President Murdered

Dallas, Texas. (AP)—A hidden gunman assassinated President Kennedy with a high-powered rifle Friday.

Three shots reverberated. Blood sprang from the president's face. He fell face downward in the back seat of his car. His wife clutched his head and tried to lift it crying "Oh, no!"

Harvey Lee Oswald was arrested by the Dallas police within the hour and charged with the murder of President Kennedy. Sunday morning on leaving the City jail to be transferred to the county jail, Oswald was shot and killed by one Jack Ruby, a night club operator in Dallas.

Governor John Connally, who was riding with the President, was also shot, but his wound was not fatal.

On word of the President's death, the state and nation went into mourning.

God bless our deceased President.

Final rites were held Monday in Washington, D. C. for J. F. Kennedy. He now belongs to the pages of history and eternity.

Lyndon B. Johnson took the oath of office as president of the United States in a crowded compartment of the presidential jet Friday, with Jacqueline Kennedy at his side.

J. D. Tippit, Dallas police officer slain Friday by Lee Harvey Oswald, immediately after assassination of President, was laid to rest in a Dallas Cemetery at 3:40 p.m.
