## Primary Elections Saturday

### Manhunt Halted Wednesday

A massive manhunt for two of three escaped prisoners was called off at 12:30 p. m. Wednesday as hunters ran out of clues in an area south of Newcastle - Elbert farm road.

The intersection of the Newcastle - Elbert and Newcastle - Olney roads in Newcastle at one time Wednesday morning looked as though a police convention was taking place.

The hunt began about 5 p. m. Tuesday when Jackie Cooper, an employee of the Jeffery Ranch northwest of Newcastle, discovered an abandoned pickup hidden in some woods on the ranch. He notified police who in turn found that the pickup had been stolen in Wichita Falls Sunday night, the same night the trio escaped jail.

Cooper, Charles Gunn, Highway Patrolman, Tom Jeffery, a city patrolman in Fort Worth who was visiting his father, and his father Ed Jeffery, returned to the pickup and noticed that the men apparently had made camp near a stock tank on the ranch.

The men attempted to close in and capture the fugitives but apparently they heard the men coming and fled. Two of the men headed south while the third doubled back and was heading for the pickup when Tom Jeffery spotted him and fired a shot over his head. This was about 6 p. m.

The man, identified as Weldon Leon Emory, immediately surrendered and was taken into custody and placed in the Olney city jail.

There the search began for the other two, identified as Billy Wayne Howard, formerly of the Olney area, and Darwin Meharg of Wichita Falls.

Throughout the night automobiles, trucks and pickups going into or out of the area bordered by the Newcastle-Olney, Olney - Padgett and Newcastle - Padgett roads were stopped and searched. As many as 37 units of the Highway Patrol, Wichita County, Young County and Archer County Sheriff's Departments and the Texas Rangers were in the area as well over 50 troopers took part in the search.

Operations continued all night and early Wednesday morning six or seven armed horsemen joined in the search starting at the pond where the men were first sighted and continuing south following their tracks.

Several air planes and helicopters were made available to searchers attempting to locate the fugitives, but attempts were futile.

### Pasture Short Course Set By Ag Department

A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held May 9-12, under the sponsorship of the Newcastle High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Wayne Hales, Superintendent, and Ward Pendleton, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Phillip Nix, pasture specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences at Texas A & M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M University.

Nix holds a B.S. degree in Agricultural Education from Texas A & M University, and has completed work at A & M toward an M.S. degree. He has also done work in Agronomy. He has had nineteen years of field experience as a county agricultural agent, where much of the emphasis was on pasture production.

"Many pasture short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Nix and all have met with outstanding success," according to Ralph Moser, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Stephenville, Texas. Arrangements for adult education short courses in pasture and in other fields are made through Moser's office.

The short course at Newcastle is scheduled to begin May 9 at 7:30 in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of 4 will be held May 10-11-12. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Nix will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Ward Pendleton.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Hales, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Pendleton. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Pasture Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Nix states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as adapted grasses and legumes, fertilization, weed control, grazing management and grazing systems. Student activity only.

The primary purpose of the course is helping farmers and ranchers to make the most profit from their pastures.

"Short courses in pasture, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A & M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A & M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A & M.

"This cooperative program," stated Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef production, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm arc welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy science, oxy-acetylene welding, and pasture.

### Young Finds Coins Following Rains

W. W. Young is convinced that it has been raining money on his farm. After the weekend deluges at his farm east of Olney, he found five coins, and all of them with old dates.

Included in the find was a penny made in 1928, a dime minted in 1873 and a dime estimated to be about 100 years old, an 1899 Liberty Head nickel and an 1871 half-dollar.

Young said that the rains washed the coins to the surface after having been buried for several years.

### Cotton Voting Planned For Sale, Lease Acres

Growers in about two-thirds of the upland cotton producing counties will vote during period May 16 through May 25 on whether to permit transfer of cotton acreage allotments to other counties by sale or lease. If in any county at least two thirds of growers voting favor transfer, growers will be permitted to transfer allotments by sale or lease to farmers in other counties within same state. Allotments may not be shifted to other states.

Where approved by at least two thirds of growers voting in county, transfer of allotments to other counties for period 1967, 1968 and 1969 will be permitted. Transfer of allotments authorized in Food and Agriculture Act of 1965.

