Reese's Honor Guard is continually visible in the surrounding communities during

Survey shows that different views exist

RANDOLPH AFB, Tex. (AFNS) - Results of the Air Force survey conducted last fall indicate that while specific differences between officer and airmen views exist, their overall attitudes on issues were quite similar.

These findings will be updated when analysis of the results of a similar survey conducted in May 1976 is complete. Those results should be available this fall.

In the last survey, officers indicated that training and education, retirement, and their jobs were the most favorable features of an Air Force career. Airmen listed training and education, retirement, followed by security, in response to the same question.

Unfavorable Aspect

Officers and airmen agreed that the most unfavorable aspects of service life were family separation and Air Force policies and procedures. Most officers expressed undecided or neutral feelings on the potential impact of the Defense Officer Personnel Management Act.

In response to which Air Force policy or procedure was the most irritating, officers and airmen again agreed upon excessive paperwork and inadequate utilization of abilities. Airmen also mentioned haircut standards.

Most officers were satisfied with their present assignments, along with two-thirds of the airman force.

Reenlistment

Six of seven officers reported no plans to separate within the coming year. For those who did plan to separate, reasons varied from retirement for field-grade officers, to

a better civilian opportunity for junior officers.

Responses from airmen indicated that intent to reenlist increased with grade and years of service, except for first termers. For them, plans to separate increased with grade and service.


Reese T-38 crashes; pilot killed

The first Reese aircraft accident since 1972 occurred at 12:50 a.m. Aug. 18 when 2nd Lt. Donald G. Taylor, of Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT) Class 77-01, was fatally injured in a T-38 crash three miles northwest of the base.

The aircraft was on a routine night solo training mission at the time of the accident. An investigation team headed by Col. Vernon C. Peterson from Vance AFB, Okla. has been convened to investigate the accident.

Lieutenant Taylor is survived by his wife, Paula and his parents, MSgt. and Mrs. Michael J. Taylor, USAF (Retired).

Services were held for Lieutenant Taylor Aug. 20 in the Reese Chapel. He was buried at West Point Aug. 23. Lieutenant Taylor was a 1975 graduate of West Point and he arrived at Reese Sept. 25, 1975.

The children are back in school and it is again time to review a few things about safety and our responsibilities to them.

All people who drive must be extra cautious during those times when children are enroute to or at the pickup points as it is so easy to unwittingly find yourself in the position where you cannot stop in time to avoid striking a small child. The laws concerning stopping for school buses should reduce the problem, however, when in the housing areas you simply have to be extra cautious and extra alert in order to avoid a tragedy.

Our parents have a number of special responsibilities associated with the school year. In addition to being drivers themselves, they also have the responsibility to teach their children safe traveling habits in going to and from school, so that there will be no opportunities for mishaps. This responsibility includes checking on the conduct of the children from time to time, and insuring that the children know the best way to proceed to and from their bus pickup stations.

The parents responsibility doesn't end when the child gets on the bus; even though your

children are out of sight most of the day, you are still responsible for insuring that they are good citizens at school. The school most certainly has some responsibility in this area, but the parent is the one who, through attitude and caring, can most influence a child's behaviors.

Parents of school children are also responsible for participating to the highest degree possible in the management of the school system, and for insuring that their children are receiving the education they need. Be interested in what is going on so that your children will grow up to be good citizens, and be fully prepared for the world that they must live in.

Word to Wives

Health care providers offer varied help

Medical care is one of the most significant benefits that Air Force people and their families receive through military service. Although, as a wife, you can appreciate this fact, often you may find the range of benefits to be confusing. Sometimes the rules governing such programs as CHAMPUS (Civilian Health and Medical Program for the Uniformed Services) seem as complicated as the tax laws.

Well, just as you might seek the "expert advice" of a tax consultant in filling out your Federal income tax return, there is someone you can contact to help you sort out the complexities of medical care for military dependents and retirees and their families.

Help Available

That person is the health benefits advisor (HBA), located at each Air Force medical facility. Usually, the HBA is the assistant administrator of registrar services. He can help

you obtain the maximum benefits from health-care services inside and outside the military system.

Health care outside the military is increasingly necessary. Because medical attention for dependents and retirees is on a space-available basis at military facilities, it's important to know what alternatives you have for seeking medical care at civilian facilities when military hospitals can't accommodate you.

CHAMPUS

CHAMPUS is one program to ensure your family's medical needs are met. It's a cost-sharing program, where the Government pays a significant part of your medical bills, with you paying the rest. The rules on eligibility and entitlements change from time to time, however, the piecemeal and inaccurate information on the program could cost an Air Force family needless expense.

