capital improvement projects, as presented by City Manager Gary Brown and committee, plus new coverings for the ground water storage tanks.

City Manager Brown and Water/Sewer Supervisor Jack

Alaniz answered questions concerning each project. The projects should be completed within the next two or three years, according to Brown.

The list of capital improvement projects, with engineers' cost estimates, presented to the council by City Manager Brown were: (1) outflow sewer line and lift station - \$700,000, (2) three monitor wells at the sewer treatment plant - \$100,000, (3) water tower painting - \$400,000, (4) water booster house and pumps - \$300,000, (5) water line tapping machine - \$50,000, (6) sewer line cleaning machine - \$40,000, (7) 12 new fire hydrants - \$50,000, (8) park improvements - \$100,000, and (9) ground storage tanks' covers - \$300,000; TOTAL - \$2,040,000.

The council approved a 5 month fuel surcharge of \$.75 cents per month per sanitation customer in the City limits, with an amended motion to allow the City Manager to develop an amount to charge the out-of-the City limit customers.

Brown explained, in a written statement, handed to the council,

"The sanitation fuel account was budgeted at \$12,500. Through April, 2005 (7 months of the year's budget), the City has spent \$15,800. Based on this information, it appears a minimum fuel charge of \$.75 cents is needed to generate another \$8,000 from our 1600 customers. There is \$3,225 left in the 'pit digging' account, which will not be used for that purpose. We can use that amount for fuel, also."

In other matters, the council discussed and approved a motion to pursue a \$57,830 grant to be used for lighting the walking path at the Floydada Park east of the high school.

Police Chief Darrell Gooch addressed the council concerning complaints and concerns from the public about the operation of small scooters on the City streets. "We don't want to restrict fun, but we must be safe," said Gooch. No action was taken by the council.

City Animal Control Supervisor Roy Moreno spoke to the council about dangerous dogs in the City limits. Moreno said, "We

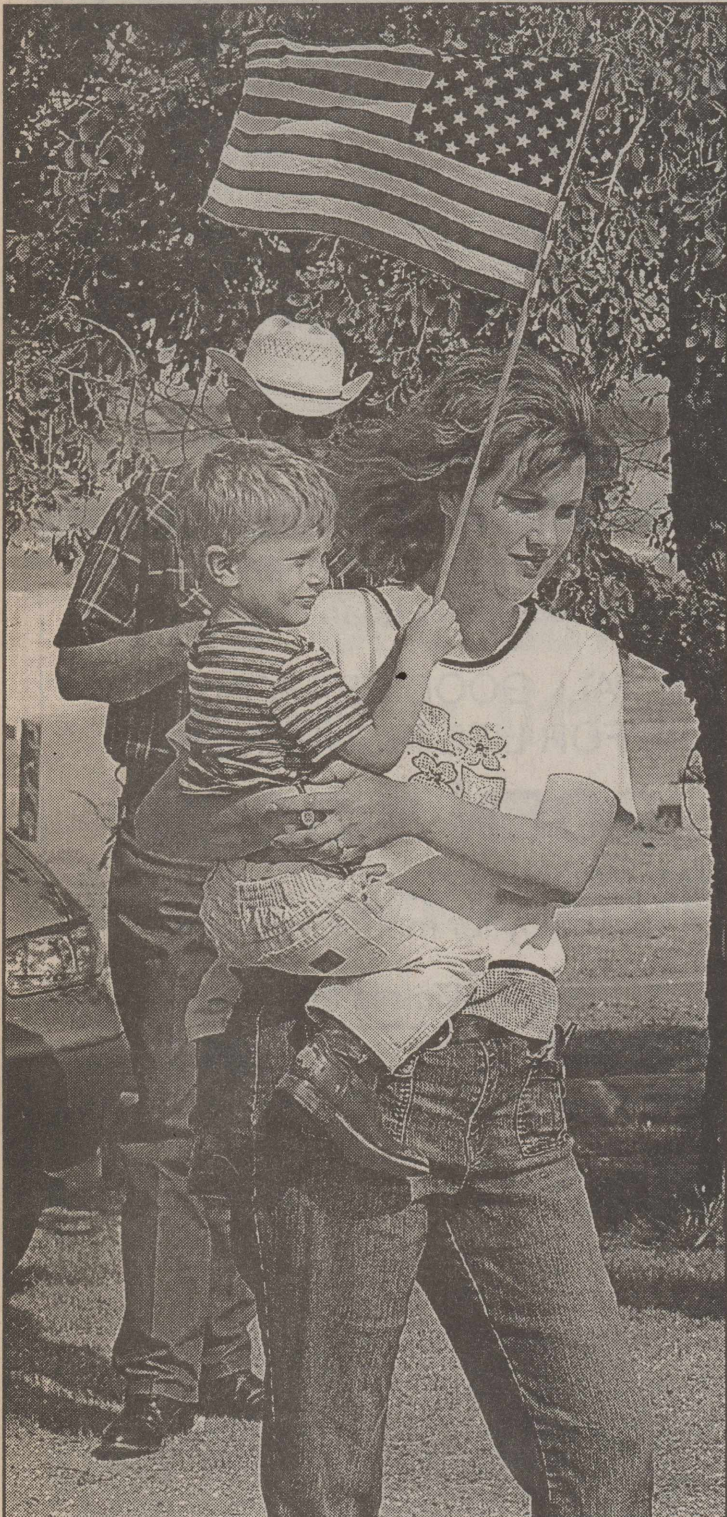
The FISD Board met Tuesday, May 17, and observed the swearing in of a new board member, and an incumbent, and then elected new board officers for the next three years.

