Cotton harvest getting good grades

The Floyd County 2005 cotton and milo harvest is getting off to a good start, according to local producers, ginners and Floyd County Extension Agent J.D. Ragland.

Ragland told the Hesperian-Beacon, "The cotton harvest so far looks as good as last year's, but we can't say yet that it is better than last year's harvest. Dry land yields this year are running between 200 to 500 pounds per acre, while the irrigated is averaging between 700 to 900 pounds per acre."

"Floyd County lost around 70,000 acres of cotton to the early hail storms this past summer, leaving about 120,000 acres of cotton to be harvested this year," said Ragland.

The Floyd County milo harvest is about 60 percent complete with dryland producing between 1,000 to 2,500 pounds per acre, while irrigated milo is averaging between 4,000 to 6,000 pounds per acre, according to Ragland.

"Our pumpkin harvest is nearly ended, but the yields this year were better than average, coming in at around 25,000 to 30,000 pounds per acre," said Ragland.

Shawnda Foster, co-owner of D & J Gin of Lockney, told the Hesperian-Beacon, "We already have ginned over 5,000 bales and the quality, yields and grades are all better than last year's."

Lockney Coop Gin has already ginned 4,400 bales. "The yields and quality are good and

the average selling price is around the \$.50 cents range," said manager Tom Byars.

Floydada Coop Gin has ginned 2,300 bales, according to Gin Manager Todd Cypert. "We just started our night shift last night. The quality of the cotton is great. It is turning out good and the grade is good," said Cypert.

Producer Jon Jones, near Dougherty, said, "We just started harvesting 200 acres of dryland cotton last week. The quality is good and it is yielding around 500 pounds per acre and selling for \$.5047 cents per pound, compared to \$.46 cents last year."

Office manager Denise

Pernell of Darty Gin said, "We have ginned 1,356 bales so far and we are ginning 24/7. We need more dry weather. The grade and quality is real good."

Producer Don Marble of South Plains told the Hesperian-Beacon, "Marble Gin of Lockney has already ginned about 1,500 bales. The quality is good, but our crop this year is probably not as good as last year because of the good rains we received last year. However, we had one 34 acre plot that produced three bales per acre already this year."

Scott Gin has already ginned around 1,500 bales and the quality is "excellent," according to Office Manager Stacie Woelfel.

Floyd County produced 262,621 bales of cotton in 2004 and finished ginning in April of 2005.

FISD Band makes history with UIL win

Pit Bulls running loose create problems

Within a 15 minute time frame, Floydada Police had to deal with two different Pit Bull incidents Monday, October 24. The first involved an 8 year old boy and the second involved an attack on a Floydada Police Officer.

According to Police Chief Darrell Gooch at approximately 6:00 p.m. an officer was out of his car on W. Jeffie looking for an individual. The Pit Bull walked up near the officer.

"The dog had broken his leash and was loose," said Gooch. "He showed no aggression at first. He was just wandering around, but when the officer turned his back and started to walk away the dog

came up behind him and got aggressive. The officer turned around and had to shoot the dog in the head."

Within 15 minutes police received a call to go to East Lee in reference to an 8 year old boy being bitten and scratched by a Pit Bull.

"The dog was only about 6 months old," said Gooch. "It was not aggressive towards us. I was able to pick it up."

"The child had several puncture wounds and scratch marks and was taken to the hospital in a private vehicle."

According to Gooch the puppy is currently under observation. The owners of both dogs are not known.

"Past Dues" have only 60 days with City

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, October 18, and unanimously adopted a new policy concerning past due accounts over 60 days for City utility customers.

City Secretary Karen Lawson told the council, "Now we are waiting 120 days before turning a past due account over to the collection agency. The collection agency gets 30 percent of the amount collected. I recommend we change the 120 days to 90 days."

Once the past due account is turned over to the collection agency, someone with a past due utility bill here in Floydada cannot move to another surrounding city and hook up utilities without paying Floydada's past due

bill first, according to Lawson.

Council member Clar Schacht made the motion to turn over past due accounts to the collection agency after only 60 days and it was unanimously passed.

Citizen Billy Shipley addressed the council and told how several of his trees at his home at 912 W. Lee were dying. He said he was convinced it was due to the nearby spraying of 2-4-D.

Mayor Gilliland said, "I believe we have addressed this before."