First vote on transfer of allotments held on November 23, 1965. At that time growers in 349 upland cotton producing counties voted to permit transfers. There are a total of 1,059 cotton growing counties in U. S. Only those counties which did not approve transfers last November will vote this month.

The May 16 - 25 referendum will be by mail, first time a referendum of this type has been conducted by mail. Ballots will be delivered to all cotton growers of record in counties holding referendum next month. Officials said a mail vote should be much more convenient for growers rather than having to appear in person at their polling place, particularly during busy season. USDA officials hope for good turn out in voting and will regard it as sign growers approve mail method of holding referendum. To be counted, all votes should be in office of the county ASC committee before office closing time May 25.

### Hughes Funeral Held Saturday

Funeral rites for Oscar H. Hughes, 78, were held Saturday, April 30, at the First Baptist Church in Throckmorton. He was the father of Johnny Hughes of Newcastle. He died Thursday, April 28, in a Throckmorton hospital.

Rev. Laney Johnson, pastor of the church, and Rev. Curtis Brown, pastor of Crestview Baptist Church, officiated at the services. Burial was in the Elbert Cemetery under direction of Merriman Funeral Home.

Hughes was 78 years old and had lived in Throckmorton for 72 years. He was born August 1, 1887 in Ellis County and was married in 1911 to Gertrude Wertemberger.

Survivors included the widow, four sons, one daughter, a sister, Mrs. Owens of Olney, 13 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The association has been awaiting the approval so that actual construction can begin on the proposed recreation center.



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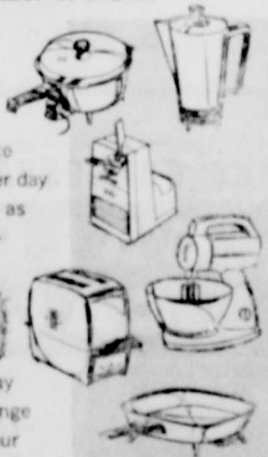
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# Cumin, Parsley, Thyme Can Add Flavor To Family Meals

Mankind has been using herbs to season his food almost as long as he has been using fire to cook it. Three of the very oldest known are cumin, parsley, and thyme.

Thyme is member of the mint family and has been used for cooking and for medicine for thousands of years. Next to sage, it is one of the most used herbs.

Thyme is a small plant, ideal for borders, sturdy in appearance and carries lavender-pinkish blooms in late May or early June. It likes a limy, almost poor soil and is most fragrant during its first two years of life.

Thyme oil is used widely in making perfumes, the fresh tops are a nice garnish, and the leaves, when chopped, fresh or dried, add a wonderful flavor and tang to food. Most cooks use "store-bought" thyme regularly, but fresh thyme will delight you with its crisp, plea-

santly bitter taste.

Parsley has been grown deliberately for more than two thousand years. There is no way to determine how long man picked it wild before he decided to cultivate it.

Greeks and Romans knew and used both flat and curly parsley and it was brought to the American continents as early as the seventeenth century.

Parsley is easy to grow, but needs a very long period of germination. Some herb growers intersperse it with radishes or early green onions, so that the small vegetable protects the seedling during its early days. Then, after the vegetable is harvested, the parsley needs no thinning.

Curled dwarf parsley is a lovely border for a herb bed or for any type of flower bed, with its frilled leaves and deep emerald color.

Use parsley for garnish, and chew a bit of it after eating foods heavily spiced with onion or garlic. As its deep green color implies, parsley is full of vitamins, and one of the most healthful of foods.

Cumin has a history as long and as varied as any other herb. It has been used by cooks, doctors and binders of spells. In the days of Isaiah, it was believed to keep chickens at home and lovers faithful.

Cumin, mint and dill were used by the Jewish people in tithing and are mentioned in the twenty-third chapter of Matthew.

Cumin is a native of the Nile

Valley area, but has been cultivated a dozen Old-World countries for centuries. It is used frequently, and to great advantage in the cooking of the Mexican people, and is grown to some extent in the United States.

Cumin is another ideal border plant. It is very short, with lacy, spiky leaves and carries umbels of tiny purple flowers. Cumin seed looks a lot like caraway, but it is embellished with long hair that fold up when the seed is dried.

