## Bobcats suffer first defeat of season at Rule, 22-6

The Rule Bobcats beat their cousins from Newcastle Friday night in Rule, 22-6. It was the first loss of the season for Newcastle, who are now 5-1 for the year. The little Bobcats gave away almost 20 pounds per man, but beat themselves with fumbles and intercepted passes.

The Newcastle Bobcats kicked off to get the game started. Rule took the ball down to the Newcastle 15 before they lost the ball on downs. The Bobcats of Newcastle made two first downs and lost the ball on a fumble, the first of many. Once again Rule lost the ball on downs and Newcastle punted out.

Rule having a third down needing 24 yards for first, quick-kicked to Newcastle's five. On the first play Newcastle fumbled and Rule recovered. Three plays later Rule scored the first TD of the game with Ronnie May, Rule's fine tailback. Rule passed for the two points after. Newcastle moved the ball deep into Rule's territory shortly before the half on two passes from TB Donnie Hulse to Preston Pitts.

In the third quarter Rule kicked off to Newcastle, and once again Newcastle fumbled the ball away inside the 20. In five plays Rule scored their second TD and kicked the extra point.

Donnie Hulse got Newcastle on the scoreboard three plays later when he broke away for a 50 yard dash for the Bobcat's only score. Newcastle held Rule on downs but got a pass intercepted on the next series of downs, and Rule's last TD came on a four yard run by 190 pound fullback, Corneilus. No scores were made in the fourth quarter, but Newcastle was on their 1 yard line when the game was over. Defensive standouts for Newcastle were Terry Boroughs, John Taack, Mike Mitchell and Harold Whiteley.

## Historical meeting at Fort Belknap big success

Historians from over the state of Texas gathered at old Fort Belknap on Saturday, October 17, 1964 for the annual meeting of the society.

Dr. Cora M. O'Neal Wichita Falls, president of the society, presided at what has been termed the best meeting ever held.

Highlights of the day was the review of COMANCHE LAND (by J. E. Harston) by the Henrietta lawyer, Donley Suddath. Two numbers on the program met with real approval of the over 200 assembled: the concert of Civil War songs rendered by TWC drama students, and the reading of an original historical poem by the librarian of Yoakum county.

Bill Campbell Gilbert McPherson and David Zapeda, dressed in Civil War costume, accompanied by guitars, rendered "Bonnie Blue Flag," "Lorena" and "Cold War." They were introduced by Dr. Mason Johnson, director of drama at TWC in Ft. Worth.

Rheba Coop Burgess of Denver City, Texas, rendered her own composition of FORT BELKNAP ON THE BRAZOS, written while a senior at Newcastle High School. She was dressed in appropriate costume and gave her own poem while an 80 year old organ played by Mrs. Florence Pendergrass, rendered music in the background.

## Lone Star Fertilizer plant will soon be completed

Dallas: Construction of Lone Star Producing Company's \$20,000,000 Trinity River Chemical Fertilizer Complex will be completed on schedule this fall, according to Roy E. Jury, vice president, Chemical.

Mr. Jury said construction schedules calling for completed ammonia producing facilities by September 1, and completed ammonium nitrate facilities by October 1, have been met. Urea and ammonium phosphate producing units will be finished by November 1, 1964.

The Trinity River complex annually will produce some 267,000 tons of LSP fertilizer.

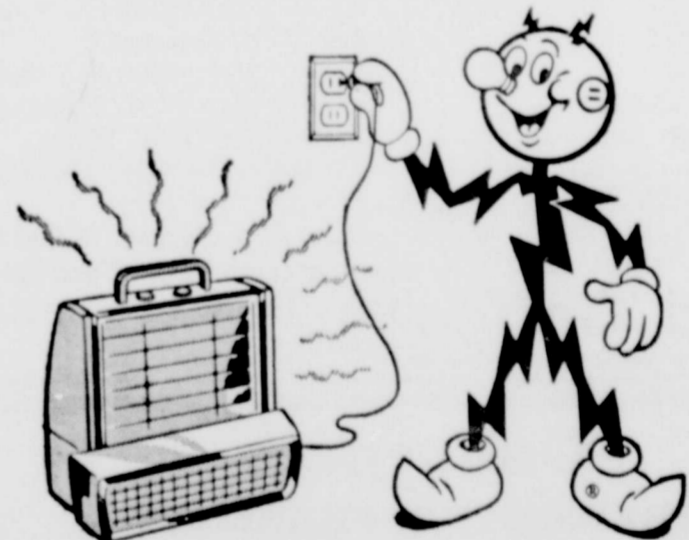
