27 Grain Varieties Being Tested

Young County small grain producers will have an opportunity to watch their favorite wheat, oat and barley varieties as they grow side by side in a demonstration plot recently planted, reports L. M. McCarroll, county agent.

This variety plot is located on Highway 251 between Newcastle and Olney on the Gene Lowe farm.

The plot contains 13 wheat varieties, 11 oat varieties, and 3 barley, seeded on October 15. 100 pounds of 18 46-0 fertilizer was applied per acre at the time of planting. This demonstration is a cooperative affair and is being carried out with the cooperation of Dr. I. M. Adkins, in charge of small grain work in Texas with headquarters at Texas A&M; the local agricultural agents and the Newcastle Vocational Agriculture Chapter. Every member of the FFA chapter will have an important part in helping carry out this demonstration including seeding, printing and placing signs for the varieties, harvesting, and other necessary work in connection with completing this demonstration. Ward Pendleton, chapter advisor, and several of the boys were on hand for the seeding. Four boys who were of special help included Jack Clayton, John Tomlinson, Wayne Davis, and Harold Whiteley. It was the responsibility of these four boys to completely clean the drill and supply seed after each variety was sowed.

Wheat varieties included Comanche, Tascosa, Crockett, Bison, Gage, Improved Triumph, Ottawa, Scout, Lancer, Warrior Caddo, Kaw, and Early Triumph. Oat varieties were DuBois, Moregrain, Suregrain, New Nortex, Alamo-X, Bronco, Mustang, Ora, Cimarron, Forke-deer, Tennes. Barley varieties included Rogers, Cordova, and Will.

Plans now call for 40 pounds of nitrogen to be used as a top dress in February in addition to the fertilizer put down at seeding time. This demonstration should prove very educational from the standpoint of total production of each variety as well as disease resistance, winter kill, insect resistance, and other important information. Wheat, oat, and barley farmers are invited to visit the demonstration plot at any time or to contact the vocational agriculture teacher at Newcastle or the county agent for additional information.

Gene Lowe serves as chairman of the Young County Crops Sub-Committee and is furnishing the land, equipment, and fertilizer for this demonstration.

Berries net Belknap farmer \$275 per acre

Liston Hearne of Belknap, likes fruit farming and truck cropping, and is making it pay. Hearne has lived in Young county most of his life and has many years of experience in growing and marketing fruits and vegetables. He is willing to share some of his experiences with the general public and is serving as a member of the Young County Horticulture Sub-Committee for the coming year.

Berries are one of his favorite crops. Three years ago he set one acre to Wonder Berries, on his deep sandy farm. As two year old vines, 600 gallons of berries were harvested last year. "Where we pick the berries, they sell for \$1 per gallon." "We get 50c per gallon if you pick them," he said. "I figure I netted about \$275 from this one acre last year." According to Hearne, the patch was plowed 10 times, hoed three times, pruned one time, and fertilized. He uses a shovel full of barnyard fertilizer per vine each year. "I don't know of many field crops that would give me as great a return for my labor and investments as do berries; in fact, I plan to put in two or three more acres of berries this next year." Hearne believes that he could have easily have sold five times as many berries this past year had they been available. The patch is kept clean and free of weeds. The berries are easy to pick because of the training and pruning practices followed.

In addition to berries, the Hearne orchard contains 100 peach trees, 50 apples, 30 pecan, 12 apricots, and some pears. Peach varieties include Burband Elbertas, Dixie Red, Ranger, and Red Globe. The apples are of the Golden Delicious, Double Red Delicious, and Hollands. The apricots are all Bryants. Liston did maintain quite a grape vineyard but is taking out all of the vines because of the extra labor involved and the bird prob-

lem at harvest time.

His watermelons are well known throughout the area. He had four acres last year that were all sold at the farm. He says, "year in and year out, I can clear \$20 per acre from my melons." He uses 16-20-0 fertilizer in each hill at planting time, but feels he could easily increase yields by one-third with additional fertilizer as a side dress.

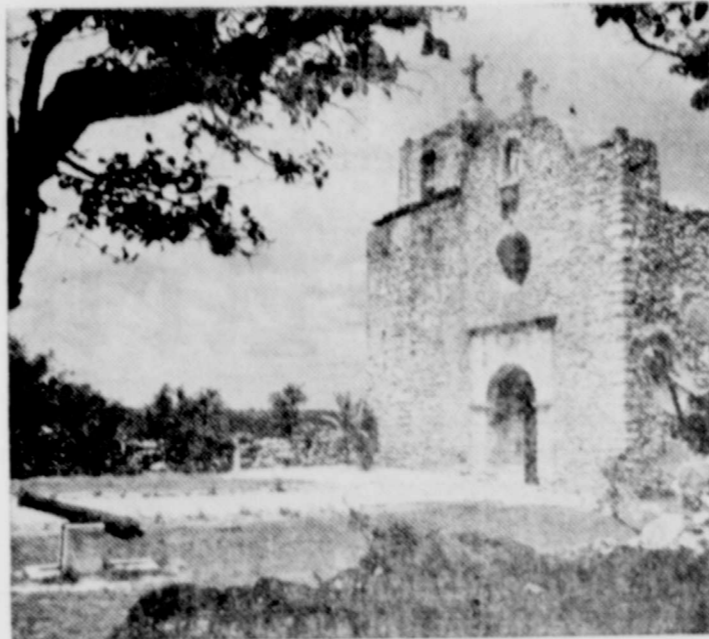
