In the past few years he has done research and analysis in the problems of detecting nuclear explosions in various en-

vironments and has participated in a number of studies in the area of arms limitation and control.

Since 1956 he has been associated with the Department of Defense in a variety of advisory capacities. He was a member of the Polaris Steering Committee from 1956-1958. 

Scientists Collect Space Dust Samples

WASHINGTON (AFNS) —U.S. and foreign scientists plan to collect extra-terrestrial dust particles this summer using rockets lunched into the extereme upper atmosphere by the Office of Aerospace Research's Air Force Combridge Research Laboratories.

The project is under the direction of Dr. Robert K. Soberman whose group at AFCRL designed particle-collecting nose cones for the experiments. The nose cones, designated Venus Flytraps, open up like a blossoming flower to expose four large petals. These petals contain 500 square inches of collecting surface.

As many as five Aerobe rockets will be launched from the Church-ill Research Range, Canada, during a five-week period.