For instance, although you may

be receiving primary care through CHAMPUS, it would probably be less expensive for both you, as a patient, and the Air Force if you had a laboratory tests done and prescriptions filled at a military hospital. You would not have to pay your share of the civilian costs for these items and the Air Force could accomplish these items at less cost than the Government's share of the costs under CHAMPUS.

Other Avenues

Other avenues of medical care also are open. A retiree may be eligible for care from the Veterans Administration, and both the retiree and his dependents may be eligible for care under the Social Security Administration's medicare program. Or they could have health-care insurance through civilian employment, or purchase supplemental health insurance to cover their share of the costs under CHAMPUS or medicare.

As you can see, a wide range of

benefits is available. The HBA, as the focal point on matters relating to all health benefit programs, can steer you in the best direction for your particular case. He can place the various programs in perspective and explain the benefits available

from Government, public and private sources.

The HBA can offer you the kind of advice that could help you receive the greatest good possible from the military health-care delivery system.

Commander's Call aids communication

Wing Commander, Col. Edward Mendel, held a civilian employee commander's call at 4 p.m., Aug. 20 at the Simler Theatre.

The special meeting was scheduled to insure that the civilian work force is kept fully informed of program policy and changes from the commander. Another objective was to promote improved relations and communication between military and civilian workers.

During the meeting, Colonel Mendel stressed communication. He stated that all channels of communication must be kept clear between civilian and military employees. Improved communication will improve performance.

The following is a summary of the topics covered at the meeting:

Pilot Production - We are presently at about one half previous pilot production with only 15 per cent less people.

Base Construction - Reese construction is slowing down considerably. Plans are still on the drawing boards for a new CBPO in 1978 and a new Transportation and CE Complex in 1981.

Equal Opportunity - All employees should have the same opportunity to perform and develop skills necessary to advancement, but there should be no favoring or giveaways to anyone who does not progress.

Suggestion Program - The civilian suggestion program at Reese is one of the few in the Air Force which is behind the military suggestion program in terms of number of suggestions and amount

of money awards collected. We need more participation and will streamline the program as necessary to get it.

Safety - 1975 was a bad year as far as traffic and recreational safety. All supervisors should think and stress safety. We are doing better.

RIF - The last reduction in force did not result in any involuntary releases. Jobs were found in other areas for all personnel who desired to remain at Reese.

Questions from audience - A question was asked pertaining to civilian-military relations on the job. Answer - There have been some areas of misunderstanding between civilian and military workers. Civilian supervisors should treat military subordinates and co-workers with respect, and be responsive to their needs in training and counseling. Civilians must assume an active role in OJT. The assigned supervisors are in charge and fully responsible for running the function, be they civilian or military.

Is there any professional course for civilian supervisors similar to the military leadership/management courses? Answer - Yes, there is a Civilian Management course of 30 hours that is scheduled for Sept. 7-17. Four OJT Supervisor courses will be offered in January 1977, beginning Jan. 10. These inform civilian and military supervisors how to handle supervisory responsibility and requirements of OJT. They should also improve supervisor-trainee relationships.

Dear Sir:

This morning I overheard an argument between a patient in the hospital and an officer in the General Therapy Clinic concerning the patient's medical records.

Apparently the patient wished to read her medical records, and the nurse was very insistent that the medical records were the property of the hospital and not to be inspected by the patient.

Now this is my question: If all the medical records are the property of Reese AFB Hospital as this nurse claimed, then why are the patients required to sign a privacy act statement releasing the information to them if, in fact, it is already hospital property?

Now as far as I am concerned, my hospitals records are my property, which I have given the hospital temporary custody of.

Listening

Dear Listener:

Your inquiry really poses two questions: That concerning access to a patient's medical records; and that concerning ownership of the records.

The ownership question is clear; they are maintained by Air Force hospitals as governmental property. The information in the records is about a specific patient, similar to the arrangement between civilian doctors and their patients. The information is about the patient, but it belongs to the physician who uses it to record the care and treatment he has rendered. Our hospitals and

physicians operate in a similar manner.

With respect to the access to the information contained in the records, the Privacy Act of 1974 makes it clear that patients are entitled to review the information in their records. Let me give you some of the words from AFR 12-35, dated April, 1976, which addresses compliance with the Privacy Act: "Requests for access by the individual received by any Air Force activity maintaining a system of records: (3) Concerning a medical record, will be disclosed to the individual to whom it pertains unless, in the judgment of a physician, access could have an adverse effect upon the individual's physical or mental health. When it has been determined that the disclosure of medical information could have an adverse effect upon the individual to whom it pertains, the information may be transmitted to a physician named by the requesting individual."

