## Civil War Centennial Celebration at Fort Belknap, Saturday, June 6th

Judge Raymon Thompson was master of ceremonies and led the singing of Civil War songs, with everyone singing, accompanied by Miss Glenda Boatright on accordion, as a symbol of the old parlor organ music.

Registration began at 9:30 and program began at 10. As the parade passed in review each grouping was introduced. The PK Drillettes in beautiful costumes on well groomed horses presenting the Flags of America, the buggy carrying the crowned queen of the Fort Belknap Historical Society, Mrs. Ben G. Oneal, and her escort, Mrs. E. D. Clement, official hostess of the Mule Train.

The Tally-ho carrying the Duchess and Princes of the Queens Court, selected from pioneer families in and around Fort Belknap of the 18th century, who's descendants of the third and fourth generation live here today. Dora (Harmonson) Dent, Alice (Reynolds) Daniels, Nan (McKinney) Daws, Cathryn (Clark-Newhouse) Wright, Loretta (Griffin-Putman-Knight) Daniels, Sallie (Williams) Watson, Mollie (Woolfolk) Johnson, Mamie (Johnson) Mars, Florence (Bullock-Grubbs) Pendergrass, Lola (Terrell-Peveler) Remington Jackie (Garvey-Waters) St. John, Ruby (Walsh-Taskett) Myers, Ione (Neelley) Thompson, Mozell (Clifton) Chappell, Hattie (Proffitt) Price, Delia (Powell-Gibbs) Veal, Altha Mae (Whiteley) Thompson, Connie and Audra Wilkinson, Catherine Cusenbary, Joan Bullock, Charlene Burris, Aline (Henderson) Thompson. Other ladies of distinction on the Tally-ho were a former Texas Governor's wife, Mrs. James V. Allred, Mrs. W. B. Hamilton, and the Young County Pioneer Queen, Mrs. Adam Furr.

A large decorated float carried many others dressed in pioneer style, carrying fans and umbrellas. There are many other pioneer families not mentioned in this selection, due to the lack of time and space, but they and their descendants, fill the same place of importance in the county history.

On the platform besides those mentioned, were the Young County Civil War

Queen, Mrs. J. W. Bullock, who reigned for the day. At the song "America" the US flag was unfurled from the top of the permanent flag pole. The invocation was given by Dr. John Stephens, in charge of the Oneal Chair of History at TWC. Welcome by Judge Thompson. Response by Judge J. C. Lee. At the singing of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic," the Queens and their court were presented at the speakers stand, for the remainder of the field day events. Dr. Rupert Richardson, HSU, also an official representative of the TSHSC was in charge of the dedication of two Memorial Markers, "Camp Belknap"; and asked Dr. Kenneth F. Neighbours of MU, to dedicate the one in memory of Col. William C. Young for whom Young County is named. Joe Todd, member of the Graham High School Band, closed the open air part of the program with "Taps" as a tribute to our Civil War dead.

The program continued inside the auditorium as everyone sang "The Yellow Rose of Texas." Dr. Cora Maud Oneal spoke words of appreciation and thanks from the Fort Belknap Historical Society, and to all who had so graciously assisted in the Young County Historical Civil War Centennial, especially to the Rolling Plains Wagon Train; the beautiful girls in costume, the Graham PK Drillettes, presenting the flags, the buggy, the tally-ho, the decorated floats carrying the ladies in pioneer costumes, provided by Chas. Hipp, parade marshal and the Wagon Master, Gerald Hoffman, as he introduced the owner and driver of individual wagons as they passed in review. All of this brought color, atmosphere, and spirit, as only Texas can bring. Fort Belknap was all dressed up in her Sunday clothes, ground covered with beautiful green carpet, shade trees, and the grape arbor so inviting.

Mrs. J. W. Bullock, county chairman, presented the officers, committees, and helpers. Dr. Neighbours, marking chairman, listed historical sites for future marking, and plans. The program ended at noon with all standing and singing "We're Tenting Tonight" and "God Bless America." Benediction and table grace was said by Judge Thompson. Zebbie's Bar-B-Que dinner was served under the Grape Arbor. The Rolling Plains Mule Train rolled out of Fort Belknap around 2 p. m. for Graham and the

## Special venire, 200 called for murder trial, June 22

A special venire of 200 persons have been summonsed for the trial of Allen L. Cook and Willie Ray Cook, who have been indicted for the murder of Glen Dale (Bud) Carnley, Tuesday, April 14, 1964.

Carnley, 20, who was fatally stabbed in a fracas following an argument, suffered a great loss blood from a leg wound and was dead on arrival at the Graham hospital. The incident occurred 10 miles south of Graham off State Highway 254.

The Cooks are free, under \$10,000 bonds.

Carnley and a party of three other men, Jackie Carter, Kenneth Borden and Charles Hayes all of Graham were fishing at a spot on the river across from a spot where the Cooks and three other men had established a camp for cutting cedar posts.

The fishing party claimed the cedar cutters were firing guns, an argument ensued and it is said the cedar cutters crossed the river and attacked the fishermen. Carnley was stabbed and the rest of the party fled, returning later to find Carnley suffering badly from loss of blood.

Jack Q. Neal, district attorney, will be the prosecutor in the case.
