## A FRIENDLY COMMUNITY

In the Brazos River Valley about halfway between Seymour and Newcastle lies a friendly little community with a rich heritage dating back to the turn of the century when Cotton was King.

Round Timbers is one of the oldest settlements in Baylor County but there is not much of the glamour of the old days left in this little community with a general store, a little white church and a couple of homes.

One thing that cannot be conquered though in this unusual farm community is their traditional and historic faith in God, His Christ, and His Church.

Word went out last week that services would once again be scheduled for Sunday morning in the Round Timbers Baptist Church and nearly 50 people came proudly to the little white frame building and engaged wholeheartedly in good old time gospel singing and enjoyed and participated in the 11:00 a. m. worship service.

One man stood to testify that over 30 years ago he had been converted to Christianity in the same building which is still proudly standing as a sentinel to God's faithfulness in this hour of the world's stress and tension.

## Poster and essay contests of 1964

The Young County Historical Survey Committee has adopted this year 1964, for the county observance year, in the Texas Civil or Centennial 1961 thru 1965, and are asking the different

schools of the county to consider working with this worthwhile project in the plans listed below. We are asking that each high school superintendent, and principal of the county clip the set of rules given by the THSC as a guide in the two contests, which are self explanatory

### RULES FOR THE TEXAS CIVIL WAR CENTENNIAL COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP POSTER CONTEST 1964

1. The Texas State Historical Survey Committee through its Texas Civil War Centennial Advisory Committee announces a contest for the best work on "Texas in the Civil War" depicted on a poster.

The design on the winning poster may be submitted to the proper authorities for the issuance of a special Texas Civil War Centennial commemorative postage stamp. All posters submitted will be on display in the capitol area during "Texas Civil War History Appreciation Week," April 20-26, 1964, and will be subsequently displayed over the state on appropriate occasions.

2. The prize will be a scholarship for one year's tuition at a state-supported college or university of the student's choice plus an expense paid trip to Austin for the winner and a teacher or parent during the week of April 20, 1964 to attend award ceremonies in the Governor's office. Honorable mentions will also be given. In the event the prize winner shall not wish to attend college a \$100 US Savings Bond will be awarded.

3. All contestants must be students of Texas high schools, grades 9 thru 12.

4. Each contestant must be sponsored by a teacher in his school. It is understood that the student's entry is his own work but executed under the supervision of a teacher, who vouches for the originality in a signed statement enclosed with entry.

5. A list of books, essays, pictures or other sources studied in planning and execution of the poster is to be submitted with the poster in the envelope containing the signed statement, etc.

6. A profile or outline of the map of Texas is recommended to be used somewhere in the design of the poster.

Suggestions for posters are as follows:

A. "A Typical Texas Confederate Soldier or Sailor in Artillery, Cavalry, Infantry or Navy."

B. "A Typical Texas State Trooper, Militiaman, Indian Scout, Ranger, 1861-65."

C. "A Texas Confederate Frontier Family Fort or Frontier Outpost."

D. "Texas Coastal Fortifications Gun Emplacements or Beach Patrolling, 1861-65."

E. "Texas Confederate Blockade Running."

F. "Life on the Texas Home Front, 1861-65."

G. "Texas Civil War Salt Works."

H. "Life on the Texas Confederate Cotton Road."

7. Posters may be submitted in any medium on standard poster board. Minimum, 14"x20"; maximum, 14x28.

1. On the back of the poster, on a pasted label attached firmly and taped to prevent loss, is to be listed the title of the poster and the name and address of the school from which the entry is submitted. School entries are to be numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, etc., by the sponsors as they are submitted within any school, and the assigned number of the entry is to appear beside the school name on the label and on the sealed envelope accompanying it. Packed and mailed with the poster and with the list of reading and references from which the student got his ideas is to be a sealed envelope bearing the same wording as the label. Inside the envelope must be the name, age and grade and address of the student together with the name and address of his sponsor with the originality voucher signed by the sponsor.

9. The Texas Civil War Centennial Advisory Committee is to have complete charge of the judging; decisions made by this committee will be final and all entries

become the property of the THSC.

10. Posters are to be mailed flat, and the wrapping should be postmarked no

earlier than Jan. 1, and no later than March 15, 1964. Address all entries to "Texas Civil War Poster Contest," Box 2276, Capitol Station, Austin.

