## Special examination to represent clients before IRS

The Internal Revenue Service announced today that a Special Enrollment Examination will be conducted by the Dallas IRS office on September 24 and 25, 1964.

The Special Enrollment Examination presents an opportunity for those who are NOT attorneys, certified public accountants, nor qualified former IRS employees, to establish proof of competence to represent their clients at all levels of procedure before the Service. An examination fee of \$25 must be paid with the application. In addition, a \$25 enrollment fee is applicable to successful candidates.

Applications postmarked not later than August 31, 1964, are to be filed with the Director of Practice, Washington, D. C. Detailed information and forms concerning the examination may be obtained by writing to R. R. Bishop, Examination Co-ordinator, IRS, P. O. Box 594, Dallas, Texas 75221.

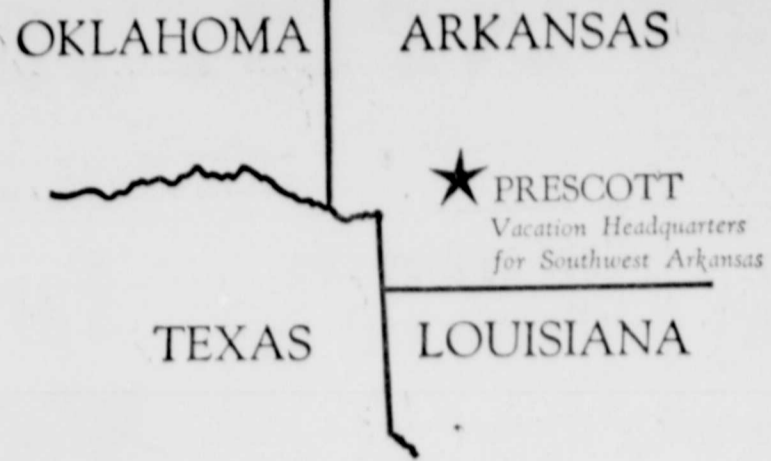