Council member Schacht said, "Most cities, I think, prohibit the spraying of 2-4-D from April 1st to November 1st. I suggest we table this until we see if we already have an ordinance about this."

Floydada Economic Development Corporation Executive Director Dora Ross addressed the council concerning the need to investigate a request by Blue Moon Solutions to bring wireless network technology (WIFI) to Floydada.

The item was tabled to investigate costs and grant possibilities.

Three of the highest bids for City surplus vehicles were approved by the council. They were: a bid of \$400 by Lionel Garza to purchase a 1999 Ford Crown Victoria; a bid of \$816 by Robert Cozby to purchase a 1993 Ford 1/2 ton pickup; and a bid of \$151 by Juan DoOchoa to purchase a shop-made trailer.

The council awarded First

National Bank of Floydada to be the City's depository service for the next 5 years, through September 30, 2010.

Several appointments to City boards were approved and extended two more years by the council. They were: Airport Board - Bill Harbin, Warren Mitchell and Kendis Julian. Planning & Zoning Board and Board of Adjustment - Glenda Wilson, Kyle Smith and Mike Muniz. Floyd County Central Appraisal District Board - Sam Green. Housing Authority Board - Jimmy Cervantes and Elaine Austin (resident). Floydada Economic Development Corporation Board - Melvin Lloyd, Charles Tyer, Scott Graham and J.D. Ragland.

Floydada school enrollment is down

Enrollment in Floydada ISD has dropped to a total of 974--down by 61 students from last year.

Duncan Elementary campus decreased 15 students to a total of 2265. The largest class is the First grade with a total of 78 children.

Andrews Elementary decreased 29 students--down to 192 students. The largest class is Fifth grade with 72 students.

In Junior High the largest class is eighth grade with 74 students. The total enrollment at Junior High is 206--down by 16.

High School enrollment is 281--down by 6 students. The

largest class is Tenth grade at 78 students.

The campus as a whole has an ethnic ratio of 70% Hispanic, 26% Anglo and 4% Black.

Duncan Elementary School is 74% Hispanic, 19% Anglo, and 7% Black.

Andrews Elementary is 72% Hispanic, 24% Anglo, and 3% Black.

Junior High is 68% Hispanic, 27% Anglo, and 5% Black.

High School is 65% Hispanic, 31% Anglo, and 3% Black.

LISD student enrollment drops

High School enrollment is 196--down by 14 students. The largest class is tenth grade at 69

In case you've missed it Early Voting is now in progress for the amendments and for the Special Amendment for Floyd County (check out the story in the newspaper).

Normally I don't comment on elections--especially amendments because half the time I don't understand them well enough to explain them--but I recommend voting "YES" for the Special County Amendment and "YES" for Proposition 2.

Proposition 2 refers to Same Sex Marriage. Voting "Yes" is a vote for a Texas Constitutional amendment defining marriage as between one man and one woman. Voting "No" would allow marriages (or "civil unions") between two men or two women.

Even writing about this makes me roll my eyes. Can you imagine our Founding Fathers ever in their wildest dreams thinking that someday we would have to vote on how to define "marriages".

I also believe the Special County Amendment should be a "YES" vote. I don't think we should combine the two offices of County Clerk and District Clerk. I realize we could save the salary of one elected official if we merged, but we would still have to hire at least one more person--maybe two--to take over the responsibilities. It seems like a wasted effort to me to change.

Those are my opinions for anyone who has been waiting with baited breathe on what I had to say on the subject.

You may notice a story in the paper about more problems with Pit Bulls in the City. More attacks.

I have already said that I think the owners should be banned and not the dogs. Obviously that was tongue-on-cheek because of course that can't be done.

But there is something that

can be done.

Cities are wrestling with all kinds of ideas on how to handle this problem, and my proposal will not be popular I'm sure.

I propose an ordinance that states you must have a fenced in yard for dogs in the City Limits. You can't even adopt a dog without a fenced in enclosure because tying up a dog is not considered humane.

Floyd County: Apollo Energy Operating Company LP, W.D. Miller Lease Well #1 reached total depth of 9823 feet and was logging the well Tuesday. Planning on running 5 1/2 inch production casing to total depth this week.

Floyd County: BASA Resources, Inc. has staked the location for the C. Foster et al Lease Well #1. This Well will be located 467 feet from the North line and 467 feet from the East line of the Southeast Quarter of Section 16, Block T, 3/4 mile North of FM 786 on the West side of County Road 201. This will locate this Well 2 miles Northeast of the W.D. Miller Lease, Well #1, and 6 miles Northeast of Floydada.