It is one of the main ingredients in curry powder.

Cumin should be handled with care, at first, until you learn its distinctive taste and flavor. Try it in pickling, chili sauce, cheese dips or add a little pinch to those ordinary devilled eggs for something really unusual.

This recipe uses cumin, and is an example of the Mexican *sopa seca* . . . dry soup. Your whole family will love this.

**SOPA SECA CON CARNE**  
(Dry Soup with Meat)  
1 lb. ground round steak  
½ green pepper, chopped  
½ small onion, chopped  
1 can tomatoes  
1 can hot water  
1 chicken bouillon cube  
6-8 whole black peppers, ground  
1 large clove garlic.  
½ tsp. cumin  
salt to taste  
3 coils vermicelli

Saute the onion and green pepper until the onion is transparent; add the meat and fry until it is evenly done. Dissolve the bouillon cube in the hot water and add the tomatoes to the meat.

Now add the crushed pepper, the minced garlic, the cumin and the salt, and allow to cook gently until the flavors are well blended.

Break up the vermicelli and add it to the meat sauce. As it softens, the vermicelli will take up the sauce. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the mixture is almost dry. Serve hot, with a green salad, crusty rolls and a good dessert. Serves 4.

Allen is a participant in the Great Plains Conservation Program using the cost-share to carry out his basic conservation plan, the following practices have been achieved: Proper use of range-4719 acres, deferred grazing-1498 acres, Brush control-1128 acres, range reseeding-791 acres, cross fencing-334 rods, construction of farm ponds--3, gully control structure-1, conservation cropping system-98 acres and crop residue use-98 acres."

Allen is also active in both county and community affairs. He is President of the Young County Jr. Livestock Show Committee, Treasurer of the Young County Hereford Association, President of the Graham Area 4-H Adult Leader Club, past President of the Young County Rural Volunteer Fire Depart-

ment, Past President of the Murray Community Club and is active as a 4-H Adult Leader.

Haskell Easterling, director for Zone 1, (made up of all of Young County) says he is proud of the many conservation practices that have been carried out in this area during the past year. He was likewise complimentary of the large group from Young County that attended the Annual Upper West Fork Soil Conservation District Banquet in Bridgeport.

encouraging. David Hays says his wheat crop would have been bought cheap before the rains. Clarence Klenk believes he has some 40 bushels per acre wheat. Unfortunately that Clarence lost several acres to the hail. Joe Campbell, is thinking of planting guar on some of the hailed out wheat.

The Young County Crops Subcommittee of Newcastle and Olney area farmers serving on the committee. Gene Lowe, is Chairman, a job he has had for about 5 years. Other members include Clyde Stuteville, Robert Goodloe, Raylon Kunkel, James Kunkel, Dwight Hamilton, Bob Self, R. T. Wells, Jr., Woodrow Tack and David Hays. This group will be working toward plans for the annual small grain educational meeting and tour later this month.

Be sure you see the wheat variety and fertilizer Demonstration plot planned and being conducted by Raylon Kunkel. This plot is located on the Seymour highway about 2 miles West of Olney on the Rice Farm. Signs will be prepared and erected soon. For the time being however the plots are a grain drills width, starting with the west fence of the G. E. Jeske farm:

Yields will be determined at harvest and the results reported.

If you haven't visited the Wheat, Oat, Barley and Rye Variety Demonstration Plot on the Woodrow Tack Farm lately, may I invite you to do so. There are some big differences. Also you will be interested in seeing and checking the 5 varieties of wheat on the Dwight Hamilton Farm, near Elbert.

Now is an excellent time to bud or graft those native peans. I would suggest you consider using one of the USDA varieties. They have many advantages over some of the standard improved varieties.

Be sure and write, call or visit the County Agents office for your free copy of "Insect Control of Garden Insects". This is an easy guide to follow giving the insecticide recommended for the control of the "bugs" eating on a particular vegetable. It is important to kill the insects, but it is more important to apply an insecticide that is safe to use, still making the vegetable edible.

I enjoyed visiting a number of Olney Business Concerns with 4-H Club members in preparation for their Agribusiness reports.
