## Mrs. Grace Johnston 84, passes away

Mrs. Grace Bullock Johnston, 84, of Newcastle, passed away Friday morning in an Olney hospital. She had been in declining health for several years. Mrs. Johnston was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Bullock, pioneer settlers and ranchers, a few miles east of Fort Belknap.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Saturday from the chapel of Morrison Funeral Home in Graham, with Rev. Don Campbell, pastor of the First Christian Church in Olney, officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery of Graham.

Mrs. Johnston was born July 20, 1881, in Dallas County and moved to Young County with her parents when she was a child. June 28, 1905, she was married to Frank E. Loran. To this union was born one son, Terrell Eugene Loran.

She was married to the late J. N. Johnston in 1921 while he was superintendent of Newcastle Schools, and she was a teacher in the school. A retired teacher, Mrs. Johnston had taught in many schools of this area. She also taught at Floydada for several years, where they moved to in 1922.

Mrs. Johnston moved back to Newcastle in 1950 and resided here until her death.

Early in life Mrs. Johnston united with the Baptist Church, later joining the Christian Church with Mr. Johnston.

Survivors are one son, Terrell Loran of Levelland; two grandsons, Gene Loran of Levelland and Jack Loran of Lubbock; six great-grandchildren; one brother, Robert Bullock of Newcastle; two sisters, Mrs. M. H. Thompson of Houston and Mrs. T. J. Pendergrass of Newcastle.

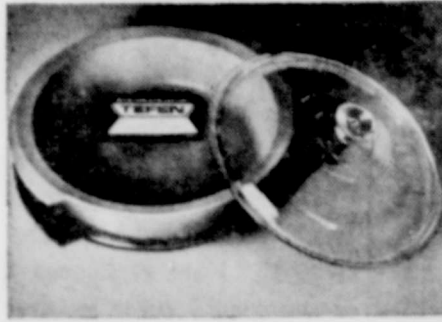
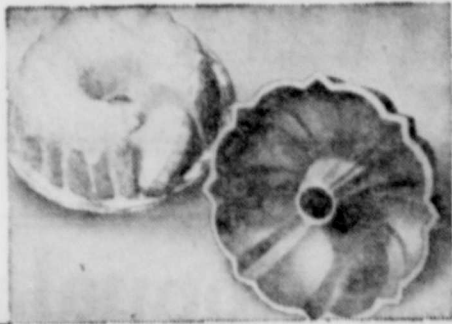

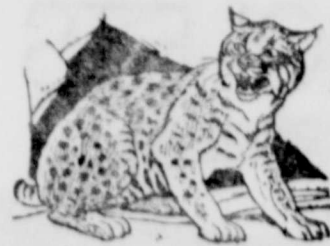
