Local Scouts attend National Jamboree

Three Boy Scouts from Floydada Scout Troop 357 made a 'trip of a lifetime' to the 2005 National Boy Scout Jamboree held at Fort A.P. Hill Army Base in Bowling Green, Virginia. 43,000 Boy Scouts from America and 12 other countries were on hand to celebrate the theme of the Jamboree "On My Honor, Timeless Values."

Scout Master, Third Assistant, Jay McGaugh, Eagle Scout Brian Odom and First Class Boy Scout J.C. Chappell attended the ten day Jamboree. They also visited the Washington, D.C. area.

McGaugh is a 2004 graduate of FHS and will be a sophomore at Mary State College at Tishoningo, Oklahoma. His parents are Jimmy and June McGaugh of Floydada. Odom is a 2005 graduate of FHS and will attend Hardin Simmons University in Abilene this year. His parents are John and Robbie Odom of Floydada. Chappell will be an 8th grader at FJHS this year and his parents are Jerry and Darla Chappell of Floydada. All three scouts are members of the Floydada Troop 357, with Bob Gilliland as their Troop Scout

On the first day of the Jamboree four adult Boy Scout leaders from Alaska were killed when their tent pole came into contact with an overhead power line while they were setting up camp. "All flags were flown at halfmast for the entire Jamboree," said McGaugh. "Their Boy Scout camped out in sub-camps in a troop was integrated into the very primitive area of trees and

A highlight of the Jamboree was a visit by President George W. Bush on Sunday, July 31 at the Jamboree's Closing Service. Thunder storms and terrible heat at the camp had postponed two other planned trips by President

McGaugh said, "The president impressed me because he wore casual clothing and he shook hands with almost everyone on the front row. Security was real tight. No metal objects were allowed and only one backpack was permitted for each troop. With parents and visitors present, we broke the Jamboree's attendance record with over 70,000 people to hear him

The president's first trip, to open the Jamboree, was cancelled because of a dangerous thunder storm. Senator Fisk from Tennessee spoke to the scouts and told them the 'Boy Scout Funding' bill had passed 98 to 0 in Washington, D.C.

Concerning that first planned presidential trip, Chappell said, "I had been chosen to sit up front near the platform at the large outdoor arena to meet the president."


A second planned trip by the president was cancelled because of the stifling heat and humidity on that particular day. "Well over 300 scouts fell sick from heat exhaustion that day. Our troop's 3 1/2 mile walk to the arena in the heat was horrible. We were brush. The humidity was high and the heat index that day was 110 degrees. Three scouts and two leaders from our troop fell to heat exhaustion. We were told to drink three quarts of water between each meal," said McGaugh.

Odom was assigned to the Boy Scout Band. He flew in on another flight and his luggage was lost for the first three days of his trip. "They bought me clothes at Wal-Mart and other places so I could play in the 66 member Boy Scout Band. My luggage got mixed up with some Army soldiers' luggage at the airport. It was delivered to me three days later," said Odom.

'We practiced for two days, then we played for about an hour 'on the square' in downtown Bowling Green on Monday, July 25. From there we performed one hour programs at George Washington's sister's home in Fredricksburg, Virginia on Tuesday. On Wednesday we played at the Opening Jamboree Ceremony at the large Boy Scout Arena for the president's cancelled trip," said Odom.

According to Odom, the band visited several sites in Washington, D.C., including the Aero Space Museum and the War Memorial on Thursday. The President's Marine Corp Band performed for them.

"The Boy Scout Band performed daily each morning at the flag raising ceremonies at the Jamboree camp and then again on Sunday for the President's **Continued On Page 3**

Have I made the right decision?" So I worried--even though I pretended I wasn't.

By the end of the day Brandon was happier and so was I.

I had worried for months before we got to NMMI about things that never occurred to Brandon to worry about, I worried about the registration process. Did I have the right papers filled out? How much money will I need? What kind of bank account do we set up? I could go on and on.

I shouldn't have worried about anything.

The registration (called Matriculation at NMMI) went smoother than I could ever have imagined.