Following a brief recess, the board reconvened at the FISD

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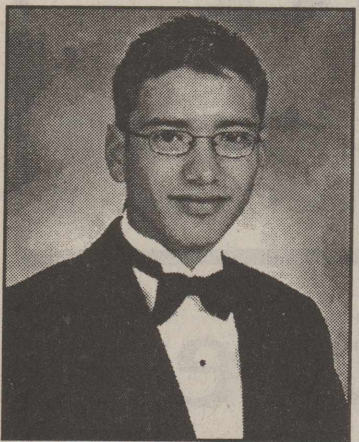
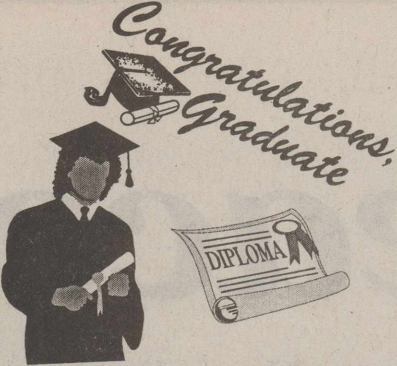

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Floydada Council considers issues of vicious dogs

can ticket citizens according to the Health and Safety Code."

In a written statement, City Manager Brown said, "This subject is going to be tough to please everyone. What is a dangerous dog? I realize that a dog that attacks someone is dangerous, but there are a lot of circumstances that can cause the attack. This is not out of line."

Brown shared a document from the Texas Department of Health that stated, "A 'dangerous dog' is one that makes an unprovoked attack on a person that causes bodily injury and occurs in a place other than an enclosure in which the dog was being kept..." No action was taken by the council.

The council approved the proposed Floyd County Appraisal District Budget for 2005-2006, which is \$236,660. The Appraisal District's budget was up from the 2004-2005 budget by \$8,188. The reason for this increase, as stated by the Appraisal District, is "due in part because three employees retiring and gaining three

new employees being trained for their new jobs. Some will have to attend school to be trained and certified. The increase is also due to the increase in the price of gas for the appraisers doing Field

Work." The building of a new carport at 1110 S. Ralls Highway was approved by the council.

Another item discussed by the council was about four "honey bee" calls in the City recently. Steve Davis, Floyd County Extension Agent, IPM wrote the council and asked to come at their next meeting to help deal "with feral or wild honey bee colonies, currently inundating our area."

City Attorney Karen Houchin

and Council Member Monte Williams addressed the council concerning the oil and gas leasing in the City limits of Floydada. It was decided that an ordinance was needed and to be drafted concerning this issue.

A copy of a questionnaire, concerning gas and oil well development, being used by the City of Denton was given to the council members to study. The Denton questionnaire covered subjects, such as: (1) Should there be separate ordinances for gas and oil drilling? (answer: If

oil were discovered in the City limits, the oil or gas company would have to obtain zoning through a specific use permit); (2) Where are gas well allowed in the City? (answer: An SUP (Specific Use Permit) is required if the well site is within 250' to 500' of a residence, because of about 4 weeks of drilling, which includes noise, the danger of water injections at high pressures, fenced in tank batteries, emissions from diesel machinery, and toxic and nontoxic by-products.

For all practical purposes the Texas Legislature has drawn a blank when it comes to revising the property tax code, and the finance laws governing state schools. They may still pull it off, but for now any chance for improvement looks rather dismal. The way things look now, any change is problematic, and if there is any change, the results are likely to be no better than we have now.

Many years ago, we wrote our arm off on both subjects, but our own voice in the legislature, or what should have been our voice in the legislature, Pete Laney, marched to a different drummer, a drummer paid for by the same people who paid for his twin engine aircraft. (The one he used to fly some of his absconding Democratic buddies up to Ardmore, Oklahoma so they wouldn't have to present themselves to their constituents as more concerned with the fate of

their Party than they were with their Districts.) We thought, in those days, that the whole thing could be solved with a few simple changes in legislation. It would have caused a little pain, no doubt, but far less pain than is manufactured when special interests get dug in. That's where we are now.

We thought then, and we still think, that a big chunk of the problem could be solved simply by rerouting a portion of the sales tax to the communities from whence it came, rather than to the community which collects the tax. In this locale, for instance, hundreds of thousands of dollars, even millions of dollars, that flows to Wal-Mart in Plainview every year would be returned to Floydada, Lockney, Hale Center, Matador, wherever. There the money would flow into the local infrastructure, relieving at least a portion of the burden local communities now must make up with property taxes.

But no. The lobbyists that swarm the state's Capitol would come unglued at any suggestion of change. Powerful big city delegations that now use tax rebates as an enticement for luring more and more industries, or for luring more and more huge retailers (like Wal-Mart) into their locali-

ties, would oppose any move that might cause unease. That way exists the possibility of electoral defeat. It is far better, for some, to do nothing, or run to Ardmore, or somewhere, and hide, rather than risk defeat by attempting to do something. And by avoiding defeat, a legislator can amass years of longevity retirement so he (or she) can collect upwards of \$100,000 per year for the rest of their natural life. I would expect that Pete Laney, our secretive legislator from Hale Center, will retire on a "pension" from taxpayers approaching \$100,000 per year, a pension, by the way, that has been quietly increased, with no record vote, in the last few days. The dodge is quite simple. The Legislators simply raise the pay of District Judges to outlandish levels, and then tie their own "retirement" to the pay of the District Judge. So, any time they want to increase their own pension, they merely have to raise the salary of the District Judge, which is now \$125,000 per year, plus perks. It's a nice, symbiotic relationship, one that serves the dual purpose of discouraging Judges from running for the Legislature while putting Judges on notice that they can't let their political guard down.