November 8 election contains local issue

Early voting is now in progress at the Floyd County Courthouse for the special Constitutional Amendment election.

Floyd County residents will be voting on an amendment that applies only to this County and also on the much publicized "Traditional Marriage Amendment".

At the bottom of the election ballot voters will either vote for, or against, "Keeping the office of the County Clerk of Floyd County, and the office of the District Clerk, of Floyd County, as two separate offices."

The amendment had to be included in this election after the State Legislature mandated that all counties whose population falls below 10,000 must have an election to vote on whether or not they want to combine the offices of District Clerk and County Clerk or leave them as two separate offices.

state to recognize marriages

County Judge Bill Hardin, County Clerk Marilyn Holcomb and District Clerk Barbara Edwards were all in agreement that the offices should stay separated.

The elected official all stated that they believed combining the offices would not save the County any money. "We will still need the same amount of people to run the offices and it would also prove to be an inconvenience," said Hardin.

Also included on the ballot will be Amendment #2 which "provides that marriage in this state consists only of the union of one man and one woman and prohibits this state or a political subdivision of this state from creating or recognizing any legal status identical or similar to marriage."

A vote "for" is in favor of the traditional view of marriage. A vote "against" would allow the other than marriages between one man and one woman.


DAR holds meeting


istration fee is \$16.00 and that includes supplies, lunch and snack.

Lockney Longhorns tame Olton Mustangs 34 - 14

The Lockney Longhorns traveled to Olton last Friday in a battle of 1-1 teams fighting for the playoffs. The Horns improved to 2-1 with a convincing 34-14 win over the Mustangs. The Longhorns used a balanced offensive attack as they ran for 289 yards and passed for 163 yards. The 452 yard total is the most yards gained by the Horns in 2005. Lockney had nine possessions and scored touchdowns on five of them: 1-TD, 2-TD, 3-TD, 4-Halftime, 5-INT, 6-TD, 7-TD, 8-punt, 9-punt. Olton also had nine possessions: 1-TD, 2-downs, 3-punt, 4-downs, 5-punt, 6-fumble, 7-downs, 8-TD, 9-fumble.

The Horns first touchdown drive included receptions by J.W. McPherson (32 yards) and Brandon Hall (19 yards). Wes Davis had back-to-back seven yard runs. The drive was concluded by Brandon Hall's eight yard run that gave the Horns an early 7-0 lead with 4:39 left in the first quarter.

Olton answered the touchdown with a tough 21 play drive that ended with a reverse. It caught the Horns off guard tying the game at seven with 9:58 to go before halftime. That was the last meaningful possession for the Mustangs as the Horns reeled off 27 unanswered points.

Lockney's second touchdown came on 3rd and 15 from midfield. Quarterback Blaine Hall found Adrian Luna all alone downfield. Luna walked into the endzone with a 48 yard touchdown reception. Lockney was up 14-7 with 6:15 remaining in the half.

Olton completed a 47 yard pass on their next snap, but they were quickly stopped on downs soon after. Lockney took advantage of an aggressive Olton defense as Blaine Hall connected with Dahlen McCarter on consecutive third downs. The second reception came on 3rd and 9 from the +22 yard line as Hall completed his second touchdown strike of the evening. The Horns were now up 21-7 with 2:03 left in the 2nd quarter.

The frustrated Mustangs could not accumulate any yards on their next possession. Lockney took the ball back with under a minute left, but they could not convert before halftime. A last second

pass into the endzone fell incomplete.

The second half opened up with Olton being forced to punt. Lockney's Blaine Hall was intercepted on a tipped pass on the Horn's first possession of the half. Olton took the ball with their first opportunity with field position in their favor. On 2nd and 16, Olton attempted the same reverse play that scored a touchdown earlier. This time, Jonathan Silva sniffed it out and came up with a tackle for an 11 yard loss on the Olton ballcarrier.

After the Olton punt, Wes Davis carried the ball four times for 64 yards and a touchdown to increase the Lockney lead to 28-7 to start the fourth quarter. On the following kickoff, Olton fumbled and sophomore Bryan Cooper recovered. The Horns started the final touchdown drive of the night on Olton's thirty yard line. Davis plunged ahead for a 27 yard gain and Adrian Luna punched it in from three yards out to close all Lockney scoring. It was 34-7 with 10:34 to go in the game.