Just in case you missed it: The United States and Israel are now in "negotiations" over an Israeli request for an additional \$2.2 Billion in aid to pay for building new homes for those Jews slated to move from the Gaza strip to other places in Israel,



speech at the closing Arena Show," said Odom.

McGaugh said, "We flew to the Jamboree with 39 other Boy Scouts from the South Plains area. Including Brian (Odom) on another flight, the total was 40 from this area."

While in Washington, D.C. and the surrounding area, these local Boy Scouts toured the National Zoo, the FDR Memorial, the Korean and Vietnam Memorials, the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials, the Boy Scout Memorial, the White House, the National Archives Museum, the American History Museum and the Museum of National History at the Smithsonion Museum.

Also, they visited the Battle Ship Maine Memorial, the STS 101 Columbia Disaster Memorial, Audie Murphy's grave site, The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, The David Story Holocaust Museum and Mount Vernon's Home of George Washington.

Chappell said he was "most impressed with the Korean and Vietnam Memorials", while McGaugh said he was most impressed by the speech of the Major General of the Marine Corp, and the Marine Corp Band, during their visit at the Arlington Cemetery. "He spoke on the theme of the Boy Scouts, 'On My Honor, Timeless Values,' and gave us a better appreciation of our service," said McGaugh.

According to McGaugh, about half of the South Plains Boy Scout group at the Jamboree took part in the 5K Run and Walk held on Friday and Saturday. "By their participation in these events and other activities, they could earn up to 5 "Rocker" patches to be worn around their National Jamboree Patch."

Chappell earned three "Rocker" patches. The adult scouts over these scouts, then could earn a Full Circle Patch for their uniform, according to McGaugh.

Some of the activities at the Jamboree that the scouts participated in were demonstrations and the firing of black powder rifles, archery, tomahawk throwing, conservation of wildlife demonstrations and an Army Adventure Area, with training and participation by the scouts.

On Saturday the scouts watched a presentation of 'The Order of the Arrow." "This demonstration showed the scouts how to 'Live your life according to the 12 points of the scout's law," said McGaugh.

The Jamboree's food was "pretty good", according to these hometown scouts. "We cooked breakfast and supper ourselves. Lunch consisted of a brown bag sandwich provided by the Jamboree. At breakfast we ate eggs, pancakes, cereal and sausage. For supper we had stew, ribs and spaghetti," said McGaugh.

McGaugh said he was able to trade 'location' patches with several Boy Scouts from other places. Some patches he traded for were from Chicago, Midland, Iowa, Oklahoma and Tennessee. Some of the names were Golden Spread, Buffalo Trails, Hawkeyes and Indian Nation.

All three scouts agreed, the last night's 45 minute fireworks show was the greatest they had ever seen. "It was bigger and better, and I liked the 'booms'," said Chappell.

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
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

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

It takes 185 blood donations every day to meet the needs of area patients and to be ready for emergencies. "We all expect blood to be there for us if we ever need it," said Hollinshead. "But only about 5 percent of area residents donate blood." Donors must be at least 17, weigh at least 110 pounds and be in good health.


All donors must have a picture ID and a list of any medication that they are taking. People who wish to donate may schedule an appointment by calling Jean Appling at 697-2648 or logging on to:

www.UnitedBloodServices.org. All donors will receive a gift of their choice.

Each blood donation can help several patients. Every unit of donated blood is sent to the United Blood Services laboratory for testing and processing. Laboratory technicians separate the whole blood into components (including red blood cells, plasma, platelets and cryoprecipitate).

Red blood cells are used for surgery patients. Plasma is needed to treat trauma and burn patients. Platelets are required for cancer and leukemia patients undergoing chemotherapy. A special blood clotting factor, cryoprecipitate, is used by those with hemophilia. While individual components are transfused for specific medical needs, a patient with a serious injury may require several different components.



1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced-price meals. Use one Free and Reduced-Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. 2. Who can get free meals? Children in households getting Food Stamps or TANF and most foster children can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Guidelines.

3. Can homeless, runaway and migrant children get free meals? Please call [983-3498] to see if your child(ren) qualify, if you have not been informed that they will get free meals.

4. Who can get reduced price meals? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced-price limits on the Federal Income Chart, shown on this application.