Still, anything can happen in politics. We even saw, in a recent

edition of the Crosbyton Review, some glowing remarks from Don Richards, a defeated Democratic candidate for Congress back in the 1980's (and the new owner of the Crosbyton Review), about one Randy Naugerbauer, the new Republican Congressman from Lubbock who now represents this District. That came after Don wrote his arm off condemning Naugerbauer and supporting the Democratic candidate, incumbent Charlie Stenholm of Stanford, or somewhere up there, in the recent election. So changes in political posture are not the exclusive property of John Kerry, by any means. Changes, and flip-flops, can, and do, happen all across the political spectrum. Anyone who supported George Bush, thinking he was going to enforce emigration laws, will know what we mean.

Inequities in the tax code in Texas have been around for years. It is not going to be fixed (though it should be), simply because we now have a Republican majority in both houses of the Legislature. The Republicans in the Legislature face the same pressures faced by their Democratic predecessors. It comes down to one simple thing: Do they have enough intestinal fortitude to vote their convictions? Their predecessors didn't.

CHD approves communications backup plan

The Caprock Hospital District Board met Tuesday, May 17, and observed the swearing in of three board members, heard from Floyd County Emergency Coordinator Preston Belt and received a good profit report from the PNS Cogdell Clinic.

Floyd County Judge William D. Harjin swore in Board Members Denise Payne, Kyle Smith and Tom Farris for another two year term.

Emergency Coordinator Preston Belt presented to the board the need for an emergency backup system in Floyd County communications. Belt told the board about a Homeland Security Grant that had been received for backup communications during an emergency. The tower north of Lockney will be used and the Hospital District's cost will be a \$300 yearly fee for leasing the tower. The CHD board approved the annual fee.

Paul Acreman from PNS of Lubbock and PNS Cogdell Clinic Office Manager Maybelle Monreal were both present for the meeting, along with all board members.

Their report showed the clinic made a \$17,424.15 profit in April and a Year-To-Date profit of \$75,288.94, compared to last year's profit of \$46,479.04 at this same time.

The board approved \$434.53 of indigent health care claims for the month.

Paul Moore of Floydada EMS reported to the board. There were 60 runs during April and EMS is still looking for another paramedic.

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FISD approves air conditioning

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main office. FISD Secretary Laveta Morren swore in incumbent Board Member Rachel Castillo of Pct. 3, and new Board Member Lyle Miller, At Large, replacing retiring Board Member Mitch Probasco.

The Board of Trustees elected new officers. They were: Board President Bill Dean, Board Vice-President Rachel Castillo and Board Secretary Mark McCormick.

The board approved installing air-conditioning at the FHS Field House at a cost of \$33,600 by Hammond Sheet Metal. The vote was 5 to 1, with Board Member Kerry Pratt voting against the motion made by Board Member Castillo, and seconded by Board Member Amado Morales.

Superintendent Vaughn pointed out that Hammond's bid last year was \$29,000, but the \$4,600 increase was budgeted into this year's Building Expenses.

In other matters, the board accepted two bids for the purchase of two school buses recommended by Superintendent Vaughn. The board voted unanimously to purchase a 71 passenger bus, at \$62,723.00, with mandatory seat belts and shoulder restraints, to be shared with the Head Start Program and FISD.

The other 18 passenger bus, costing \$49,704.00, would be paid for with Federal Grant rollover money and by FISD, according to Vaughn.

Concerning grant money, Superintendent Vaughn presented the board a written record of grant money received by FISD this school year. It showed: E-Rate Grant (for phone and internet expenses), \$30,000; Texas ASAP Grant (science grant

for At Risk H.S. students), \$50,000; Title IV Grant (for DAEP students), \$68,525; Reading First Grant (for Reading Program, K-3), \$244,632; and TIP Grant (for training and laptop computers at FJHS), \$390,000; Total All Grants = \$783,157.

In a related matter and following discussion, the board unanimously approved the motion by Board Member Pratt, and seconded by Board Member Castillo, to relocate the CCLC/DAEP sub-campus, with personnel, to the FHS campus, with the exact location to be determined at a latter date.

Superintendent Vaughn told the board, "We could put a permanent building, West of the high school and North of the tennis courts, for around \$100,000. Or, we could lease, with or without the option to buy, two portable buildings at a cost of \$13,000 each, for a total of \$26,000 yearly."

Upon the recommendation of Superintendent, the board amended the 2004-2005 Budget in order to place an automatic external heart defibrillator in every FISD building, including the gymnasium, at a total cost of \$9,000.

"All of our teachers this year will be given instruction on First Aid, CPR and the defibrillator," said Vaughn.

Business Manager Sharon Rainwater presented the board with a Tax Statement and a Cash Flow Report. The Tax Statement showed \$1,980,624.07 collected as of April 30, 2005, a 95.27 percent collection. The Cash Flow Statement showed a Current Cash Balance of \$5,195,321.76, with an Average Monthly Expense of \$580,000.

The bid by First National

Bank of Floydada was unanimously approved by the board to be FISD's Depository for the 2006-2008 school years.

The board recognized the Students, Educator and Support Staff of the Month during the meeting. They were: Students of the Month - Javier Olvera, Building Bridges, A.B. Duncan Elementary; Brannon Stewart, Grade 4, R.C. Andrews Elementary; Bailey Davenport, Grade 8, FJHS; Charles Beedy, Grade 9, FHS; Educator of the Month - JoAnn Chavarria, Business/English, CCLC; and Support Staff of the Month - Donna Henderson, Office Assistant, R.C. Andrews Elementary.

