Mrs. Charitye Lowe, age 79, a long time and highly respected citizen of the True community, passed away in the Olney hospital at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday after a short illness. She had been in declining health for several years.

Mrs. Lowe was born September 27, 1885, in Baxter County, Ark., the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Talburt, pioneer settlers in the True community. She was married in 1919 in Throckmorton county to J. D. Lowe, a prominent farmer in the True community. Mr. Lowe passed away in 1934.

Mrs. Lowe had resided in the True community for the past 60 years, and had a host of friends who will regret to hear of her passing.

She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include one son, Gene Lowe of Newcastle, three grandchildren; and one brother, John Talburt, of Littlefield.

Funeral service were held at 10 a. m. Thursday (today) from the First Methodist Church in Newcastle, with the pastor, Rev. Ernest C. Hewitt, officiating.

Burial was in the True Cemetery under direction of Lunn Funeral Home of Olney.

T. A. "Tink" Daniel drowns in lake near Soper, Okla.

Hugo, Okla., May 23—

An 82 year old Choctaw county man drowned Friday in a freak fishing accident five miles southwest of Soper in a heavily wooded area.

The victim was T. A. Daniels, a retired farmer who lived two miles west of Soper.

The accident occurred at what is known as Lake Tipton. Daniels had gone fishing with a grandson, Johnny Logue, 17. Sheriff Ed Thornton said the grandson left the immediate scene where they were fishing for a short while and when he returned to the location he found his grandfather hanging from the boat by one foot and leg, with his head under the water.

He had apparently stumbled in the boat and caught his foot under one of the cross pieces, Thornton said.

The grandson got the victim to shore and went for help.

Services were held Sunday at the Soper Baptist Church, at 3 p. m. Burial was in the Soper Cemetery with Coffey Funeral home in charge.

Daniels, a native of Eastland, Texas, where he was born Jan. 16, 1883, had lived in Soper 18 years. He was a member of the Baptist church.

Survivors include six sons, Leon of Irving, Texas, Floyd of Fort Worth, T. A. Jr., and J. W. of Roswell, N. M., Elmer of Bakersfield, Calif.; William of Graham, Texas; three daughters, Mrs. Zella Higgins, Lancaster, Texas; Miss Elwana Daniels and Mrs. Zora Logue of Soper; six sisters, including Mrs. Trudy Winters, Stringtown; Mrs. Ira Doshier, Chickasha; and Mrs. Eva Young, Mergargel, Texas; a brother, Jeff of Stringtown; 31 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren.

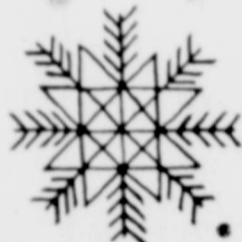

The threat to livestock and the heavy loss to the farm economy caused by leptospirosis is generally recognized. But the threat this disease poses to people often receives little attention.

A study of recent figures shows why more attention should be given to this livestock disease and its threat to humans. During the years 1958-60, some 18 per cent of the persons stricken by leptospirosis died. Authorities blame this rather high death rate on lack of proper recognition of seemingly mild infections and their possible consequences.

In humans, lepto may cause headaches, fever and jaundice. Among animals the disease primarily affects cattle, hogs, sheep, horses and dogs. Since lepto is so widespread in our animal population, it is easy to see why there is concern for the threat it poses to people.

The disease is often spread through the urine of carrier animals. Humans or animals coming into contact with equipment, ground, streams or ponds which may have been contaminated in this way may well contact lepto. A case in point was an incident in a midwestern state not too long ago when 40 persons became infected after swimming in a slow-moving rural stream.



Unfenced farm ponds may become sources of leptospirosis infection for both people and livestock.

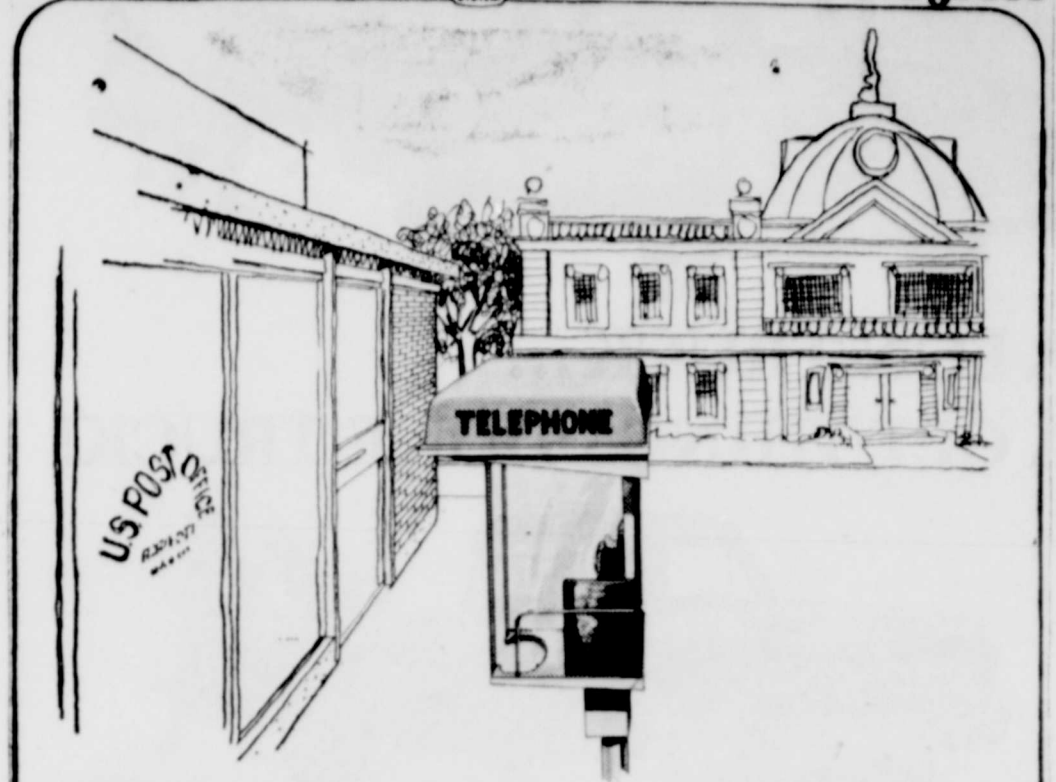
Thus the warnings: stay clear of slow-moving streams, and ponds which are not fenced, do not drink raw milk, and be especially careful around animals sick with lepto and around equipment the sick animals may have contaminated.

One way to help blunt the threat of lepto to people is to do everything possible to control the disease in animals. The best and safest assurance against it is to have a veterinarian vaccinate animals in areas where the disease has been a problem. This can stop it at its source.

Prompt treatment of animals which may become infected also will help.

Symptoms of lepto in animals generally include loss of appetite, abortions and fever.

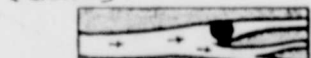