5. Should I fill out an application if I got a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free or reducedrice meals? Please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at [983-3498] if you have ques-

6. I get WIC. Can my child(ren) get free meals? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Please fill out an application.

7. Will the information I

give be checked? Yes, we may ask you to send written proof.

8. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year if your household size goes up, income goes down, or if you start getting Food Stamps, TANF or other benefits. If you lost your job, your children may be able to get free or reduced-price meals.

12. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally get. For example, if you normally get \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only got \$900, put down that you get \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but not if you get it only sometimes.

13. We are in the military, do we include our housing allowance as income? If your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. All other allowances must be included in your gross

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FSA optimistic about quail populations

Bobwhite quail enthusiasts in Texas may no longer wonder where all the quail have gone, thanks to the efforts of USDA's Farm Service Agency and its many partners.

All species seem to have their dedicated devotees, but no game species seems to provoke more enthusiasm than Bobwhite quail.

Northern Bobwhite quail are a native species with a historic range in the Midwest and Southeast areas of the county. The birds are a valued inhabitant of farm landscapes, an important aspect of rural culture and are a key element to the heritage of hunting.

However, the Northern Bobwhite quail population has declined dramatically over the last quarter century. Their habitat is disappearing due to urbanization, increased grassland cultivation and a transitioning of once grassy fields into woods and forests --a process called succession.

To underline the bird's importance, the Farm Service Agency, which has the largest conservation partnership involving private land in the United States, is paying private land owners in 35 states, including Texas, to set aside land for quail habitat. The Conservation Reserve Program's Northern Bobwhite Quail Habitat Initiative introduced a conservation practice intended to create 250,000 acres of early successional grass buffers along agricultural field borders.

To date, more than 48,000 acres have been enrolled nationwide. The Farm Service Agency estimates this nesting and broodrearing cover will increase Bobwhite quail numbers by threequarters of a million birds annu-

ally. Planted buffers will also benefit reptiles, amphibians, aquatic species and upland birds, many of which are being considered for listing as endangered species. In addition, the initiative will reduce soil erosion and protect water quality by trapping field sediments and nutrients.

The quail population in each of the "select" states has been studied; and organized efforts by wildlife groups and sporting organizations are underway to boost quail populations. Study results all point to one thing - the need for more wildlife habitat.

If there is one thing quail lovers agree on, it's that FSA's Conservation Reserve Program has provided the necessary fund for farmers and landowners to create habitat for these desirable upland birds.

USDA estimates that through the northern Bobwhite Quail Habitat Initiative, CRP will provide \$125 million in payments to participants through 2007, when the overall statutory enrollment limit is expected to be reached.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and 32 state fish and wildlife agencies are providing technical, monitoring and evalu-

With only a handful of days gone by, the month of August is turning out to be a busy one for the staff and officers of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

This month's activities include scheduled meetings with Randy Congressman Neugebauer, the Texas Farm Service Agency and the USDA Risk Management Agency.

Topics of discussion with Congressman Neugebauer will include the ongoing FY06 Budget reconciliation process, potential impact of the DR-CAFTA trade bill and the recently passed Energy Bill.

Texas FSA Executive Director John Fuston will meet with PCG and representatives from other Texas commodity groups at the PCG office on August 19 to discuss a number of issues facing the agency in Texas in the

On August 23, the PCG Executive Committee will be meeting with the USDA Risk Management Agency to discuss a recently completed study of cotton skip-row provisions.

The PCG/RMA meeting will provide PCG an opportunity to gain a better understanding of what the RMA study found in regard to current skip-row provisions and help create a foundation upon which PCG can work with the agency as it determines what, if any, changes may be warranted in the future.

Also on PCG's August calendar are this week's American Cotton Producers meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, a joint Cotton Incorporated/Cotton Board meeting in Dallas, the National Cotton Council's Midyear Board of Directors meeting in San Diego, California, and a texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Trapping Committee

In addition to the meetings, PCG will also be hosting a group of Agricultural Legislative Assistants from Washington, DC, who are participating in the Summer Cotton Industry Congressional Orientation program's western tour. The National Cotton Council coordinates the program with support from Monsanto Corporation through its' grant to the Cotton Foundation. NCC Congressional orientation tours are conducted each year to educate key Congressional staff about the U.S. cotton industry.