You do have the right to review the medical record, but this right is obviously one that cannot be exercised by merely walking up to the records counter. You must go the Registrar and request review, either verbally or in writing. This request must be acknowledged within 10 workdays and granted within 30 workdays according to the regulation. The provision for the delay is to allow a physician to evaluate the effect the release of the record might have on the individual. This is only exercised when appropriate.

With respect to the situation you cited, it appears that some of our hospital people may have been confused about the applicability of the Privacy Act to the medical record and about the procedures used. You can be assured that they are now well informed on the subject as a result of your inquiry. Thank you very much.

Dear Sir:

I have a complaint against the Base Veterinary Clinic because there is only one Veterinarian. I have a dog that was in a fight and I cannot get the dog seen until Monday. I was wondering why there can't be two Vets or at least someone else at the Clinic qualified to take care of dogs.

It seems kind of funny to me that we have only one person on base who can take care of dogs. Therefore if a person needs a dog taken care of right away, it would cost him more money and time to take him downtown and to me I feel that the Vet Clinic on Base should be able to help people on the base. If someone is not going to be there, then I cannot see how the Base Veterinary Clinic can help anyone.

Out of Patience

Dear Out of Patience,

While I understand your impatience and desire to use the Base Veterinary facilities, I don't think you understand the primary reason we have an Air Force Veterinary Service.

The Veterinarian's main area of responsibility is the inspection of food and food services on the base. The Commissary, Wing Dining Hall and all other base food facilities are his primary concern and this takes up a great deal of his time. Of course, this does not mean that the base veterinarian will not try to help your pet but the treatment of animals is secondary to the primary mission.

Unfortunately, Reese does not have even the services of the one Veterinarian we are authorized. Dr. Stay has departed PCS and his replacement is not due in until Monday. I am sure the new base Veterinarian will be happy to see your pet, his schedule permitting.

Saving lives has become habit for SSgt. Boshers

Saving a life is a unique and beautiful event, but SSgt. Larry Boshers has made it a habit. Between the period of July 6 and 20, he saved the lives of two individuals by using mouth to mouth resuscitation.

Sergeant Boshers, who is the NCO In Charge (NCOIC) of the Physiological Training Unit administrative section, awoke on July 6 to the muffled hollering of his next door neighbor in Wolforth. He shook himself awake and stumbled out into the front yard. In the next yard his neighbor was kneeling over his unconscious wife making a frantic effort to perform mouth to mouth resuscitation. She was having an allergic reaction to some medication. Sergeant Boshers took over

the rescue attempt and was able to bring the victim back to consciousness.


Two weeks following this ordeal, his talents were again taxed. On July 20, the Boshers family vacationed in Dallas. At about 9 p.m. Sergeant Boshers, relaxing by the poolside of his motel, noticed that about 10 children were playing in the pool area. He had a premonition that someone would get hurt because of the evident inferior swimming ability of the children.

Only a matter of minutes passed after this premonition when a young child asked him to come over to the pool and help. Several children crowded around the pool and were screaming about a man being underwater too long. He looked in

but saw nothing. Not knowing whether it was a hoax or a real emergency, Sergeant Boshers dove in and searched the dark bottom for a sign of the man. Just as he decided to give up the search, he spotted a glimmer of red and swam towards it. A man lay motionless at the bottom of the pool's 11 foot section. Boshers lifted the 180 pound man and pushed him to the surface.

The man had ceased breathing and was bleeding from the nose. Sergeant Boshers performed the arm lift-back pressure method of artificial respiration and mouth to mouth resuscitation, saving his second life in the course of two weeks.

Sergeant Boshers who teaches life saving techniques in Reese's PTU section felt that his performances were ironic, "I've taught mouth to mouth resuscitation for more than seven and one half years and never had to perform it for real, let alone twice in two weeks."

Rape: Methods of Prevention

As with diseases of the body, when dealing with societal diseases, i.e., crime, an ounce of prevention is worth at least a pound of cure.

Rape is no exception. Law enforcement officials generally agree that in a potential rape situation, certain courses of action will discourage or even prevent rape. The following suggestions have been compiled by the San Antonio Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) Public Education Committee.

Prevention of rape if walking

- Walk in groups, in lighted areas.
- Walk purposefully.
- Avoid lonely streets and lonely bus stops.

- Wear apparel which allows for running.
- Do not hitch-hike.

Hitch-hiking is extremely risky and is to be avoided, but if you must hitch

- Hitch in groups.
- Never hitch at night.
- Carefully observe the driver before accepting a ride.
- Keep your hand on the door handle.
- Embark and disembark in well-lighted, crowded areas.
- At the first indication of

suspicious behavior by the driver, ask to be let out.

