Calvin E. Clark, 57, of Newcastle, died in an Olney hospital about 3 a. m. Wednesday morning. Service will be at 3 p. m. today (Thursday) from the Hamilton Street Church of Christ in Olney, with Richard Lunsford, minister of the Church of Christ at Newcastle, officiating.

Clark was a native of this community and resided here throughout his life except for several years as a rancher and farmer near Muleshoe. He was well and favorably known, and the many friends will regret to bear of his passing.

Bobcats win district 26-B track meet at Wichita Falls

The Newcastle Bobcats beat out favored Throckmorton, and actually coasted to the District 26-B track and field championship Wednesday of last week at Coyote Field in Wichita Falls.

There were several heroes in the Cat's surprise win. It was evident early that the Hounds couldn't repeat as champs Woodson took an early lead in the field events, but after the first few events the Bobcats took a lead they never relinquished.

The sprint relay, the first running event, was to be a close race, but a Cat team of Terry Creel, John Tomlinson, Preston Pitts and Donnie Hulse, sped to a new record of 45.9 to beat 2nd and 3rd place Woodson and Throckmorton by 15 yd. Both were timed at 47.6.

The big point getters were the high hurdlers. The Cats took the first three places, as John Taack was first with a 16.7; Preston Pitts second in 16.7, and Jack Clayton third in 17.3.

Mike Mitchell set a new standard in the Pole vault with a jump of 11' 5 1/2". Mitchell had a real duel with Woodson's Latham and his own team mate, Jack Clayton.

The times were fairly good despite the wet track, which was half covered by water.

Terry Creel, despite a badly pulled muscle, picked up 23 points, two firsts and a second. The Cats regional chances depend much on how well the muscle mends.

Donnie Hulse was the biggest point getter in the meet with five first places. Donnie set a new record in the 220 at 23.3. Donnie accumulated 45 points.

John Taack tied for first in the high jump but gets credit for a new district mark at 5' 8".

The Cats will be in the regional meet this week end in Denton. Nine boys will enter eight individual events and both relays.

THE McDONALD BROTHERS

On June 9, 1881, three brothers, Middleton, Pete and Nick McDonald, rode into Belknap, stopping at the J. E. Martin store. Among the articles they purchased were blankets and food. They started to leave with out offering to pay, and when Mr. Martin demanded payment he was shot and killed.

From Belknap the McDonald brothers went in a southwest direction and crossed the Brazos River near Belknap. Instead of going directly across the river they went down the river quite some distance before coming up out of the river; perhaps this was to throw anyone trailing them off their track.

A wire was sent to Governor Roberts requesting that he offer a reward for the apprehension of the murderers of J. E. Martin.

Soon a posse was formed including Sheriff James Melton, John Crain and others whose names are not known.

After trailing the brothers for some time, we are told they were overtaken at the home of a kinsman, just what place or county is not known. When night time came, the posse came near the kinsman's home. The McDonald brothers were sleeping in the yard. Two of them appeared to be asleep and the other was acting as guard. In the early morning hours, it was noticed that the guard was growing sleepy. Soon he too was lying down.

When it was evident the three were asleep, Sheriff Melton and

Mr. Crain, over the protest of others, slowly and quietly crawled near the sleeping brothers.

While the sheriff had him covered, Mr. Crain took their guns, then stood up and called out for them to wake up and give up. As they awoke they grabbed for their guns, but no guns were in reach. Crain stated the noise awakened a woman in the house who came to the door with a shot gun threatening to shoot him.

In his commanding voice he told her to put the gun down or be shot down. She chose to put the gun down.

The brothers were brought to Graham and lodged in the county jail. While in their cell, they were continually taking exercises, apparently trying to keep fit for any opportunity they might have for escape.

On September 20, 1881, the three brothers were indicted for murder. The presiding Judge was B. F. Williams and John F. Brim was District Attorney. Members of the Grand Jury were: D. C. Brooks, foreman, Dud Benge, A. Don Brown, John Caviness, A. T. Gay, Joe Graham, J. M. Kirby, John Proffitt, N. J. Timmons, W. Timmons, F. L. Thomas and R. E. Mabry. Witnesses called before the Grand Jury were: Mrs. J. E. Martin, Wm. Holly, J. H. Graham, George Terrell, Joe Melton, John Crain, E. J. Masie, Robert Williams, Jud King, Allen Horner, C. O. Reddie, David Allen and W. B. Pope.