The board accepted four resignations. They were: Janie Flores, FJHS; Dale Jahay, FHS; Brenda Greer, R.C. Andrews Elementary; and Raymond Flores, FHS.

In Superintendent Vaughn's closing report, he handed out the 2004-2005 TAKS' report for FISD.

Board Member Amado Morales asked Superintendent Vaughn, "Why are the FHS 10th Grade scores so low? Is the problem with the curriculum or the instructor?"

"We are not where we want to be, but it is not because of 'lack of effort'. We need to improve and we want to see the entire picture across the state to see if other schools have had this problem. These were different tests and they were harder. If graded by last year's standards these scores would have been a lot higher," explained Vaughn.

The low scores by the FHS 10th Grade class were: English/Language Arts - 57; Math - 41; Social Studies - 78; and Science - 34.

FHS Principal Wayne Morren responded, "We have some students who just don't think these tests count."

Other low scores were: 3rd Grade Math - 48; 4th Grade Reading - 51; 5th Grade Math - 48 and Science - 52; and 7th Grade Math - 46.

Some snake bite treatments are bad

If you are less than one hour from the nearest emergency room, initial first aid treatment for a rattlesnake bite is relatively simple. Try to calm the victim and gently wash the area with soap and water.

Apply a cold, wet cloth over the bite and transport the victim to the nearest emergency facility for further treatment.

There are several treatments that are dangerous and will not help the victim and you should NOT do.

Do not apply a tourniquet. Do not pack the bite area in ice.

Do not cut the wound with a knife or razor. Do not use your mouth to suck out the venom.


Do not let the victim drink alcohol, and do not apply electrical shock.

Applying ice or a tourniquet can block circulation, which can result in gangrene and eventual loss of the limb due to amputation. Cutting the wound can cause excessive bleeding.

Because human mouths are full of bacteria, sucking the venom from the wound can cause infection, making treatment more difficult.

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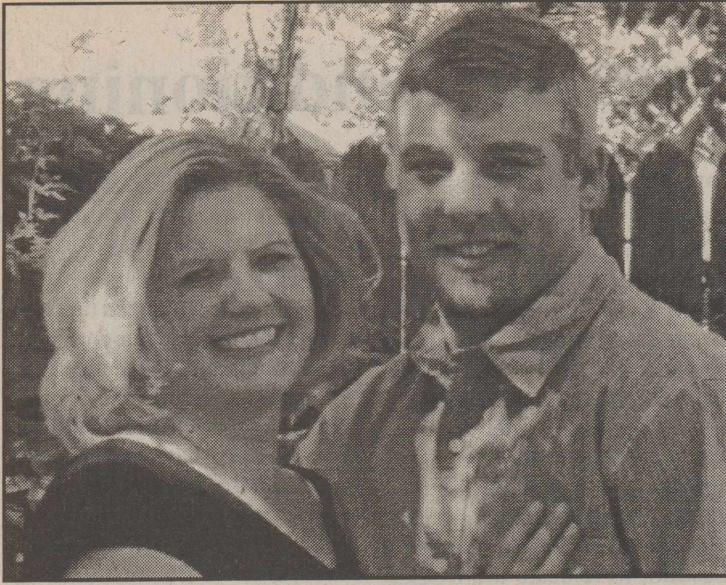

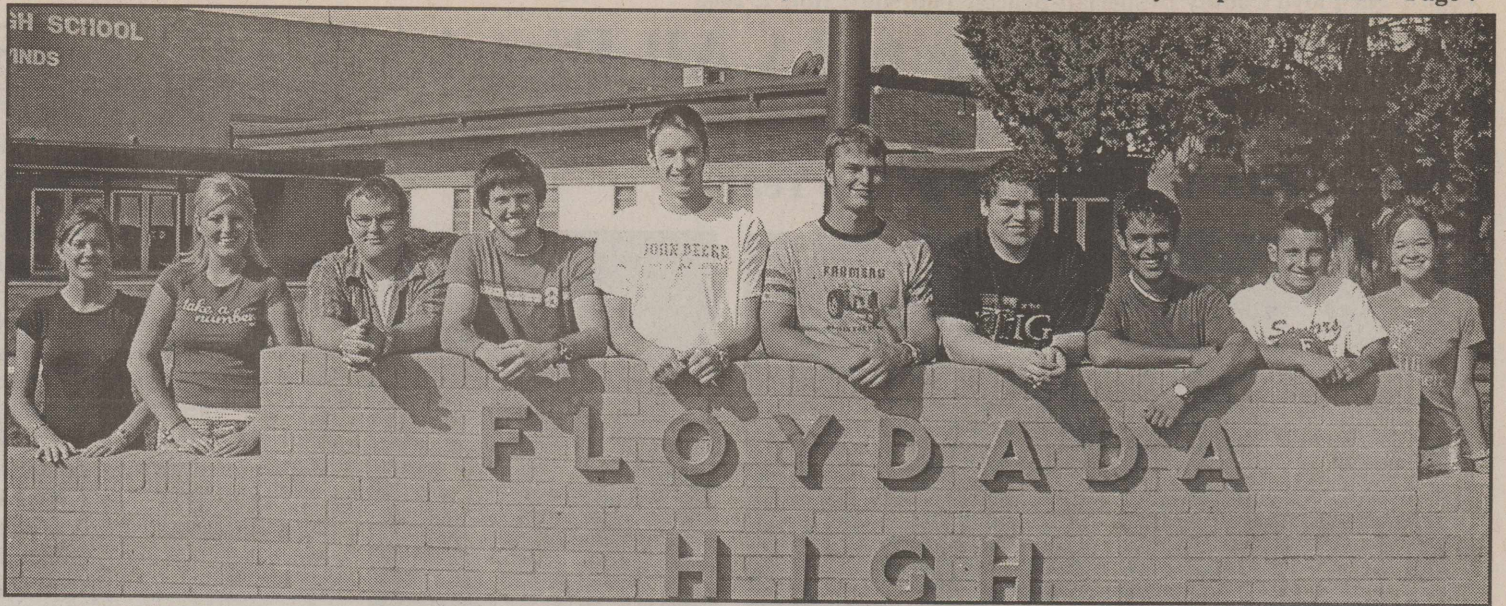
trict President.

