NEWCASTLE'S TALKING BI-LINGUAL MAGPIE

Once in a great while "Filthy" is so quarrelsome Mrs. Proffitt has to whip him. When she does, "Filthy" sulks and will not say one word to her for two or three days.

In Capulin, N. M., where Proffitt caught the wild magpie, some Spanish speaking persons were often around the combination service-station-feed store, and there, while very young, "Filthy" learned many Spanish words. He has remained bi-lingual.

Since the maximum life span of a magpie is about 12 years, ole 'Filthy' is nearing his age of retirement and is living up to the cliché "chatters like a magpie."

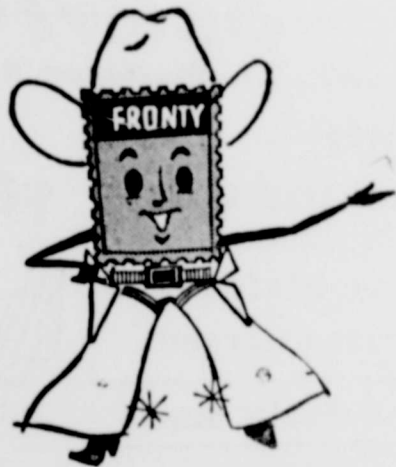
