Young county's civil war dead will be remembered

The men who served the Union Army and the Confederate Army during the Civil War, and whose last resting place is Young county, will be remembered and honored during the Civil War Centennial.

A 154 page research paper has been completed by Mrs. Horace Ledbetter. The State Archives and the Fort Belknap Archives are depositories for copies of the work entitled: "Young County's Civil War Dead—Union and Confederate." Mrs. Ledbetter states, "a sincere effort was made to be as accurate and as comprehensive in the Young County work as was humanly possible. I feel that a veteran's name, a veteran's grave or some facts about a veteran has been overlooked. She further states 'if additional information is known by anyone, please let someone know.' A copy of the work is in the Young County Judge's office and a copy has been presented Mrs. J. W. Bullock for the Young County Historical Survey Committee.

Many sources were used to obtain information. Special thanks go to Mrs. Nita McPherson and L. W. Brooks for their assistance in the compilation of this work. Many hours and months go into such an undertaking as this, and this project by Mrs. Ledbetter means that Young County will be represented well in the planned 1964 State Publication.

The Register publishes below a story of a veteran from Newcastle. This will give the people of Young County an idea of what is needed and desired about each veteran.

JOSEPH ALFRED WOOLFOLK

A young lawyer, just out of Louisville Law School, Mr. J. A. Woolfolk came to Fort Belknap in 1858. He purchased land about 3 miles northwest of Fort Belknap. In 1859 he put the land into farming land.

J. A. Woolfolk enlisted in ranger service prior to the civil war. He alternated scouting the prairies for hostile Indians and practicing law before the courts. He resigned his job as County Clerk at Ft. Belknap in 1862 and joined Colonel Norris' Regiment. His Lieut. Col. was Obenchain. After 12 months of duty he was commissioned by R. M. Gano to report to Gen. John H. Morgan's men at McMinnville, Tenn. He engaged in skirmishes across the Ohio River and was captured by the Virginia Militia near Point Pleasant. He was paroled from Camp Chase, Ohio and returned to Kentucky.

An interesting story about Mr. Woolfolk is as follows: He carried a pistol from Ranger Service through the Civil War. When captured, his gun was removed from his care. Year later at a Confederate meeting in Dallas, Texas, a South Carolina civil war veteran returned to him his pistol.

After the war he practiced law in Weatherford until 1874. During the famous trial, State of Texas vs. Chiefs Satanta and Big Tree, S. W. T. Lanham prosecuted the red men and the court appointed two lawyers,

Luther Hill, 83, pioneer citizen, passes away

Aaron Luther Hill, age 83, a fifty year resident of Newcastle, passed away Friday, December 20, 1963, at 10 a.m. in the Hamilton hospital at Olney, from a heart condition. He had been in declining health for some time.

Hill was born September 10, 1880 in Oxford, Miss. He was married to Hattie Roman in 1906 at Bridgeport, and moved to Newcastle in 1913. He worked in the coal mines until they ceased to operate. He was well known over this area, and held in high esteem by his friends and acquaintances. He was a member of the Baptist Church. In his passing we lose a good citizen, and his presence in our community will be missed.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m., Dec. 22, 1963, in the Newcastle Baptist Church with Rev. Bill Cathey of Abilene, former pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Dick Williams, pastor, and Rev. H. E. Boatright, pastor of the Assembly of God.

Burial was in the Newcastle Cemetery under direction of Lunn Funeral Home of Olney.

Survivor are his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Beatrice Mahan, Newcastle; four grandchildren, 13 great grandchildren, two great great grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Irene Holland, Bridgeport; two brothers, C. W. Hill, Shawnee, Okla.; C. B. Smith of San Francisco, Calif.

Mrs. R. T. Bowen received word Christmas day that her son, Donald of Wichita Falls was operated on for appendicitis. He is now home from the hospital and doing fine.

one of which was Joseph A. Woolfolk, to defend the Indian Chiefs, at Jacksboro. The red men were found guilty as charged.

J. A. Woolfolk was born in Mead County, Ky., April 19, 1838, the son of John F. Woolfolk of Virginia, and the grandson of Joseph F. Woolfolk, a planter and slave owner, who established himself in Kentucky in the year 1801.

J. A. attended St. Mary's College near Lebanon, Ky.; University of Missouri and finished Law School in Louisville.

He first came to Fort Belknap by the Butterfield Stage from Sedalia, Missouri, in 1858. The fort was then under the command of George H. Thomas and it was a thriving place upon his arrival. J. A. Woolfolk lies buried today in the Woolfolk family cemetery, just a short distance from the place of his arrival by Stagecoach.

J. A. Woolfolk's daughter, Mollie (Mrs. R. J. Johnson) is living today in the town of Newcastle.—Barbara Neal Ledbetter, 11-1-1963.

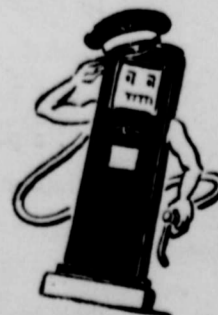

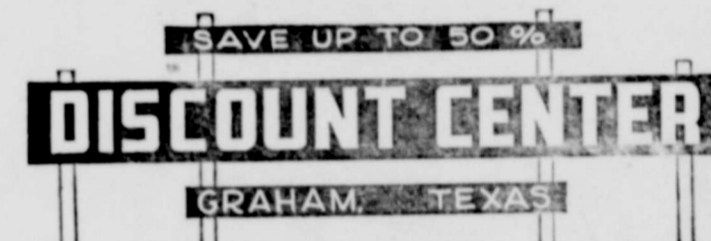

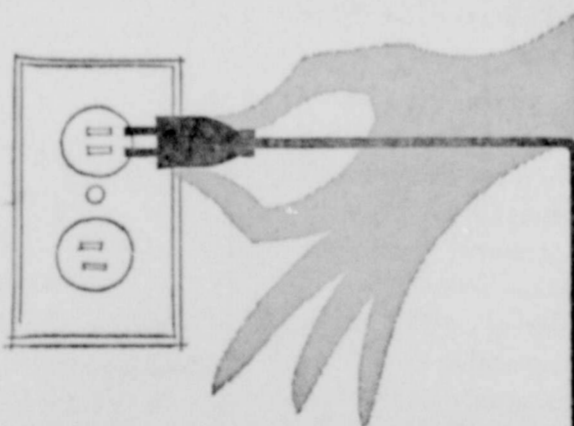