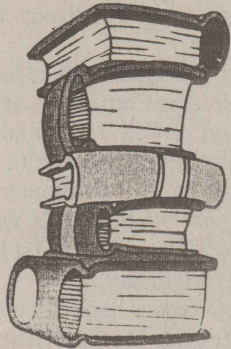

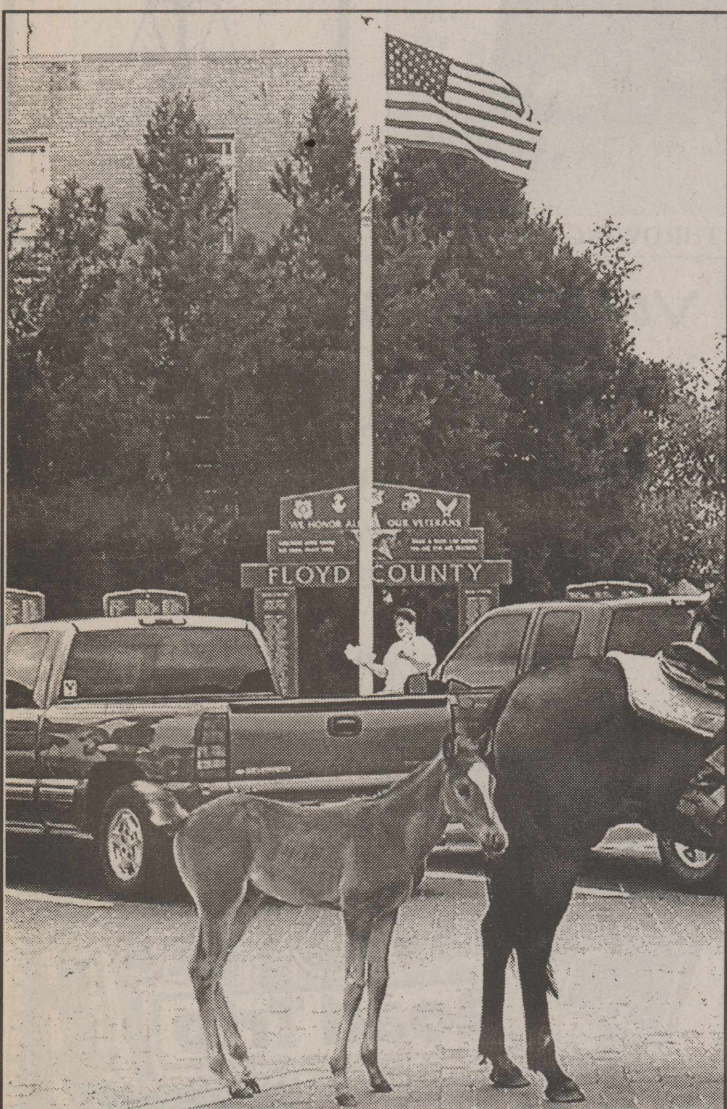

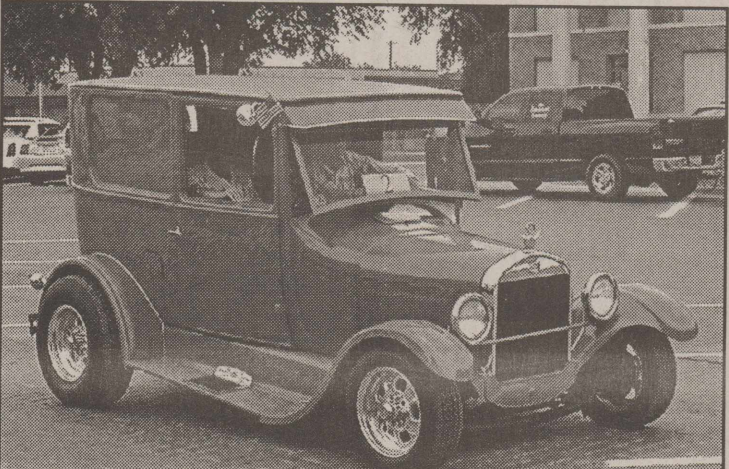

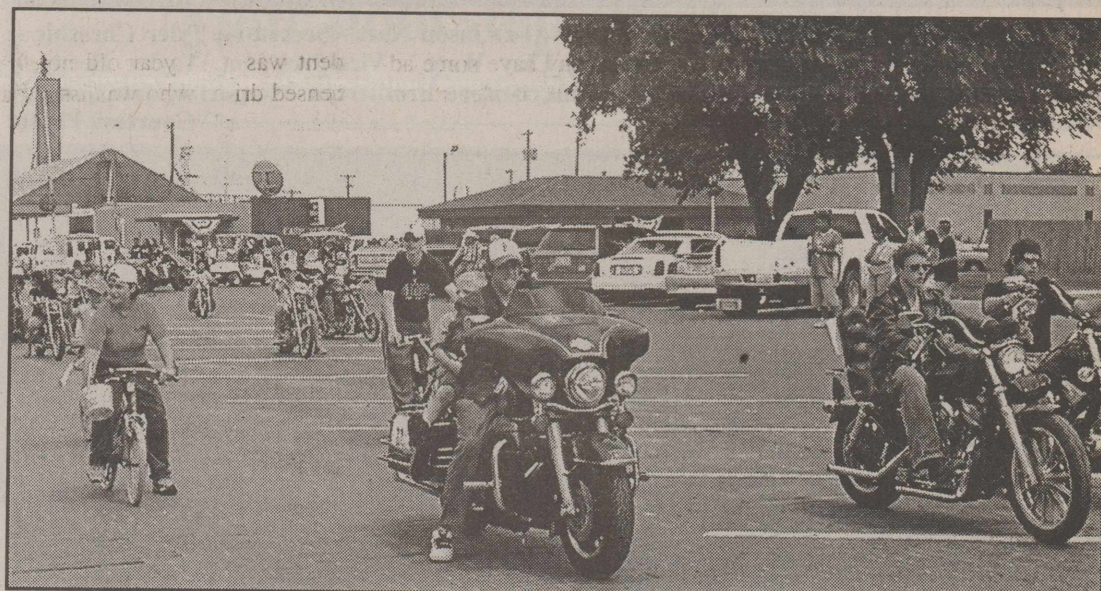
Stoerner named to Dean's List at ASU

Lockney Police Report

