Dr. Kenneth Neighbors, President of the Genealogical Association will preside. Different aspects of genealogy will be presented by four speakers. Miss Tommie Clack of Abilene will speak on "The Elements of Genealogical Research."

Lyle W. Williams, instructor of Texas History at Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth, will speak on, "My Grandfather, Andrew J. Williams and the Belknap Area," bringing color and emphasis to the part one's family plays in genealogical study. Williams holds degrees from North Texas State University and University of Texas.

Grand Jury Returned Thirty Indictments

Thirty indictments, the greatest number in the past 15 years, were returned Thursday by a 90th District Court Grand Jury after considering evidence throughout the day, examining witnesses, and conferring with District Attorney T. J. Rodgers.

The indictments ranged from

theft, mortgaged property, burglary, embezzlement, perjury, fondling, to passing worthless checks.

Grand Jury indictments returned: State of Texas vs Billy Bert Huffman, theft; J. C. Smith, worthless checks; Earl Dempsey Shubert, fraud; Ed-

die Blackmon, theft; Stella Maria Blackmon, receiving and concealing stolen property; Dave Jordan, embezzlement; O. W. Bullock, burglary (two indictments); A. D. Stuard, forgery and passing worthless checks; and James Preston Guynes, perjury.

And, State of Texas vs William Riley Roberts, fondling, (two indictments); James Beddo, worthless checks; Willie Samuel Neal, forgery and passing worthless checks; and Richard Earl Browning, burglary. Names of other persons indicted by the Grand Jury will be released after papers have been served by the Sheriff's office according to a report by Sheriff John Edwards.

Gene Lowe served as foreman of the Graham Jury which met Thursday.

Two men indicted by the Grand Jury pleaded guilty to charges in District Court Friday before Judge E. H. Griffin. One man was transferred to the State penitentiary in Huntsville today, Monday by Deputy Sheriff Hugh Casey and Deputy Sheriff G. G. Dunaway of Olney.

J. C. Smith pleaded guilty before Judge Griffin on charges of passing worthless checks over \$50. He was assessed two years in the penitentiary.

Billy Bert Huffman received a three-year probated sentence, by Judge Griffin after pleading guilty to theft charges.

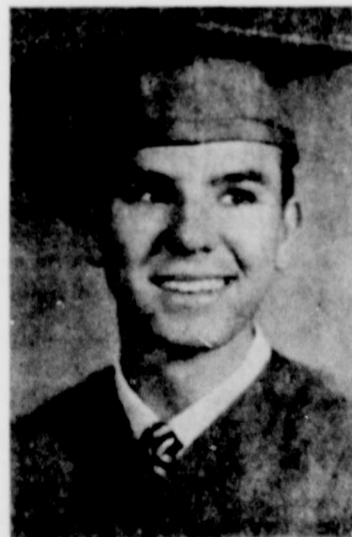

County Receives FM Road Construction

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the spending of \$81,600.00 for construction of new farm to market road mileage in Young County as part of the 1966 FM Road Program.

District Engineer L. B. Dean said 3.5 miles in the county will be involved.

The work authorized for this county is part of a 904 mile statewide farm to market road building program for 1966 as approved today by the Texas Highway Commission.

The Commission action raises to more than 38,200 miles the State's designated FM System. Projections call for an ultimate 50,000 mile system.

The Texas Farm to Market

Road system is one of the most highly developed rural highway networks in the United States and exceeds in mileage the entire highway systems of most states.

The 1966 program proposed improvements on 904 miles of FM roads at an estimated cost of approximately \$23 million.

Of the roads added by the new program, 75 per cent are school bus routes and 66 per cent are mail routes.

Today more than 8,000 busses travel more than half a million miles each school day to take more than 450,000 Texas youngsters to classes. The Texas Education Agency estimates that most of these youngsters travel over FM roads for part or all

of their daily trip to school.


It is estimated that rural mail carriers travel almost 50,000 miles over farm to market roads each day.

The original aim of the FM system, which was given impetus with passage of the Colson-Briscoe Act in 1949, was to "get the farmers out of the mud" and enable them to get their produce and livestock to market.

Though this is still a major function of the FM system, population shifts into urban areas have brought about a new function. City dwellers now have made market-to-farm roads of the FM routes as they seek week-end recreation in the country.

The project authorized for construction on this program for Young County is located as follows: From State Highway 199 South to end of FM 2652 at Red Top.