FSA sign-up deadlines an-

Several important farm program deadlines are approaching and the Texas Farm Service Agency wants all growers to be sure that they do not miss out on any opportunities.

The most time-sensitive deadline on the horizon is August 15, which is the last day to return nomination forms for this year's Farm Service Agency County Committee elections.

FSA County Committee elections will be conducted between November 4, when ballots will be mailed to eligible voters, and December 5, the last day to return voted and signed ballots to the local FSA office. Newly elected County Committee members and alternates will take office January 1, 2006.

Producers should be aware that the final day to sign-up for the 2003-2004 Crop Disaster Program (CDP) has been set for September 9, 2005. The CDP sign-up window opened on March 14, 2005. Growers who think they may qualify for benefits through either the production or quality loss provisions of the CDP program are encouraged to contact their local FSA office before the September 9 deadline.

who has not completed their application for the 2005 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) have until September 30 to get their applications in to the local FSA office. A late fee of \$100 will be charged for all late filed DCP applications.

The last deadline that FSA wants to remind growers about is September 2, 2005 and involves the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). Growers with CRP contracts that expire on September 30, 2005 may be eligible for a one-year extension of that contract. To inquire about these extensions growers should contact their county Farm Service Agency Service Center before September 2, which will be the last day to request an extension. High Plains crop looking good; August/September Tour and Field Day dates

With cotton crops blooming and looking good, irrigation and field activities are in full swing on the Texas High Plains.

Beneficial rain showers August 4 brought anywhere from a few tenths to more than 1.5 inches of much needed moisture to a broad area of the High Plains including parts of Crosby, Dickens, Lubbock, Lynn, Dawson, Gaines and Yoakum

This area, is in large part the region that missed out on the last round of rain showers that visited the region the last week of

With the weekend forecast showing continued rain chances for much of the area, crop prospects continue to be favorable and keeps the region on track to produce what could well be the second largest crop ever, assuming it does not meet last year's production total

Next week's USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) August Crop Production Report, scheduled to be released August 12, will confirm what many observers think they are seeing in High Plains fields so far. The NASS report will be the first 2005 production estimate based on a coordinated sampling and estimation process.

Even though producers are busy with the daily routine of cultivating, spraying and watering, the August 12 NASS estimate will spur many growers to think ahead to the end of the season and what they need to be aware of as they prepare for har-

To satisfy their curiosity and provide a timely bit of advice regarding late season crop management and termination, the Texas Cooperative Extension (TCE) service has begun scheduling a series of production workshops, crop conferences and crop tours in counties across the High Plains

In addition to the TCE events, two of the regions's seed companies have already set the dates for their 2005 Field Day events. It will be through these events that they will introduce producers to what could be a bumper crop of new cotton varieties for the 2006 growing season. The big draw for producers this year at virtually every seed company event will be the opportunity to take a close look at some of the new RoundupReady Flex cotton

2004 Average Price Received Calculation on track to create maximum 2004 CCP payment

Based on USDA figures the 2004 Upland Cotton Weighted

Average Price calculated through June 2005 stands at 42.69 cents per pound. With only the July marketing figures yet to be reported, the 2004 Counter-cyclical payment rate will most likely be the maximum 13.73 cents allowed bay current program rules.

The 2004 Counter cyclical payment rate authorized under the 2002 Farm Bill will be based on the 12 month Weighted Average Price Received by growers. For cotton, the 12 month Weighted Average Price will reflect price and marketings for the 2004 marketing year. The 2004 cotton marketing year began on August 1, 2004 and ended July 31, 2005.

The following table shows the average price received each month by farmers and the calculated weighted average price based on estimated cumulative marketings and prices reported by the National Ag Statistics Service through June 2005.

Field Days offered to area producers

Hale County Corn and Cotton Field Day Aug. 12

Farmers and others interested in crop production on the Texas South Plains can get a close-up look at corn ensilage and cotton variety demonstrations by attending the Aug. 12 Hale County Corn and Cotton Field Day.