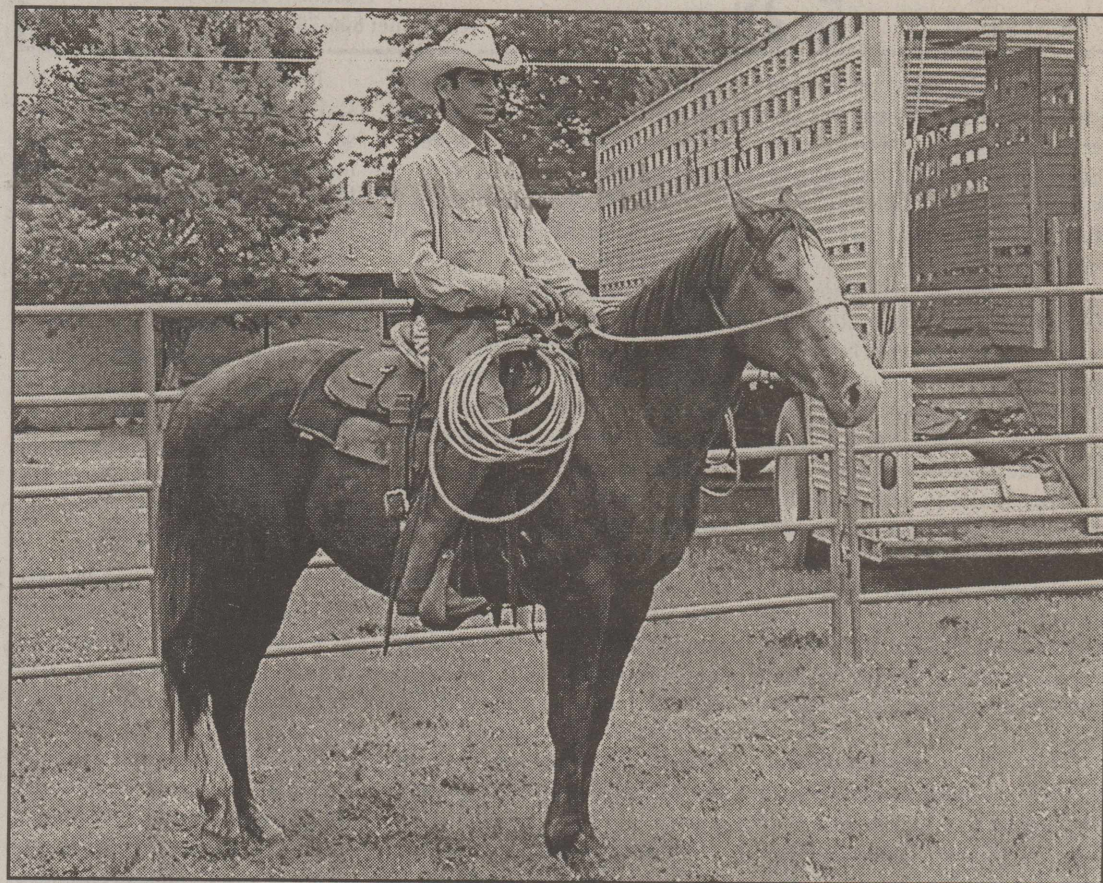
May 12 The Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon reported to police that someone had taken cash from a local business in the 200 block of N. Main that sells the newspaper.

