## Poll tax repeal defeated in Newcastle box

Of the four Amendments to the State Constitution, voted on last Saturday, State wide, one was for repeal of the Poll Tax as a requirement for voting. This amendment was not only voted down in the Newcastle box, but in the county and state as well. Of the 67 votes cast here, only 19 voted for repeal and 48 against. Amendment No. 3, was also on the short end of the vote 32-20.

Amendment No. 2 on assistance payments to needy aged and individuals, was favored by a vote of 57 to 13. No. 4, to increase veterans Land Fund, carried 40-24.

The vote in the county was as follows—Poll tax repeal, 286 for, 895 against; welfare ceiling hike, 677 for, 428 against; retirement plan for Jefferson county, 371 for, 606 against; veterans land fund, 691 for, 492 against.

Unofficial returns to the Texas Election Bureau from 240 of 254 counties, 176 complete, give these totals in Saturday's constitutional amendment balloting:

1. Poll tax repeal, approval 235,849, against 301,455.
2. Welfare payments, approval 298,346, against 176,252.
3. Jefferson County pensions, approval 197,176, against 233,071.
4. Veterans' land fund, approval 225,007, against 236,026.

## TFB 30th annual convention

Almost 2000 Texas Farm Bureau members, including over 750 official voting delegates, are helping with the organization's 30th annual meeting in Fort Worth, according to Jack Atwood, president Young County Farm Bureau.

Voting delegates representing the 200 organized county Farm Bureaus in Texas are adopting policies for 1964, and approving national recommendations which will be considered in December at the AFB Federation Convention.

The Young Convention was held October 3 and approved their county policy recommendations to be considered at the State. Eight voting delegates were elected to the State Convention: Messrs. and Mrs. Louis Donnell, Eliasville; Arnold Koester, Olney; Charles Ward, Olney; Mrs. Jessie Larimore, Olney; Troy Lee Shepard, Loving; Lindsay Hawkins, Loving; Jack Atwood, Graham.

In addition to policy formulation, the TFB convention program will include the president's annual message by C. H. DeVaney, commodity and special conferences, Talk, Meet and Find activities for Farm Bureau young people, election of seven directors, addresses by outstanding guest speakers, and the final of the state-wide queen contest.

In pre convention activities the TFB board of directors met Nov. 6. At 2 p. m. the three-member resolutions committee convened to draft tentative resolutions from the hundreds of recommendations sent in.

The convention proper got under way Monday morning, Nov. 11. After an annual report by the secretary and treasurer, the annual message by the president and a recognition program honoring counties and individuals concluded the morning session.

Monday—commodity conference at 1 p. m., special conference at 2 p. m., district caucuses at 4 p. m., annual queen contest at 7 p. m.

Tuesday's activities started with breakfast at 7 a. m., after which the business session was called to order at 1:30 p. m. and continued until 5 p. m. Clayton Rand, Gulfport, Miss., publisher and columnist was speaker at the annual banquet beginning at 6:30 p. m.

Wednesday morning the business session reconvened at 9 a. m. and continued until all proposed resolutions had been disposed of.

## Artifacts presented Belknap archives

The following artifacts were made available to Fort Belknap by Judge and Mrs. Renee Allred of Bowie, at a recent meeting of the Fort Belknap Historical Society.

Three items were presented by Vice-President and Mrs. Lyndon Johnson, from Washington, D. C., through Judge Allred. (1) a gavel used by vice-president Johnson when he was Senate Majority Leader, and was the presiding officer over the Senate Armed Services Preparedness Sub-Committee meetings and hearings. He was chairman of that committee, 1950 through 1952 and 1955 through 1960. (2) one booklet on "Our Nation's Capitol," and on pages 19 thru 27 the story of the gavel appears. (3) Mrs. Lyndon Johnson secured a brick that came out of the White House in 1950. During President Harry S. Truman's administration the White House was remodeled and this particular brick came from the original White House material. The authentication plate shows the Seal of the United States of America in the center surrounded by the wording "Original White House Material, Removed in 1950."

7. Mrs. Frank R. Stewart (Troy, Ala.) two books of Cherokee County, Alabama, History.
8. Mrs. Aileen Burgess Taliferro's book, "Bowie, Texas, the Year Old Wonder of the West."
9. Four items of historical interest contributed by Mrs. Harriett Morrow, Austin, Texas.

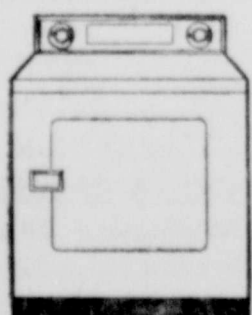

### Wheat growers can help maintain income

Mr. Lynn Jenkins, office manager, ASC, recently said that

wheat growers can use the 1964 feed grain program to help maintain income from 1964 crop wheat while continuing progress in meeting the program's objectives.

Many wheat growers also produce feed grains, the office manager pointed out. By diverting acreage under the feed grain program, such growers could receive both diversion and price support payments, thus offsetting a possible loss of income from the 1964 wheat crop (resulting from probable lower market prices because of lower price supports available under the 1964 nonquota wheat program). Producers who divert 40 percent or more of their farm's feed grain base will be eligible for the maximum rate of payment under the program.

Also, the feed grain program provision with regard to maintaining a farm's normal acreage in conserving use may be instrumental in helping hold down wheat plantings since it will mean that any planting of wheat in excess of the farm wheat allotment on a complying feed grain farm would have to be in the expense of some other soil-depleting crop.

While the 1964 feed grain program sign-up will not be held until early next year, the office manager said that the people at the ASC county office will do their best to answer any questions farmers may have about the program.