If you are driving

- Above all, keep your doors and windows locked.
- Do not pick up hitch-hikers.
- Try to stay on busy, lighted streets, even if it means going out of your way to get to your destination.
- If you have a flat tire, if possible, drive on the shoulder of the road to the nearest lighted service station.

If you are at home

- Keep doors and windows locked.
- Check identification of all delivery/service men.
- At night, close all curtains and drapes.
- Never give out personal information on the phone.
- When walking from your car to

your house or apartment, have your keys out and ready.

What to do if you are actually attacked

The above mentioned precautions are not foolproof. In the event that you are actually confronted by a potential rapist, above all do not alter any evidence. Above all, do not bathe and do not change clothes. Uniformed police will meet you for your initial statement.

B-1 missile launch tests successful

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The B-1 completed the first inflight rotation of the short range attack missile rotary launcher during its 12th test mission at Edwards AFB, Calif.

During the flight, forward-looking infrared was used as part of the aircraft's navigation system. Also a series of automatic instrument landing system approaches were flown.

Top speed achieved during the flight was .72 mach, approximately 492 miles per hour. Highest altitude reached was 12,000 feet.

AAFES cannot guarantee that a particular style can be located in every size, that depends on what a given

He said that women's sizes such as junior, misses or half-sizes are no longer a problem. The central distribution system handles these sizes as a matter of routine, "Women or men who can't find their size can ask the salesclerk to request delivery of that size. Delivery usually can be accomplished in 10 to 21 days, depending upon store location," He pointed out.

General Hospelhorn cited another improvement, that of availability of extra-large sizes for men. He said the Arlington center carries an array of leisure suits, duos and sport coats for big and tall men. "Exchanges can order for speedy delivery," he emphasized. "Many larger outlets now have complete Big and Tall Men's Shops, and more are being added where the demand exists."







Soviets spend \$1 billion yearly on civil defense

In an article in the April Social and Political Affairs magazine, two U.S. congressional staff officers wrote:

"While much attention has focused on the Soviet military build-up, very little attention has been devoted to the Soviet civil defense program, a program which must be considered destabilizing if the arguments which led to the anti-ballistic missile treaty are accepted. . . .

"Predicated on the belief that nuclear war is both thinkable and survivable — even capable of producing a victor — the Soviet Union has undertaken a civil defense program which, conservatively estimated, costs the U.S.S.R. approximately \$1 billion annually in equivalent U.S. terms, or roughly \$4 for every Soviet citizen.

"The Soviet Civil Defense Ministry has a permanent organization staff of some 72,000, which can be augmented by the U.S.S.R.'s 500,000-member police force, and the civil defense program is an integral component of all Soviet national planning, from urban planning to industrial organization.

"This has led, among other things, to the dispersion of critical Soviet industries (with 80 per cent of

all new industry having been dispersed to some 1,000 new, small and medium-sized towns built during the last decade), extensive bomb-resistant construction, low-building density, and the stockpiling of a one-year food supply for population and livestock, with plans to expand the food supply further.

"Civil defense training is mandatory for all Soviet citizens. . . ."

Guam school crisis affects AF families

WASHINGTON(AFNS) - Air Force families on their way to Andersen AFB, Guam may find the dependent school situation difficult, according to Air Force personnel officials.

In a message to the field, officials said that a recent financial crisis and the severe effects of typhoon Pamela, which hit Guam, have combined to create shortages of facilities, teachers, supplies and equipment. They said families won't

be able to rely on private schools, because they are booked solid.

Department of Defense and Department of Interior officials are working with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to improve the situation for military dependents. Officials said that it is not possible to predict when the schools will achieve standards commensurate with the average mainland school district.

Hurricane flyers gain needed info

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Aerospace Rescue and Recovery hurricane hunters flew directly into the eye of Hurricane Belle to gain the vital information needed to save lives and property of east coast residents.

Flying WC-130 Hercules aircraft into the dark eye of the hurricane Aug. 8-9, the crews gathered information on position, winds, pressure, temperature and humidity for relay to weather forecasters at the National Hurricane Center in Miami.

Crews were from the 53rd Weather Reconnaissance Squadron, and the 920th Weather Reconnaissance Group, (Air Force Reserve) Keesler AFB, Miss.

Timely warnings resulting from such flights by hurricane hunters have saved countless lives and billions of dollars worth of property in past seasons as they did for this storm.

The hurricane hunters provide storm surveillance of the Atlantic, Caribbean and the Gulf of Mexico, locating and tracking tropical storms off the entire U.S. coastline from Texas to Maine. The storm watch area covers a million and a half square miles of ocean and gulf waters.