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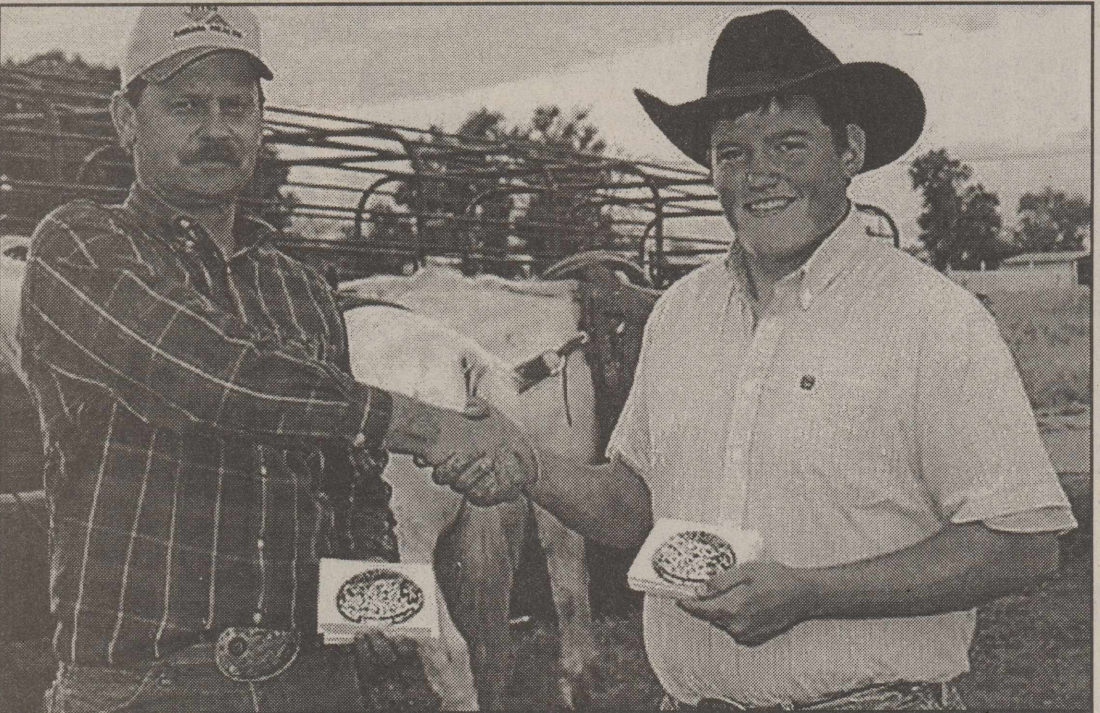

In a 6-3 decision, the United States Supreme Court has rejected a First Amendment challenge to the Beef Promotion and Research Act and that industry's marketing program, "Beef: It's what's for dinner."

In the ruling, the Supreme Court reversed a lower court decision and held that the beef program is a form of "government speech" and therefore immune to challenge as a free speech issue under the First Amendment.

The decision clarifies that commodity promotion programs do not infringe the First Amendment rights of individuals required to fund them when the government defines the central message that is communicated and also oversees program operation.

The majority opinion was delivered by Justice Antonin Scalia and signed by Chief Justice William Rehnquist, Clarence Thomas and Sandra Day O'Connor. Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg concurred with the decision, but provided a separate opinion. The three justices dissenting in the decision were David J. Souter, John Paul Stevens and Anthony Kennedy.

This is particularly good news for the U.S. cotton industry as it deals with similar court challenges to the nearly 40 year-old Cotton Research and Promotion Program.

The cotton industry is in the process of dealing with two challenges brought by a group of cotton textile importers. One case is an administrative challenge filed with USDA and the second is a lawsuit filed in the U.S. Court of International Trade.

It is important to note that the cotton cases will ultimately be judged on their own merits, but the Supreme Court finding in the beef case is important because it

is the first time that a program of this type has definitively been identified as a form of "government speech."

National Cotton Council Chairman Woods Eastland says the Supreme Court decision is great news for beef producers and cotton farmers alike and should clarify the law regarding the constitutionality of agricultural research and promotion programs like the Cotton Research and Promotion Program.

In dealing with the cases brought against the Cotton Research and Promotion Program, the cotton industry has formed the Cotton Research and Promotion Defense Council to act as the liaison between the U.S. Department of Justice and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) who have primary responsibility for defending the cotton program.

Plains Cotton Growers is actively involved in the effort led by the Cotton Research and Promotion Defense Council as the contact point for the Texas Cotton Producers (TCP) organization which is one of four organizations acting as an intervener in the cotton case. PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett has also been granted the authority to represent TCP as the cotton case moves forward.

Lubbock Classing Office's final 2004 Quality Report: Lamesa Office Director Wells retires

While they haven't quite turned out all the lights at Lubbock's USDA Cotton Classing office, Classing office Director Kenny Day issued the office's final 2004 crop classing report on Monday May 23, 8 months and 3,679,364 bales after the office issued its first 2004 report on September 23, 2004.

In the process Day and the staff of the Lubbock office have set a new all-time record for cotton samples classed at a single location. The previous single office classing record of 3,165 million bales was held for just a few weeks earlier in the season by the Memphis, Tennessee facility.

Quality measurements for the 2004 crop classed at Lubbock covered a broad range and contributed to the description of this year's crop as a mixed bag that provided something for just about any buyer's needs.

The bulk (57.7%) of the crop was classified as Color grades 31 (15.5%) or 41 (42.2%). Approximately 38 percent of the 2004 crop had color readings below 41.