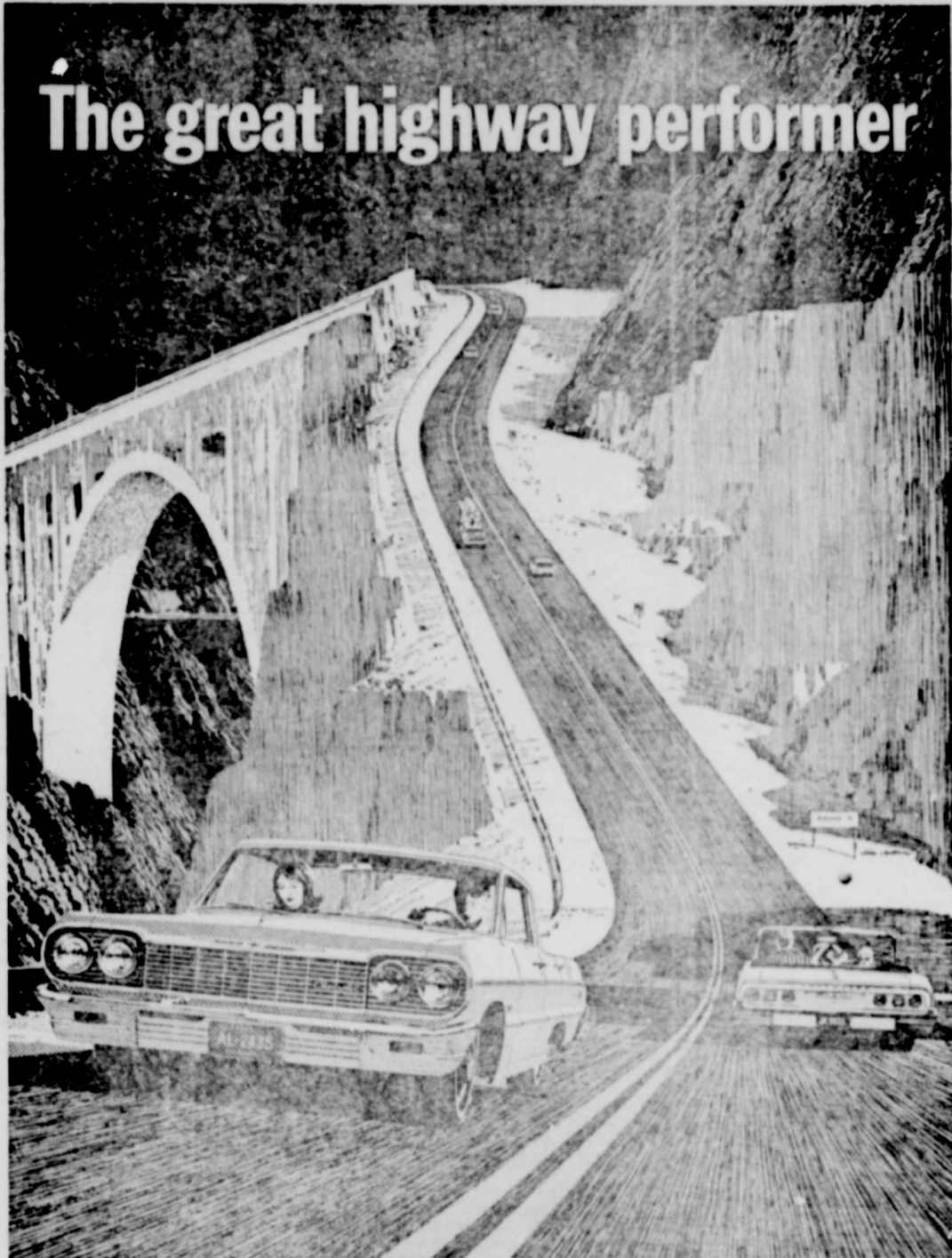

ship for one year's tuition at a state-supported college or university of the student's choice plus an expense-paid trip to Austin for the winner and a teacher or parent during the week of April 20, 1964, to attend

award ceremonies in the Governor's office. Honorable mentions will also be given. In the event the prize winner shall not wish to attend a state-supported college, a \$100 U S Savings Bond will be awarded. All essays will be bound and presented to the

state Archives.

3. All contests must be students of Texas high schools, grades 9 through 12.

4. Each contestant must be sponsored by a teacher in his school. It is understood that the student's entry is his own work but executed under the supervision of a teacher, who vouches for the originality in a signed statement enclosed with the entry.

5. The essay must be at least 500 words but not more than 2,500 words in length and be confined to Texas people, military units and events in the Civil War, insofar as your county was concerned. Some suggested are: "Young County in the Civil War", "History of Confederate Soldiers Buried in Young County", "My County's Name-sake".

6. An optional essay project is the copying and editing of a diary of memoirs of a Texas soldier, sailor or a civilian involved in the Civil War. The student who chooses copying and editing must include his own work of explaining names of people, locations of places and importance of events mentioned by the work he is editing. A number of letters written during the Civil War might also be edited, provided these letters are interconnected and significant. Such a project should not be shorter than 500 words nor longer than 2,500 words.

7. All entries must be typewritten and submitted in original with two carbon copies. A bibliography on sources must be attached.

8. In the upper left-hand corner of the first page of the essay must be typed the name of the school, together with the address. School entries are to be numbered 1, 2, 3, etc., by the

sponsors as they are submitted, and the assigned number of the entry is to appear beside the school name on the paper and on the sealed envelope accompanying the entry. In the attached, sealed envelope bearing the same school name must be the name and address and the age and the grade of the student, together with the name and address and the voucher of originality of his sponsoring teacher.

9. The Texas Civil War Centennial Advisory Committee is to have complete charge of the judging; decisions of this Committee will be final, and all entries become the property of the T.S.H.S.C.

10. Essays are to be post-marked no later than March 15, 1964, the date when the preliminary judging begins. Address all entries to "Texas Civil War Centennial Essay Contest" Box 2276, Capital Station, Austin.