Swing shift carry mission into darkness

The 4:45 p.m. whistle ends another day of duty for Reese day shift workers. However, personnel working swing shift are already busy beginning their eight hours.


Swing shift workers carry Reese's mission of training Air Force pilots into the dark hours of night. Their

work areas are illuminated by powerful flood lights and in the distance a never ending array of different colored lights seem to beckon.




KEEPING THEM FLYING - SrA James Harrington performs one of the many inspections that are necessary to provide safe aircraft for Reese pilots.



Retirees Don't Go Home

Whether a discharged member of the Armed Forces returns home to work often depends on how green the economic pastures are near his last duty station, according to a Department of Commerce Census Bureau study.

A Census Bureau demographer researching the Nation's migration patterns found that of the almost 17 million Americans moving between states during 1965-1970, nearly 2 million (11.2 per cent) were military personnel entering, leaving, or remaining in the

Armed Forces.

The migrant leaving the Armed Forces does not invariably return to his home state, says the study. The prospects for obtaining a well-paying job and the cost associated with moving to another area are major considerations. As a result, persons leaving the Armed Forces are likely to stay in the same general region where they were last stationed. Moreover, the greatest military migration is from northeastern and north central states to southern and western states.





In the dawn of the automobile age, some wordsmith pinned the name "grease monkey" on mechanics.

He did the profession no favor. For years afterward, the phrase conjured up the image of a guy forever condemned to busting his knuckles on a rusty bolt in some dimly-lit, damp, draughty garage.

Not any more. Today a highly-skilled mechanic (make that "service technician") at an auto dealership may pull down \$20,000 a year or more. Oh, he's still plagued by frozen fittings, but more often he's monitoring an oscilloscope or some other exotic piece of diagnostic equipment.

At least one automaker and its dealers are putting service before sales. When Datsun introduced its F-10 front-wheel-drive models here recently, service training experts first made sure that mechanics were thoroughly familiar with the new engine/drive train components.

After running the vehicles for more than 5,500 miles — often on all-but-impassable roads — the experts could find but a single flaw: They recommended that one wire in the engine compartment be repositioned to guard against moisture. Mike Murray, Datsun's national technical training manager, summed it up this way: "I guess we're committed to the motto that one thousand good customers will bring ten thousand better customers."





Bike, rider need to be ready

When it comes right down to preparing for an enduro, you've got to think of two things — yourself and your bike.

If you can't physically go the route, or if you get off and hurt yourself, the best bike in the world isn't worth a hoot. On the other hand, if you're decked out in the finest protective gear available and you're in such top shape you could run the course, let alone ride it, a broken chain 10 miles out can put you in the "did not finish" column. Let's look at you.

Physical Condition

Being in shape is where it's at. Your shoulders and legs take the biggest beating, so that's where the work needs to be done. Some people swear that running builds your stamina and wind, and I'm sure it does. However, you use different muscles when you ride, and I'm convinced that the best way to get ready to ride is ride. Incidentally, the idea isn't new Carl

Cranke of International Six Day Trials fame said it first. An even more convincing factor is that one way to minimize energy drain is to learn how to ride well; there's no substitute for expertise. So get out there and ride — build your body while you learn. Now to the bike.

Bike Is Important

There are really very few secrets to building a bulletproof scott. By the same token, there are very few machines that you can take right off the dealer's floor and ride to the finish over a 100 mile course. It's got to run clean, have ample power, handle well, and stay together. Proper break in and tuning will take care of the first category, and most bikes made now have enough power to get you there and back. Handling is a matter of the components working well. Forks and shocks are designed to absorb harsh bumps, but they can only do so if they're in good order and matched to the bike. Keeping things together falls into the category of most neglected.

Before you ever throw your leg over the saddle, that bike should be in the best running order you can get it. Every nut and bolt should be checked for tightness, tolerances of moving parts compared, and worn parts replaced. If you think that this kind of stuff is a pain and that you'll just ride until you have to fix something, you'd better forget enduros and stick with the gravel pit or other less serious forms of riding.

Comfort

One thing that slips right by a lot of folks, and quite unnecessarily, is adjusting the bike to fit you. Handlebars, pegs, and levers can all be moved to a position that feels good and will not contribute to your fatigue. Take the time to figure out which position is the most comfortable over a long period of time and set the controls there. Believe me, pulling a clutch lever at the wrong angle for five hours can really tie up your left arm.

If you've done all these things you're just about ready. Next I'll tell

you how to enter an event and what to expect when you get there; then it will be up to you to experience the joy of victory or just the feeling that you did your best.