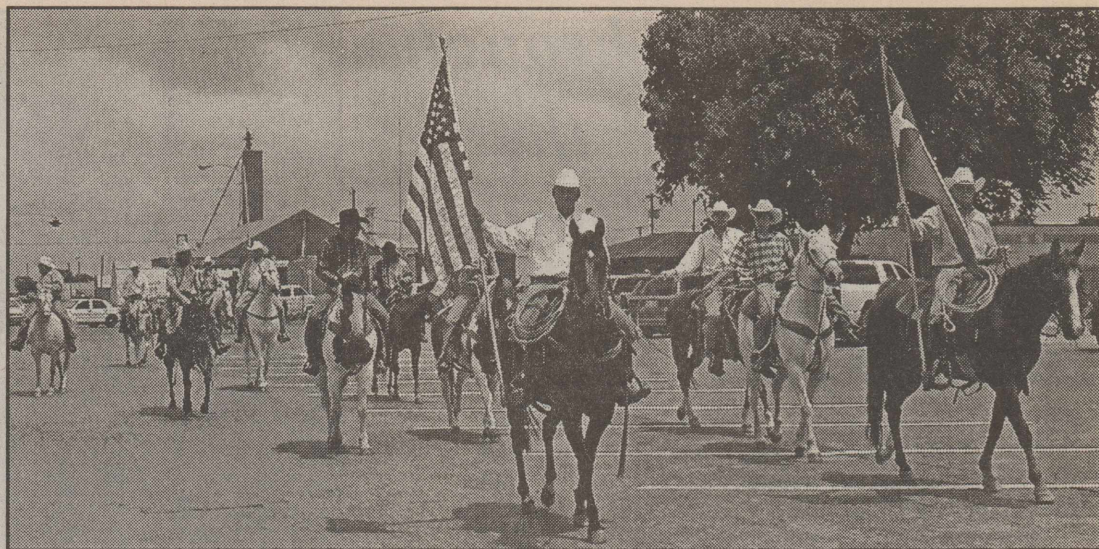
Lubbock's average length for the season was a respectable 34.23 or just over 1-1/16th inch. Over 43 percent of the 2004 crop showed length measurements of 35 or longer.

Micronaire readings averaged 3.62 for the season even though almost 35 percent of the crop received Micronaire readings below 3.5.

Strength readings at the Lubbock office average 28.48 grams per tex for the season.

The 2004 crop took almost exactly 8 months to process and will go down as a crop that few people will ever forget. For the folks at the Lubbock Classing Office, the time spent on reflecting about the record crop will be exceedingly short as cotton planting is already well past the half-way mark for the 2005 crop.

With another crop already in the ground, the job of getting the Lubbock office ready to class the first bale of the 2005 crop just about four short months from today is already underway.

Farm Service Agency accepts applications for 2005 Livestock Assistance Program

Floyd County is one of 95 counties in Texas approved for 2005 Livestock Assistance Program (LAP) benefits. LAP provides relief to livestock producers who suffered grazing losses in 2003 or 2004 due to drought, severe weather and related causes. Producers of dairy and beef cattle; bison and beefalo; goats; swine; sheep; and certain equine, elk and reindeer are now eligible to participate in LAP.

To qualify for LAP, grazing land must be located in a county designated as a primary disaster county under a presidential or secretarial disaster declaration. The declaration must have been approved on or after Jan. 1, 2003, for a disaster occurring through Dec. 31, 2004. LAP benefits are not available for contiguous counties. A county may meet eligibility requirements for both

2003 and 2004, however, producers may receive benefits for only one of the two calendar years.

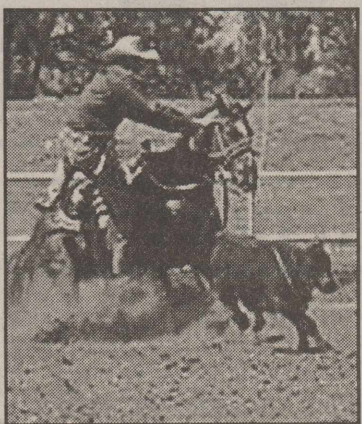
Eligible applicants must have control of adequate grazing land to support the eligible livestock and possess beneficial interest in eligible livestock that have been owned or leased for at least three months. During 2003 or 2004, livestock producers must have suffered a 40 percent or greater loss of grazing production for three or more consecutive months due to natural disasters.

If you reduced the number of livestock because of a natural disaster, you won't be penalized for those reductions. If, because of a natural disaster, you sold eligible livestock that were placed on grazing land on or after January 31, 2003, you will receive compensation for the entire disaster payment period or to the date when livestock are normally

sold. LAP payments will be based on the number of livestock a producer would have owned if the disaster had not occurred. For livestock that were sold in the course of routine business, eligible applicants will receive benefits for those animals only - up to the date of sale. A payment limitation of \$40,000 per person applies, and individuals whose gross revenue exceeds \$2.5 million are ineligible for program benefits.

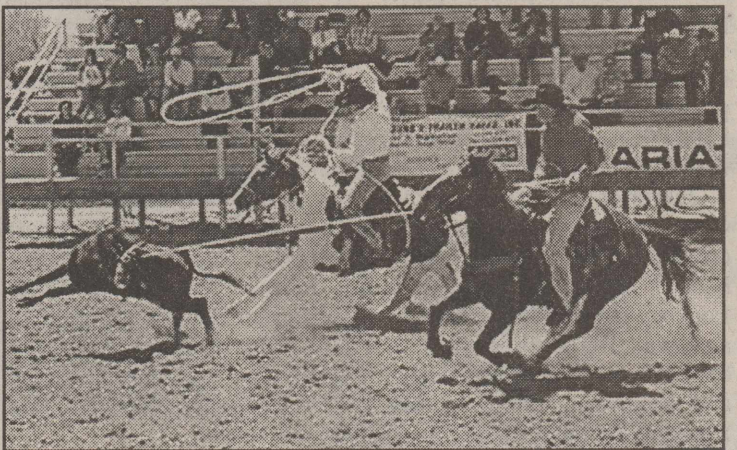

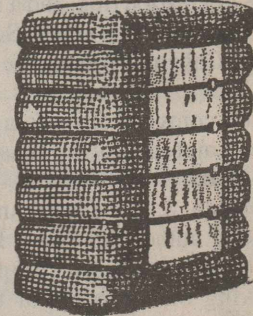
