Wings must be left on birds

The most important change in migratory game laws this year concerns the requirement calling for hunters to leave one wing on all dove, ducks and geese killed.

The change is designed to enable the conservation officer to determine at a glance the species of bird in possession. The new law will eliminate the old practice of hunters dressing dove in the field by tearing out the breast and throwing the rest away.

This cannot be done now until the birds are taken home.

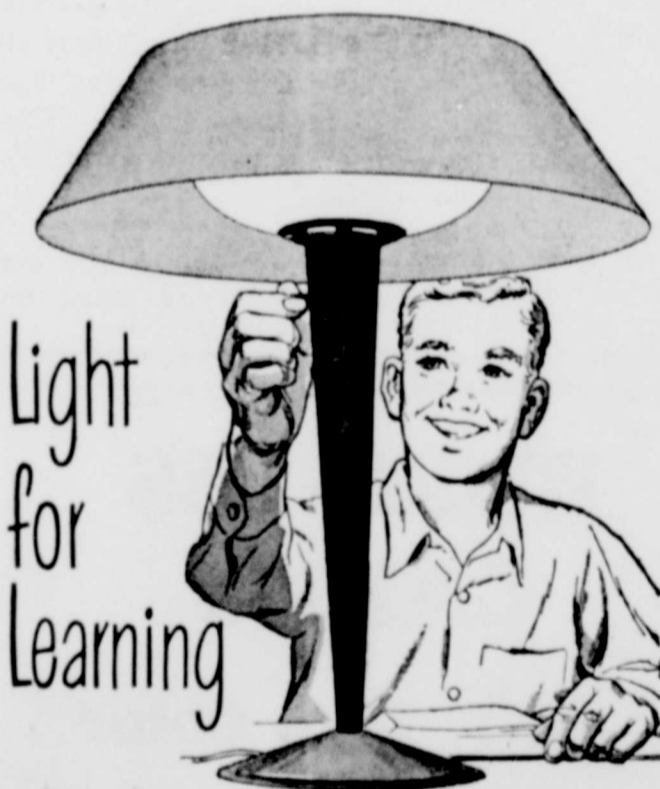