Olton and Lockney traded punts on the next two possessions of the game. However, the Mustangs wanted to reach the endzone one more time before the game ended. Olton running back Tracy Deberry scored from seven yards out with 4:01 remaining.

Lockney attempted to run out the remainder of the clock, but a punt was forced with less than a minute to go. Olton attempted several passes trying to move the ball down the field. But, Bryan Cooper ended the game with a quarterback sack and a caused fumble on the last play.

The Longhorns (4-4 & 2-1) will travel to Dimmitt Friday for a clash with the Bobcats. Tulia defeated Dimmitt 45-7. Tulia is 5-3 on the season and 2-1 in District. Dimmitt is 0-8 on the season and 0-3 in District. Friona defeated Floydada 31-14 bringing their record to 6-2 & 3-0 and dropping Floydada to 2-6 & 1-2.

Lockney Shorthorns have battled injuries more than battling opponents this year.



Explosion of Cotton Rats cause concern

CANYON--The Texas Panhandle and South Plains needed a pied piper this summer to deal with a population explosion of cotton rats.

The cotton rat, properly known as the hispid cotton rat, hasn't been seen in these numbers since the 1950s' Texas Cooperative Extension specialists said. And while the rat has little or nothing to do with cotton, it can damage melons, pumpkins and gourds.

Alarm was raised this year when the normally range-habitat rat started showing up in towns, getting the attention of homeowners, said Ken Cearley, Extension wildlife specialist in Canyon.

Rick Gilliland, Extension/Texas Wildlife Services district supervisor, received as many as 30 to 40 calls, averaging three to four a day for a couple of weeks. Gilliland is responsible for 61 counties in the Panhandle and South Plains.

A pumpkin producer in Yoakum County reported up to 60 percent of his pumpkins were damaged by the rats gnawing on them. One homeowner reported trapping 10 in her home.

After the first call from Parmer County came in, Gilliland said he began researching the cotton rat and found this rodent species is subject to violent fluctuations in numbers.

The last outbreak in Texas occurred in 1958, when millions of these rodents seemed to appear

from nowhere and caused serious losses to farm crops, particularly peas, peanuts, watermelons and cauliflower, according to "The Mammals of Texas - Online Edition."

As in 1958, this year's population peak was preceded by bountiful rains, which resulted in an abundance of grass and suitable habitat, Gilliland said.

No toxicants are registered for control of the rodent, he said, so the recommendation is to try traps in home areas and to mow all grassy or vegetative areas extremely short to decrease their protective habitat.

"The more you make the country less desirable to them, the more control you will have," Cearley said. That includes making sure field borders are kept mowed.

"Even if we had a grain bait, it's not likely it would be very effective," Gilliland said. "These rats, for the most part, are vegetative eaters. They can do a lot of damage to gardens and crops."

While most people assume a rat is a rat and are concerned their homes and barns will be invaded, that's not the typical behavior of the cotton rat, he said.

The rats may find their way into garages and other structures, but typically they are range dwellers. Also, there are more showing up dead in yards because cats find them easy prey in such high numbers, Gilliland said.

The prolific rodent can give birth to as many as nine litters a year, with two to 10 young per litter, according to The Mammals of Texas.

Females breed as soon as 10 hours after having a litter, and the gestation period is approximately 27 days. Females begin breeding when they are only 40 days old, the online report states.

Their life cycle is about a year, Gilliland said. Already a high mortality is being seen.

"We were finding when people were seeing the dead rats, it was because they were reaching the end of their mortality and not that there was a disease among them," Gilliland said. "Nature takes care of its own population peaks and explosions."

Reports of high raptor numbers, hawks and owls, in the region where these rats are easy prey are also coming in, he said.

Being a true rodent, the rats are susceptible to plague and tularemia, and have been linked to hantavirus. But Karen McDonald, public health technician in Lubbock, and Kathy Parker, public health technician in Midland, have helped conduct tests on dead rats in a die-off and did not find a disease agent to be the cause.

"This thing exploded rather quickly and we didn't know how broad and wide it would be," Gilliland said. "It has been a fire drill for us."

Cearley said producers should be aware that a similar increase in some predators--coyotes, skunks, raccoons, badgers, and foxes - can be expected due to a generous food supply of cotton rats and other rodents that have proliferated this summer.