On January 1, 1882, deputies Sam Murphy and Dave Melton went to the jail to feed the prisoners. Each of the deputies were armed. On this day Sam Murphy was to eat the New Year's meal with the J. C. Casburn family.

The three McDonald brothers were in the same cell. While they were eating Sam Murphy handed his gun to Dave Melton and went in the cell with a hatchet and tapped on the bars to see if they had been tampered with, while Dave Melton stood in the door of the cell holding a gun in each hand.

C. Runyon, 86 pioneer citizen passes away

C. Runyon, 86, a long time citizen of this community, died in the Olney hospital at 10:30 a. m. Saturday, April 17, after an illness of several days.

Runyon was born March 1, 1879, place unknown. He had lived in Newcastle the past 45 years, coming here from Colorado. He operated a picture show here for several years.

Survivors include one son, Harrison of Newcastle; one daughter, Mrs. Violet Cheatwood, Tempe, Ariz.; and three grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Monday April 19, 1965, in the Lunn Funeral Home Chapel at Olney, with Rev. R. D. Williams, pastor of the Newcastle Baptist Church, officiating.

Burial was in Newcastle Cemetery, with Lunn Funeral Home in charge.

One of the McDonald brothers asked him for a match. Mr. Melton put both guns in his left hand and with his right hand offered him the match. Instead of taking the match, he grabbed the guns. Immediately the McDonald brothers left their cell taking Dave Melton with them and went into the guard room for more arms. When Sam Murphy turned around and saw what had happened, he hurriedly went toward the guard room and as he stepped in he was shot and killed instantly.

When the shot at the jail was heard, men knew something was wrong and some of them went by the J. C. Short Hardware Company, grabbed guns and shells and made for the jail. J. C. Casburn, on his way to the jail, met Benton Kramer, who gave him a gun and shells. When he reached the jail one of the brothers looking out of the window said to him, "I don't want to hurt you, but if you make a move I will kill you."

When the McDonald brothers came out of the jail with Dave Melton as hostage they stated if anyone fired a shot, they would kill Dave Melton. From the jail they went in a southerly direction, and when they were east of the back end of the Graham Land Office building, someone opened fire on them. They began to shoot back and the battle was on. When the battle was over, the McDonald brothers were dead. Dave Melton had been shot through the mouth and Joe Ellis shot in the knee.

In the lonely timber about 200 yards east of the Pioneer Cemetery, one finds a few rocks, perhaps used for grave markers, and a sunken place. This is where the McDonald brothers are buried. They are buried beside the grave of one who was convicted and hanged for murder. As one views this lonely and unattended place where these four bodies are buried, you realize how truthful is the Bible verse, "Be sure your sins will find you out."

Kenneth Reeves, 29, born October 3, 1935, at Newcastle, and had resided here all his life. He was an oil field worker, and a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors are his wife, three sons, Mark, Ricky, Lynn, Kei h, one daughter, Margaret, of Newcastle; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Reeves of Newcastle; one brother, Don Reeves of Graham; four sisters, Mrs. Royce Holder, Olney; Mrs. Pete Trimble, Elbert; Miss Juanita Reeves, California; Mrs. Virgil Williams, Newcastle.

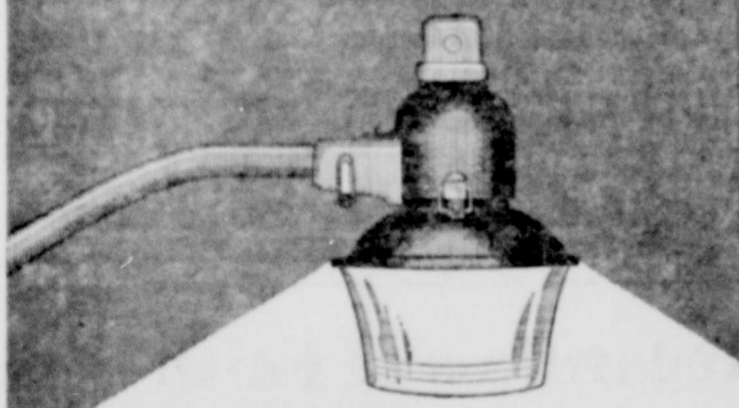
