## Reese Civilian Employees Awarded Pins For Lengthy Federal Service

Ten-year pins were presented by immediate supervisors to Johnnie Oats, motor vehicle operations; Miss Mary Graham, wing comptroller; Mrs. Jo W. Stoneham, Form 5 section; Homer L. McKee, Fidelis J. Fetsch and William Karon, M&S Group; and Virgle W. Gatlin, Civil Engineers.

The employees became eligible for the service pins during the current quarter.

## Base Hosting RCAF Pilots

Reese early next week will be host to 11 members of Royal Canadian Air Force who are assigned to pilot training duty. The visitors will study basic pilot training here to become better acquainted with methods and procedures.

The Canadian delegation will be headed by Wing Commander Eud Lawrence of the Portage la Prairie Air Station. Accompanying him will be five instructor pilots from Portage and five from Gimli Air Station.

The visitors all are RCAF instructors in T-33 jet aircraft in basic pilot training. The T-33 also is used as basic trainer at Reese.

The Canadians will arrive Monday and remain until Thursday, attending briefing of students and instructors, visiting the Pilot Training Group and two pilot training squadrons, as well as the military training section and academic section.

Each will have a Reese instructor pilot as companion during the visit and each will be able to spend as much time as desired in any particular phase of pilot training he desires. Progress of students and records kept will be of major importance to the visitors.

Project officer here is Flight Lt. Harold Hart, RCAF instructor pilot who is assigned here on an international exchange basis.

## Contest Deadline Set For April 8

Reese people were cautioned this week that the time is short for entering the annual base level photography contest. The entry deadline is April 8, with the judging and exhibit the following night at Mathis Service Club.

Military and civilian personnel may enter the contest and win trophies. Winning entries will be sent to Air Training Command to compete for cash prizes.

The contest is divided into black and white photos and color transparencies. Divisions are portrait, animals and pets, sports action, scenic and experimental. All photographs should have been taken within the past year.

The exhibit is scheduled from 7 to 9 p.m. on April 9 in the service club. Entry blanks and copies of rules are available at the club.

## Reese Given New Honor

Contributions and leadership given the Lubbock Community Fund throughout the years will be recognized Sunday night by the Southwest Regional Conference of United Community Fund and Councils of America.

Colonel James A. Gunn III, wing commander, will be awarded a specially designed certificate by the Southwest Region "for the outstanding leadership and financial contributions made to the United Fund by Reese AFB."

Officiating at the ceremony will be the Hon. Fred Korth, secretary of the Navy, and Hon. William Fulbright, U. S. Senator from Arkansas.

Presentation will be at the awards dinner of the Conference in the ballroom of the Hotel Marion in Little Rock.

Reese throughout the years has surpassed its goals and quotas in United Fund drives held in Lubbock. In 1961 the base was a "pilot organization" in the Lubbock campaign, holding its campaign prior to the one held in the city. Reese recorded 96 per cent participation by its personnel and 136 per cent of the goal set by the Lubbock United Fund.

Each year for several years, a majority of Reese units have received Outstanding Citizenship

awards for reaching 90 per cent participation or better. In 1961, seven of the ten units at Reese reached 100 per cent participation.

Last year the base and eight individual units were presented

Outstanding Citizenship Awards for 90 per cent or better participation and 75 per cent or more of a fair share of one day's pay per month. Reese had 107 per cent of its goal and 94 per cent participation.

## Air Force Suggests Dental Care Aid For Dependents

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—Maj. Gen. Maurice C. Harlan, Air Force assistant surgeon general for dental services, has announced that the Air Force has developed a dependents' dental care program and proposed to the Department of Defense its adoption by the military services.

The proposed program, which would require legislative approval from Congress, would permit substantial government contribution toward the cost of dental care obtained from civilian sources by dependents of military personnel.

The Air Force said that adoption of the program would be a tremendous career incentive, in the same way that the Dependents' Medical Care Program has improved career and retention problems.

The Air Force proposal has been presented to the Department of Defense by the Secretary of the Air Force and is now awaiting further DOD action.

## Club Contract OK'd By ATC

The low bid of the Turner Construction Company of Lubbock for renovation of the Reese Officers' Club has been approved by Air Training Command and a contract will be awarded soon.

The contract will provide completion of work within 120 days after notification to start. The Lubbock firm will re-work the present dining area to erect a suspended roof and eliminate present posts. The arched roof will be laminated and the outside walls of the dining area are to be brick.

