

Mathis Wins ATC Award

Mathis Service Club has been named second place winner in the Air Training Command Service Club Scrapbook Contest for 1963. A cash prize of \$600 accompanies the award.

Mrs. Betty Jane Wright, service club director, in commenting on the award, said, "I think it's pretty nice that a base as small as Reese could do so well in a command-wide contest of this sort."

This is the third time in four years that Reese's scrapbook has placed in the contest. In 1960, a \$300 prize was won for third place; in 1962, an honorable mention brought a \$100 award.

The scrapbook is compiled as an annual record of the service club program. Pictures, news clippings, publicity posters, written descriptions of activities and itemized monthly budgets are all required by ATC regulations for inclusion in the book.

Other winners in this year's contest were: First place, Keesler AFB; third place, Stead AFB; and honorable mentions, Greenville and Randolph AFBs. Keesler received a \$1000 prize, Stead a \$300, and Greenville and Randolph each received \$100.

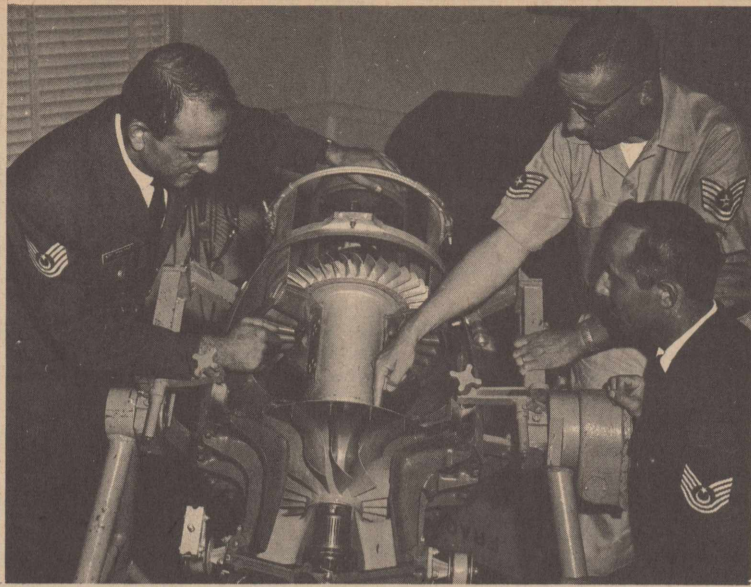

Reserve Officers To Retire At 20

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Retirement after 20 years of practically all Reserve officers serving on active duty in the grades of colonel and below was announced by the Air Force.

The Air Force said it was scrapping its Project 20-10 and adopting the concept that the maximum active duty career for Reserve officers is normally 20 years of active federal military service. Project 20-10 was instituted in 1960 as a means of reducing Reserve officer strength through retirement of certain

persons completing 20 years service, 10 of which were commissioned.

"The continued maturing of the Regular officer force in terms of service and grade, combined with existing and proposed strength and grade ceilings, make it impossible hereafter to retain any substantial number of Reserve officers on active duty beyond the 20 year point," the Air Force said.

Except in special cases, June 30, 1964, is the date set for the first such retirements.

The Air Force has stated it must set its goal for promotion to major grade at a level of 75 per cent of new eligibles if it is to subsequently move its phase points back to promotion points comparable to the other military services.

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Anniversary Story Told In 'Airman'

Commemorating the 16th anniversary of the Air Force as an autonomous service, Secretary Eugene M. Zuckert dispels the myth of the so-called "typical military man" in the September issue of The Airman magazine.

"Load 'Em, Move 'Em" tells how a group of airmen in South Viet Nam handle airlifts of everything from pigs to radar vans for friendly fighting units involved in jungle war.

In "Lucky and Levelheaded," The Airman tells the true story of Lt. Pete G. Konduros whose calmness and presence of mind combined to save his life in a crippled B-24.

Another airlift story is told in "They Call It Combat Cargo," relating how the 332d Air Division carries out its diversified air transport role supporting NATO forces.

The September issue also presents America's largest jet cargo carrier, the C-141.

"The World Is Their Classroom," concerns the far flung operations of the 3321st Field Training Squadron at its more than 100 locations around the globe.

The September Airman also

includes a report on the evolution of aircrew badges, a glimpse of the Air Force Academy grid squad and an article on an interesting set of orders dated July 6, 1779, plus the regular departments, short subjects, and anecdotes.

Announcement of exercises will be made in the Daily Bulletin and Roundup.

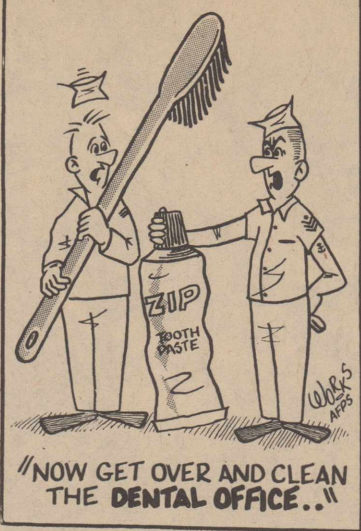
OSU Alumni Planning Family Picnic Sunday

TV Station Gives Publicity To GCA

Publicity for the Air Force Communications System activities at Reese has been given recently by KLBK-TV, Lubbock.

The station showed operation of the Ground Control Approach (GCA), using a film depicting use of radar to direct aircraft to safe landing. The GCA operator watches the plane coming in and "talks him down" by issuing instructions to the pilot who may have a low ceiling or restricted visibility in attempting to land.

The GCA controllers of the 2053 Communications Squadron here average 850 GCA landings for pilots here per year.