The kitchen and serving area will be remodeled, with the service area re-located, and new equipment will be added. The package store also is to be re-located.

Outside walls on the swimming pool side will be redwood and glass of modern design.

Work on remodeling of the base exchange area also will be started soon, with a 100-day completion period allowed. The Brown Showcase Company of Lubbock was low bidder on the project, which includes renovation of the annex to turn it into the BX cafeteria and remodeling of the present BX-cafeteria area to construct one large sales room. The cafeteria will be operated with virtually all new equipment, while the enlarged sales room also will have new equipment.

### PROCESS TOLD

## Reese Holds Lead In Competition For ATC Award

Reese holds a substantial lead in the Air Training Command competition for the Commander's Trophy, Col. James A. Gunn III, wing commander, was advised Thursday.

Reese had 1,175 points as of Monday, while Lackland AFB in second place had 1,040 and Lowry AFB 1,020. No other of the 19 competing bases topped 1,000 points.

Points in the program are accumulated through a variety of activities, including entering teams in events and winning. Competition includes squadron and base level competition in basketball, volleyball and other sports, and base competition in boxing, judo, library publicity, handball, table tennis and various service club activities.

## Panel Trucks Added

The panels, of the Ford Econoline, are 1963 models. One is being used by the motor pool as a base taxi, one has gone to the Civil Engineering Group and two are being used by the Maintenance and Supply Group.

Request has been made for other new vehicles for Reese.

## Pilot Graduate, Highest In Class, Awarded Trophy

Second Lt. Roger L. Cranmer, graduate of Kansas State University, was awarded the Commander's Trophy as outstanding member of Class 63-F during graduation exercises Wednesday morning in the base theater.

The lieutenant, from Wellington, Kan., was presented the award by Col. Joseph E. Payne, commander of the Reese Maintenance and Supply Group. He ranked highest of the 40 graduates in all phases of the Undergraduate Pilot Training program. Six graduates are members of the German Air Force.

Graduation speaker was Mayor Jack Strong of Lubbock, captain in the Army Corps of Engineers during World War II. Colonel Payne introduced him.

Mayor Strong challenged the new pilots to become leaders in the Air Force and in all communities to which they may be assigned. He asked that they give major attention to molding youth of the nation into good citizens, citing that youth admires men in uniform and will follow their example.

"Wear the uniform proudly," the mayor said. "You are our first line of defense. The uniform is set apart and all eyes are on you young pilots. Represent the Air Force and the United States well."

He also urged each young pilot to grow as an officer and good citizen, provide outstanding leadership, and serve as models for all persons to follow "for you are in the spotlight."

He asked that each young pilot search himself to find his own personality, which should include a happy disposition, ambitious traits, proper social adjustment, understanding, balance, ability to solve problems and ability to live in the present.

Mayor Strong praised personnel of Reese for contributions to Lubbock community activities in churches, civic clubs, in United Fund and other community drives and in numerous other affairs.

Reese writers are being urged to work on stories immediately in order to make necessary revisions and re-writes prior to the deadline.

"Remember — May 6," said Mrs. Fuller.

## Air Force Cited For Libyan Assist

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The State Department praised the Air Force for its role in the recent rescue and rehabilitation work following a severe earthquake that struck the city of Barce in Libya.

After the quake had leveled the North African community of 13,000 during what was described as "Libya's worst major disaster," the Libyan government requested that Wheelus AB provide major assistance.

As a result, several C-54, C-47 and C-130 aircraft airlifted emergency supplies, including a 36-bed USAF field hospital, and personnel to assist in alleviating the suffering in the distressed area.

**Commander's Comments . . .**

The Armed Forces have, for the past number of years, waged an unrelenting campaign to recruit and retain only the most desirable individuals. As part of this program, the Air Force has relied heavily upon quality control in recruiting, resulting in over 85 percent of new airmen being at least high school graduates.

Experience and demands of both the present and future prove that each branch of the service can function well with only the best, most professional people. Quality recruitment helps achieve this. Also, a healthy side effect of quality recruitment is a correspondingly lowered AWOL and offense rate.

Reese, for example, rates very favorably with other ATC bases in those categories. In fact, according to the latest ATC composite report, our standing in many areas is among the highest.

Good people cause good records, to be sure. But supervisory personnel play a most important role, also, since it is they who furnish example and leadership to subordinates. Our success is due in large measure to their efforts.

There are two areas in this composite report which should cause us some concern, though; and these are our Government vehicle and privately owned vehicle accident rates. We have suffered some setbacks in these categories recently, experiencing more than our fair share of accidents. Not only does this give us an undesirable rate, but it can lead to pain, injury, and even tragedy and heart-break.

Our vehicle accidents, in general, have been minor. But they serve as a reminder that safety is everybody's job all the time. With the top notch people we have here, I'm sure our added efforts will result in a vehicle safety record second to none.

Lubbock people generally have considered Reese as a part of the community, and cooperation in activities is given. On the other hand, people at Reese always have worked with the community in worthwhile projects, giving generously to welfare campaigns and contributing time and effort in many areas.

**Former FTAF Head Received Award**

Lieutenant Gen. G. P. Disosway, former commander of Flying Training Air Force and a visitor to Reese many times, has been awarded his third Legion of Merit. He presently is deputy chief of staff for programs and requirements in USAF headquarters.

The general was cited for "exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service to the United States as vice commander, Tactical Air Command, from July 1, 1961, to Oct. 31, 1962."

He was commander of FTAF, of which Reese was a station, when the command was inactivated in 1954.

**Bobsled Team Wins Berth In Olympics**

LAKE PLACID, N. Y. (AFNS) — A two-man Air Force team placed second in the North American bobsled championships and won a berth on the United States Olympic squad.

The team of A1C Gerry Sheffield and A1C Bob Hagemes finished behind world title holder Eugenio Monti of Italy. Their total time for four, one-mile heats was 4:46:22.

On the basis of competitive standings for Feb. 17 and Feb. 24, the Air Force team scored five points to qualify for the Olympics.

**AF Boxers Make Team**

TOLEDO, Ohio (AFNS) — Air Force boxers won five of the 10 positions on the United States Pan American boxing teams as the result of the AAU-Service tournament held here to select the American squad.

The Air Force gladiators, who finished second to the Army in the recent interservice championships in Washington, D.C., won their positions over other service competitors through their affiliation with the National Amateur Athletic Union. Four airmen were included among the AAU champs.

Victors in the competition between AAU titleholders and those from the Armed Services will fight in Sao Paulo, Brazil next month in the Pan American Games.

**Volleyball Team Wins Sixth Place**

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AFNS) — An All-Star Armed Forces volleyball team wound up in a sixth place tie in the National Volleyball Championships played here.

Although generally conceded to be the strongest team since 1959 when it took third place, this year's All-Stars met extremely tough competition as each of the 28 teams pointed for berths in the Pan American Games. The event served as volleyball's Pan American trials and a third place win would have assured some of the Armed Forces players a spot on the United States team.

The All-Stars chalked up impressive wins of 15-2 and 15-2 over Wichita Falls, 15-8 and 15-6 over Kansas City.

Tournament champion Hollywood then stopped the Stars 16-4 and 15-0. The military team whipped Westside Los Angeles 17-15 and 15-8 before losing to Honolulu 15-12 and 15-4. A victory over Honolulu would have given the All-Stars third place.

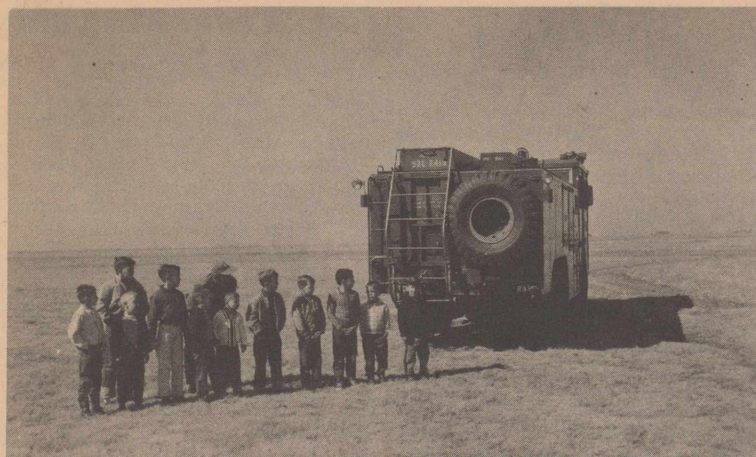
